Bangs and tuberculosis for all who this week includeddesire to have their milk cows tested. Letters have been mailed but in case you do not get a letter and desire to have your cows tested, call me before 8 o'clock Monday morning when we will start the program.

Bangs disease in cattle is the causative agent of undulant fever in man. It is transmitted from the cow to man through milk or milk products. The only way to be sure your cow does not have it is through the blood test.

While testing cows, Dr. Turner will also vaccinate pets for rabies if it is desired. Cost of the rabies shot is \$2.50; the Bangs test and tuberculosis test \$3.00.

On Thursday, November 20, Dr. Turner will set up on the west School Lunchroom Menus side of the courthouse to vaccinate all pets that need rabies shots. All MONDAY, NOVEMBER 17 dogs and other pets that were vaccinated last fall need to have their shots renewed. Dr. Turner will be here from 4:00 p.m. to 5:30 p. m. for this part of the program.

They will get most of the baits and either carry them off, eat them, or make them unfit FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 21 for the varmints. PYRAMIDS AND CASTLES TO EXPLORE

sive stone castles continue to sand years in time. lure visitors to Egypt and Syria, as they did even before the days of Marco Polo. Egypt has some eighty pyramids which extend from Cairo up the Nile. Syria and its deserts.






