

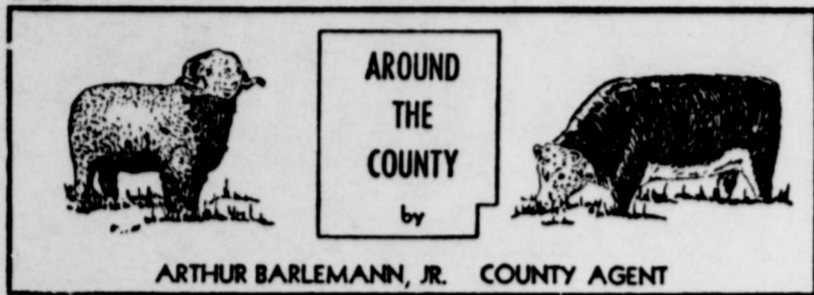

Gold Star 4-H club winners from twenty-two counties in Extension Service district 7 received their medals and certificates at the luncheon Saturday in the Cotillion Room of the Town House. West Texas Utilities Company was host at the luncheon which was enjoyed by club members, adult leaders, and county extension agents.

Earl Rudder, vice-president of Texas A&M College, was speaker at the luncheon. Rudder told the guests that he was a 4-H club and FFA member at Brady High School. He said that he felt that this gave him something to work for when he joined the club and kept him out of the soda fountain and assorted mischief. He said that the future of the democracy of which we are so proud rests on the young people; the eyes of the rest of the world are on us and it is up to us to maintain that respect and the type of government that so many of the rest of the world's people are striving for a democratic form of government with equality and freedom for all.

Sterling county 4-H club members Carolyn Payne and Reynolds Lee Foster were among those who received medals and certificates. Others who attended were Mrs. Leslie Payne and Reynolds Foster, adult leaders, and Mrs. Barlemann and the county agent.

The coming Christmas season is one of joy and happiness to many. To others, far too many each year, it ends in sorrow and grief. During this season of the year fire hazards are concentrated in the home and many accidents happen.

The Christmas tree is the center of most home decorations and gaiety and is also the chief offender in many of the mishaps. Before the tree is placed in the house, it should be cut diagonally at the base and placed in water or wet sand. This keeps the tree fresh and helps in retarding fires. Place it away from the fireplace, heaters, or powerful

electric lights. Use only Underwriters approved lights. Check old sets for broken wires, frayed insulation, or damaged sockets. Do not overload electrical circuits by using "octopus" to plug in too many circuits or extension cords for lights, decorations, or toys. Use non-inflammable decorations on the tree; turn off the lights at night when retiring or when away from home. Discard the tree when it becomes dry and the needles begin to fall. If you smoke, be especially careful with cigarettes or other smoking material. There is usually an accumulation of wrapping paper and the like around during the holidays. Be careful and keep the season happy and joyous.

Two new bulletins are available in the county agent's office now. They are: **The Great Plains Conservation Program—What Is It?** bulletin number L-410; and **Snorter Dwarfs in Beef Cattle**, number L-412.

The one on the Great Plains program explains the program in simple language. It was written by Lyn Pitard, Assistant Soil and Water Conservationist for the Extension Service. It explains how a land owner can benefit from the program's provisions. Also, it gives advantages and disadvantages of the program.

Sterling County is not yet in the Great Plains Program but is on the edge of the area. It is possible in the future that we will be in it.

The bulletin on snorter dwarfs was written by L.A. Maddox and Uel D. Thompson, Animal Husbandman for the Extension Service. It is short and very informative on a subject that has caused much controversy and discussion among cattlemen. It gives a good rundown on the causes and results of dwarfism in a short space. Diagrams are used to show how dwarfs result.

Both bulletins are on hand. A copy of either or both can be had by coming by the office or dropping me a card requesting the one you might want.

Plans for the Sterling County Cancer Drive will be laid at a meeting here on January 7, it was said.

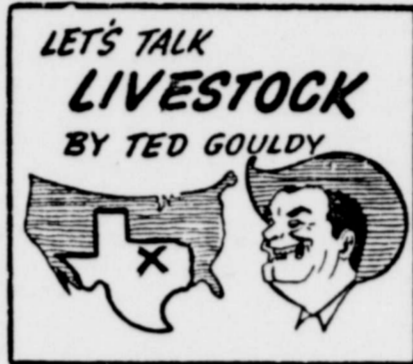

CATTLE DEMAND CONTINUES EXTREMELY HIGH IN TEXAS

FORT WORTH, Dec. 8—Offerings of cattle around the nation's major livestock markets Monday was about ten percent higher than a week ago and at Fort Worth, the increase was nearly thirty percent. Both slaughter interests and the buyers of stockers and feeders moved in early and cleaned up supplies at Fort Worth before the noon hour.

Veterans in the trade still find reason to wonder at the continued demand for stocker and feeder cattle this late in the season. The answer, of course lies in the abundant feed supplies both in the pastures and in the barns.

Cattle and calf prices Monday reflected the strength of the market as fed steers and yearlings of the good or choice variety sold from \$25 to \$28.50, the top figure for some club steers from Graham (Young County). Commercially fattened cattle reached \$27 to \$28 without difficulty, and heavy-weight baby beef calves again soared to \$30.

Some weeks ago in the column we reported the trade here speculating on the probability of \$30 fat calves this Winter. The \$30 and better level was reached at least a month prior to those "educated guesses" of last month.

Feeder steers weighing 660 pounds from the Double L Ranch, Hood County, scored \$28.75 and some 573-pound stocker yearlings drew \$31. Light heifer calves scored \$33 and some steer calves ranged from \$34 down. This sort of stocker demand this late in the season reflects the strong undertone of the cattle trade in the Southwest.

Comparative prices included: Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold from \$25 to \$28, a package of over 700-pound yearlings at \$28. Three loads of 1,080 pound steers from Castro County drew \$27, and some eight other load lots of fed steers were reported from \$25 to \$27. Medium and plain butcher steers and yearlings drew \$18 to \$24.

Fat cows sold mostly from \$18.50 to \$20, a few young butcher cows to \$21 and above. Canners and cutters drew mostly \$13 to \$19, some emaciated canners of doubtful health down to \$12 and below. Bulls were reported from \$18 to \$23, some stocker bulls up to \$25.

Good and choice stocker steer calves cashed at \$29 to \$34 and some bull calves reached \$32.50. Stocker heifer calves ranged from \$33 downward. Stocker steer yearlings ranged from \$24 to \$31, some 575-pound yearlings at \$31, and some feeder yearlings scaling 660 pounds cashed at \$28.75. A few stocker cows drew \$18 to \$21.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold from \$25 to \$30, the top figure usually for heavyweights of the baby beef type. Plain and medium slaughter calves cleared at \$21 to \$24.50 and lower grade killers ranged from \$17 to \$21.

Walraven has operated the station several years, even while it was a Chevron Station—before the El Paso Natural Gas Sales Company bought out Chevron. Walraven said his plans for the future were not too definite at this time, but he planned to stay here. He was the first mayor of Sterling City, only leaving the position this spring.

lamb was very strong, quality of much of the offering considered. Good and choice slaughter lambs cashed at \$20 to \$21, the higher figure for 94-pound lambs with mostly No. 1 pelts, but a sprinkling of No. 2 skins were included. Some woolled lambs sold at \$20, including some around 120-pound wether lambs, and some 110-pound buck lambs scored \$20. A package of very heavy, over 150-pound lambs cashed at \$17. Feeders sold mostly at \$18 to \$19, some bucks, longtails etc., down to \$15 and \$16. A few slaughter ewes drew \$7 to \$8 and a few goats sold at \$8 to \$8.50. Slaughter aged bucks sold from \$7 to \$7.50. Yearlings sold at \$18.

BUTCHER HOGS STRONG, SOWS UNCHANGED, RUNS LIGHTER

Monday's offering of hogs around the nation's major terminals was about 13,000 under a week ago. This lent some strength to the trade on hogs at Fort Worth and other points.

Hogs were steady to stronger, mostly steady with late last week. Choice butchers scored \$18.25 to \$18.75, the higher figure sparingly on closely sorted meat type hogs. Medium to good hogs sold from \$17.50 to \$18. Sows were steady with last week's low close at mostly \$14 to \$17. Stags drew \$8 to \$13 and boars sold at \$5 to \$8.

Dr. Stover went to Brazil in 1940. He has served since 1947 as Executive Secretary of the State Convention in Minas Geraio, Brazil. The state is the size of Texas and has 10 million population. Dr. Stover and his family live in the city of Belo Horizonte that has a population of 650 thousand inhabitants. Dr. Stover has spent most of his time in evangelistic and organizational work, much time being spent in the interior with the churches.

Dr. Stover and his wife have four children, two are Americans and two are Brazilians because they were born while Dr. and Mrs. Stover were in Brazil. They will return to Brazil in January to continue their work there. Their term of service will be five years before they return to the United States.

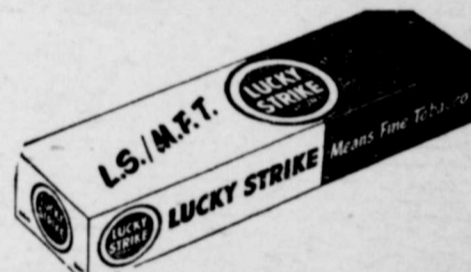

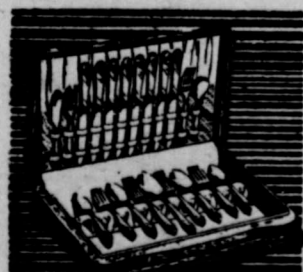

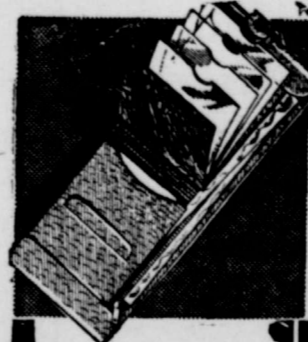

PYRAMIDS AND CASTLES TO EXPLORE

The mystery of pyramids and the impressive grandeur of massive stone castles continue to lure visitors to Egypt and Syria, as they did even before the days of Marco Polo. Egypt has some eighty pyramids which extend from Cairo up the Nile. Syria has twenty-one castles which dot its Mediterranean coastline and its deserts.

A whole day, and more, can be spent exploring a pyramid or a castle, if you are curious and unhurried. Walking around the Great Pyramid at Giza is in itself a thrilling experience, though few tourists take time to do this. The Great Pyramid, built by the Pharaoh Cheops, towers unbelievably high above you, some forty-five and more centuries old, and more impressive than the tallest skyscraper that modern man has built.

As you walk, you can stop to visit the solar boat pits, to see the symmetrical streets of stone tomb-chapels of nobles closely hugging the pyramid of their pharaoh. You can see the entrance of the Tomb of Queen Hetep-heres, mother of Cheops. You can walk down the rock causeway, which once led down to the Nile and along which blocks of granite were transported to build the Great Pyramid.

Inside the Great Pyramid

Climbing the Great Pyramid is a thrilling experience if you feel strong and husky. Agile Arab youths are provided to help you. Or you can climb up inside the Great Pyramid and visit the Queen's Chamber and the King's Chamber. To feel yourself within the very heart of one of the world's greatest monuments, and the only remaining Seventh Wonder of the Ancient World, is an awesome experience, and gives you a feeling of detach-

ment from today's world, of being transported back four thousand years in time.

Twenty-one Castles

Of castles, the most exciting Syrian castle to explore for a day is the Krak des Chevaliers, a Crusader Castle not far from Homs. It stands on a hilltop among green and rolling Syrian plains, dotted here and there with tiny stone villages. From far away the Krak looks like a story-book castle. But as you wind your way up its steep hill, you are aware of its massive stone strength—of its thick surrounding walls, its square keep, its drawbridge, its aqueduct, its moat.

The Krak des Chevaliers was so strong, in fact, that it was never taken by storm in battle. It surrendered in 1271. You can walk today along its ramparts, visit its chapel, its refectory, look seaward to the Mediterranean from its round towers, and dream of knights in armour who lived here, two thousand strong, in the early thirteenth century offering hospitality and succor to pilgrims to the Holy Land.

Should pyramids and castles become your hobby, you can easily arrange a pyramid itinerary or a castle itinerary for one of your visits to the United Arab Republic. In Egypt, in addition to the Great Pyramids, the pyramids of Dahshur, Sak-kara, Abu Sir, Lisht, Hawara, Meidum, Abu Roash are interesting to visit. Syria's most fascinating castles include Sah-yun, Marqab, Tartus, Kasr el Hair, Aleppo's Citadel, and the picturesque Turkish castle which stands on a treeless hilltop overlooking the desert caravan of Palmyra over which the beautiful and gifted Queen Zenobia once ruled.
