## North Concho River Soil Conservation News Column

Now is the time to start getting ready to do brush work. If you are planning to do root-plowing or dozing, reseeding should be done at the same time. This should be done early enough to catch spring rains. The county A.C.P. program offers cost share assistance for both brush control and reseeding work. Root-plowing and seeding dates are from January 1 to June 1. For current seed lists and prices drop by the Soil Conservation office. We will be glad to help you figure seeding rates and costs.

The district tractor, pitting plow and seeder is not in use now. This is a good time of the year to do pitting and reseeding. Ewing McEntire, Soil Conservation District custodian, has the equipment at his place west of town. The equipment rents for .60 cents per hour. The county ACP will assist in cost share payments for pitting and seeding.

Proper use of rangeland is the important factor in range improvement. Without proper use the better forage plants will not be able to survive and increase in vigor and density. Proper use is leaving enough litter and dormant topgrowth to carry the livestock through the winter and have enough stubble for the plant to come back from in the spring. This litter also helps reduce runoff and erosion. A good rule of thumb is to leave approximately half and take half of each year's growth.

## WINTER WEATHER SLOWS THINGS

Traffic was dangerous on all highways of the area with a coating of ice Sunday, Monday and most of Tuesday. The schools of the area were closed Monday and Tuesday due to the bad road conditions. School was resumed here on Wednesday.

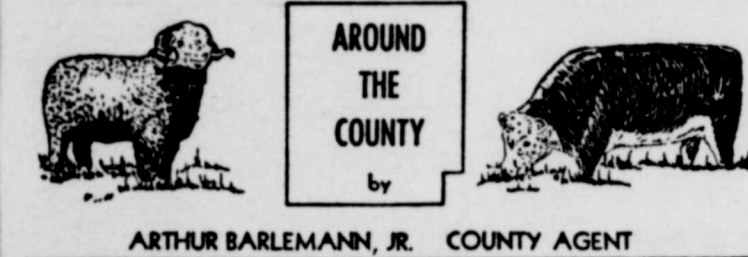
Church services were called off at the First Methodist Church here Sunday night.

The moisture from the sleet and-or snow was .10 of an inch. This was the first measurable amount of moisture this year.

Traffic was slowed to a creep over this area. The hills were hard to get up until the highway department worked on them with sand and scrapers. Walking on the streets, sidewalks or anywhere outside was hazardous.

The temperature itself did not get too low. The low 20s was the coldest recorded but the disagreeableness made up for it.

Now is a good time to prune your fruit trees and shape up other trees around the yard that you are depending on for shade during the summer. It is advisable to prune all trees during the dormant season; February is a good month for this. It is also a good time to prune or shape your roses, particularly the bush roses.

The principles of pruning are the same basically for any trees or roses. Prune them to the shape that you want them to grow, remove any weak crotches or bad forks that might break or split off later on when the tree is larger. The present ice storm may have split some trees with weak crotches. It might ruin the entire appearance of the tree. In addition these wounds often are the beginning of some of the disease or insect trouble that are so hard on trees that are in a weakened condition. Remove the limbs or branches from the center of the tree or bush. Leave those which you wish to maintain the desired shape or size. Cut the rose bushes back to about a foot or a foot and a half in height.

February is also a good time to treat trees for scale. The most effective treatment for scale is spraying with an oil emulsion spray. This emulsion must be used during the dormant season to avoid the damage to the leaves or buds of the trees. Use 3 1/2 gallons of a 97% oil emulsion and enough water to make 100 gallons of spray.

The good crop broomweeds on many ranges are thoroughly dry now and are a fire threat to the range. Not only will a fire now burn off much of the dry grass but it will create an erosion hazard for the self-employment this spring. The bare ground

left behind by a fire will leave nothing to catch and hold the spring rains (if any). Much organic matter will also be lost. To protect ranges and keep fires from spreading over a wide area, fire guards are essential and of much benefit. They can be made by plowing around the pasture, discing, or blading along the fence lines. Many fires will be stopped and damage cut considerably.

## Back From Tour of Western Pacific

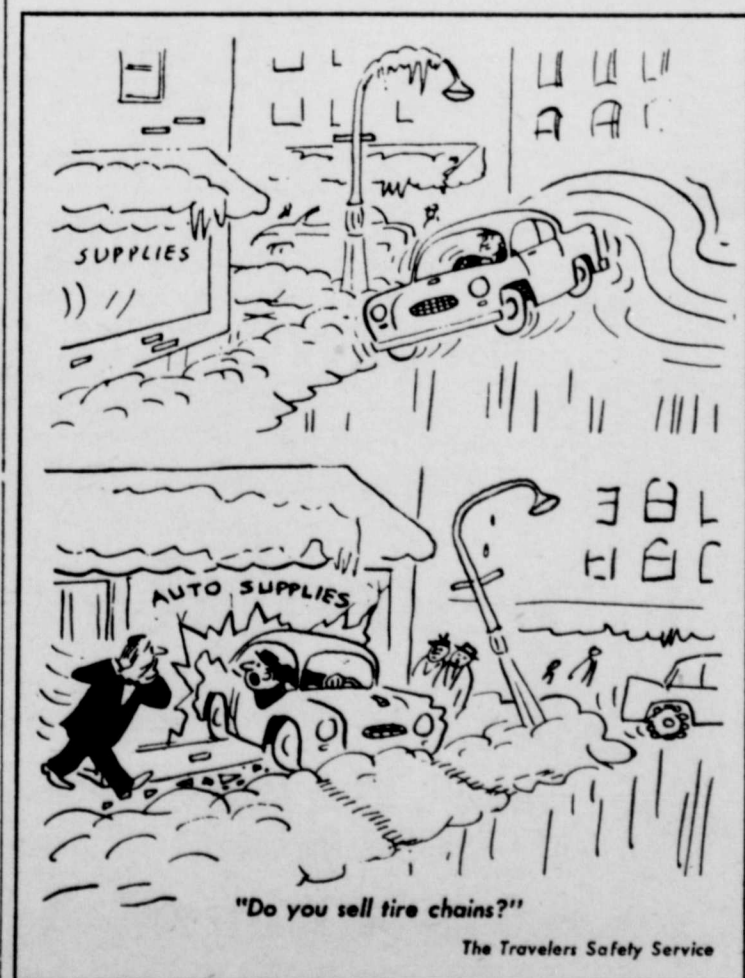

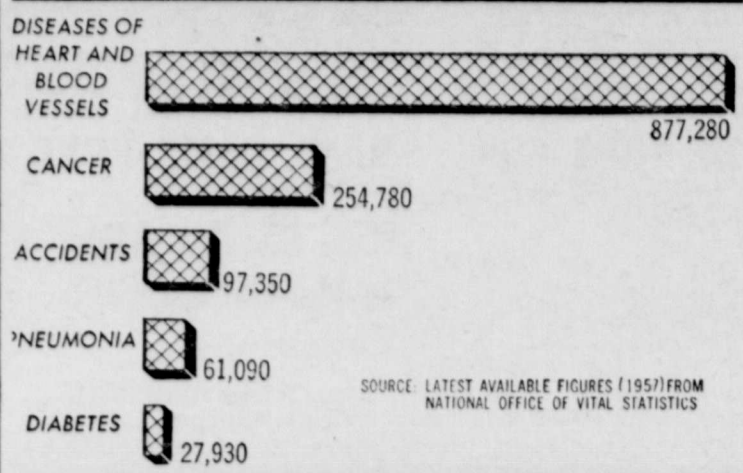

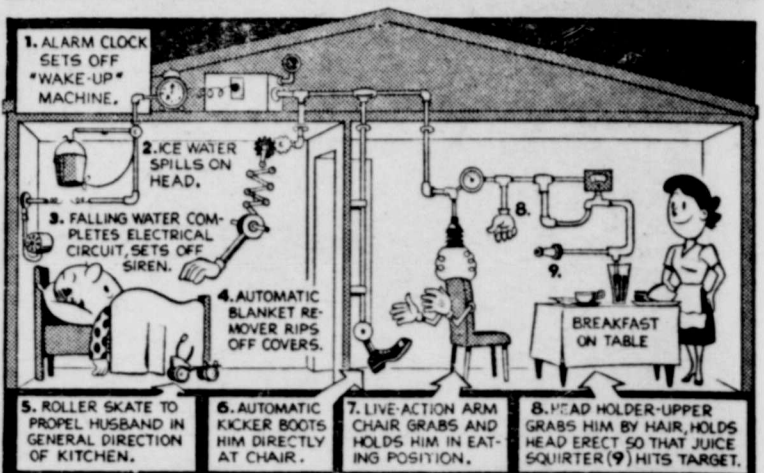

## Solution to Breakfast Problem

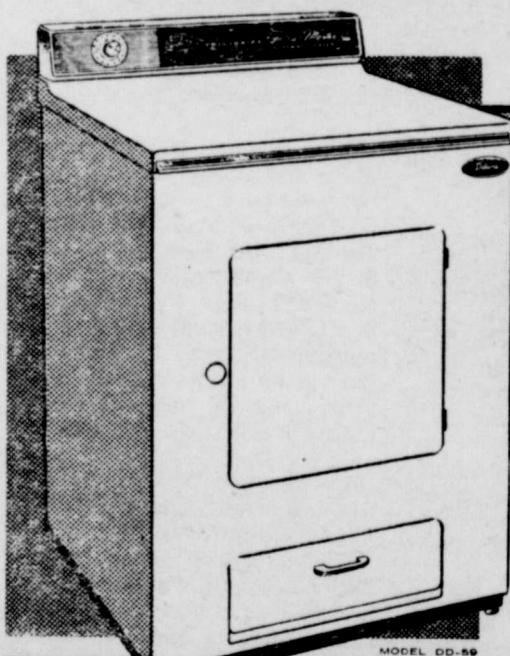


Having a problem getting the family up for breakfast? In this age of electronic miracles, the gadget shown above is suggested as a logical solution. It will arouse the sleeper, in more ways than one, but once up, he can help establish good eating habits for the family. Strong measures (maybe not to the extent shown above) are necessary, according to leading doctors and nutritionists who have studied the subject, to insure that breakfast will not be the day's most neglected meal. Breakfast, according to those diet authorities, should supply about one-fourth to one-third of the daily food requirements. They point out that the "let's skip breakfast" people prove to be less alert, less efficient and more susceptible to fatigue than those who eat a good morning meal.

The human body is so constructed that for maximum health it requires fairly even intakes of food at regular intervals. You can't make up for the lack of a good breakfast. People who are troubled in holding the right weight should eat a good breakfast. If they neglect breakfast they may eat too hearty a lunch or dinner. And they just might have a snack or two between meals. What constitutes a good breakfast? The foods essential to the day's first meal include fruit or fruit juice, cereal, milk or other beverage, and several slices of toast. Eggs and breakfast meat frequently should be included. These foods are necessary both for children and adults. They supply the nutrients essential for the physical and mental stimulus for work—and play.

VALUE OF WATER and its  
conservation is emphasized in  
the unrecoverable losses that  
resulted on the Rio Grande  
during 1958. Shortly after the  
Falcon dam, below Laredo,  
was completed a few years ago  
the biggest flood in modern  
history came. Engineers esti-  
mated that savings from flood  
damages alone more than paid  
the cost of Falcon's construc-  
tion

And the less severe floods  
of 1958 furnishes further  
proof of the need for another  
dam to conserve and protect.  
Col. L. H. Hewitt, U.S. Com-  
missioner for the Internation-  
al Boundary and Water Com-  
mission, has just reported to  
me that if the proposed Diab-  
lo Dam above Del Rio had  
been built and in use last  
year, savings would have  
amounted to 90 percent of our  
share of the cost of construct-  
ing it. Total value of flood  
water that would have been  
conserved and damages pre-  
vented would have amounted  
to an estimated \$42.5 million.

DAIBLO was advanced an-  
other step last week when  
comments on Col Hewitt's ec-  
onomic report on the project  
were received from all Fed-  
eral Agencies to which the  
report had been submitted.  
The next step is action by the  
Bureau of the Budget, and  
then submission to Congress.

INCREASED IMPORTS of  
frozen lamb carcasses from  
New Zealand has caused  
much concern among domes-  
tic growers and feeders. The  
Department of Agriculture,  
however, has declined to in-  
tervene before the Tariff Com-  
mission to seek restrictive ac-  
tion.

Citing import figures, the  
Secretary of Agriculture ex-  
presses doubt that, at least up  
to this time, the imports have  
been enough to cause much  
damage. In the January-Sep-  
tember 1958 period mutton  
and lamb imports were 18.6  
million pounds and U.S. do-  
mestic production was 516  
million—about 3.6 percent of  
domestic output. In urging  
the Secretary of Agriculture's  
help, many of us became fear-  
ful this rate of importation  
may increase and cause ser-  
ious harm to lamb markets.

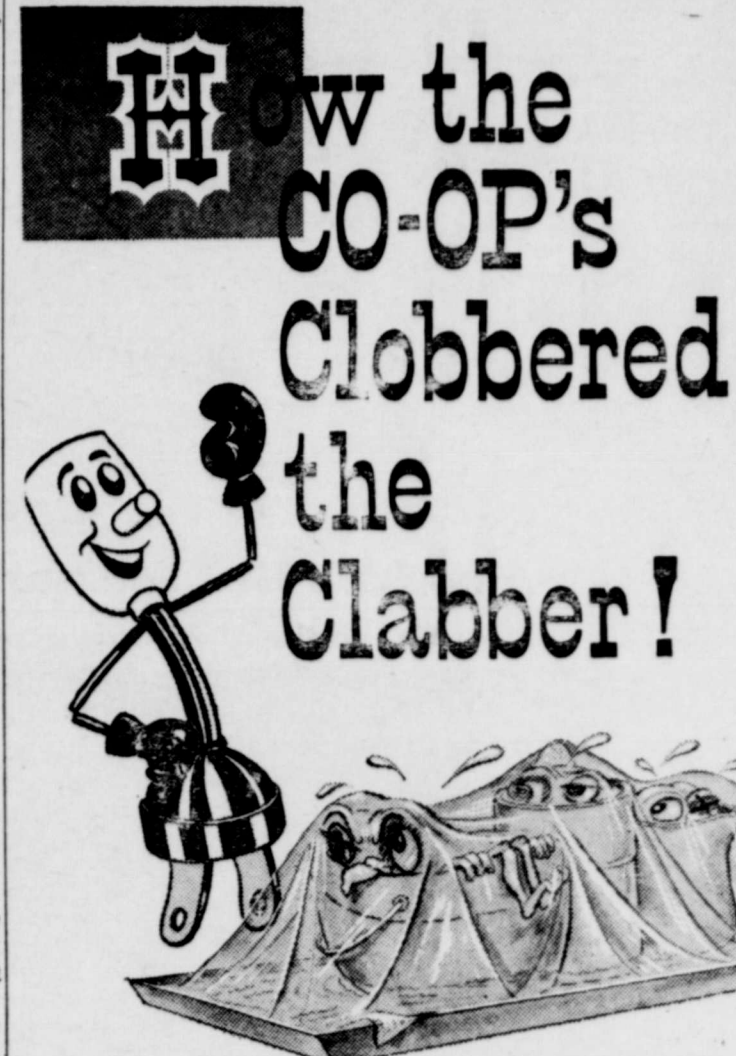

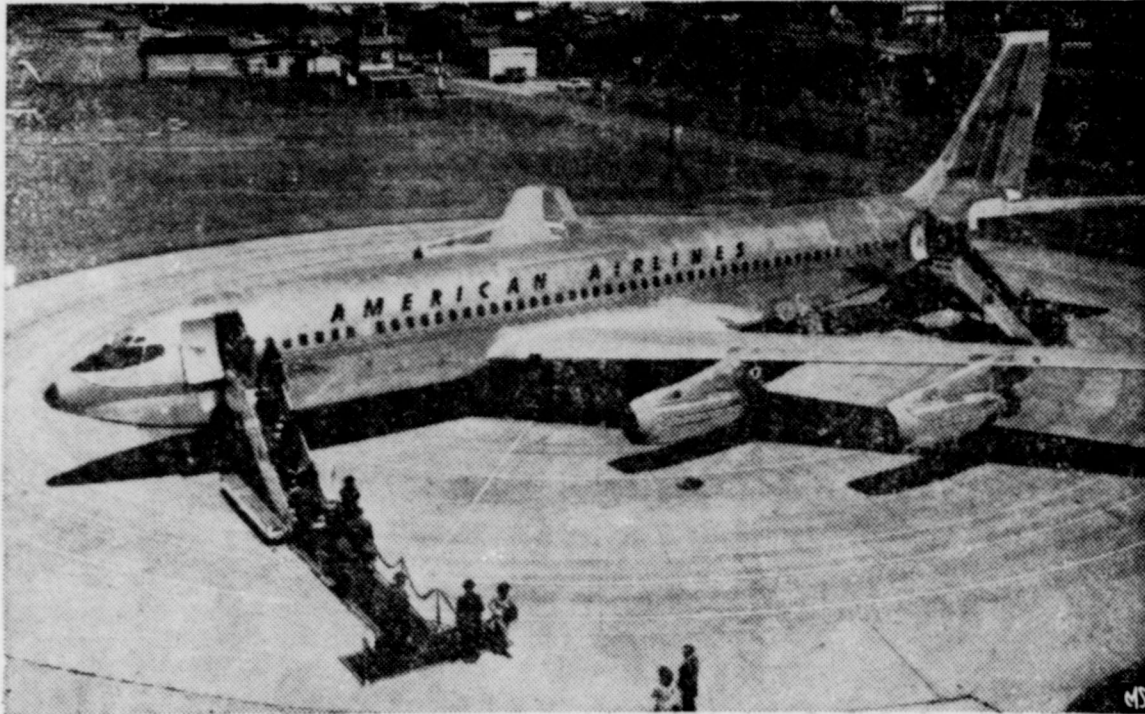

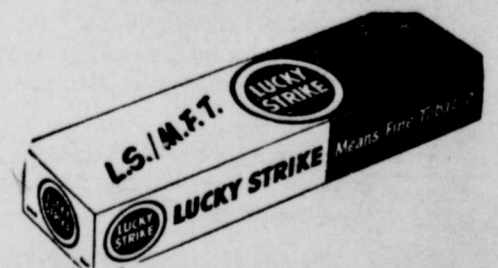
