Rainfall early last Saturday morning ranged from .30 inch to an inch over the county. Heaviest fall was south of town. Here in town .40 inch was recorded.

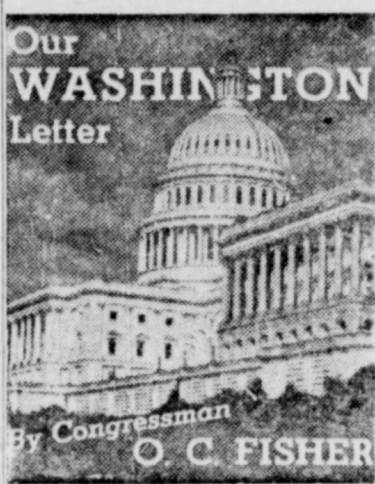
This was the first rain of the year. Moisture is badly needed.

RECENT Disclosure of office pay-roll shenanigans by a few Congressmen has aroused the ire of many people, including most of the members of the Congress.

Out of the new crowd of liberals who were swept into office last fall, some of them put their wives on their payrolls the day they were sworn in. Another put his college student son on at \$11,000 per year (since reduced by half). Still another, a machine tool worker who got elected to Congress from Ohio last November, not only made his wife an office secretary but also rented the enclosed front porch of his Ohio home to the government as his official district office.

These and other disclosures provide ample reason for changes in the present system to better cope with the few who abuse their responsibilities.

The present law makes available to each member of the House a limited amount to draw upon for clerk hire each month. The member certifies the employees and their salaries and they are paid by the House Disbursing Office. The amount available but not used is each month automatically turned back to the Treasury.

A good many of us do not always use the full amount provided, and turn back a few thousand dollars each

Since 1932 all House payroll records have been wide open for public inspection, and properly so. That was true in the Senate until 1948 when secrecy was clamped upon all Senate office payrolls. And such rolls have been closed to public view since that time.

In the meantime, I hope some law can be enacted which will require minimum hours of work by such employees and also require that they work in the member's office, and not on a sort of floating basis as recent disclosures reveal is done in an instance or two in New York City.

The time is near for getting in the spring garden. The danger of a late frost will soon be past and the garden would not be in any danger except to an exceptionally late frost which does occur occasionally. According to studies conducted last year from data at the weather bureau office, the average date of the last freeze in Sterling County is April 1 on the average. There is a 20 percent chance that a freeze will occur after April 10 and a 5 percent chance of one occurring after April 20.

Beans, corn, cantaloupes, cucumbers, okra, peppers, squash, tomatoes and watermelons could be planted now. They will be blooming and putting on fruit before the hot, dry weather gets here and the garden will produce more.

To stimulate growth of your tomato and pepper plants, use a starter solution. The solution is made by dissolving one pound of a good grade of commercial fertilizer such as 16-20-0 in five gallons of water. Place a pint of this solution around each plant at the time of planting.

For more detailed information about varieties recommended for this area and other garden practices, ask your county agent for bulletin B-70, Vegetable Gardening.

Ranchers are reminded that all applications for the incentive payments on wool must be filed in the County ASC office by April 30. All sale transactions on lambs or wool must have been completed before March 30 to be eligible for payment during

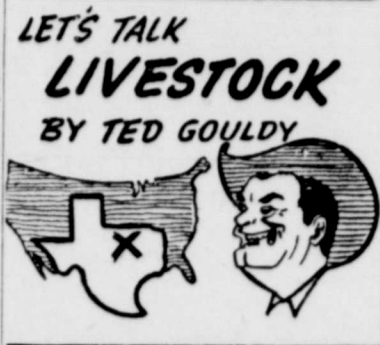
the 1958 marketing year. Amount of payment will be determined by the average price wool sold for during the year—nationwide, and the difference between this average and the announced price of 62 cents.

According to Johnny Hailley, office manager of the local ASC, about half the applications have been filed. During the 1956 marketing year, there were 71 applications in Sterling County covering 820,720 pounds of wool. Net payments to growers totalled \$129,384.99. Sterling County was one of sixteen counties in Texas producing more than 800 pounds of wool per square mile.

Net income realized by Texas ranch and farm operators during 1958 averaged \$3,254 per farm or ranch. This is 79% more than during 1957 according to the Agricultural Marketing Service. This net income realized is the amount of money available for spending after production expenses were paid. Gross income realized during 1958 was \$8,999 before expenses were deducted.

The Texas average income per farm was somewhat higher than the national average which was \$2,750 per farm. Cotton still produces more than half the total cash receipts for Texas farms. Sorghum grain, wheat, and cattle produced large amounts of the remainder. While income was showing an increase, production expenses also showed a marked increase. These expenses include labor, depreciation, feed and livestock.

CATTLE FEEDERS RUSH INTO MARKET FOR REPLACEMENTS AS FAT STEERS, YEARLINGS HIGHER

Fort Worth—The closing days of March on the Fort Worth Livestock Market have been featured with renewed activity of cattle feeders as the fat cattle prices hit new peaks for the year. Monday's trade was no exception as the 840-pound feeder steers cashed at \$26.50 and 750-pound yearlings hit \$27. Lighter yearlings earned \$30.

The surge of activity by stocker and feeder buyers brought more inquiries from buyers seeking places at the ringside in the special cattle sale April 9 at the stockyards new auction arena.

At the bottom of the flurry of inquiry is the fact that fat cattle prices have hit the highest levels of the year or longer, and feeder buyers were competing with slaughter interests on shorted cattle here and at other major terminals over the country.

Farmers and stockmen, plagued by a dry winter, welcomed the return of a strong stocker and feeder trade and the first entries in the April 9 combination auction and private treaty cattle sale began to come in.

Fat cattle crossing in to the \$30 level in recent days at the market have focussed attention of feeders in all parts of the country on the special sale and assure a strong out-of-state representation at the April 9 special cattle feature.

All grades and all breeds and classes will be in this event and packers are lining up for ringside seats, as well as stocker and feeder buyers.

ally steady, except some slaughter cows were slow and weak.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold from \$26 to \$30.25, the top figure for some strictly choice heifers scaling 697 pounds. Some over 1,100-pound steers scored \$29. Medium and lower grade yearlings and steers cashed at \$18 to \$25.50.

Fat cows sold from \$18.50 to \$20.50 and canners and cutters cashed at \$13 to \$18.50. Bulls scored \$18 to \$23.50.

Good and choice slaughter calves ranged from \$26.50 to \$31 and medium and lower grades scaled from \$18 to \$26. Medium to good stocker steer calves cashed at \$27 to \$34, and heifer calves drew \$31 downward. Some mixed bull and heifer calves sold at \$30. Medium and good stocker and feeder steer yearlings sold from \$24 to \$30, three loads of 840-pound feeders at \$26.50. A part load of 750-pound feeders sold at \$27.

SPRING LAMBS 50c to \$1.50 HIGHER, OLD CROPS UP

Spring lambs at Fort Worth sold from 50 cents to \$1.50 higher here Monday as good and choice milk fat lambs cashed at \$21 to \$22.50. Old crop shorn slaughter lambs were also strong to 25 cents to 50 cents higher in spots. Old crop shorn slaughter lambs were about steady, except lightweight stocker spring lambs were very dull and weak. Sheep were scarce and steady.

Dairy Foods Demonstrators Win State 4-H Award

"Learn by doing" is the motto of one Carson and two Swisher County girls whose talent in showing how-to-do-it won 1958 state and national honors in the 4-H Dairy Foods Demonstration program conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service, Texas A. & M.

They are national winner Ellen Latta, 17, of Groom; and state winners Edith Herring and Carolyn Jones, both 18, of Tulla.

The Carnation Company presented each girl with a 19-jewel wrist watch. Miss Latta was also awarded a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress and the Carnation \$400 college scholarship.

Veteran Demonstrator

Miss Latta's demonstration,

which placed her among the six national champions, was "lemon parfait pie." But this Groom High School junior is a veteran of six years of demonstrating dairy foods. She has been Carson County winner three years for individual demonstrations and three years for team demonstrations.

She has been awarded the dairy foods pin three years, dairy achievement medals twice, and while still too young to compete in the district dairy foods demonstration competition, she won the Carnation pin for her records two times.

She is also the winner of county honors in food preparation, frozen foods, and junior leadership. In 1957, she was county

winner of the bake show. She is a 4-H Gold Star.

Swisher County Team

The Swisher County team of Herring and Jones were victors with their demonstration, "start the day the dairy foods way." It featured sour cream pancakes topped with cottage cheese and fruit syrup.

The two Tulla High School seniors were county and district winners in 1957 also with a team demonstration on mocha pudding, placing third in the state.

Both girls are 4-H Gold Stars. Miss Jones was named "Best All Around Girl" in the county in 1956, and Miss Herring was chosen "Most Outstanding 4-H Girl" in 1957.

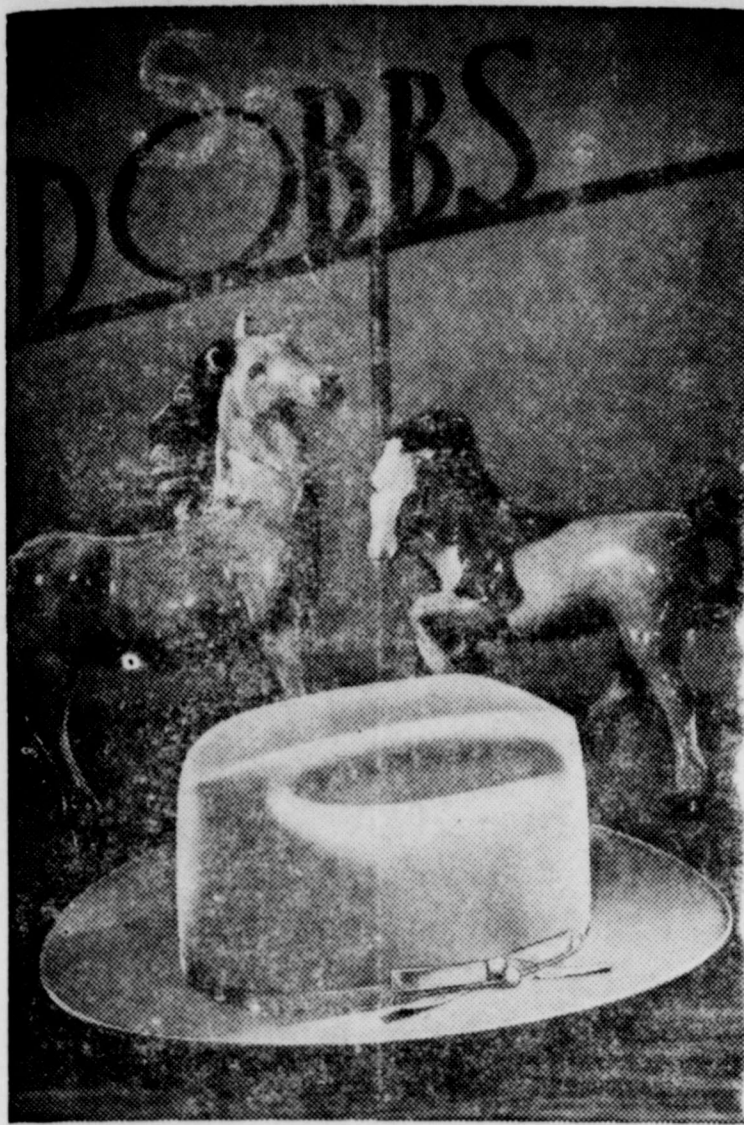

Norway Ships Ice to Darkest Africa

Modern Norwegians are going to be one up on the ancient Romans who hauled snow from mountain-tops to chill drinks in their marble palaces. The Norwegians are shipping a three-ton block of ice by truck from the Arctic Circle to French Equatorial Africa.

Their purpose is to demonstrate the heat-barring quality of mineral wool, with which the ice will be wrapped before shipment. This is the same product used to insulate houses—in America as well as Europe.

Used in adequate thickness, preferably three inches in walls and six inches in ceilings, mineral wool does an efficient job of keeping heat out of a house during the summer and in it during the winter. Comfort is improved, and fuel bills are reduced considerably.

Pitched Roof Saves Money On Construction of Home



Roofer applies asphalt shingles in a light color to home with a roof pitch of 2 inches per foot of width. Builder of this home in a California development says the construction costs saved with this low-pitched roof enabled him to offer a high quality home for as much as 20 cents less per square foot than the same house would cost with a flat roof.

If you plan to build a home, you can save considerably on overall construction costs by careful selection of the roof style, says the University of Illinois Small Homes Council.

The Council's research shows that the most economical roof has a 2-in-12 pitch—that is, a slope of two inches for every foot of width—on a house either 28 or 40 feet wide.

In its annual Short Course for Builders, the university research group explained that only a few years ago houses 24 feet wide with higher pitched roofs were the most economical to build. The main reasons this has changed are:

1. Trusses with joints nailed and glued together are available today. These are less costly than the older method of joining members with bolts.

2. Today asphalt shingles can be applied to roofs with slopes as low as two inches per foot. This insures a top quality roof that is economical and will give years of trouble-free service. A further advantage of asphalt

shingles on a small, low house is that a light color can be chosen for the roof. This makes the house appear taller and larger.

3. Labor costs have gone up faster than material costs. Although a 28-foot house needs more material than a 24-foot house, it needs little more labor.

The Council points out that the most expensive house to build is one with a flat roof. Research shows that at average, nation-wide costs of labor and materials it would cost \$254 per 100 square feet of floor area to build a house 24 feet wide with a flat roof. The same house with a 2-in-12 roof would cost \$234 per 100 square feet.

Similarly, a house 28 feet wide with a roof pitched at 2-in-12 could be built for \$228 per 100 square feet, while the same house with a flat roof would cost \$242 per 100 square feet.

A house 40 feet wide with a flat roof would cost \$237 per 100 square feet, while the same house with a roof pitched 2-in-12 could be built for \$227 per 100 square feet.

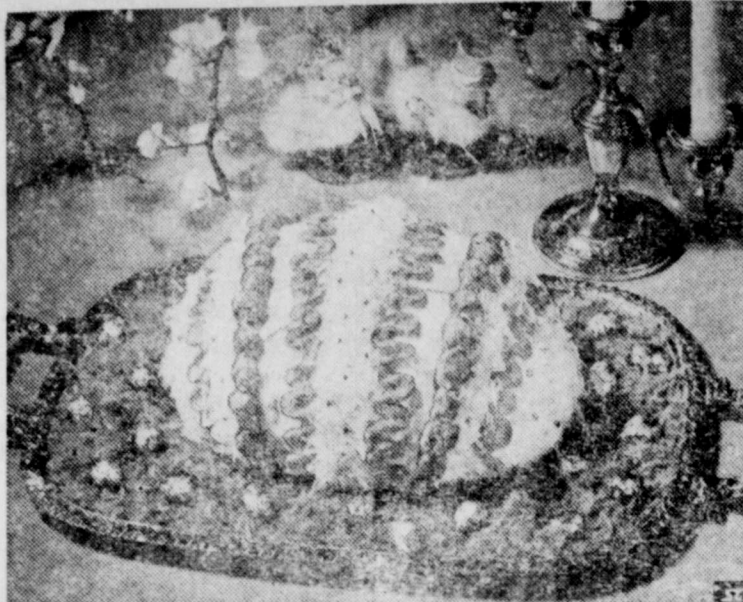
Alvie Cole was named the chairman of the show and he will accept entry fees for the show. The fee is \$10.00 for performance and halter classes.

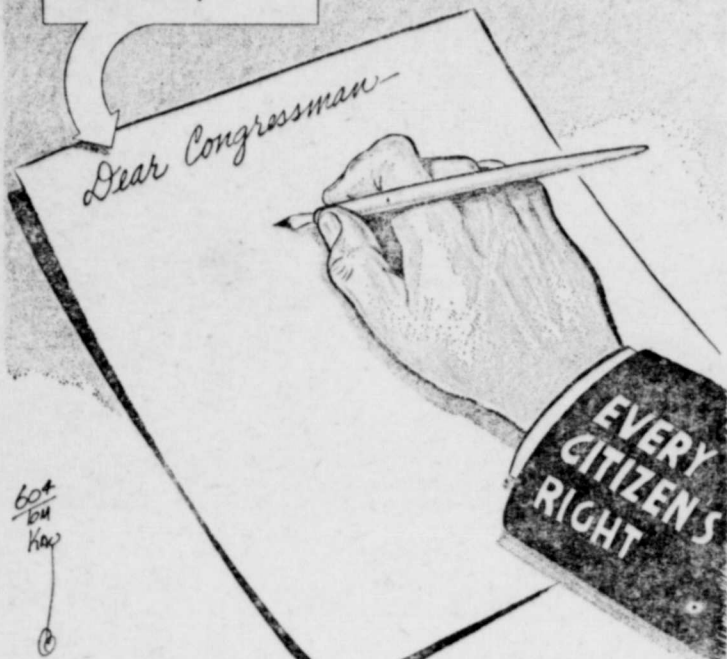

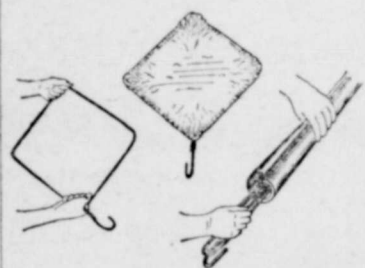

Use that "Right" to "Write"



Here's an idea for a folding frying pan — amazingly light and easy to carry. Fortunately, we don't need to buy one, because there are plenty around the house. Those of us who get tired of sandwiches on hunting and fishing trips will find that this suggestion can extend the menu considerably.



Pull a wire coat-hanger from its triangular shape into a square, as shown. Bend the hook down for a handle. Double a section of metal foil around the wire square, folding the remaining three sides under securely. Presto! — a very practical frying pan that takes up almost no room or weight in the hunting or fishing jacket. With foil removed, the outside half can be bent inward toward the handle for easy carrying, as the sketch shows. It's easy to bend it back into shape again.

If one wants to carry a roll of metal foil, this folded pan rim can be slipped inside the roll. Then we have extra foil for making cups and for other cooking jobs. If this seems cumbersome, just remove a sheet and fold it like a handkerchief.

While cooking, the food will depress the center of the foil a bit, so hot fat, cake batter, gravy and other liquids won't run off.

Arrange three or four flat rocks to support the pan, and build a small fire between them. When the fire is reduced to coals, we are ready to cook. Each person can make his own pan, and can use it as a plate. This, of course, is a good way to prepare bacon and eggs, meats, fish, pancakes and many other dishes. I humbly submit that these hot foods taste better than cold sandwiches!

Sportsmen know that compact instant beverages, such as coffee, tea and cocoa, are easiest to carry and quickest to prepare; in fact outdoor-minded people seem to have adopted these delicious powdered drinks as standard equipment. Many of us, however, don't realize that the same hot drink powders also are excellent in cooking.

Here's an idea for several kinds of hot breads that can be cooked on your foil frying pan on the trail:

Put half a cup or so of pancake mix in a sturdy plastic bag. Add a teaspoon of sugar and one of Nestle's "Quik" or of "EverReady" cocoa. Roll up the bag and carry it in your jacket until lunch time.

If you like your cakes only mildly sweet, leave out the sugar, because both "Quik" (a cocoa powder that mixes easily with cold milk) and "EverReady" cocoa have sugar already in them.

Now, while the fire is burning down to coals, dip a little water into the bag and massage it until the ingredients are smooth. Add enough water to make the batter pourable. Grease the foil with a strip of bacon and pour on some batter. When the batter stops bubbling on top, flip the cake over to brown the other side.



This is more of a dessert cake than a pancake. Among other variations, we can add a teaspoon or so of "Nescafe" instant coffee for a mocha flavor, or we can substitute it for the cocoa and have coffee cake. Many sportsmen like a dessert made (with or without the cocoa or coffee) by dropping some Semi-Sweet Chocolate Pieces into the batter on the pan. These sink into the batter, and can be turned with the cake. This kind of pancake reminds us of the famous "Toll House" Cookies. Pancakes usually taste dull without syrup, but these cakes don't need it. These "Nestle's" Semi-Sweet Chocolate Pieces come in cellophane bags, so they are handy to carry in the coat to nibble on when outdoors. Chocolate is a valuable energy producer, so active sportsmen use a lot of it.

... ABOUT YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY ...

People who work for themselves in a business, trade or profession are reminded by Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the San Angelo social security office to report their earnings for social security purposes with their income tax returns. For most business people this return is due on or before April 15, 1959 and the social security tax rate for 1958 is 3 1/2 percent of the first \$4200 of net earnings.

Since Federal income tax returns are used not only for reporting the amount of income for income tax purposes but also for reporting self-employment income for social security credits, it is necessary that a complete and accurate Schedule C be filed with the income tax Form 1040. If net income from a trade or business was \$400 or more, social security taxes must be paid on these net earnings. This is compulsory even though no income tax is due. Self-employed persons sometimes overlook their responsibilities for paying social security taxes because they have enough exemptions so that they don't owe any income tax.

"Persons receiving social security benefits can save themselves and us a great deal of inconvenience if they will report promptly when they go to work and expect to earn more than \$1200.00 in the calendar year," stated Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the social security district office at San Angelo, Texas.

"Most people know that if their earnings are in excess of \$1200.00 for the year that they will not be entitled to a benefit check for every month of the year," Ellington continued. "However, many folks are confused as to what to do when they don't know for sure on January 1 what their total earnings for the year will be. Sometimes they go on receiving their benefit checks all year without realizing that their earnings in the last part of the year may cause them to go over the \$1200.00 limit. When this happens they may have to refund part of the benefits they received."

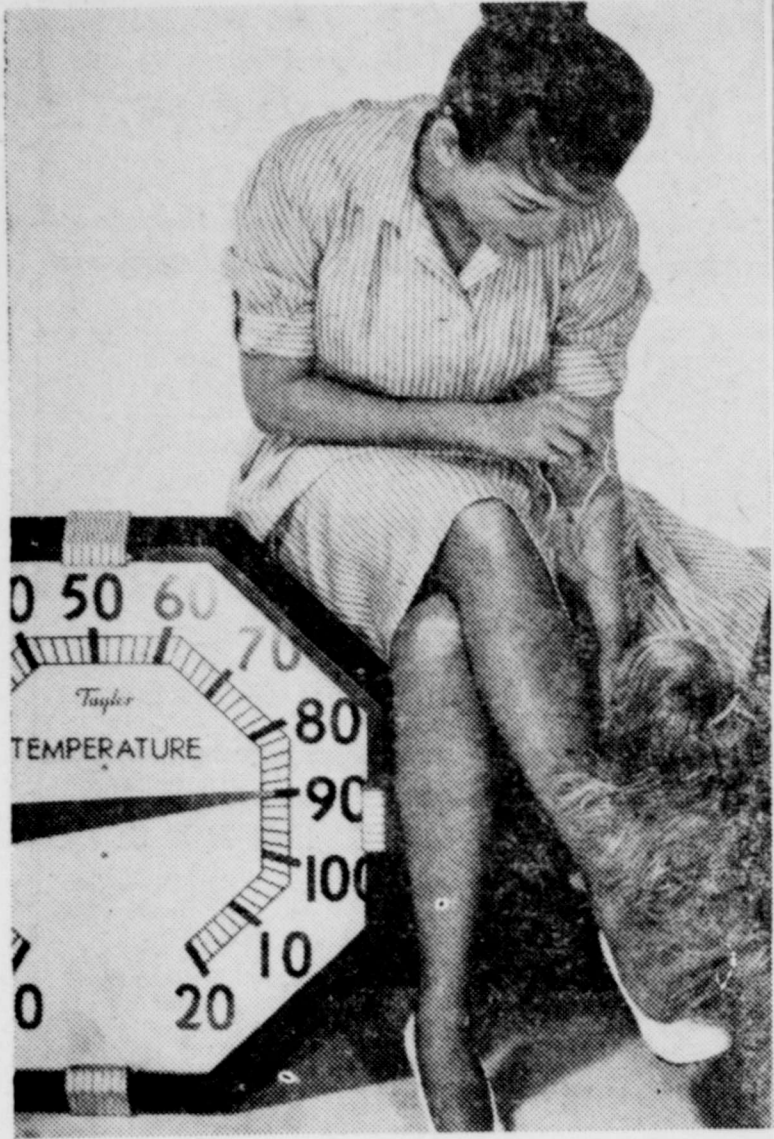
