## Sterling Second At District Track Meet

In District 19-B track and field meet last Saturday in Big Spring, the Sterling City seniors and juniors racked up second places, giving way to Forsan in the top spot.

High point athlete among the junior entries was Sterling City's Jerry Payne, who had 14 1/4 points to his credit.

Sterling City finished second in the senior division with 32 1-3 points. Forsan had taken first with 59 1-6 points. Garden City was third with 29 points. Knot next with 21 and Water Valley was fifth with 10 1/2 points.

Forsan's junior high group had 38 points for first and Sterling City was second with 32 points.

The two range judging teams representing the Sterling County 4-H at the District Seven elimination contests at San Angelo College each won second place. Twenty-two counties participated in the contests with about 600 boys and girls on hand.

The junior range judging team composed of Cecilia McDonald, Joy Flynt, David Foster and Larry Stewart competed in the division for club members who had not reached their 13th birthday on January 1 of this year. This was the first contest the group participated in and they are to be congratulated on their placing of second.

The senior team composed of David Durham, Clayton Stewart, and Reynolds Lee Foster competed in the division of teams whose members had reached or passed their 13th birthday on January 1. They will compete in the state 4-H Club contest finals at College Station on the campus of Texas A&M College on June 9 and 10. These boys were second in the district last year and seventh at the state contest.

David Durham was high point man of the entire contest. Tom Green County won first in the range judging with a score of 648.5 points to Sterling County's 645.5 points.

Team members received ribbons. The county will receive a banner at a later date.

The field day at the Sonora Experiment Station was the best they have had in several years. About 150 people were on hand to see the results of the ram progeny tests and see the station.

Speakers on the program presented the results of the tests and how they can be used by a breeder. Appearing on this part of the program were Dr. Maurice Shelton and Fred Campbell. Dr. R. D. Turk, head of the parasitology department of the school of Veterinary Medicine at A & M discussed parasite control in sheep and goats.

Leo Merrill led the tour of the deferred grazing pastures. Under their program each pasture in a series of four is rested four months of the year. The four months rest comes at a different period each year; for instance, if a pasture is rested during January, February, March and April of 1959, that pasture will be grazed for 12 months and rested from May through August in 1960. In four years time, each pasture has been rested around the calendar.

One thing of interest was the bitterweed situation. According to Merrill, they have never had any trouble with sheep on bitterweed where they are run with cattle even though a pasture may be heavily grazed. In contrast, if sheep alone are run, even on lightly stocked pastures, they have lost sheep. Only explanation he could make was that the cattle forced the sheep to graze over a wider area rather than the tendency to spot graze which is common when sheep alone are run. Lightly grazed pastures carry 32 animal units per section; heavy grazed pastures carry 48 units per section. He uses 1 cow as a unit, 5 sheep or 5 goats as a unit. The jack rabbits are extra according to him but the deer are figured in the stocking rate on some pastures at the rate of 6 deer per animal unit.

The pastures have lots of grass. One pasture on the station has not had any domestic livestock on it since 1948 in order to see what it would do. As is true in all cases, the deep soil sites are showing a return of the desirable native grasses. The shallow rocky sites are not showing the return that might be expected even though it has not been used.

The plan used at the station is merely an idea. Not every rancher can run his operation

the same way but it does give an idea of what he might do or shoot for. Actually, a short deferment with moisture accomplishes a lot more than a long deferment during a dry period.

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
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



**JUST BETWEEN US SPORTSMEN**

Here's an idea for a folding frying pan — amazingly light and easy to carry. Fortunately, we don't need to buy one, because there are plenty around the house. Those of us who get tired of sandwiches on hunting and fishing trips will find that this suggestion can extend the menu considerably.



Pull a wire coat-hanger from its triangular shape into a square, as shown. Bend the hook down for a handle. Double a section of metal foil around the wire square, folding the remaining three sides under securely. Presto! — a very practical frying pan that takes up almost no room or weight in the hunting or fishing jacket. With foil removed, the outside half can be bent inward toward the handle for easy carrying, as the sketch shows. It's easy to bend it back into shape again.

If one wants to carry a roll of metal foil, this folded pan rim can be slipped inside the roll. Then we have extra foil for making cups and for other cooking jobs. If this seems cumbersome, just remove a sheet and fold it like a handkerchief.

While cooking, the food will depress the center of the foil a bit, so hot fat, cake batter, gravy and other liquids won't run off.

Arrange three or four flat rocks to support the pan, and build a small fire between them. When the fire is reduced to coals, we are ready to cook. Each person can make his own pan, and can use it as a plate. This, of course, is a good way to prepare bacon and eggs, meats, fish, pancakes and many other dishes. I humbly submit that these hot foods taste better than cold sandwiches!

Sportsmen know that compact instant beverages, such as coffee, tea and cocoa, are easiest to carry and quickest to prepare; in fact outdoor-minded people seem to have adopted these delicious powdered drinks as standard equipment. Many of us, however, don't realize that the same hot drink powders also are excellent in cooking.

Here's an idea for several kinds of hot breads that can be cooked on your foil frying pan on the trail:

Put half a cup or so of pancake mix in a sturdy plastic bag. Add a teaspoon of sugar and one of Nestle's "Quik" or of "EverReady" cocoa. Roll up the bag and carry it in your jacket until lunch time.

If you like your cakes only mildly sweet, leave out the sugar, because both "Quik" (a cocoa powder that mixes easily with cold milk) and "EverReady" cocoa have sugar already in them.

Now, while the fire is burning down to coals, dip a little water into the bag and massage it until the ingredients are smooth. Add enough water to make the batter pourable. Grease the foil with a strip of bacon and pour on some batter. When the batter stops bubbling on top, flip the cake over to brown the other side.



This is more of a dessert cake than a pancake. Among other variations, we can add a teaspoon or so of "Nescafe" instant coffee for a mocha flavor, or we can substitute it for the cocoa and have coffee cake. Many sportsmen like a dessert made (with or without the cocoa or coffee) by dropping some Semi-Sweet Chocolate Pieces into the batter on the pan. These sink into the batter, and can be turned with the cake. This kind of pancake reminds us of the famous "Toll House" Cookies. Pancakes usually taste dull without syrup, but these cakes don't need it. These "Nestle's" Semi-Sweet Chocolate Pieces come in cellophane bags, so they are handy to carry in the coat to nibble on when outdoors. Chocolate is a valuable energy producer, so active sportsmen use a lot of it.
