

## Mrs. Joe Hopper Dies in Car Crash

Mrs. Joe Hopper (former Euna Lee Bryant) was instantly killed when her car got out of control and turned over about eight miles up the Colorado City road Wednesday afternoon shortly before three o'clock. Her three little children were hurt in the accident.

Mrs. Hopper, who graduated from high school here in May, 1954, was 23 years old. She and Joe Hopper were married on graduation night that year, following the graduation exercises. She had lived here that year with her grandmother, Mrs. A.G. Daves.

She was visiting her grandmother here Wednesday with her three children and was returning to her home in Colorado City when the tragic accident occurred.

The three children are Jerry Lynn Hopper, four, Margie Jolene, age three and little Ruth, a two months old baby.

The two older children were cut and bruised somewhat and the baby seemed lifeless when it first reached the hospital in deputy sheriff Jake Martin's lap on a pillow. She rallied soon, however. The little boy was found wandering away from the wreck by passers-by.

The surviving husband, a brother of Delbert Hopper of Sterling City, is employed by the Texas Electric Service Co. in Colorado City.

Mrs. Hopper was born in Stanton May 13, 1937. She is survived by her husband; the two daughters and the son, and two brothers, Billy Bob Bryant and Robert Owens. Her mother and grandmother also survive.

Funeral services were held here at 10 a.m. Thursday at the First Baptist Church with pastor Billy Crews officiating. That afternoon services were held at the Oak Street Baptist Church in Colorado City with the Rev. B. R. Brook officiating. Burial was in the Colorado City cemetery. WITH THE drawing of the curtain on the 1st session of the 86th Congress, the debit and credit dopesters are at it again. An appraisal of the degree of success of the session is a debatable subject, with more credit than debit being apparent from the record that has been made.

While there has been some free spending, by and large the record has been good, with a balanced budget being likely. On the face of it the Congress has actually trimmed budget requests by around a billion dollars. But unfortunately that does not tell the full story. We will know more about it next Spring when supplemental appropriations are made to supplement funds that are found to be inadequate.

Foreign aid was trimmed by nearly a billion. But most of that was offset by a three-quarter billion dollar outlay authorizing 37,000 additional units of public housing—a direct federal subsidy, although that figure is handled through back-door spending, which does not appear in the budget.

CHIEF CREDIT of the session was the Landrum-Griffin anti-racketeering bill which breezed through on the side of public opinion.

On the wake of that historic success against the hoodlums and gangsters in the labor movement came the threats upon the political lives of us who supported the bill against racketeering. James Carey and Jimmy Hoffa both got into the act with wild-swinging threats of what they would do at the next election.

This brings up the recurring question of just how amenable rank-and-file union members are to union leaders who try to tell them how to vote, and just how regimented in that regard union members allow themselves to become.

The dictatorial attitude of labor politicians is evidenced by a statement made by James McDevitt, a National Director of the political arm (COPE) of AFL-CIO, who in a speech made at a regional meeting of union leaders in Hartford, Conn., was quoted as saying: "We are going to get the labor leaders who differ publicly with the position on candidates and issues already established by the labor movement... We are warning you, and we are warning all in the future; do not differ with the movement with respect to issues or candidates. We will not stand for it!"

### Play Union There Tonight at 8:00

Coach J. R. Dillard's Sterling Eagles easily clubbed the Dawson boys 44-16 last Friday night in a non-conference tilt here. Dillard played all his squad during the game and the Dawson eight-man aggregation got in their scores as the first string boys rested.

Dawson kicked off as the game opened. As the Eagles took the ball for play Danny Gonzales took the ball over and through the line for a touchdown on the first play of scrimmage. David Durham ran the ball over for two extra points. Sterling kicked off to Dawson as play resumed. The ball went over the line and was brought back to the 15 for play. Dawson passed and Don McDonald intercepted on Dawson's 32 yard line. Durham picked up 9 yards around left end, and Gonzales took the ball over for the second touchdown on the second play. A pass from McDonald to Tony Allen was good for two extra points.

Sterling kicked following the TD down to the Dawson 10 yard line. They passed for a 3 yard gain then lost the ball on a fumble. Gonzales made four yards and Durham took it far enough for a 1st down. Tony Allen then ran around left end for a touchdown. Gonzales ran the ball over for two extra points.

Sterling kicked off to Dawson and Dillard ran in an entirely new team of Eagles. Dawson fumbled and Sterling recovered but failed to make a first down. They kicked on the fourth down. Sterling then drew a 15-yard penalty. Dawson fumbled and the locals recovered the ball on their own 10 yard line. The first quarter ended with the score 24-0, Sterling.

As the second quarter started, Don McDonald went for an 8-yard gain, followed by David Durham going for 15 yards and a first down. Gonzales got 3 yards and was hurt on the play. Jodie Green passed to Bill Davis for a score and the Eagles failed to make the extra points. As play resumed Dawson made a first down and then bogged down and had to kick. Sterling drew a long penalty and Sam Nance made up the penalty yardage, but the locals had to kick on the fourth down. Loyd Gray of Dawson made a TD and a run picked up two extra points just before the half ended. The game at half time was 30-8.

Sterling kicked to Dawson as the second half opened. The rivals couldn't make a first down so they kicked to the Eagles on the fourth. McDonald advanced the pigskin and Nance bulled over for a TD. Later Don got the ball down on the 12 yard line and Nance took it over again for six points. A pass from McDonald to Bill Davis picked up the 2 extra points. Now the score was 38-8, Sterling.

As play resumed Dawson took the kick and made a 1st down and the third quarter ended. They made another 1st before losing the ball on downs to the locals. A pass from Robert Carter to Green got a first for Sterling. Durham on an end run took the ball to Dawson's 10 yard line. Then Durham took a pass and got the ball practically on the goal line. C. L. King took the oval on over for the count.

Dawson passed and Dennis Leatherwood ran the ball over for six points and then he also picked up the two extras, making the score 44-16, and so the game ended shortly.

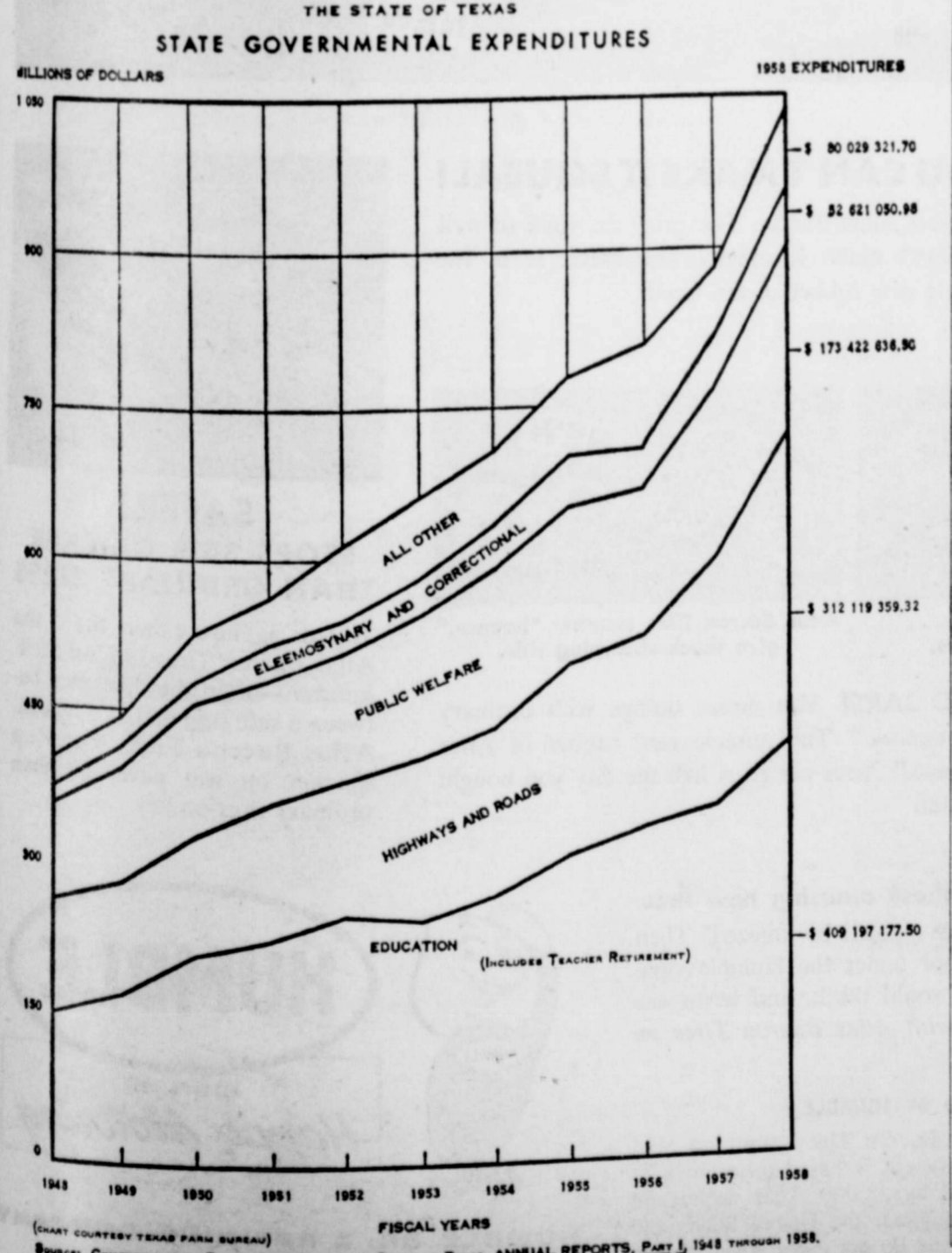

Results of the judging of 4-H Club records in Extension District 7 have been announced by Roy Huckabee and Miss Thelma Casey, District agents. The records were judged in San Angelo by a committee of county agents and home demonstration agents recently. David Durham, Sterling County 4-H Club member, won the range management record book contest. David's book covered his seven years of 4-H Club work as well as his plant collection, the basis of the range contest. He had collected, pressed, mounted, and identified 73 different plants from around here and other parts of the state and a few from Colorado. The Range Management Contest is sponsored by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association and the Extension Service. District award to David is an engraved silver belt buckle. His book has been forwarded to College Station where it will be judged in the state competition. The two state winners will receive scholarships to the 1960 range camp at Junction. Mitsy Davis' record book and plant collection won second place. Mitsy had collected, labelled, and mounted 63 different plants, including grasses, weeds, shrubs and forbs. Purpose of the range contest is to teach young boys and girls the various plants of the region they live in as well as others; grazing value of the plants; and the habitat of the plants. We have just received a packet of material regarding the 1959 Make It Yourself with Wool contest in Texas. The state contest is under the

direction of the Women's Auxiliary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association. The national contest is under the direction of The National Wool Growers' Association and the Wool Bureau. The contest is for interested girls from the ages of 14 through 22. There are three classes: 13 through 16, 14 through 17, and 18 through 22. The contest involves making a garment of 100 percent wool and modelling the garment. District contest will be set up to determine district winners to participate in the state finals at Joske's of Texas in San Antonio. In all, \$45,000 will be awarded in prizes. If any young ladies are interested in this contest, we will supply them the information we have along with the directions for entering the district contest. You still have about two weeks to get your claim in for the refund of the federal tax on gasoline. Returns are due in the Office of the District Director of Internal Revenue not later than September 30. Period covered is July 1, 1958 to June 30, 1959. If you have not received the forms for filing but are eligible, contact the county agent's office. Gasoline must have been used in the farm operation and off the highway to be claimed. September is the last month in which prickly pear can be sprayed with 2, 4, 5-T for good results. Recommended spray is 8 pounds of 2, 4, 5-T in 100 gallons of diesel oil or kerosene. Control works best if the pear is in a good growing condition. Merton and Leon Ferguson have been spraying some pear

this summer with the herbicide. They have had good kills thus far on the work that they have done. Quickest and best kills have been where the pear is growing fast and has good moisture.

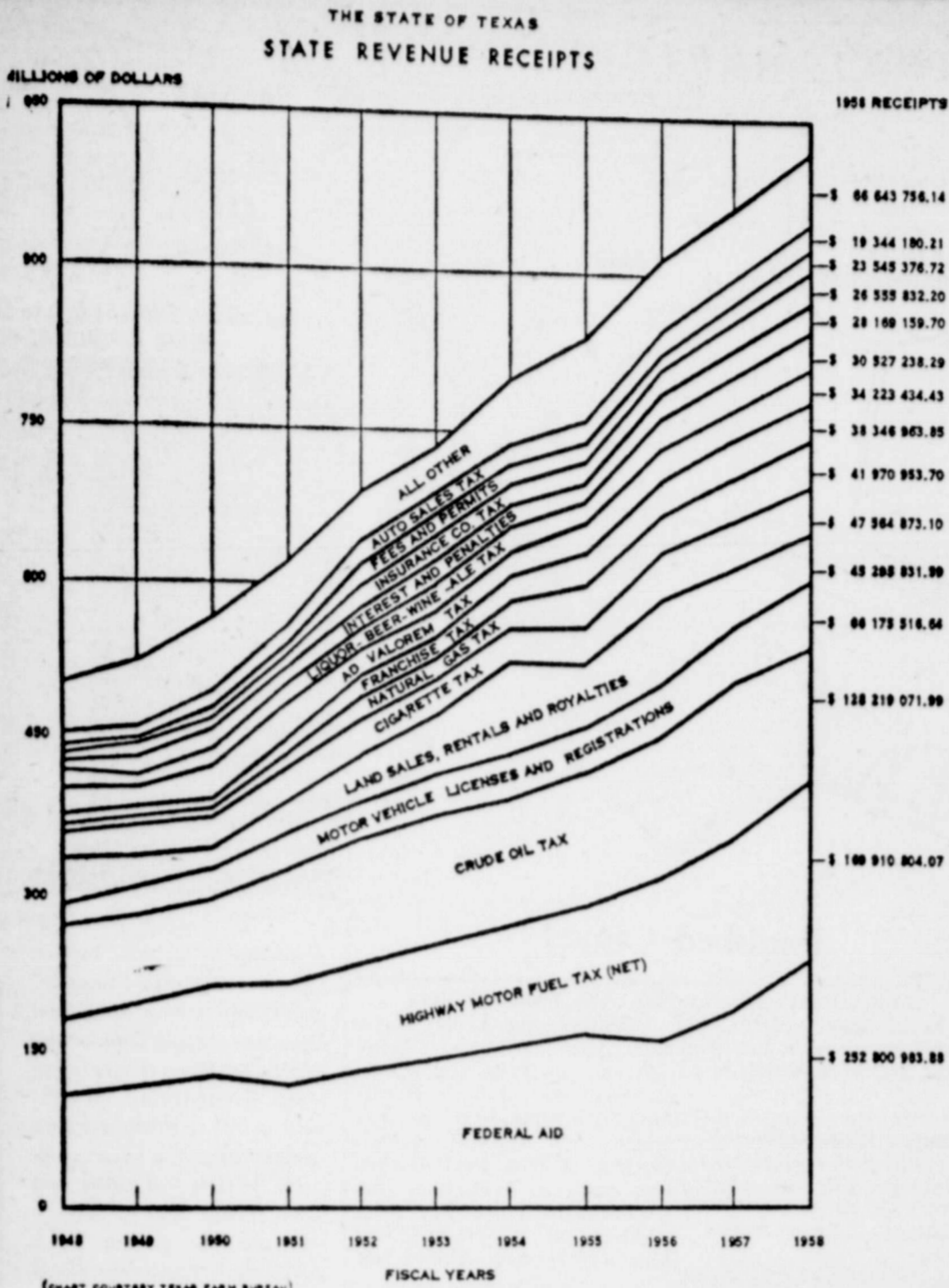

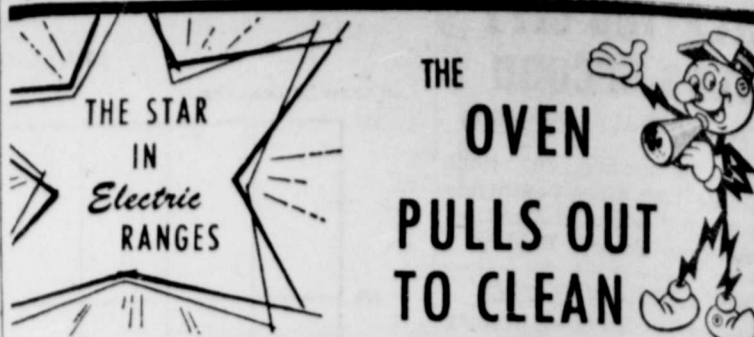
### FISH FARMING

TODAY MANY FARMERS ARE REALIZING AN EXTRA INCOME FROM PONDS ON THEIR PROPERTY BY STOCKING THEM WITH FISH AND HARVESTING THEM AS ANOTHER CROP WHEN THEY REACH A GOOD SIZE...



APPLYING "FISH FERTILIZER" TO A POND CAN INCREASE THE SIZE OF THE FISH IN THAT POND BY UP TO FIVE TIMES. THE FERTILIZER CONSISTING OF NITROGEN, PHOSPHORUS, AND POTASH INCREASES THE GROWTH OF ALGAE UPON WHICH INSECTS AND PLANKTON FEED THE INSECTS AND PLANKTON ARE EATEN BY THE FISH WHICH IN TURN ARE CONSUMED BY THE LARGER FISH. 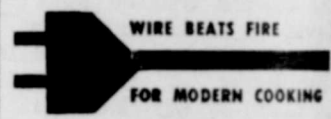
