### Here Next Thursday All Day

The Crimemobile, a huge trailer unit, filled with displays of scientific crime detection and enforcement, will be in Sterling City next Thursday, October 1. The unit will be at the high school for a part of the day and will be parked between the city cafe and barber shop part of the day, it was said.

The general public is invited to go through the exhibit, which is sponsored by the Texas Law Enforcement Foundation. Scientific crime detection aids are shown, such as the lie detector and ballistic machines. Local law enforcement officials will help at the unit, said Jack Douthit, a director of the Foundation.

Mr. Douthit urged all citizens to avail themselves of the opportunity to go through the Crimemobile. The Foundation aids and helps in many ways law enforcement officials in the state.

### PROCLAMATION BY MAYOR RUFUS W. FOSTER Sterling City Mayor's Proclamation

WHEREAS, the Crimemobile is the Texas Law Enforcement Foundation's method of enlisting the aid of good citizens in support of good law enforcement in Texas, and through this medium will call public attention to the great cost of crime in terms of wasted lives, violent deaths, human indignities and property loss estimated at \$989 million last year, and

WHEREAS, the Crimemobile, by the existence of its many scientific exhibits and displays, should be of appeal to our youth as it travels over the State and may serve to instill a sense of individual obligation in our boys and girls—our leaders of tomorrow—in carrying out the aims and purposes of good law enforcement in Texas, and

WHEREAS, the Crimemobile will bring vital information to the citizens of Sterling City pertaining to law enforcement practices and procedures in Texas, and at the same time instill an awareness to the causes of good law enforcement.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Rufus W. Foster, Mayor of the City of Sterling City, do hereby set aside Thursday, October 1, 1959 as CRIMEMOBILE DAY in Sterling City and urge all citizens to visit the CRIMEMOBILE on this date.

### Radioactive Capsule Found By Two Highway Employees

A pair of Highway Department employees found a radioactive capsule lost here last Saturday.

Dorman Gierisch and Lew Bernal found the box which was believed to contain the capsule in a ditch alongside of State 158 north of here on the road to Robert Lee.

Schuyler Rice, president of the firm which owns the capsule, said the object "even if it had lost its cobalt source could not contaminate anything."

The radioactive capsule is to be used as a tracing device in pipelines. It weighs about 150 pounds. The object was lost off a truck between here and Huntsville last Saturday; or it was stolen off a truck by someone.

The capsule contains cobalt and would have been dangerous had the cobalt been exposed.

### North Concho River Soil Conservation News Column

The list of practices eligible for cost share in the Great Plains Program has been approved by the state committee. The program is set up and ready for participation. All applications will be forwarded to the Soil Conservation Office for processing.

The practices eligible for cost sharing in the Great Plains Conservation program are—seeding grass on old fields, seeding rangeland, constructing terraces and diversions, reorganizing irrigation systems, land leveling, drilling wells for livestock water, constructing ponds, pipelines for livestock water, brush control and fencing for better distribution of grazing.

Other programs of the United States Department of Agriculture may also be used with the Great Plains Conservation Program as long as cost sharing is not for the same item. Anyone owning land or leasing land in Sterling County is eligible for the program.

### Walter Mann Dies In San Angelo

Walter Mann, 74, of San Angelo and formerly of Sterling City, died last Saturday in the Shannon Hospital in San Angelo.

Services were held Monday afternoon at the Johnson Funeral Home and burial was in the Fairmount Cemetery in San Angelo.

Mr. Mann was born Dec. 15, 1884, in Tennessee. He lived in Sterling from 1900 to 1948 then moved to San Angelo. He spent most of his life ranching, becoming a livestock appraiser in later years.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Alice F. Grixoni of Arcadia, Calif.; two sons, Jim and Len Mann, Mann, both of San Angelo; a brother, Bart C. Mann of San Angelo, two sisters and three grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Robert Foster of Sterling City, and John Willingham, Don Johnson, Marshall Powell, Otis Grisham and Austin Mills-paugh, all of San Angelo.

OUTCOME of the battle over proposed labor regulations on agricultural workers remains in doubt following two days of hearings by a labor Department Hearing Examiner last week.

At least two dozen Texans, maybe more, were present, speaking for practically all farmers and ranchers in the state. I filed a statement in opposition to the proposed regulations.

I maintained the effect of the regulations would be to by-pass Congress and by executive order to impose upon agriculture controls that have been denied by Congress, and which are "unnecessary, unjustified and unsound."

The proposed regulations would require all employers of farm and ranch labor, who make use of state and federal employment agencies, to pay the recruited labor prevailing wage (as found and determined by the Secretary of Labor); provide certain standards of housing (as found and determined by the Secretary of Labor); and pay transportation costs of the employees (if so determined by the Secretary of Labor).

The opposition to these unnecessary and wholly unjustified attempts to regulate agriculture got a big assist from Secretary of Agriculture Benson, who told his fellow cabinet officer, Secretary of Labor Mitchell, he was attempting to bring about "undue and unnecessary regulation of the farm economy", which he described as "regimentation that is repugnant to agriculture."

This marks the last of our weekly reports from Washington for this session. During the next three months I will be in the district. An office on the third floor of the Federal Building in San Angelo will be opened. In the meantime, our Washington office will remain open. We will be prepared to render every possible service to you from either of the two offices.

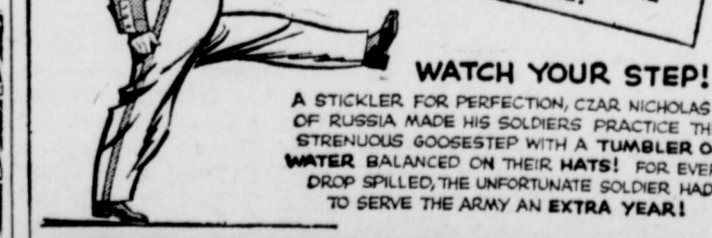

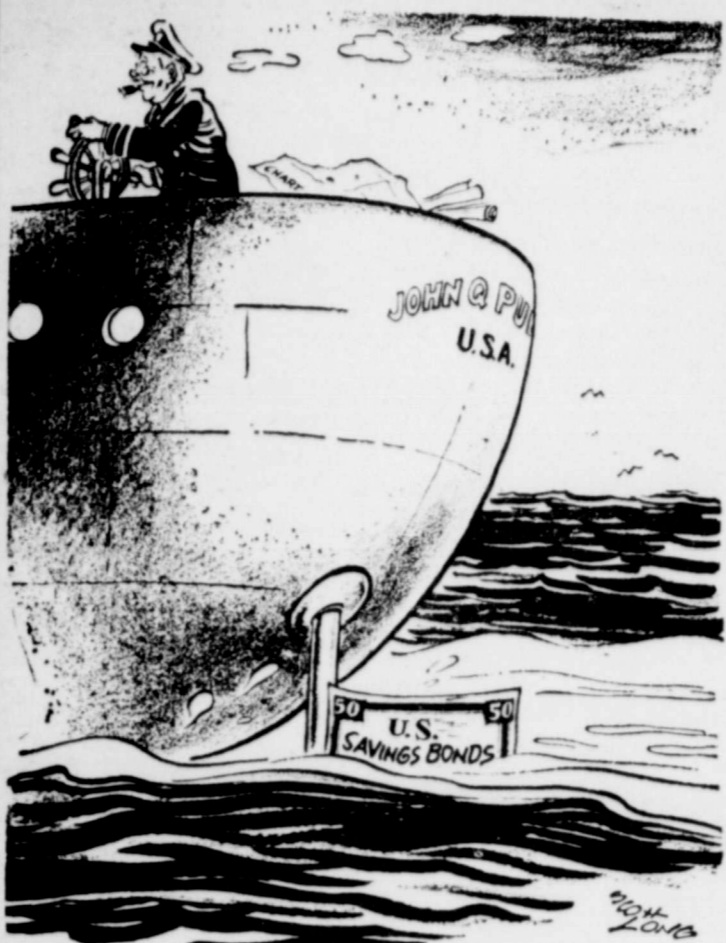

Chocolate flavored milk favorites are popular with most chil-  
 dren. Grownups not only like them too, but the added food value  
 from milk and a fortified chocolate flavored syrup gives every  
 reason to enjoy these same treats at home.

- Chocolate Nut Sundae**  
 2 scoops ice cream  
 2 tablespoons Bosco chocolate  
 flavored syrup  
 Sweetened whipped cream  
 Chopped nuts  
 Cherries  
 Put two scoops of ice cream in

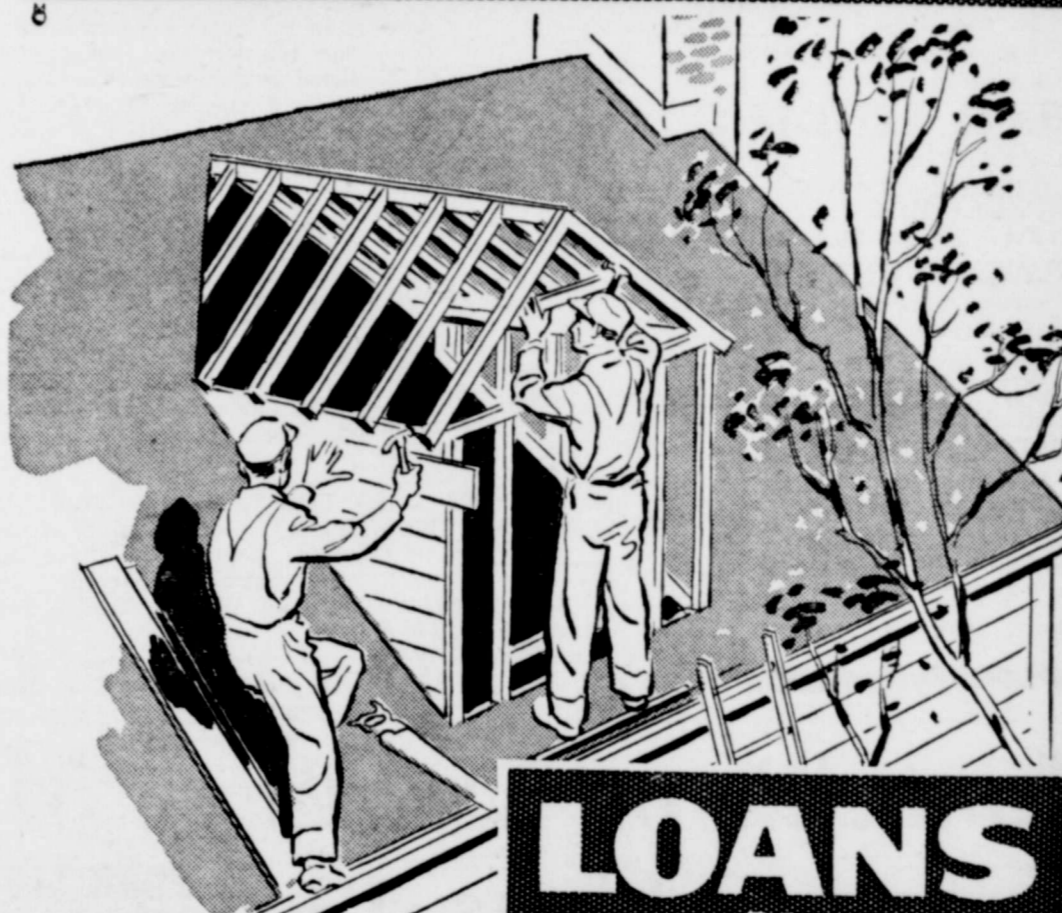

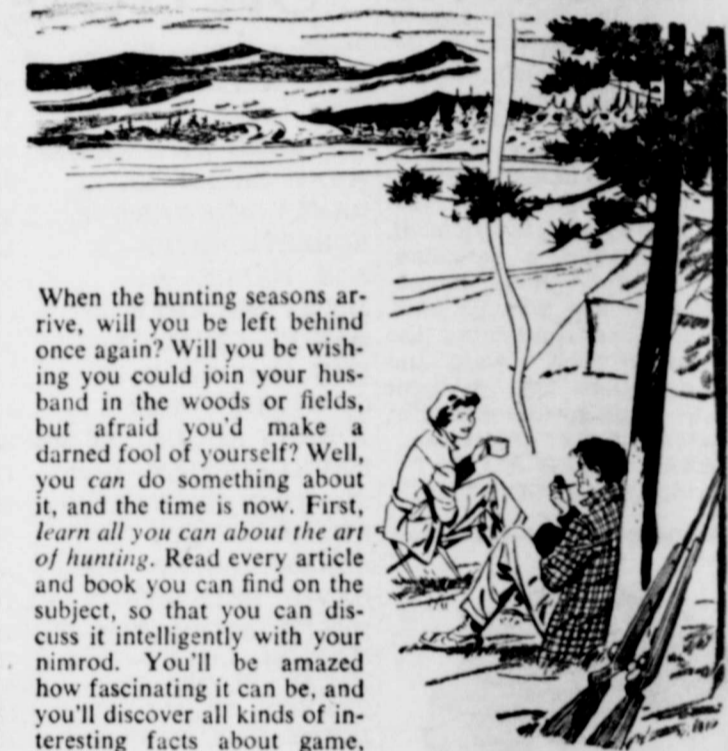

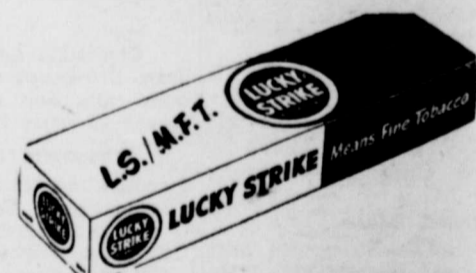
