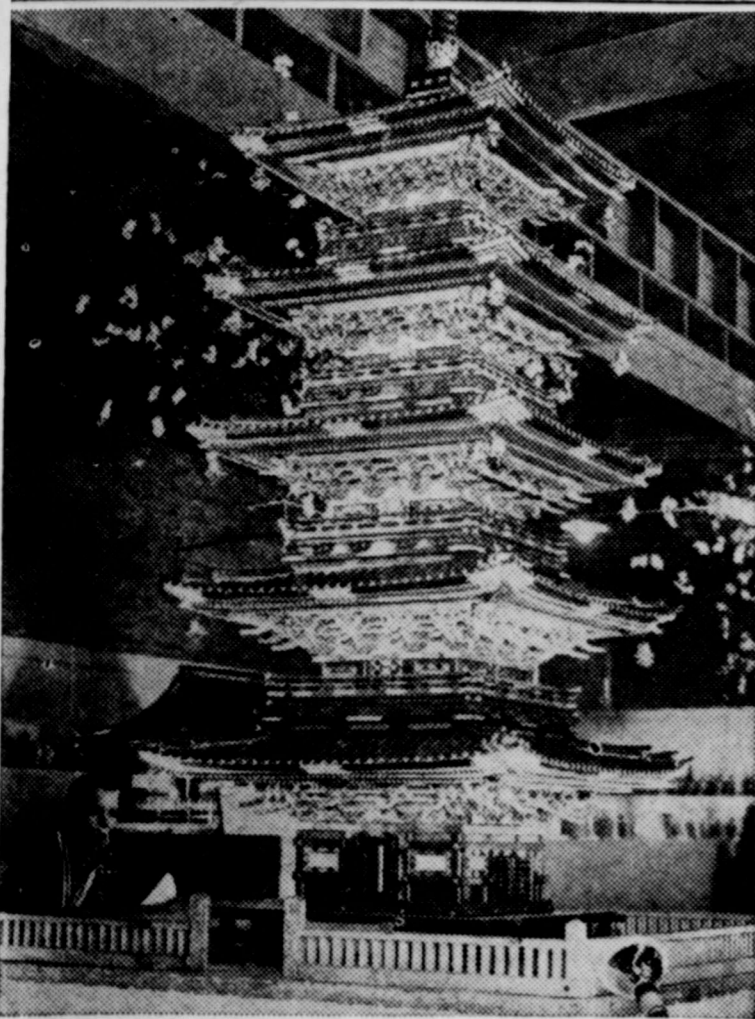

## Pagoda From 'Nikko' Exhibit



This giant five-story pagoda is one of the 24 units in the 2 1/2 million dollar Nikko Exhibitions which will be shown at the 1959 State Fair of Texas in Dallas, Oct. 9-25. The "City of Nikko" includes 1/10th scale model replicas of the beautiful temples and pagodas at the fabled Nikko Shrine in Japan. There are also 1,000 intricately carved and elaborately costumed dolls in the exhibition.

## Fred W. Allen Dies In New Mexico

Services for Fred W. Allen, 51, of Las Vegas, New Mexico and formerly of Sterling, were held in Las Vegas Thursday morning of this week. He had died at his home Tuesday morning early of a heart attack. Masonic rites were held at the graveside.

Born in Roscoe and reared in Sterling City, Fred lived in Dallas from 1927 until about 1937. He ranched for a time near here and moved to Las Vegas in 1953. There he not only ranched but was in the ranch real estate and loan business.

He was married to the former Rulene Allen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Foster. Survivors include his wife; a son, Freddie; two brothers, J. E. Allen of Dallas and O. B. Allen of Cocoa, Florida and a sister, Mrs. John A. Reich of Beaumont.

## 550 SEE CRIMEMOBILE HERE THURSDAY

Over 550 persons went thru the Crimemobile here Thursday. The exhibit was at the school all morning and was stationed in front of the vacant lots between the Williams City Cafe and the barber Shop that afternoon.

The trailer and exhibits are sponsored by the Texas Law Enforcement Foundation.

The person in charge of the Crimemobile was John Cook of Austin. He said upon leaving that he had never seen a school bunch that was better behaved than the Sterling students. Cook said they were polite and appreciative, more so than any bunch he had exhibited to before anywhere.

In the trailer are law enforcement items such as a polygraph (lie detector), spectrograph, fingerprint exhibits, police weapons, a model of the electric chair, etc.

The Texas Law Enforcement Foundation is composed of business men over the state interested in law enforcement. The foundation has funds to aid officers with money to buy dope for evidence; suitable recognition for outstanding officers each year; funds to aid widows and children of officials that lose their lives in the line of duty. Scholarship funds for college for such orphans are maintained by the foundation. Each year outstanding law enforcement officials are honored at the annual banquet with citations and monetary awards. Jack Douthitt is a director of the foundation.

## AROUND THE COUNTY

The first 4-H Club meeting of the year was held in the auditorium at school on Monday of this week. Thirty-five members were present at the meeting.

Vice-president Reynolds Lee Foster presided in the absence of president Jerry Payne. Officers for the coming year were elected. President is David Durham; vice-president Clayton Stewart; secretary, Reynolds Lee Foster; reporter, Cecilia McDonald.

Twenty-six club members have about 100 lambs on feed; four club members have about 30 ewe lambs on feed, and three others have registered Rambouillets as their project.

Scientists at the Beltsville, Maryland, Agricultural Research Center have isolated a virus causing shipping fever of cattle. Shipping fever is a respiratory disease costing livestock men many thousands of dollars annually. This is first breakthrough in finding the cause of this disease.

For many years there have been vaccines that were of value in preventing this disease but this new knowledge will aid veterinarians in perfecting a vaccine that will more effectively control the outbreaks among cattle being moved.

It is believed that several viruses make up the shipping fever complex; this belief was further strengthened when the virus of bovine rhinotracheitis was isolated along with an unidentified virus in cattle suffering from shipping fever.

Veterinarians believe that shipping fever in cattle is comparable to the respiratory diseases of humans, one of them being the common cold. Perhaps when a preventative for one is found, it will be effective against the other. Meanwhile there is much to be learned about both.

Great Plains Conservation Program practices have been approved by the state headquarters and the program is now in effect in Sterling County. Practices under this program are designed to supplement other program practices underway. Great Plains

practices are designed to meet special needs in the plains area; presently 78 counties are participating in the program.

Any rancher or farmer who has control of the land, either by ownership or lease, can take part in the program. The entire unit must be put into the program for from three to ten years; all contracts expire on December 31, 1971 however.

Any agricultural agency in the county can provide information on the program but the Soil Conservation Service is the contracting agency. They are charged with furnishing the technical assistance and cost-share on completed practices. . . . .

Now is a good time to fertilize your lawn. A shot of fertilizer is recommended about 30 days before the first frost date so now is a good time to start thinking about about it; first frost date is usually around November 15 in this area.

Two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn is recommended. This two pounds of nitrogen can be secured in an application of 14 pounds of 16-20-0 per 1,000 square feet; about the same amount of 13-39-0 will also supply the needed nitrogen and phosphorus. After applying the fertilizer, water well. The plant food now will send the grass into the cold winter in a good hardy condition with strong roots and it will emerge better next spring after such treatment.

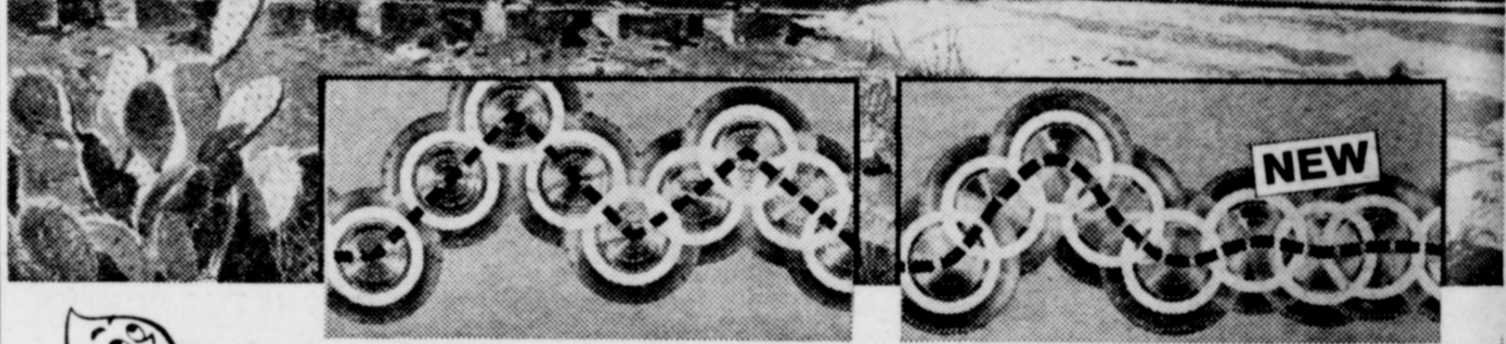
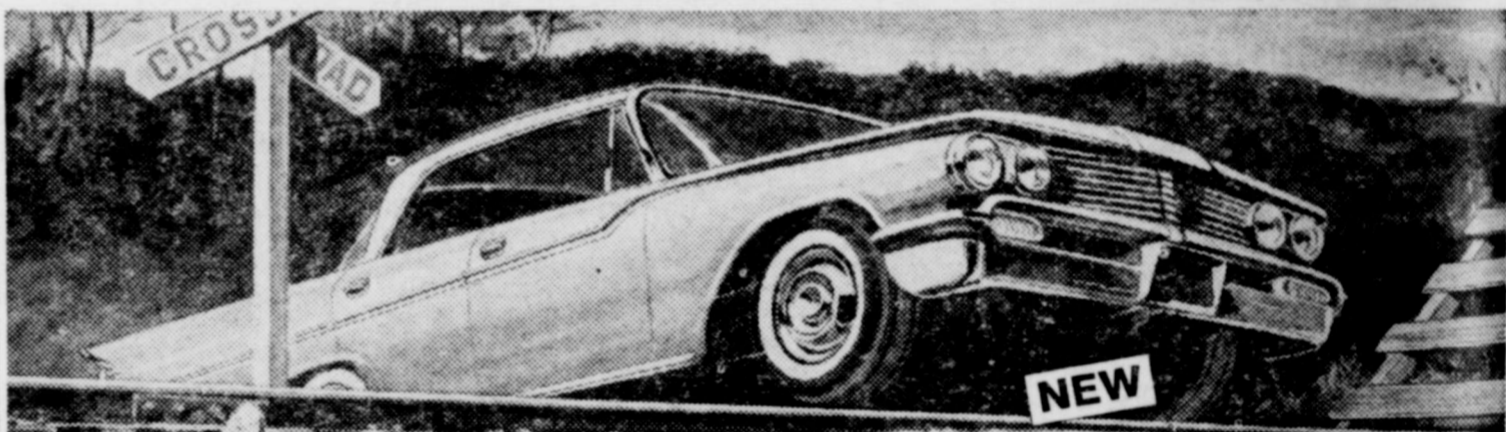

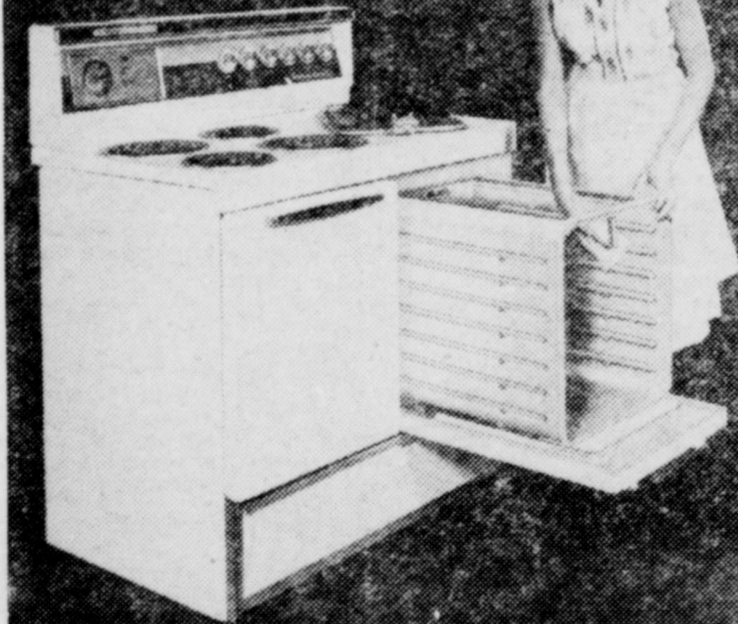

**Puddings That Please**

WHEN the back-to-school parade begins, and youngsters march in for dinner with hearty appetites, a filling dessert to their liking can be one of the easiest ways to win their approval for your entire menu. Today's recipe for Peanut Butter Crunch Pudding includes ingredients that please youngsters most, and its easy preparation is ratifying to every homemaker.



**Peanut Butter Crunch Pudding**  
1 package vanilla pudding and pie filling mix; 2 cups milk; 1 1/4 cups graham cracker crumbs (about 20 crackers); 1/4 cup sugar; 1/4 cup creamy-style peanut butter; 3 tablespoons butter.

Combine pudding mix and milk in saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Let cool to room temperature. Meanwhile, combine graham cracker crumbs, sugar, peanut butter, and butter. Mix thoroughly. Spread 1/4 cup crumb mixture in an 8x8-inch cake pan. Cover with 1 cup of the pudding. Then add alternate layers of 1/4 cup crumb mixture and remaining pudding. Sprinkle with remaining crumb mixture. Chill. Makes 1 serving.

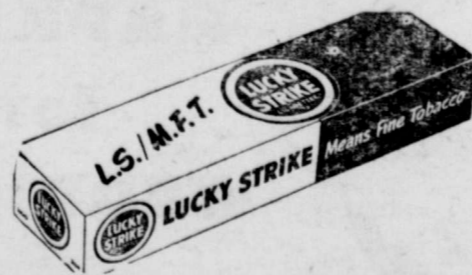

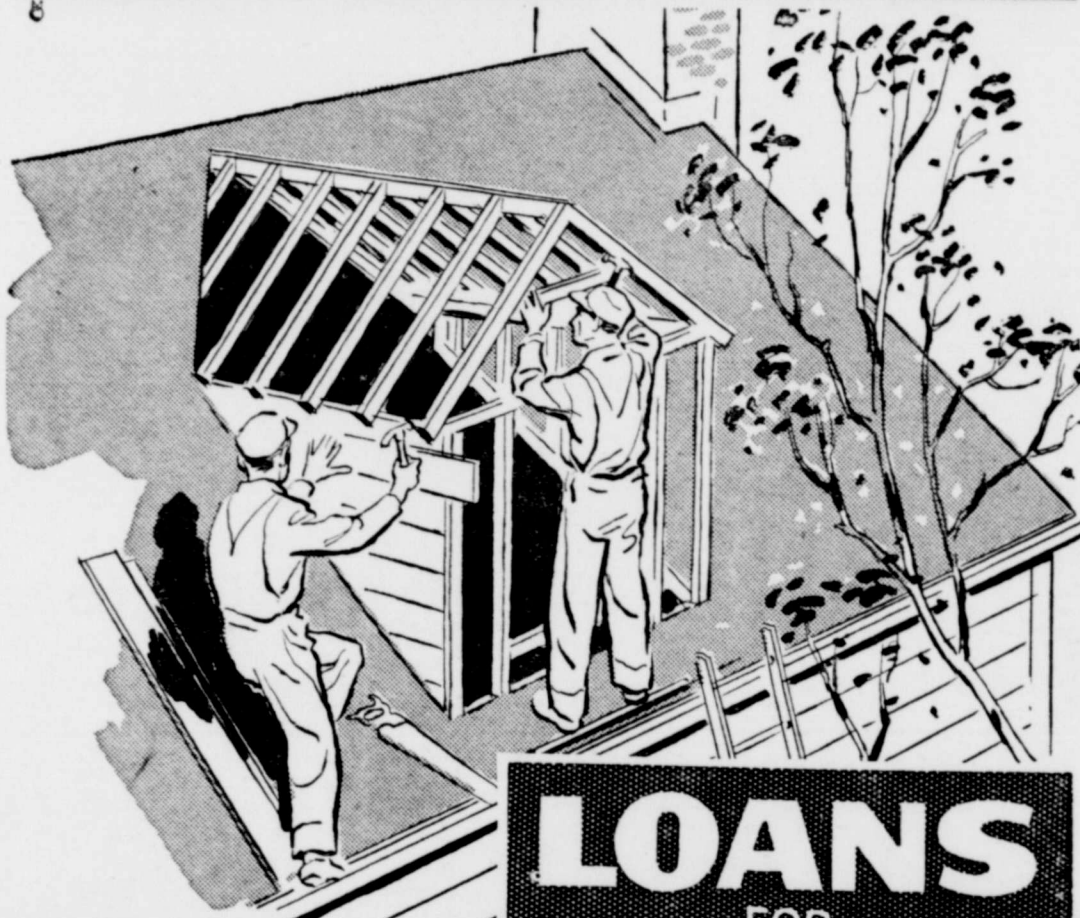

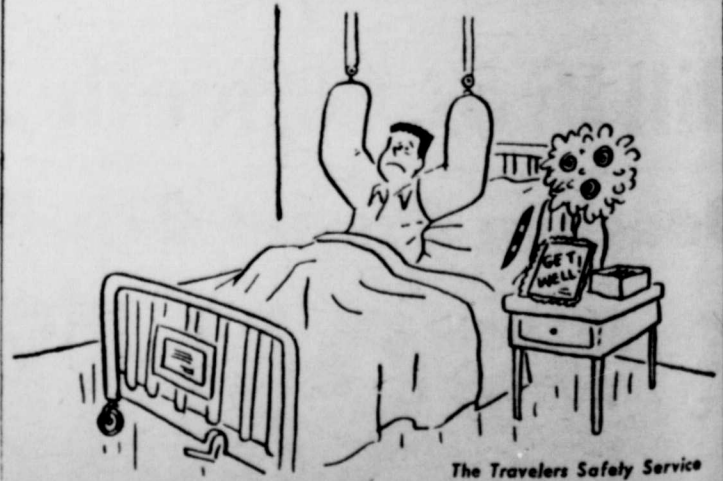
