Sterling County Livestock Show Here Next Monday

Judging Starts At 8:00 A. M.

The annual Sterling County Livestock Show will be held here Monday at the show barn. Starting at 8 a. m., the show will be judged by Curtis Henderson, county agent of Irion County.

There will be 170 lambs being shown by 42 FFA boys and 4-H Club boys and girls.

Included in the classes are finewool lambs, crossbred lambs, commercial ewes and registered Rambouillet lambs.

William Foster is show superintendent and assistants are Marvin and Melvin Foster.

The auction sale of lambs will start at two o'clock that afternoon with each exhibitor entitled to sell one lamb.

A concession stand will be operated by the mothers club in the show barn.

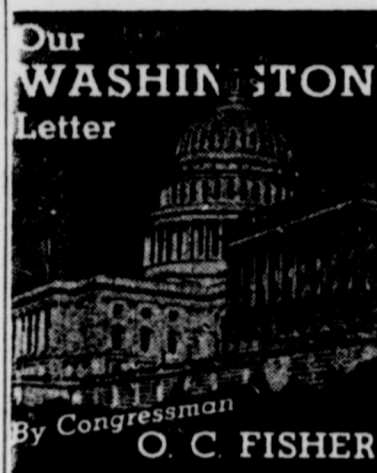

The President's State-of-the-Union message contained at least two rosy points that stood out: first, he announced that it now appears the budget for the current fiscal year, despite the steel strike, will be balanced with \$200 million to spare. Secondly, he gave advance notice that the budget for the next fiscal year which will be officially released later this month, will be balanced with \$4 billion surplus.

In commenting on the general economic outlook, the President said with confidence that 1960 promises to be the most prosperous year in our history.

The prospective \$4 billion surplus next year should, the president said, be applied to reduce the national debt. With this I agree. But the surplus is not certain. There is already a rash of brand new spending measures pending, and this is election year. But if the line can be held against nonessentials, the outlook is bright and encouraging.

As is always true on Presidential election years, the Capitol Hill atmosphere is thick with politics. Already the highly vocal radical-liberal group in the Senate is threatening Senator Johnson's leadership. They have been joined by a new recruit—Senator Gore of Tennessee, who with certain reservations has joined hands with Douglas, Proxmire, Morse, Clark and a few other extremists in a fight presumably for more state welfare and liberal legislation.

There are political overtones in such rumblings which could, if they become disgustingly vocal, rebound to the benefits of Senator Johnson in advancing his Presidential prospects.

Bank Stockholders Met Tuesday

Officers and Directors Are Renamed

The stockholders of the First National Bank here met Tuesday for the annual stockholders meeting. They reelected the officers of the bank at the meeting—being H. D. Coleman, Flavy E. Davis, Worth B. Durham, R. T. Foster, Rufus W. Foster, H. L. Hildebrand and Roland Lowe.

Then, at the directors meeting that followed all the officers were renamed—being R. T. Foster, president; H. L. Hildebrand, vice-president H. D. Coleman, executive vice-president and cashier; and Nan E. Davis, assistant cashier.

The directors met with architect Doyle Maddux of San Angelo on plans for the remodelled bank building. The plans were approved and contracts are to be let at an opening of the sealed bids on January 29. The top story of the old building will be torn off and a drive in window is to be installed at the rear of the bank.

The directors had declared and paid a 20% dividend on the capital stock on December 31. They also paid a 15% bonus to employees at that time.

The bank has capital stock of \$100,000, a surplus fund of \$200,000 and on December 31 the undivided profits amounted to \$73,471.89.

Loans and discounts at the close of the year totaled \$1,111,388.33, with total assets of \$3,085,674.56.

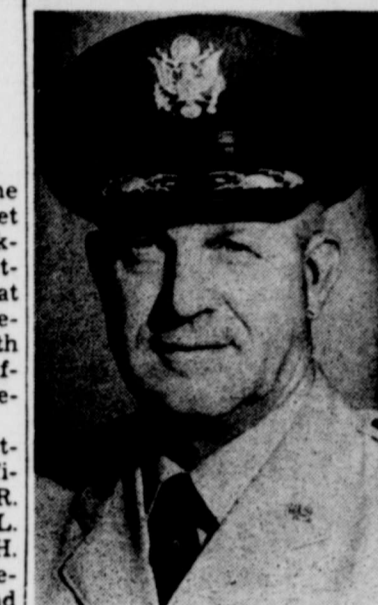
Daughter To The Dean Johnsons

Goodfellow Field C.O. Speaks To Lions Wednesday

Col Robert Augustinus, the commanding officer at Goodfellow Field, spoke to the members of the Lions Club at the regular luncheon meeting Wednesday. Col Augustinus flew up for the speaking engagement in a helicopter. Pilot Capt. Johnny Johnson, flew the speaker up in time for the luncheon.

The Security Base commander told of the Air Force Security School at Goodfellow for training personnel. They school the non-commissioned young officers for the service. They have a five-day school week, six hours a day with a two hour study period following classes.

The colonel said there were 3,000 men on the base and 1,500 were students. Men based there have 2,300 dependents. The military payroll \$7 million yearly and the civilian payroll is \$2 million yearly. Money is also spent in the area for good and services, all totalling up to a real chunk of the economy of the city of San Angelo and area.

The Air Forces contribute \$53,000 yearly to the schools at San Angelo.

Reenlistment in the Security Service (Air Forces) runs about 40% above the average for all branches of the service.

Col. Augustinus said the Security Service was always glad to cooperate in every way with the city and surrounding areas with a view to better understanding and mutual gain. He said the Air Forces were ready and willing to do their part in obtaining a better understanding between the base and civilian interests.

The colonel had been asked to speak on the program by Lion Jack Douthitt.

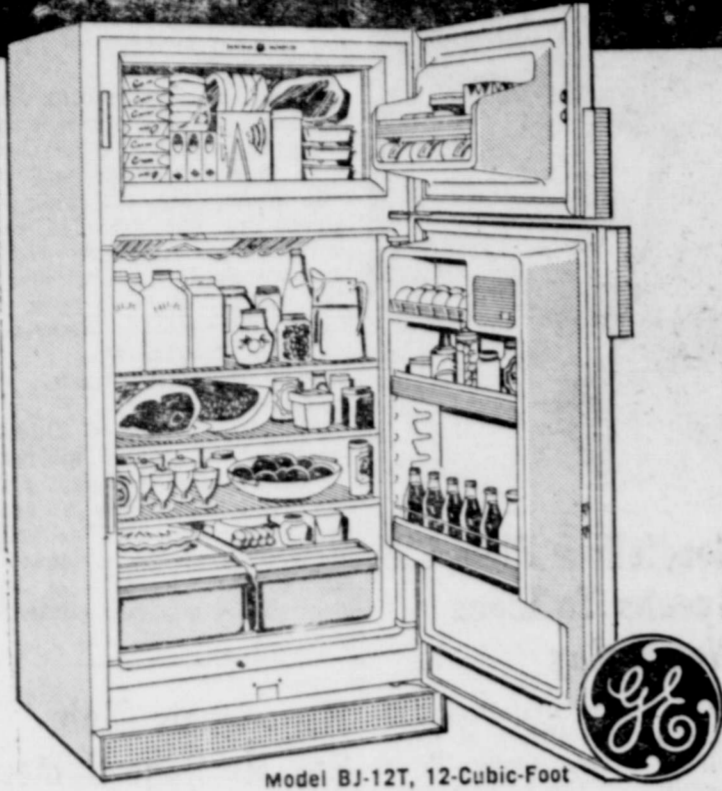

OUTDOOR COOKING MADE EASY

With fall here and the fresh vegetable season in full swing, let's give the kitchen range a rest and see how easy it is to prepare a sumptuous meal outdoors. Let's do it the lazy way, with no pots and pans to bother with!

Our vegetables can be roasted corn, baked potatoes and summer squash, for example. For meats, let's select chicken broilers, chops, steak or fish as a relief from the customary hot dogs and hamburgs. Merely wash the potatoes and wrap them individually in metal foil. Slice each squash in half lengthwise; insert a few thin onion slices, a pat of butter, and salt and pepper to taste. Then wrap each seasoned squash in metal foil. Put the foods in a carton, with knives and forks, condiments, napkins, a roll of metal foil, and whatever else is needed for beverages and dessert.

We can make our own fireplaces by placing a wire grid (such as comes in a stove or refrigerator) over a rectangle of rocks — or even a hole dug in the ground, as shown. Collect an armful or two of dry hardwood and let the fire burn down to coals. Arrange the potatoes and squash at the edge of the coals where the heat is just a bit too hot to hold a hand over it. For best results, keep the cooking fire small, and with little or no flame.

Turn the potatoes and squash occasionally and, after half an hour or so, test them with a long-handled fork. When they are about half done, put the grid over the fire and lay the corn on it, husks and all. Let the corn roast until the husks are browned all around; then wrap each three or four ears in thick newspaper, to keep them warm.

Now is the time to put on the meat or fish: If we have chicken broilers, lay them on the grid and let them brown slowly; basting them with barbecue sauce or bacon fat, if available. When a fork slips into them easily, they should be done. Fish fillets, chops or steak take less time, but can be broiled in a similar manner.

When it's time to serve the meal, cut open the potatoes through the foil, adding butter and condiments. Unwrap the steaming squash and serve it in its foil dish. Husk the corn, adding butter and salt. Serve the meat or fish on a square foot or so of doubled foil. It's a meal fit for a king — and almost nothing to wash or to pack up afterwards!

If the weather's cool, we can enjoy delicious coffee, tea or cocoa the easy way by using "Nescafe" (instant coffee), "Nestea" (instant tea) or "EverReady" cocoa — the kind with sugar and whole milk already in it. Monday, January 13, is the date of the Sterling County Livestock Show. Four-H Club and FFA members of Sterling County will exhibit about 125 head of fat lambs, 27 head of commercial ewe lambs or range ewe lambs, and 17 head of registered Rambouillet sheep.

Superintendents of the show this year are Marvin and Melvin Foster and William Foster. Judge is Curtis Henderson, county agent of Irion County.

Judging will start at 8:00 a. m. Monday morning with the crossbred lamb classes followed by the finewool lamb classes; following that the commercial ewe lambs and registered Rambouillets will be judged. The auction sale will start at 2:00 p. m. If judging of the commercial ewes or Rambouillets is not completed by that time, it will be suspended until after the sale. Each exhibitor is allowed to sell one lamb in the sale. The lamb must have been shown in one of the fat lamb classes and must grade fat.

As in the past, the 4-H Club and FFA mothers will operate the concession stand. Profits from the stand go to the two clubs. Coffee, doughnuts, sandwiches, soda pop, and hot dogs will be available.

It is still too early at this writing to know what to expect in the way of weather. No cold fronts are on the weather map at the present time but if past shows are any indication, we can expect the worst. The heaters will be set up and ready to go in case they are needed.

This year all exhibitors are required to have their lambs in the barn by Sunday night. No definite time for arrival has been set but in order to get the judging underway at 8 Monday morning, they must be in the barn Sunday night. Each exhibitor is reminded that they must pay an entry fee of \$1 regardless of the number of animals exhibited. This fee goes into the prize money.

For the first time exhibitors are limited to the number of animals they can show. Each exhibitor can show four finewool lambs and four crossbred lambs.

Several Sterling County ranchers were bull buyers at the Concho Hereford sale in San Angelo last Thursday. John and Martin Reed, Bill and Lee Reed bought several bulls, among them the reserve champion bull of the show. Mrs. J. G. Bird purchased two bulls; Clinton Hodges and Alvie Cole brought home one each. Quite a number of other Sterling County ranchers were in the crowd that saw Bill Reed place the sale bulls Thursday morning and the sale that afternoon.

Plenty of the 1960 edition of the FARMERS TAX GUIDE are still on hand in the office. This guide, compiled by the U.S. Treasury Department's Bureau of Internal Revenue, contains many helpful hints on figuring your 1960 income tax and social security.

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JUST BETWEEN US SPORTSMEN

The annual convention of the Outdoor Writers' Association, held recently at Hot Springs, Arkansas, was a great success. They seem to have more than their share of black bass down there, but they are bashful bass; the kind you have to go down deep for during warm weather. My boat came in with both first and second prizes — thanks largely to the appeal of the red plastic worm!

Evidently one shouldn't take a dim view of plastic worms, and I don't any more. Local savants, like Ira Robbins and Ed May use them with spinning tackle and impale them by one end only on the hook of a brick-colored 1/4 ounce lead jig. They cast out off points of land and let the lure sink to the bottom; jiggling it in slowly until they get a strike or get hung up. Both happen frequently. We lost several jigs, but we caught our limit of bass.

With about six inches of indigestible worm trailing beyond the hook, it's a wonder these bass don't strike short, but they don't seem to. There are few strikes that don't result in hooked fish.

All this gives me an idea for hot weather, when other fish lie deep. I don't know how this rig works on trout and other species but, when they aren't hitting on top, I intend to find out.

These Arkansas boys are great ones for enjoying life the easy way. While Ira and Ed and I were bothering the hapful bass on Lake Ouachita, Ira said, "Joe, How'd you like a hot drink of something? We have coffee, tea, or cocoa. Take your choice."

I eyed the two "Thermos" vacuum bottles and wondered how he could get three kinds of drinks out of only two bottles. He solved the problem by taking a small jar of "Nescafe" (instant coffee) from his kit; pouring a teaspoonful into a cup, and filling it with piping hot water from the "Thermos". "Nescafe" is wonderful coffee, and it tastes especially good out-of-doors.

Ed went for a hot cup of "Nestea" (instant tea) and Ira settled for "EverReady" cocoa. Three kinds of drinks — all from the same hot water container, with no waste, and no need to wash the container afterwards! These boys keep the ingredients in their "Thermos" kits all the time. Since there's no need to wait for coffee to perk, they get a quarter hour

head start in the morning!

Another angle to this idea is to combine "Nescafe" and "EverReady" cocoa to make a hot drink called "mocha". This is a favorite combination with athletes as well as with sportsmen because it packs the lift and flavor of coffee with the energy and flavor of cocoa. They usually go for the "EverReady" kind because it has sugar and whole milk already in it. There's nothing to add except very hot water.



After our little beverage break, we drifted into a crappie area and found that this lure is sure death to big crappies. This gives me an idea for salt water fishing back in New England. Along our northeastern coast we get runs of bluefish and striped bass. I'm going to try the black version of this worm rig for them. It should be a good substitute for rigged eels, which are one of the popular baits along the coast.

Sportsmen seem to have a yen for doing things the easy way. It's not that we're lazy. We just have an eye to efficiency. There are lots of short cuts to enjoying the out-of-doors and, since we usually eat three times a day, one of the handiest bits of knowledge is how to cook outdoors — the easy way.
