## Rufus Foster Back As Sterling Mayor

Mayor Rufus W. Foster was renamed mayor when the city election was held here on Tuesday. He received 85 out of the 89 votes. All names had to be written in, as no names had been printed on the ballot.

### Lee Reed, Fred Hodges and Roland Lowe on Council

Lee Reed and Fred Hodges, incumbents were renamed to the city council and Roland Lowe went on as a new member.

Reed got 79 votes and Lowe 39 for the regular terms up for filling. Hodges also got 30 in that spot.

For the unexpired term of Horace Donalson, Hodges got 38 votes and Webb Hudson got 19.

The other two members of the council who were not up for reelection are Harvey D. Glass and Hugh Harzke.

### Wm. McDonald in District Judge's Race

Wm. C. McDonald of San Angelo formally announced this week that he was a candidate for the office of the Judge of 5th Judicial District Court, subject to action of the Democratic primary in May.

Concerning his announcement, McDonald has the following to say:

In formally announcing my candidacy for the office of Judge of the 5th Judicial District Court, which judicial district comprises the counties of Coke, Irion, Schleicher, Sterling and Tom Green, I am mindful of the great responsibility which will devolve and fall upon me as the Judge of this Court.

The constitution and statutes of this State clearly define the duties of your District Judge, however, unless the Judge has a judicial temperament, it is most difficult, if not impossible for the Judge to properly carry out those duties.

It may be safely said that William C. McDonald does possess such judicial temperament, and that he will make a fair, just and impartial Judge.

It was a great honor when all the lawyers of the Tom Green County Bar who were present, voted unanimously to elect me as the Interim County Judge of Tom Green County, and when all four members of the County Commissioner's Court voted unanimously for me as their preceding officer.

The record which I made as Tom Green County Judge, both as a trial court and in presiding over the Commissioner's Court, speaks for itself. The record discloses that as such County Judge, the docket was cleared. And in February 1959, the Governor of this state appointed me as Special County Judge in a probate matter.

It is not possible to offer to you any higher recommendation than to respectfully request among those with whom I have served in a judicial capacity, as the better yardstick with which to measure just what a Judge may be expected to do in the future, is to look and see just what he has done in the past.

I respectfully ask your good will as well as your vote in the May 7th Primary.

The time for applying fertilizer to lawns is just about here. Recommendations call for the application of fertilizer for Bermuda, St. Augustine and other grasses at about the time the grass begins to grow in the spring.

A spring application of fertilizer will furnish plant food for the grass to begin its spring growth. One of the more critical times for all lawns is when the grass first begins growth in the spring after the winter dormancy period.

There are a number of fertilizers which can be used. They should be used at the rate of 2 pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square foot of lawn. In commercial fertilizers, the first figure in the ratio is the nitrogen content of the fertilizer. For instance, a ratio of 16-20-0 means that there is 16 pounds of nitrogen available, 20 pounds of phosphorus, and no potash. It would take 14 pounds of this ratio to supply the required two pounds of nitrogen.

To keep the lawn in good condition, one pound of nitrogen should be supplied the grass every 30 days during the growing season. Each application including the first should be followed by a thorough soaking with the sprinkler.

Other types of fertilizers can be used instead of the commercial types if preferred. A common one is cottonseed meal; 15 pounds of cottonseed meal every 30 to 40 days will do a good job.

The next step following the fertilizing is to get the lawn mower in shape. If fertilized properly and watered thoroughly, there's going to be plenty of work for the mower.

A new variety of tomato, especially adapted to the High Plains of Texas, has been released by the Agricultural Experiment Station at College Station. Work on the development of the strain has been going on since 1952. The first cross is Firesteel and Carter's Fruit. The result of this cross was then crossed with Rut-

gers. Fruits are medium size, 5 to 6 ounces, round and firm. Plants are small and compact and can be easily grown on 42 inch rows with plants 18 inches apart in the row.

It is early maturing, sets fruit at unfavorable temperatures and produces high yields. The tests at Lubbock and Muleshoe showed that it would set fruit at the high temperatures in this area of the state where many other varieties would not.

Seeds were released to commercial seed growers in January of this year. If the growers had good luck, the increase would make the seed available to gardeners late this spring.

Bloat may will be a problem to the cattle man, especially so in the river or creek bottom areas where there is a lush growth of rye grass and other winter grass and weeds. Cattle are not used to the succulent growth and may bloat from eating too much of it.

After they have been on it a while, there is usually very little trouble. It is possible that the shower Saturday morning will green up enough of the grass and weeds in the low area to cause trouble.

There are several bloat remedies on the market at the present time. Most of them contain some type of silicates which reduce the bloat. There are other methods which various individuals use; the important thing is to get the bloat down before it becomes severe enough to cause further complications and death.

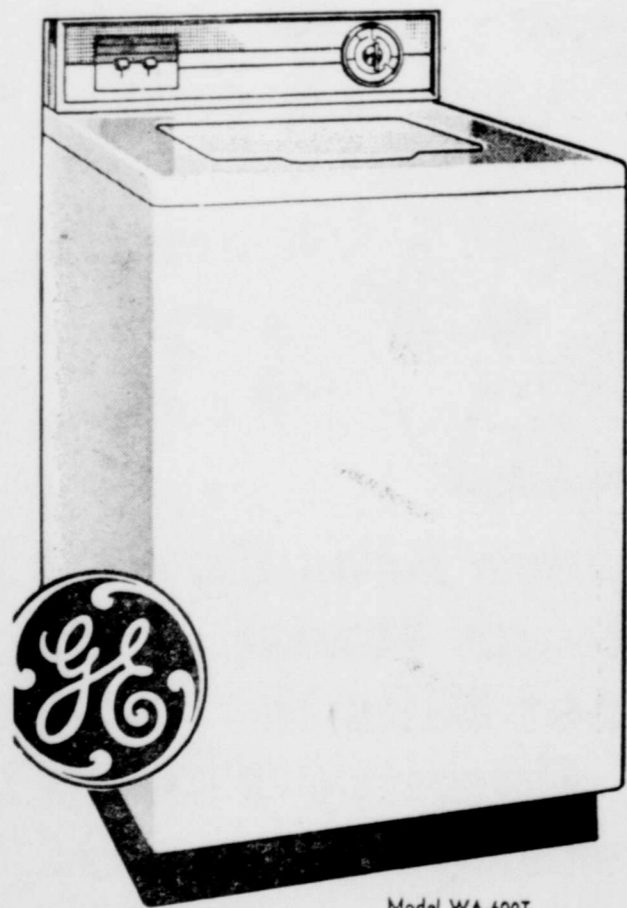
