Track and Tennis Teams Do Well

The Sterling School did well at the District 18-B Interscholastic League Meet, track and tennis divisions at San Angelo College last Saturday and Thursday of this week.

First In Tennis

In tennis the high school division went to the Sterling girls and boys. Jeannine Jones and Elizabeth Cole took first in girls doubles; Lynda was top in girls singles and Tony Allen was first in boys singles.

In the junior division of high school Billy Blair was 1st in boys singles; Jerry Payne and Jimmy Flynt were first in boys doubles.

In the elementary division Beverly Dunn took first in girls singles.

Track Events

The Sterling high school was 3rd in points at the track meet; junior division of high school 4th; and Sterling elementary placed 2nd.

There were seven new records set at the district meet, and Sterling boys set two of them.

Five boys will go to regional meet, said Coach Flynt, four relay boys and Jack Asbill.

High School Division

In the high jump Jack Asbill tied for third place, and he placed second in shot put.

Asbill placed fifth in the discus throw; and was third in the 120-yard high hurdles.

Sterling was first in the 440 Relay. Boys on the relay included Sam Nance, Don McDonald, David Durham and Daniel Gonzales. They set a new record of 46.4, the old record being 48 seconds flat.

In the mile run Daniel Gonzales set a record of 5:27.3

Bill Coleman placed 4th in the 880-yard run. Gonzales placed 3rd in the 100-yard dash and Sam Nance placed 4th in that event.

David Durham was 3rd in the 180-yard low hurdles and Nance was 2nd in the 220-yard dash.

The Sterling relay team was 4th in the mile relay event.

The mile relay team is composed of Clayton Stewart, C. L. King, Bill Coleman, and Jack Asbill.

Junior Division of High School

In the junior division of high school Billy Blair was 1st in chinning; Jerry Payne 2nd in the 100-yard dash; Billy Blair 4th in the 75-yard dash; and Larry Miller 4th in the shot put.

Elementary Division

In the elementary grade division, David Coleman was 1st in chinning; Danny Bailey was 2nd and Freddie Fields was 4th.

Van Gaston tied for first in the high jump and was second in broad jump. He was 4th in the 50-yard dash.

The 440-relay team placed 4th. On it are Van Gaston, Danny Bailey, Freddie Fields, and Billy Joe Tindall.

Bill Dees was 4th in the shot put.

Sterling was second in elementary, and was beaten by Sands 19½ to 19.

In high school Sterling had 93 points for third; Garden City had 94 points and Bronte was first with 157 points.



OUTDOOR COOKING MADE EASY

Our fan mail brought in an idea for a "Hot Dinner Package" that looks interesting. We tried it out, and it works so well we'd like to pass it along. This complete meal in foil is easy to assemble, and can be carried in the hunting or fishing coat pocket.



Lay a flat, raw hamburger on about a square foot of doubled metal foil. Lay over it a few thin slices of raw potato, some slices of carrot, and a slice or two of onion. Flavor it as desired, such as with a bit of butter and a shake of salt and pepper. Pick up the opposite sides of the foil and, by doubling them over together, fold the foil down compactly. Then do the same with the sides.

This bundle can fit into an army mess kit cup, or something similar to be used for heating a hot drink. We fill a plastic vial (such as many fishing lures come in) with our choice of an instant beverage powder, such as "Nescafe" instant coffee, "Nestea" instant tea or "Ever-Ready" cocoa. Sugar and powdered cream can be added to the little container of "Nescafe" or "Nestea" if desired. There's no need to add these to "Ever-Ready" cocoa, because this tasty sportsman's beverage has whole milk and sugar already in it.

We fill the remaining spaces of the cup with Nestle's "Semi-Sweet Chocolate Pieces". These not-too-sweet pieces of pure chocolate are excellent for dessert and add extra energy when eaten along the trail. Wrapping this whole package in some more foil seals out dirt and moisture.

When lunchtime arrives, preparation of a delicious hot dinner is quick and easy. Make a small fire and, when it burns down to coals, put the packaged dinner in or near them (hamburger side down) for ten or fifteen minutes, depending on how big the package is and how well done the meat should be. Rake a few coals over the top, too. Meanwhile, store the "Semi-Sweet Chocolate Bits" in foil and

fill the cup with water, stirring in the beverage powder when the water is about ready to boil. (Sketch of cooking over coals)

The steaming beverage and the hot dinner should be ready about the same time. Poke the dinner from the fire; unwrap it, and use the foil as a plate.

If one doesn't want to bother with a mess kit cup, let's remember that metal foil can provide a serviceable cup or dish for boiling water and for heating many kinds of foods. In this case, wrap the "Hot Dinner Package" and the little containers of instant drink powders in a second double wrapping of foil. This foil can be fashioned into a cup by forming it over your fist and crimping the edges under. With a small fire — and good cooks use no larger fires than necessary — this cup does not need a handle. However, one can be improvised from a Y-shaped green branch or from a cut wire coat-hanger. Doubling the foil around the handle will hold the foil cup securely.



Another letter came in — this one from the famous author of "Louisiana Cookery" — which says "Try adding some "Ever-Ready" cocoa to Southern Spoonbread. Also add some oatmeal, cream of wheat, or even grits. "EverReady" cocoa can turn these hot cereals into really "glamour cereals". Well, the idea sounds good, and I intend to try it. Hot cereals are a standby for hungry sportsmen for camp breakfasts, and this suggestion would seem to make them taste even better. Might be a good idea to try around the house, too.

The final report on the 1958 wool incentive program as compiled by the Agricultural Experiment Station shows Sterling County in 21st place among the 236 counties where applications for payment were filed. According to the report just released, twenty-one counties marketed more than a million pounds of wool.

High county in the state was Val Verde County where 3,666,148 pounds was marketed according to applications for payment to the ASC office. Crockett County was second with 2,800,798, Sutton third with 2,380,428 and Tom Green fourth with 2,111,966. Sterling County in 21st marketed 1,022,034 pounds with 71 applications being filed.

Average price received by producers before the incentive payment in Sterling County was 38.7 cents; after incentive payment the price received was 64.9 cents.

In line with the report on wool payments, I would like to remind all wool producers that you have two more weeks to file applications for payment under the 1959 marketing year. All applications must be filed by April 30. Wool must have been marketed prior to March 31, 1960 and after April 1, 1959 to be eligible for the 1959 payment. Take all papers relating to the sale of the wool or lambs to ASC office and Eddie Braswell or Marie Finnegan will help make your application if you have not already done so.

Today, April 15, is the last day for filing income tax returns. All returns must be postmarked April 15 in order to meet the law. Returns filed after this day are subject to penalty and interest.

Have you mailed yours yet? (Editor's note—The bureau of internal revenue has set Monday, April 18 as the final day for filing since Arthur wrote this.)

The Department of Animal Husbandry of Texas A.&M. College and the Extension Service announce the 1960 Beef Cattle Short Course. Dates for the 1960 course are August 8, 9, 10; location is on the campus of the college at College Station, Texas. The course is open to any beef cattle producer in Texas.

Along with the short course another steer carcass contest will be held. Entry blanks for the steer carcass contest are available in the county agent's office and must be received at the college by May 15; steers must be delivered on August 4 or 5. Any breed or crossbreed is eligible. Steers must be under 18 months of age and should weigh between 900 and 1100 pounds by the contest.

Contest will be based on total carcass value as determined by yield of whole sale cuts valued at the average price for the grade of each cut. Steers

will be purchased by the Meats Laboratory of the college on the basis of current carcass valuations for grade.

1960 might be a good year for mesquite control with chemicals. All that is lacking right now is a little surface moisture; subsoil moisture is good and mesquite feeds heavily on the subsoil moisture. With a little additional surface moisture, good kills should be made using recommended chemicals and amounts.

If you are thinking of doing aerial spraying this year, you should mark your calendar as to the date the mesquite leaves put out. It is recommended that spraying be done 50 to 80 days after the leaves first appear in the spring under good growth conditions. In many places around the county, the first leaves put late last week. Watch the mesquites in the area you intend to spray and mark the date the leaves put out on the calendar so you will have something of a guide. Appearance of the leaves later in the season will also be important but for the time being, remember the date they first put out.
