Democratic Primary Election Saturday May 7

Absentee Voting Now in Progress

The Democratic Primary Election will be held on Saturday, May 7, here and all over the state. Offices to be voted on include that of governor, U.S. Senator on down to precinct officials.

On Thursday of this week fourteen persons had voted absentee at the county clerk's office here. The final day for absentee votes is May 3, said Mrs. Charles Speck, deputy in the clerk's office.

Returns of the election are to be posted on a poster card board in front of the News-Record office that night, said Demo chairman Jack Douthit. In the past the office of the West Texas Utilities Company has been used, but the crowd sometimes double-parks on the highway at that point and creates a traffic hazard on the highway so the returns will be posted on the side street at the newspaper shop. Most usually all returns are in by 8:00 p.m., said chairman Douthit.

All election judges are asked to phone in their box results soon as possible after the closing of the polls at 7 p.m. Phone number of the News-Record is 8-3251. All state and district returns are phoned in to the Texas Election Bureau by the chairman for the compiling of state returns by that board.

Voting will take place at the regular voting boxes over the county. One move is the divide box to the W. H. Owens home from the Bill Ralph Bynum home. Mr. Owens is the judge of that box.

O. T. Jones will be in charge of the box at the courthouse again. H. A. Chapple was named alternate at that box. No. 2 box at Mulberry has Mrs. Bill Blair—Reynolds Foster in charge.

No. 3 box—China Valley—at the Humble ranch house, Mrs. T. H. Humble—Mrs. William Foster.

No. 4—Owens home on divide The No. 5 box will be at the N. H. Reed ranch house with N. H. Reed—Perry Matthews presiding.

The absentee box will be counted by Roland Lowe, S. M. Bailey and Mrs. Martin C. Reed Saturday afternoon.

Voters are urged to vote early in the day so the votes can be tabulated early by the judges and helpers at the voting boxes. The results will be known quicker and the workers can be through earlier. (The pay for judges and the helpers is only \$7 and \$5 in Sterling County.) The judges of each box gets the \$7 for bringing back the results and supplies to the courthouse that night. All votes must be counted and the results be turned in by 24 hours by the judge—by law. Chairman Jack Douthit and secretary Mildred Emery suggests that all votes could be kept counted up by the groups and quickly tabulated and turned in shortly after closing of the polls.

The Sterling County 4-H Club junior grass identification team composed of Barbara Durham, Larry Stewart, David Foster and James Morgan placed first in the district contest at San Angelo last Saturday. The junior division is made up of club members who are under 13 years of age on January 1, this year. Purpose of the division is to give junior club members training for the time when they become seniors.

Barbara Durham was second high point individual in the contest.

The Schleicher County team was second followed by the Kerr County team in 3rd place.

In grass identification, club members are called on to identify and give the four characteristics of a number of a number of grasses. There are 56 grasses on the list which they must be familiar with. In the San Angelo contest Saturday, they were required to identify 40 grasses and give the characteristics. The characteristics are season of growth—warm or cool season; length of growth—perennial or annual; whether it is a climax grass, introduced, or invader; grazing value—good, fair, poor.

Congratulations to the four members of the team for a good job.

Dr. O. E. Sperry was in the County Monday and Tuesday of last week to do some further work on the bitterweed spraying. He sprayed several plots on the E. F. McEntire ranch and the Copeland Bros. ranch using 2,4-D and varying amounts of water in a ground sprayer to see what results would appear. Dr. Sperry is in charge of poisonous plant control work in the Texas Experiment Station and also teaches in the Range and Forestry Department at A & M College. He was assisted in his work here by George Sultemeir, a graduate student in the Range Department.

While here, Dr. Sperry also put out two plots on the John Reed ranch seeking more information about the control of perennial broomweed, or turpentine weed. He used both 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T on these plots. I have not had a chance to check on just what he did due to the fact that I was not able to help on any of the work this time. A little jury work removed me "from cir-

ulation" as someone said.

The Texas Purebred Sheep Breeders Association will hold its 13th annual All-Breed Ram and Ewe Sale at Brownwood next week. Dates of the show and sale are May 5-6-7 at the Fairground in Brownwood. A wool show will be held in connection with the sale.

Troy Murrell L.F. and Clinton Hodges, William and Bubba Foster will all have sheep in the sale. Troy will sell the two Rambouillet rams he showed in the county show. Clinton and Mr. Hodges will sell several Rambouillet rams and William and Bubba have a number of Suffolk rams entered in the sale.

Suffolks and Hampshires will sell Friday, May 6 at 1 p.m. Southdowns, Shropshires, Montadales, Corriedales, Columbias and Dorsets will sell at 10:00 a.m. Saturday and Delaine and Rambouillets at 1:00 p.m. Saturday.

Five hundred rams and one hundred ewes will be offered for sale. If you are in need of some good rams, this is a good opportunity to get them.

Lack of Will Power

AL MILCH IN LEGISLATIVE RACE

A positive and forthright approach to the problems of the state were promised by Al Milch in his formal announcement as a candidate for the state legislature.

Milch filed with all counties in the district back in February and made this statement of his candidacy.

"I have always tried to be frank—and sometimes to a fault, my friends tell me—and I am the first to admit that I will be totally green at this business. But I am going to depend on the advice of the good, solid citizens who have built our cities and communities and who are responsible for our progress."

Milch said that when he weighed an issue and took a stand, his constituents need have no fear of his being wishy-washy.

"I'm going to do what I honestly believe is the best and what is right, I may be wrong, but I won't be fluttering back and forth."

At this stage, he said, there is one area in which he had established a course, and that was in behalf of education.

"I am for the teachers and for a strong school program," he said. "I believe firmly that our progress, our standard of living and our way of life are tied closely to the quality of our education."

"I am interested in farm and ranch problems, too, for we have a small place of our own."

Milch is a native of San An-

gelo. His parents died when he was a lad and he was reared by an aunt and uncle. He worked while attending high school and waited on tables while going through Schreiner Institute. He also worked while he was earning his degree at Hardin-Simmons University where he also was a star football player.

He has taught and coached at Roscoe, Arlington State, Sul Ross College and Big Spring. He volunteered as a Marine private in World War II and spent 2½ years of service in the Southwest Pacific emerging as a captain. Returning to H-SU, he earned his masters degree and has 12 hours additional graduate work. He is a member of several professional organizations such as NCAA, TSTA, NEA; is a member of the Rotary Club and College Baptist Church. He and Mrs. (Marigene) Milch have three children, Larry, Merrily and Suzanne, and own their home at 1731 Yale, in Big Spring. Mrs. Milch is a member of the Big Spring High School faculty as a typing teacher.

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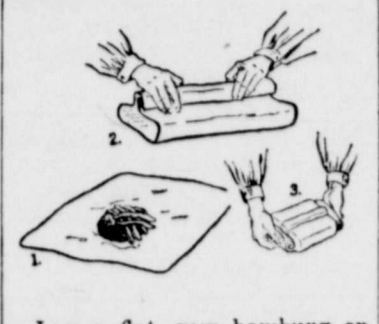
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OUTDOOR COOKING MADE EASY

Our fan mail brought in an idea for a "Hot Dinner Package" that looks interesting. We tried it out, and it works so well we'd like to pass it along. This complete meal in foil is easy to assemble, and can be carried in the hunting or fishing coat pocket.



Lay a flat, raw hamburger on about a square foot of doubled metal foil. Lay over it a few thin slices of raw potato, some slices of carrot, and a slice or two of onion. Flavor it as desired, such as with a bit of butter and a shake of salt and pepper. Pick up the opposite sides of the foil and, by doubling them over together, fold the foil down compactly. Then do the same with the sides.

This bundle can fit into an army mess kit cup, or something similar to be used for heating a hot drink. We fill a plastic vial (such as many fishing lures come in) with our choice of an instant beverage powder, such as "Nescafe" instant coffee, "Nestea" instant tea or "Ever-Ready" cocoa. Sugar and powdered cream can be added to the little container of "Nescafe" or "Nestea" if desired. There's no need to add these to "Ever-Ready" cocoa, because this tasty sportsman's beverage has whole milk and sugar already in it.

We fill the remaining spaces of the cup with Nestle's "Semi-Sweet Chocolate Pieces". These not-too-sweet pieces of pure chocolate are excellent for dessert and add extra energy when eaten along the trail. Wrapping this whole package in some more foil seals out dirt and moisture.

When lunchtime arrives, preparation of a delicious hot dinner is quick and easy. Make a small fire and, when it burns down to coals, put the packaged dinner in or near them (hamburger side down) for ten or fifteen minutes, depending on how big the package is and how well done the meat should be. Rake a few coals over the top, too. Meanwhile, store the "Semi-Sweet Chocolate Bits" in foil and

fill the cup with water, stirring in the beverage powder when the water is about ready to boil. (Sketch of cooking over coals)

The steaming beverage and the hot dinner should be ready about the same time. Poke the dinner from the fire; unwrap it, and use the foil as a plate.

If one doesn't want to bother with a mess kit cup, let's remember that metal foil can provide a serviceable cup or dish for boiling water and for heating many kinds of foods.

In this case, wrap the "Hot Dinner Package" and the little containers of instant drink powders in a second double wrapping of foil. This foil can be fashioned into a cup by forming it over your fist and crimping the edges under. With a small fire — and good cooks use no larger fires than necessary — this cup does not need a handle. However, one can be improvised from a Y-shaped green branch or from a cut wire coat-hanger. Doubling the foil around the handle will hold the foil cup securely.



Another letter came in — this one from the famous author of "Louisiana Cookery" — which says "Try adding some "Ever-Ready" cocoa to Southern Spoonbread. Also add some oatmeal, cream of wheat, or even grits. "EverReady" cocoa can turn these hot cereals into really "glamour cereals". Well, the idea sounds good, and I intend to try it. Hot cereals are a standby for hungry sportsmen for camp breakfasts, and this suggestion would seem to make them taste even better. Might be a good idea to try around the house, too.
