### WELL JOHNSON GETS ON DEMO TICKET

Lyndon Johnson got on the ticket, albeit second place.

Johnson seemingly ungrudgingly gave in to nominee Jack Kennedy's request that he accept the second spot. Kennedy and his cohorts evidently are smart enough to realize that with the ultra liberal color of the ticket, the conservatives must have one good reason for voting the Demo column this fall. So, they cut their more close associates and friends and got LBJ to accept. Then they had a bunch of disgruntled good friends who thought it was a desertion of them and their principles.

Kennedy's advisors want to hold the conservative vote, all over the nation; they want the Protestant vote over the country; they want to hold or to get Texas back into the fold (after two losses) and the South must have some reason to vote Democratic this year—and certainly Kennedy alone couldn't get enough of the southern vote.

### Wheat Referendum July 21

#### POLL SET UP FOR JULY 21 ON WHEAT QUOTA VOTE

The polling place for the July 21 referendum on marketing quotas for the 1961 crop of wheat was announced June 29 by Billy Bynum, chairman, County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

Growers eligible to vote in the referendum will be those who will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1961 (except growers taking part in the feed wheat program.)

The wheat quota ballots may be cast on Thursday, July 21, from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. at the Sterling ASC office in the Court house.

Mr. Bynum points out that at least two thirds of the growers voting in the referendum must approve the quotas if they are to become effective. Under quotas, marketing penalties will apply on "excess" wheat resulting from noncompliance with the farm's wheat acreage allotment. The basic minimum county price support rates for grade No. 1 wheat in Sterling County is \$1.77 per bushel. On the other hand, if more than one-third of the voters oppose the quotas, there will be no restrictions on wheat marketing, but allotments will remain in effect as a condition for price support as 50 per cent of parity, as directed by law.

Wheat growers voting in a referendum each year have approved marketing quotas for the past seven wheat crops.

Sheriff, tax assessor-collector W. O. (Bill) Green resigned his office here Monday, effective August 1. Green did not run for reelection in this year's primaries. The Sterling Commissioners Court appointed sheriff elect Jim Cantrell, as the sheriff, tax assessor-collector to be effective Aug. 1.

Green plans to move to Everton, Arkansas where he has a farm. His son, Jodie Green, has enrolled in Arkansas Tech at Russellville and will start to college there this fall.

Cantrell, ex-highway patrolman and former chief deputy in the sheriff's department at Weatherford, will take office as Green steps out. He won the primary election over deputy Jake Martin here in this spring's Democratic primaries.

Green was a deputy in the office of sheriff Henton Emery when he resigned in August, 1951. The court appointed him effective August 15 that year and he has served since. When he leaves he will lack only fifteen days of serving nine years in the office.

Green has a brother living at Everton, Benny Green and family.

Cantrell said the move took him by surprise and he had some work he had to hurry up and finish before he takes office in August.

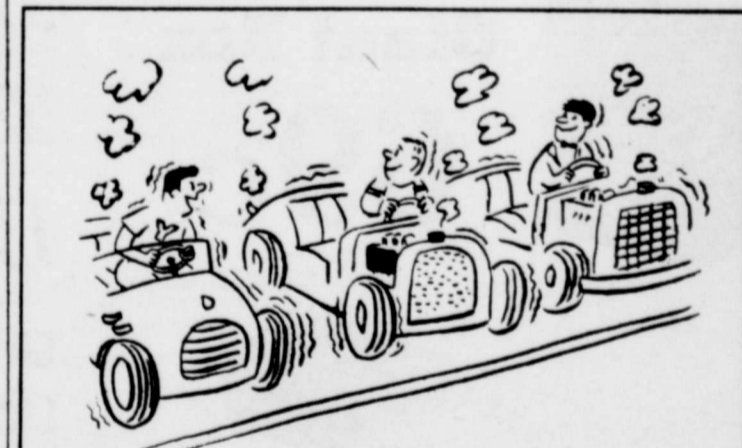
There were sixteen persons present. They were served cake and ice cream.

**WANTED BY THE FBI**



**JOSEPH CORBETT, JR.**

Corbett, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," is wanted for escape from the California Institution for Men, Chino, Calif., where he was serving a 5 years' to life sentence for murdering an Air Force sergeant. A Federal warrant was issued at Los Angeles, Calif., on March 21, 1960, charging him with unlawful interstate flight to avoid confinement for murder.

A white American, born on October 25, 1928, at Seattle, Wash., Corbett is 6 feet 1 inch to 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 160 to 170 pounds. He has light brown hair, hazel eyes, a fair complexion, a medium build, and has worked as a clerk-typist, laborer, warehouseman, laboratory technician, and alkyl-resin cooker for a paint manufacturer. His two upper front teeth slant inward and he wears glasses, reportedly being extremely nearsighted and capable of seeing only close objects without them. He has a mole under his chin and a C shaped scar on his right thumb.

Corbett, once a premedical student, is interested in scientific matters, avidly reads technical and travel books, and is intensely interested in firearms and target practice. He reportedly has a superior general intelligence and generally lives quietly and neatly but becomes erratic when drinking alcoholic beverages.

Convicted of second-degree murder, he is considered armed and dangerous.

**JUST BETWEEN US SPORTSMEN**

So many kind words have bounced back from my column telling how to make a "stovepipe stove" that it seems pertinent to pass along a similar idea. This one is about a stove you can carry in your pocket — unlighted, of course!

The cooking container is the package, and mine is the cup from an army mess kit. Everything, including fuel and a dozen or so rations of various instant hot drinks, packs inside — so this light and compact little stove is ideal for fishermen and other outdoor folks when on the prowl. The idea is a timely one, because a wide selection of hot drinks can be made quickly along stream or lake on cool spring days. We've even done it in a rowboat, while fishing!

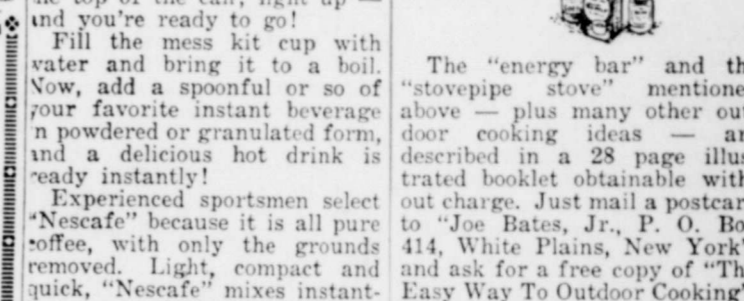


Another popular outdoor beverage is "EverReady" cocoa, because this pure, powdered cocoa has whole milk and sugar already in it, thus saving the trouble of carrying and mixing these ingredients. My favorite is a combination of the two — a teaspoonful of "Nescafe" plus two or three of "EverReady" cocoa. This "mocha" beverage is packed with flavor, pep and energy, for extra hours of exercise.

Tea lovers are happy with "Nestea"; excellent granulated tea without the leaves. A teaspoonful is enough for a large cup. To complete the instant beverage lineup, you can get chicken or beef bouillons, either granulated or in small cubes. These provide the quickest way to make clear soups, and are darn good, too.

The cans or jars in which these instant beverages are sold may be too large to carry. I save the plastic vials which certain fishing lures come in, and fill these from the kitchen supply. Several vials, plus the fuel, etc. all fit into the mess kit cup, thus making a very compact package. To keep out dirt and moisture, wrap the whole thing in a plastic envelope salvaged from grocery purchases.

While discussing compact foods, it may be interesting to pass along an idea a sportsman sent in recently. "Here's a simpler form of your 'energy bar' recipe", he writes. "Just heat a cup of any dry cereal with a king sized Nestle's 'Fruit n' Nut' milk chocolate bar in a double boiler. When the chocolate melts, mix well and cool it in a muffin tin. Wrap the cakes in foil for a tasty outdoor snack."

### Widows Get Full Social Security Benefits at Age 62, Says Ellington

"Widows should apply for social security benefits as soon as they are 62". Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo District Office advises. "It would be even better if they applied a month or two before they are 62. Of course no one should delay, but widows in particular should be careful to apply for benefits promptly."

A woman's benefit based on her own account, or on the account of a living husband is reduced if she applies before age 65, but a widow's benefit is different. Widows' benefits are not reduced and the full amount is paid at age 62.

"So, if you are a widow", Ellington explained, "And we once paid you a lump-sum or monthly benefits, you should apply again when you are 62. In fact, you can speed your first check by applying a month or so before."

### Additional Work Might Increase Your Social Security

"Social Security benefits can be increased in some cases by additional work after a person first applies for benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the San Angelo social security office announced today. "But certain requirements must be met before the benefit amount can be refigured."

If a person continues working during the year he first files for social security, he may request that his benefit amount be refigured to include the total earning for that year. There is no definite amount he must earn in the year, but it must increase the average earnings figured at the time of filing.

Another type of recomputation has a definite earnings requirement—earnings must exceed \$1200 in a calendar year after the year the person first filed for benefits. Even though the earnings exceed \$1200, the benefit cannot be increased unless the work since filing would raise his average earn-

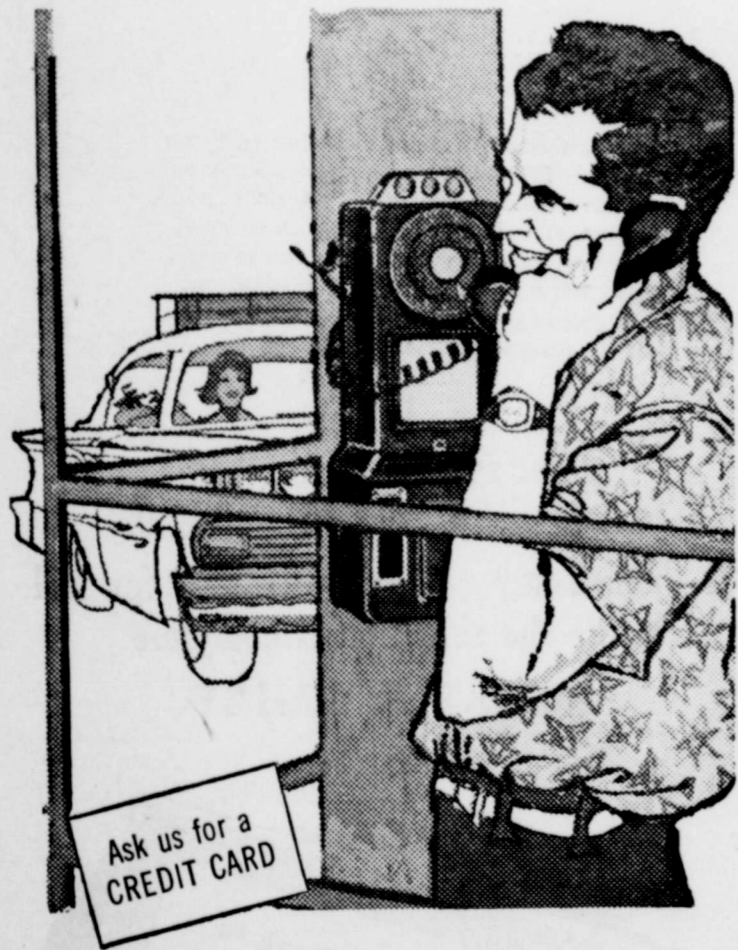

Notice is hereby given to whom concerned that under and by virtue of the authority vested by law in the Board of Water Engineers of the State of Texas a hearing will be held by said Board at its office in the State Office Building, 201 East Fourteenth Street, Austin, Texas, beginning at 10:00 o'clock A. M., on Thursday, the 1st day of September, 1960, in the matter of forfeiting, revoking and cancelling the following certified filings and permits.

1. Permit No. 63 Said permit, issued on March 11, 1915, in the name of George H. McEntire, Sterling City, Texas, is of record in the files of the Board of Water Engineers and in the County Clerk's office in Sterling County, Texas. Said permit authorized the diversion of 4.0 cubic feet per second of water from the North Concho River in Sterling County, Texas, for the irrigation of 41.2 acres of land located in Section 7, Block 14, S. P. Ry. Co. Survey in said county.

2. Certified Filing No. 597 as amended by Permit No. 150. Said certified filing, originally in the name of J. N. Kellis and now in the name of George H. McEntire, Sterling City, Texas, is of record in the files of the Board of Water Engineers and in Volume 13 page 58, Deed Records of Sterling County, Texas. Said permit, originally in the name of W. R. McEntire and Son and now in the name of George H. McEntire, Sterling City, Texas, is of record in the files of the Board of Water Engineers and the county clerk's office in Sterling County, Texas. Said certified filing declared an intent to divert 5.0 cubic feet per second of water from an existing dam and reservoir with impounding capacity of approximately 64 acre feet of water on the North Concho River in Sterling County, Texas, for the irrigation of 83 acres of land, more or less, located in Section 8, Block 14, S.P. Ry. Co. Survey in said county. Certified Filing No. 597 was amended by Permit No. 150 granted October 26, 1916, and in accordance with said permit the point of diversion was changed to the south side of the North Concho River and

within Section 8, Block 14, S. P. Ry. Co. Survey in Sterling County, Texas, and the annual diversion for irrigation was limited to not exceed 70 acre feet of water per annum.

3. Certified Filing No. 66. Said certified filing, originally in the name of W. R. McEntire & Son, Sterling City, Texas, and now in the name of George H. McEntire, Sterling City, Texas, is of record in the files of the Board of Water Engineers and in Volume 12, page 602-3, Deed Records of Sterling County, Texas. Said certified filing declared an intent to divert 6.0 cubic feet per second from an existing reservoir with storage capacity of approximately 60 acre feet of water located on the North Concho River in Sterling County, Texas, for the irrigation of 40 acres of land more or less located in Section 26, Block 23, H. & T. C. Ry. Co. Survey in said county.

Reference is here made to the above certified filings and permits for a full description of their terms and conditions and for all other purposes.

Said hearings will be held at the time and place aforesaid in the matter of forfeiting, revoking and cancelling said certified filings and permits on the grounds of wilful abandonment for three successive years in accordance with Article 7544, Texas Civil Statutes; failure to begin and to prosecute with reasonable diligence to final completion the work and development contemplated by the declaration of appropriation, in accordance with Article 7474, Texas Civil Statutes; failure to begin the works authorized by the permit and to prosecute the same diligently and continuously to completion within the authorized time, in accordance with Article 7519, Texas Civil Statutes; and failure to apply all or a part of the water to an authorized beneficial use for a period of 10 consecutive years prior to the date of cancellation proceedings herein in accordance with Article 7519a, Texas Civil Statutes. At the above described hearing, at the above described time and place, and all interested parties may appear to be heard and to present evidence on any matter pertinent to the question at issue in said hearing. Such hearing will be continued from time to time and from place to place, if necessary, until a determination has been made relative to said certified filings and permits as the Board of Water Engineers may deem right, equitable and proper.
