Mrs. Forrest Foster, Service Committee chairman for Sterling County for 1960-61, announced the following service committee members have volunteered their services to render an effective program for Sterling County thus far: Mrs. Billy Ralph Bynum, Mrs. Joe Emery, Mrs. Joe Blank, Mrs. H. L. Hildebrand, Mrs. Stanley Horwood and Miss Ethel Foster.

The service committee's purpose is to alleviate the suffering, discomfort, financial distress and psychological outlook of the cancer patient, in every possible way. Wool Payments in Sterling County Now Completed

Wool growers of Sterling County have now received a total of \$174,171.79 in incentive payments earned during the 1959 marketing year, Edde Braswell of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office said today.

This completes the making of payments to the county's wool growers on wool and unshorn lambs marketed during the year from April 1, 1959, through March 31, 1960.

On shorn wool, the rate of payment was \$43.20 for each \$100 received for wool marketed. For unshorn lambs, the rate was 75 cents per hundredweight for the live weight of lambs sold.

The wool program, authorized by the National Wool Act, is continuing during the present marketing year, with a national incentive price of 62 cents a pound. The object is to increase the annual wool output of the United States to a total of 300 million pounds.

Brucellosis Meeting Here October 18

A general meeting regarding the brucellosis testing program will be held in the District courtroom in court house on Tuesday, October 18 at 8:00 p.m. Dr. J. B. Henderson of the State Animal Health Commission will be present at the meeting to explain the program which is in progress at the present time. Dr. Henderson is working with the program and will be able to answer all questions regarding the provisions of the program.

The brucellosis eradication program is aimed at wiping out brucellosis in this state. Twenty-three states have already completed programs of a similar type and are classified as Modified-Certified free areas. When a county has achieved the Modified-Certified rating, cattle can be shipped to other counties or states without having to be tested before securing a permit to ship.

Robert Foster Named To Hospital Board

Robert Foster was appointed as a member of the Sterling County Hospital board at the Commissioners Court meeting Monday of this week. Robert replaces Rufus W. Foster, who served as a member from the beginning until his death recently.

Additional Work Might Increase Your Social Security
"Social Security benefits can be increased in some cases by additional work after a person first applies for benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the San Angelo social security office announced today. "But certain requirements must be met before the benefit amount can be refigured."

If a person continues working during the year he first files for social security, he may request that his benefit amount be refigured to include the total earning for that year. There is no definite amount he must earn in the year, but it must increase the average earnings figured at the time of filing.

Another type of recomputation has a definite earnings requirement—earnings must exceed \$1200 in a calendar year after the year the person first filed for benefits. Even though the earnings exceed \$1200, the benefit cannot be increased unless the work since filing would raise his average earnings.

Ellington emphasizes that it is better to check with your social security office and be sure, rather than to guess whether work after retirement will increase your benefit amount. Write your local office and include the amounts of your earnings in each year beginning with the year of filing up to the present, as accurately as possible and the effect on your present check can then be determined.

Widows Get Full Social Security Benefits at Age 62, Says Ellington

"Widows should apply for social security benefits as soon as they are 62", Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo District Office advises. "It would be even better if they applied a month or two before they are 62. Of course no one should delay, but widows in particular should be careful to apply for benefits promptly."

A woman's benefit based on her own account, or on the account of a living husband is reduced if she applies before age 65, but a widow's benefit is different. Widows' benefits are not reduced and the full amount is paid at age 62.

"So, if you are a widow", Ellington explained, "And we once paid you a lump-sum or monthly benefits, you should apply again when you are 62. In fact, you can speed your first check by applying a month or so before."

There will be some new practices added to the Glasscock County ACP handbook for the 1961 program. Practices added are aerial spraying of mesquite, basal spraying of mesquite or use of oil, underground pipelines for irrigation and water storage facilities for livestock water. These practices will be available after January 1, 1961.

The Great Plains Conservation Program has been a boost to many ranchers in Tom Green, Sterling and Glasscock Counties. The long range program gives cost share assistance on the more serious problems. Most point out that it is speeding up improvements on their places. Maximum cost share assistance is \$25,000.00 to date we have 17 contracts covering 111,514 acres with an obligated cost share assistance of \$193,808.00. Social Security Should Be Paid on Household Workers

Many housewives in this area may be depriving their household workers of social security protection according to a joint statement issued by S. Baker Mallett, Administrative Officer of the San Angelo Internal Revenue office and Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the Social Security district office.

"Workers' earnings are credited to their social security account from reports of their employers, and most of the employees," Mr. Mallett said, "faithfully report these earnings year after year." Some household employers who only recently hired household help may not realize their responsibility, and their employees, in particular, should make sure they are protected. The next quarterly report is due by July 31.

"Postcard forms for checking you own account with social security are available at all social security offices and should be used as least every three years by all workers, added Ellington.

If statements returned by social security show that your earnings are not posted to your record, steps will be taken to correct the omission and make sure that your employers report promptly and properly.

"Most people need many years of social security credit to qualify for benefits," Ellington said, adding, "It's your social security; make sure you are protected."
