Cecilia McDonald has been chosen as the Gold Star Award winner in 4-H Club work in Sterling County for 1960. This is the highest award given on the county level and can be won only after meeting certain requirements.

The Gold Star Award, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is given in recognition of outstanding achievement, leadership, and contribution to the county 4-H program.

To win the Gold Star, a club member must have been 13 years old on January 1 of the year the award is won. Must have completed at least three years of club work. Must be active in club work when the award is won, and can win the award only one time.

Cecilia has fed fat lambs for five years as her main club activity. She has been a member of various judging teams; in 1957 she was a member of the first place district junior grass identification team. In 1959 she was a member of the second place district junior range judging team. She has served the club as reporter and is currently serving her third term as secretary having held that office in 1957 and 1958.

Cecilia will be one of the district honorees at the Gold Star luncheon to be held at the San Angelo Country Club on December 14. This luncheon, sponsored by the West Texas Utilities Company will bring together the Gold Star Award honorees from 22 counties in District 7. Each honoree will be accompanied by one of their parents and their county extension agents. Cecilia will be accompanied by her father, L. C. McDonald.

Reynolds Lee Foster, co-chairman of the District 7 4-H Council, will be one of the masters of ceremonies at the Gold Star luncheon at the San Angelo Country Club on December 14. Lee and Jerrilyn Lohn of McCullough County, the other council co-chairman, will split the duties.

Reynolds Foster, Lee's father, will also be a guest at the luncheon.

All those in favor of or in opposition to the designation of this County as a Type II Brucellosis Control Area are invited to attend. If no opposition is presented, Sterling County will be designated as a Type II Control Area effective February 24, 1961.

See Tree Shredding DEMONSTRATION OF BRUSH CONTROL ON REED RANCH

A brush control demonstration on the W.N. & L.R. Reed Ranch on Highway 87 next Monday and Tuesday, Nov. 21-22 will show some new methods in mesquite control. Equipment to be used will include a shredder and crawler tractor.

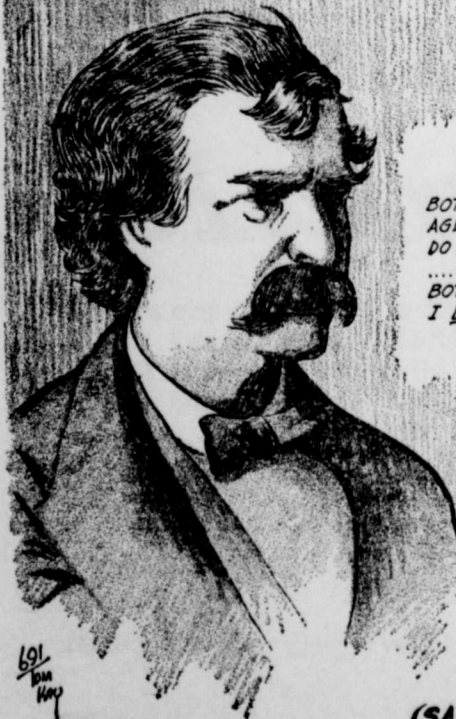
W.N. & L.R. Reed are furnishing the location for the demonstration while Griffin Truck and Tractor Company of Colorado City is furnishing the equipment. It will be in operation on the Reed ranch along Highway 87 about 18 miles west of town; they will be in the vicinity of the cattle guard on the north side of the highway. This is the entrance to the ranch headquarters where L. C. McDonald lives.

The shredder cuts and shreds trees up to five inches in diameter. Pulled by a crawler type tractor, it can travel over any country. Some of the mesquite stumps will be sprayed with 2,4,5-T to determine if this will increase the percent killed. A record will be kept to determine exact cost of the operation.

Mr. Griffin will have his equipment in operation from 8:30 to 5:30 p.m. Monday and Tuesday. He will be available to answer any questions that you may have. Everyone is invited to come out and see this demonstration.

Check . . . Mate,
if you are Buying Furniture



Of all the commodities on the American Market, furniture is one of the most difficult to buy with any degree of certainty. We look at a chair, we sit in it, we decide that we like the fabric with which it is upholstered, and we buy it. But do we really know what we are buying? What is under the cover? We are attracted to the basic styling of a wood cabinet. It is the right size and contains the required amount of storage space. But again, what do we know about the wood, the finish, or the construction? Buying a "Brand Name" can be a guide, but this method should not always be used as a hard and fast rule.

The important factor in buying furniture is not always the number of dollars spent, but rather the value received for the dollars spent. A combination of three elements establishes the quality of the piece of furniture — design, craftsmanship, and materials used. If any of these elements is missing, the value of the piece is diminished.

Selection of design is a matter of personal preference, but ask yourself this question, "Do I like to look at the piece of furniture, and why? Does it fit into the over-all decorative scheme which I have established?" If it passes this test, then delve into the construction of the piece.

Wood furniture (commonly referred to in the trade as case goods) should be constructed in such a manner that over a period of time the basic frame does not warp, the drawers continue to open and close, regardless of temperature or humidity, and any doors, whether hinged or sliding, continue to function. Check to see that drawer openings have center drawer guides (a small rail extending from the front to the back of the case which keeps the drawers in perfect line). Check the sides of the

drawers to see that they are dove-tailed together, and not merely glued or nailed. The sides of the case should be glued and doweled. Scrutinize the interior of the case to see that all supporting members are held in place with screws. These manufacturing methods are used in any wood furniture, regardless of price, which has any degree of quality.

Make certain of the materials used in the furniture which you are selecting. There is no substitute for the fine hardwoods and fine hardwood veneers in the furniture industry. Frames for upholstered furniture should be made of hard kiln-dried lumber, eliminating warpage and pulling apart, which necessitates expensive repair. Select upholstering fabrics for weave, not weight—or a combination of both. Finished wood pieces should have solid wood structural members, and either solid or fine wood veneer surfaces. Determine whether you are buying a fine cabinet wood, or whether you are buying another material which is finished to resemble what is represented to you. Remember that fine hardwoods have been designed by Nature to withstand the test of time. They give a natural beauty through the years, and can always be refinished at nominal cost, when necessary.

Buy the best quality that you can afford, but learn to look for the trademarks of quality. This is where value received—and not dollars spent—becomes important.

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Seasoning For Your Salads

Avocado Sea Food Salad

Social Security Should Be Paid on Household Workers

Many housewives in this area may be depriving their household workers of social security protection according to a joint statement issued by S. Baker Mallett, Administrative Officer of the San Angelo Internal Revenue office and Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the Social Security district office.

"Workers' earnings are credited to their social security account from reports of their employers, and most of the employers," Mr. Mallett said, "faithfully report these earnings year after year." Some household employers who only recently hired household help may not realize their responsibility, and their employees, in particular, should make sure they are protected. The next quarterly report is due by July 31.

"Postcard forms for checking your own account with social security are available at all social security offices and should be used as least every three years by all workers, added Ellington.

If statements returned by social security show that your earnings are not posted to your record, steps will be taken to correct the omission and make sure that your employers report promptly and properly.

"Most people need many years of social security credit to qualify for benefits," Ellington said, adding, "It's your social security; make sure you are protected."

Widows Get Full Social Security Benefits at Age 62, Says Ellington

"Widows should apply for social security benefits as soon as they are 62," Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo District Office advises. "It would be even better if they applied a month or two before they are 62. Of course no one should delay, but widows in particular should be careful to apply for benefits promptly."

A woman's benefit based on her own account, or on the account of a living husband is reduced if she applies before age 65, but a widow's benefit is different. Widows' benefits are not reduced and the full amount is paid at age 62.

"So, if you are a widow," Ellington explained, "and we once paid you a lump-sum or monthly benefits, you should apply again when you are 62. In fact, you can speed your first check by applying a month or so before."
