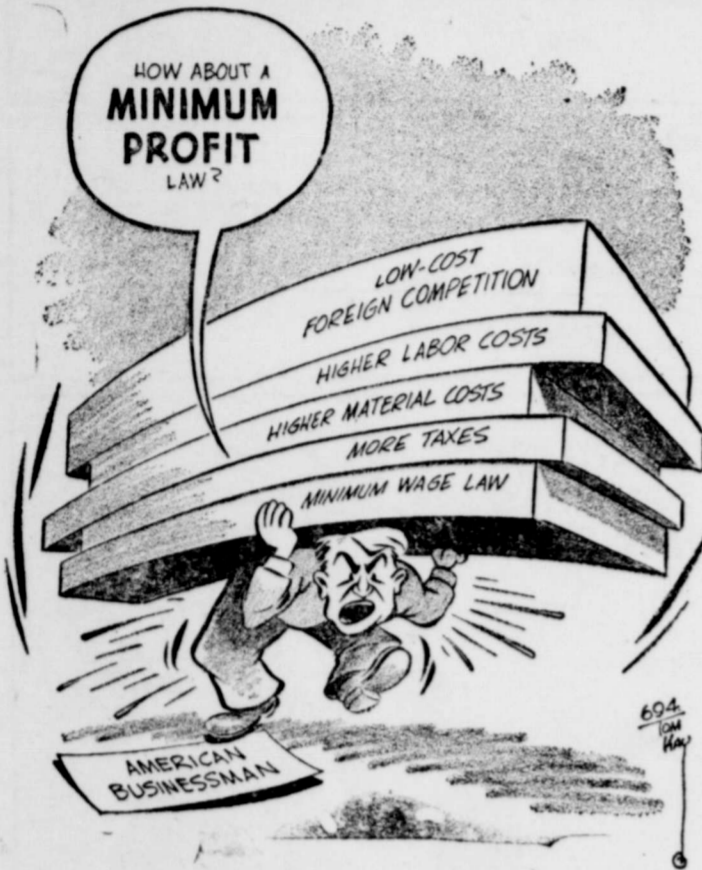

## District Court Trial Here Monday

For the Blackwell boys Mike Kinard got 10 points and Wayne King 5.

The trial of Mike Martinez Jr. is scheduled to begin trial here in District Court Monday morning. He was indicted by the grand jury here last month for the pistol slaying of Taylor Garrett in 1957. Martinez was a minor at that time and could not be tried for a felony. He was sentenced to the boys school at Gatesville when he was 21, but was released fairly soon after he got there.

Riley Edward Gunn, who received a life sentence here last year for the murder of Cecil Edward Grady, had his sentence affirmed by the Court of Criminal Appeals on Wednesday of this week.

Grady was murdered on the oil field road on the Glass ranch between here and Garden City. Gunn's attorney, Royal Hart of San Angelo, said he did not know whether he would file a higher appeal; that he would have to confer with Gunn first.

The annual meeting of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association will be held in San Angelo next week. Headquarters for the meeting is the Cactus Hotel.

On Wednesday morning, December 7, 4-H Club winners in programs sponsored by the Association will appear on the program. They will give a report to the Association on their activities as a result of the programs in which they were winners.

David Durham will give a report on what he learned at Range Camp this summer which he attended on the scholarship awarded him as a state winner in the Range Management program which the TSGRA sponsors. He will show some slide pictures made at the camp as well as tell of some of his experiences. Billy Troy Williams, another state winner in the range program will also tell of some of his experiences.

Also on Wednesday morning, Clayton Stewart will receive his certificate of award by the president of the association, L. M. Stephens. Clayton will attend range camp next year on the scholarship awarded by the TSGRA. He will also receive an engraved belt buckle as district winner in the program.

The special pecan report released by the Agricultural Marketing Service of the USDA places the Texas pecan crop at 37 million pounds. This is 16 percent above last

year's crop but is about average for the state. Of the 37 million pounds, 31.4 million pounds are native and 5.6 million improved varieties.

The national pecan crop is set forecast at 179.2 million million pounds, which is 25 percent above last year's crop and 19 percent above the ten year average. Only the state of Georgia produces more pecans than Texas. Their estimated production is 44 million pounds. However the majority of their pecans, 33 million pounds are improved varieties.

The premium list for the San Angelo Livestock Show has just been received. Several new classes have been added to the show this year.

New shows are the Junior Angura Goat Show, Junior Angus heifer show, a Quarter Horse show and Cutting Contest, and a Junior Grass Judging Contest. An adult Suffolk show has also been added.

According to the premium list of judges for the 1961 show will be the same as they were in 1960. Fat lamb judge will be Swede Hanson; Jr. Rambouillet judge will be Lewis Bridges; range ewe lamb judge will be Marion Badger, before shearing, Bull Crawford and Hank Davis, wool and E. G. Cauble, out of the wool.

The premium list for the Abilene show has also been received. There are no changes in the Abilene show from last year.

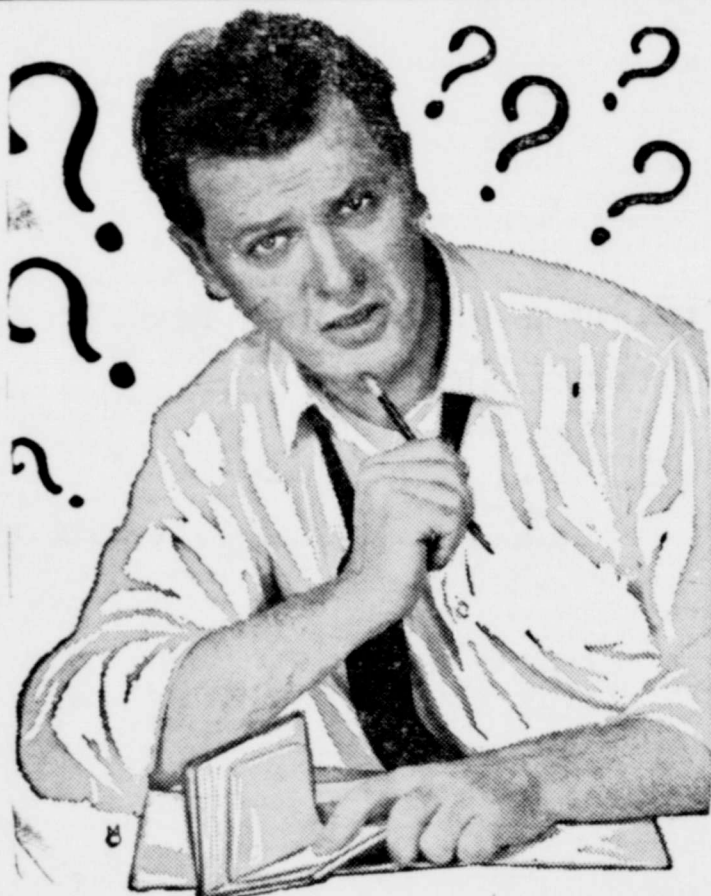

### Social Security Should Be Paid on Household Workers

Many housewives in this area may be depriving their household workers of social security protection according to a joint statement issued by S. Baker Mallett, Administrative Officer of the San Angelo Internal Revenue office and Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the Social Security district office.

"Workers' earnings are credited to their social security account from reports of their employers, and most of the employers," Mr. Mallett said, "faithfully report these earnings year after year." Some household employers who only recently hired household help may not realize their responsibility, and their employees, in particular, should make sure they are protected. The next quarterly report is due by July 31.

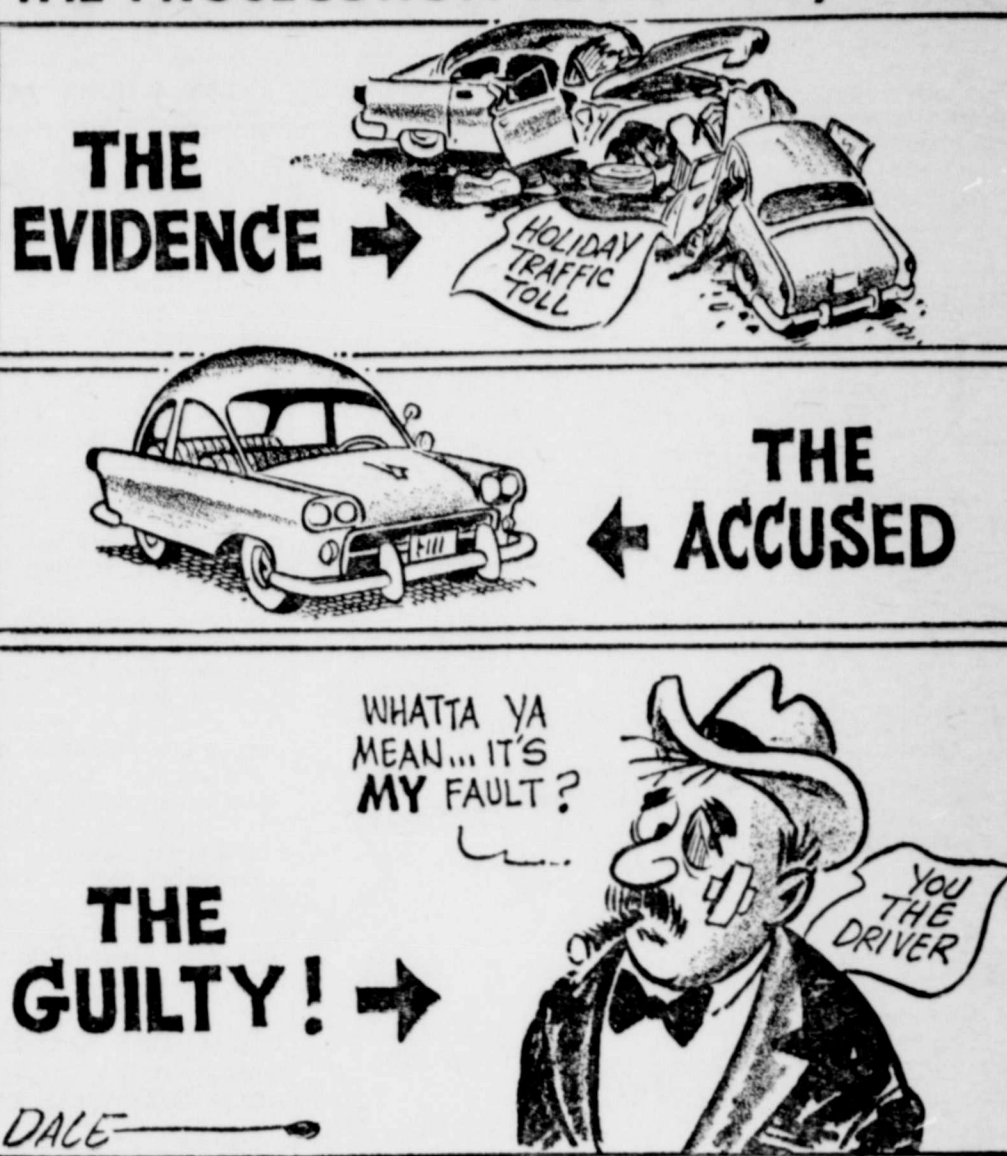
"Postcard forms for checking your own account with social security are available at all social security offices and should be used at least every three years by all workers," added Ellington.

If statements returned by social security show that your earnings are not posted to your record, steps will be taken to correct the omission and make sure that your employers report promptly and properly.

"Most people need many years of social security credit to qualify for benefits," Ellington said, adding, "It's your social security; make sure you are protected."

**4-H Pair Win Trip to Chicago**

Top state honors for 1960 have been bestowed upon two Texas 4-H'ers, for outstanding achievements in the frozen foods and agricultural programs. They will receive trips to the 39th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 27 through Dec. 1, where they will compete for \$400 scholarships.

Reba Payne, 16, of Mount Pleasant, has frozen almost 1,700 packages of foods, and estimates that she has saved \$750 during her four years with this project. She began by freezing various fruits, storing them in plastic containers, and soon expanded her project to include vegetables, poultry, meat and fish.

Yeast breads, pies, cakes, pecans, sandwiches, salads and creamed dishes were added to her freezer this year. In addition, Miss Payne experimented with the freezing of egg yolks, figs, grapes and the use of glass containers.

The 4-H frozen foods program is supported by the Whirlpool Corporation in cooperation with the Extension Service and the National 4-H Service Committee.

**Agricultural Census of Sterling County**

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, conducted in Sterling County last fall, counted 75 farms, according to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. Total land in farms was 717,331 acres. The average size of farm was 9,564.4 acres. The average value of farms (land and buildings) in the county was \$207,506.

Of the county's farm operators, 25 owned their farms, 34 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 13 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm operators in the county was 53.4 years. There were 21 farm operators 65 or more years of age.

Of the 75 farms in the county, 55 were commercial farms.

Detailed statistics on crops, livestock, equipment, etc., are presented in the preliminary report, with comparable statistics for 1954. Copies of the county report may be ob-

tained for 10 cents each from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C.

**Widows Get Full Social Security Benefits at Age 62, Says Ellington**

"Widows should apply for social security benefits as soon as they are 62", Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo District Office advises. "It would be even better if they applied a month or two before they are 62. Of course no one should delay, but widows in particular should be careful to apply for benefits promptly."

A woman's benefit based on her own account, or on the account of a living husband is reduced if she applies before age 65, but a widow's benefit is different. Widows' benefits are not reduced and the full amount is paid at age 62.

"So, if you are a widow", Ellington explained, "And we once paid you a lump-sum or monthly benefits, you should apply again when you are 62. In fact, you can speed your first check by applying a month or so before."
