AROUND THE COUNTY

The 28th Annual San Angelo Fat Stock Show gets underway next Wednesday, March 8. Thirteen Sterling County 4-H Club members are exhibiting 21 finewool lambs, 7 crossbred lambs, 5 registered Rambouillet and 12 commercial ewes.

Barbara Clark, Tommy Foster, Reynolds Lee Foster, David Foster, Jeanie McDonald, Cecilia McDonald, James Morgan, Rosanne Foster, Jack Clark and Diana Cole all have two finewool lambs each entered; Mitsy Davis has one finewool lamb entered along with two crossbred lambs. Others exhibiting one crossbred lamb each are Mike Payne, Cecilia McDonald, Jeanie McDonald, David Foster and Reynolds Lee Foster. Betty Jo Barrett is showing two Rambouillet rams and 3 ewes in the Junior Rambouillet show. Reynolds Lee, Tommy Foster, Barbara Clark, and Betty Jo each have one group of three range ewe lambs.

Calendar for the San Angelo show goes like this: weighing, sifting, classifying of fat stock starts at 8:00 on Wednesday morning; adult Delaine, Rambouillet and Suffolk breeders show at 1:00 Wednesday afternoon. A quarter horse show is also scheduled for Wednesday morning.

Thursday morning, cutting horses, fat lambs and junior poultry show. Starting time for fat lamb show is 8:30. That afternoon, Junior Rambouillet and Junior Hereford show at 1:00; Angus cattle at 1:30 and adult Hereford show at 3:00. Range ewes show at 8:30 Friday morning, steers at 10:00, and Junior Rambouillet, Junior Delaines and Junior Angora goats at 1:00.

Saturday at 8:00 livestock judging teams and grass identification teams start their contest. Auction sale of stock begins at 10:00.

The third time was the charm for the 4-H Club awards barbecue. Postponed previously on January 28 and February 6 because of heavy snow, Saturday night turned out to be the time. One hundred twenty club members, parents and guests turned out for the even in the community center. Barbecued lamb was served along with the trimmings supplied by club mothers. The lamb was served to the club members in cooperation with the American Sheep Producers Council's lamb promotion program for youth groups. The Council pays up to 50c per serving where it receives a bill for the lamb purchased and pictures of the event.

ald, Clayton Stewart, Mitsy Davis and Reynolds Lee Foster; seventh year winners included David Durham and LeRuth Reed.

Reynolds Lee also received a nice desk set as the outstanding Sterling County 4-H Club conservationist during 1960. The award was made by the North Concho River Soil Conservation District and presented by Neal J. Reed, one of the district supervisors.

The week of March 4-11 has been designated as National 2-H Club Week in the nation and in Texas. President Kennedy designated the national observance while Governor Daniel signed the state proclamation.

Since the 4-H Club movement started in the United States in 1914 it has spread to 52 foreign countries. The movement, which makes it the oldest of the farm youth groups, started in Jack County, Texas as a corn club for boys. The girls first club was a tomato canning club. From that beginning it has grown until now there are 100,000 members in Texas alone.

The club members and their parents are responsible for the success of 4-H Club work in the rest of the world just as they are the backbone of the work in Sterling County. They are to be congratulated on their achievements.

Due to the San Angelo Stock Show, no formal observance of the week can be made in Sterling County.

Brucellosis Testing To Start Next Week

Brucellosis testing is scheduled to begin in Sterling County on or about Tuesday, March 7, according to Dr. Roy G. Chaney of the Texas Animal Health Commission. Exact date could be changed by bad weather but the crew scheduled for Sterling County is presently working in Concho County and should finish there Friday of this week. The laboratory would be moved to Sterling City on Monday and testing of cattle started on Tuesday if present plans are not affected by the weather.

The testing is being done by the Commission as the result of the petition submitted on November 8. When completed the county will be designated a Modified-Certified Brucellosis free county if the rate of infection does not exceed 1 percent of the cattle or 5 percent of the herds in the county.

To qualify, all registered beef cattle and all milk cows must be tested. In commercial beef herds, herds of 50 head or less, all cattle are tested; herds of 50 to 250 head, at least 50 must be tested; over 250 at least 20 percent must be tested. In all cases, regardless of the size of the herd, the commission will test all cattle if the owner desires and also vaccinate heifers less than 12 months old if the owner desires.

The test is done by taking a sample of blood from each animal. The blood is then taken to the mobile laboratory which will be set up in Sterling City. Ranchers will know the results of their herds test the next morning after testing.

Seven technicians have been assigned to Sterling County. These men will work the various areas of the county at the same time. The plan now is for one technician to work each of the major roads in the county.

Roads so designated and the line-up man on each road who will contact the ranchers about two days previous to their time are as follows: San Angelo Road—Bill Humble, Robert Lee Road—C. J. Copeland; Colorado City Road—Jim Bob Clark; Big Spring Road—Chesley McDonald; Garden City Road—Donald McEntire; Big Lake Road—Gene Alley; Barnhart Road—Merton Ferguson.

These men will be contacting the ranchers in their area in a few days and giving them a tentative date for testing crews to be at their ranch. Then, when the crews get started, they will be able to contact each rancher and give them a more definite date.

The House Un-American Activities Committee, which has for four years been a thorn in the side of Communists and subversives in this country, is sure to get approval of requests for funds to carry out its functions during the next year.

Unfortunately, there has recently been quite an upsurge of criticism of the committee, most of traceable either to the Comies or those liberals who, wittingly or unwittingly, have been taken in by Communist propaganda.

Of particular concern is the ravings from certain University campuses. Student groups at such places as the University of Southern California, Harvard, the University of Nebraska and others have rallied to the support of the Committee critics.

But when hearings were held before the House Administration Committee that recommends funds for the committee, only two appeared to raise questions about the Un-American Activities committee.

After all the phony arguments and misrepresentations of the liberals are heard, the American people can be assured that the overwhelming majority of the Members of the House of Representatives will continue to give full support to the Committee.

FROZE FER MEAT

It started at a high school picnic when we were teasing the girls with a big bullsnake. One of the girls screamed: "Why did you catch that horrid thing?" and Simp hollered back: "We're gonna eat it!"

Simp only said that for effect, but there was no turning back. We were committed. So we skinned the snake, cut it up, and spitted it on a stick to roast beside the marshmallows. Reveling in the girlish shrieks, we ate it.

It wasn't bad. Roast bullsnake, as I recall, gets bigger with the chewing and tastes something like a setting hen that's drowned in horse trough. But it isn't bad eating when you're sixteen, hungry, and girls are watching you be brave.

For the next two years — more from wanting to be moutain men than from being hungry — we went on a binge of Injun cookery. If it walked, crawled, flew, swam or ran, we ate it. We chewed our way through a regiment of blackbirds, crows, robins, bugs, muskrats, skunks, groundhogs, bobcats, muskels, hawks and salamanders. Some of this eating was a little rank, but much of it was pretty good and we learned a lot.

To this day, walking in from a hungry fishing trip, I may catch large grasshoppers, deleg them, nip off the tips of the large thighs, and pull out the delicate slivers of meat. We never did learn to like freshwater clams, but maybe we weren't handling them right. Crawdads are delicious, but mean a lot more cleaning than eating.

One of our big surprises was skunk. Older skunks tend to be a bit beetley in flavor, but a young animal tastes a lot like prime 'possum which, in turn, is sort of like pork. A man can do worse than eating young skunk.

Same thing with muskrat,

beaver and groundhog. I still think the finest wild meat I've ever eaten was a young muskrat done to a turn over a slow hickory fire in a trapper's camp. It's sweet, delicate, tender, and goes mighty well after you've laid fifty drown sets in a November river.

Eating crow, blackbird, starling or hawk is just eating bird, and that's about all you can say for it. It's O.K. for a change, but it's nothing you'd get addicted to.

To capture the spirit of all this, we never put these critters into pies or stews. We took them straight, turned over a slow fire, for two reasons: 1) we owed at least that much to Jim Bridger, and 2) our mothers wouldn't allow the stuff in their kitchens. These experiments were so successful that we started calling each other "Ol' Hoss", and saying "Waugh! This chile is froze fer meat!" This chile is froze fer meat!

We were budding mountain men, ready for anything, and so it was that one day we tried eating fox. It was a big old dog fox trapped in mid-February with romance on his mind and a winter's hard hunting behind him. He smelt like a wet civet cat, and under the thick fur we could feel the bands and packs of winter-hardened muscle. He promised to be about as toothsome as a belt knife, but we took him home anyway and butchered him and fried him on the laundry stove in the basement.

I'm here to testify that foxes taste just like they smell.

That was the rankest, meanest, sorriest meat that ever soured a frying pan. But it accomplished what scolding mothers and shuddering girl friends could never do — it converted us from mountain men into normal, smalltown boys. We knew when we were licked. That old fox was stronger and tougher than the best of us.

Butterfly Waffles

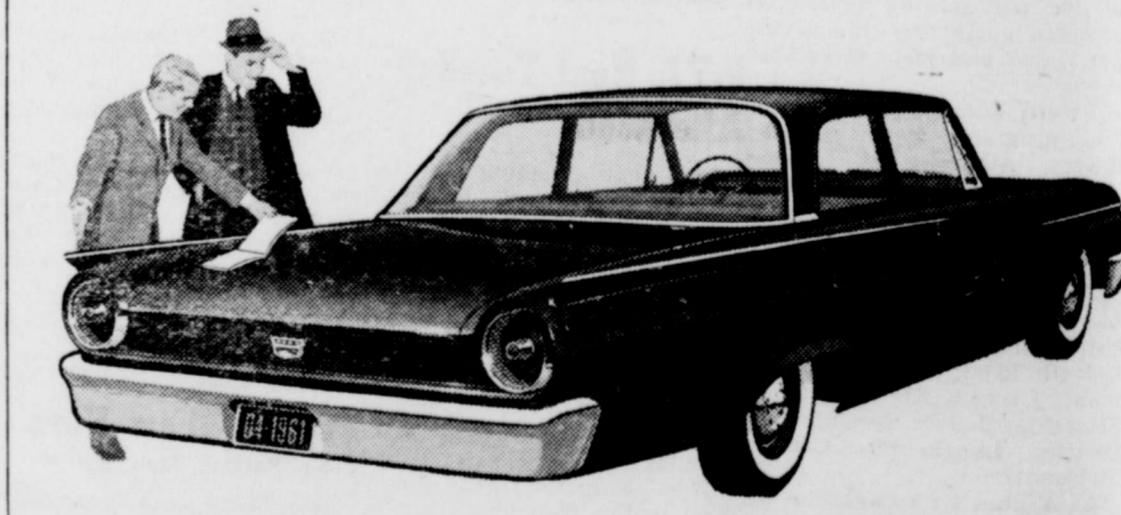

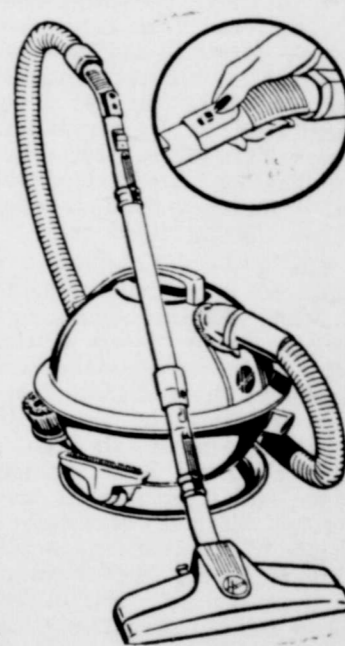

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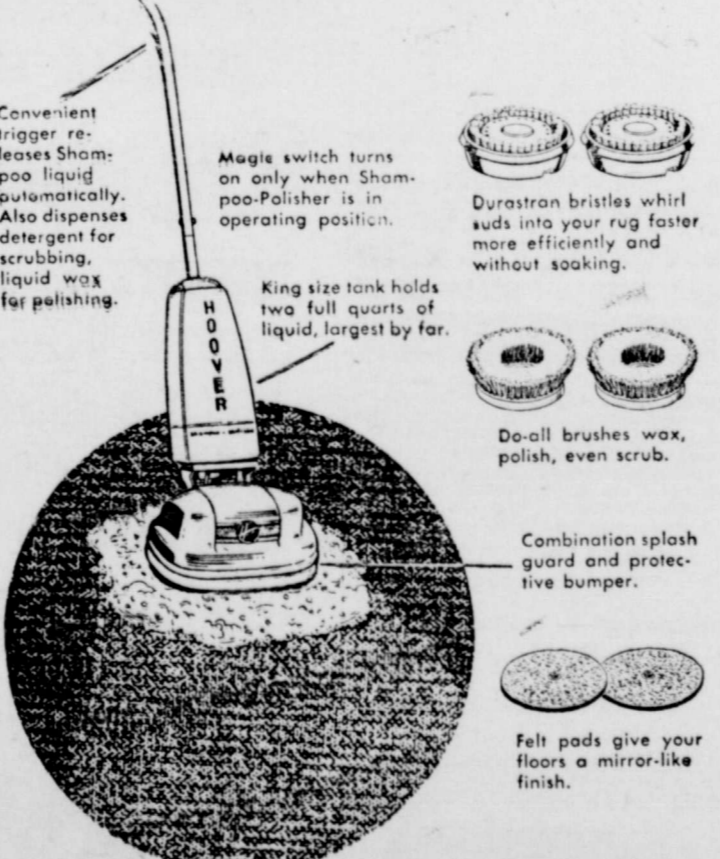

LAND BANK LOANS UP

Demand for the type of loans made by the Federal Land Bank of Houston is up 30% over the 1960 requests, according to Hal Weatherford, president of the bank. He said the demand, among other things, reflects an adjustment which farmers and ranchers are making in their operations by switching heavy short-term debts to long-term land loans. This gives them a better balanced debt load and more freedom in their operations, Weatherford said.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston has more than 237 million dollars of loans in force, which is an all-time high. It is one of twelve such banks in the nation and serves the State of Texas. Its loans are made through 73 Federal Land Bank Associations, and it secures its loans funds through the sale of bonds to the investing public.
