Noratadata Club Has Year-End Meeting

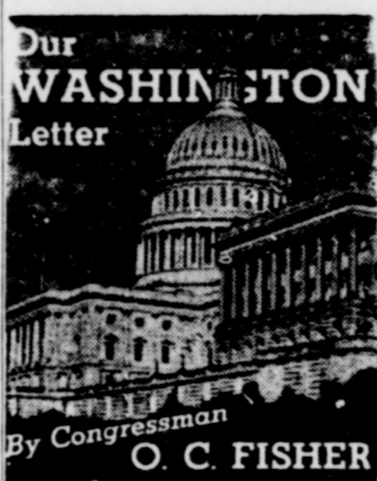

What prompted the Freedom Riders mission into the South? Many speculations are heard. One theory which has substantial backing is that it was Communist-inspired, timed to coincide with the Kennedy-Kruschchev meeting in Vienna which will take place soon. If so, the Reds would hope that Kennedy's prestige would be downgraded because of world coverage of the Alabama riots, and that this would give the Russian a psychological advantage. The Commies are not in the habit of overlooking any bets.

Another theory is that the NAACP, through its Congress of Racial Equality, which sponsored the trips, felt that by provoking a riot in the South it would assist in raising more funds and enlisting more members.

In any event, the bus trips, which were widely publicized as a challenge to Southern laws and customs, have aroused much interest in the need for enactment of laws to better cope with those who conspire together for the purpose of causing criminal acts, including riots. Bills have now been introduced to make it a Federal offense for one or more persons to travel across state lines with their mission designed or reasonably calculated to cause riots or the violation of existing laws.

This proposal is sure to run into stubborn opposition from NAACP and also from certain radical labor leaders who don't want interference in the movement of pickets or goon squads across state lines, even though such movement might be designed or reasonably calculated to provoke breaches of the peace or other criminal acts.

It is felt by many that the riots, which were most deplorable, were actually in accordance with the hopes and expectations of the so-called Freedom Riders. It is believed that if nothing had happened (which would have been the most effective way for Southerners to have handled the problem) the trips would have fallen flat.

Quite a hassle has developed over the proposed ransom of the 1200 Cuban prisoners Castro's boastful offer to release the invading captives upon delivery of 500 tractors, was accepted by Americans headed by Mrs. Roosevelt. Walter Reuther and Dr. Milton Eisenhower. They started

Sterling County voters ran counter to the state and favored incumbent Wm. A. Blakley in the special U. S. Senate race last Saturday.

Few voters turned out but Blakley got 125 votes to Republican John Tower's 61.

The state wide race gave the Wichita educator a slim margin over Blakley, in fact less than 1%, but it does put a Republican Senator in the statehouse from Texas.

Most observers had given Tower a chance to win, and sure enough he did—albeit it was with fewer votes than he lost to Johnson last fall—by half.

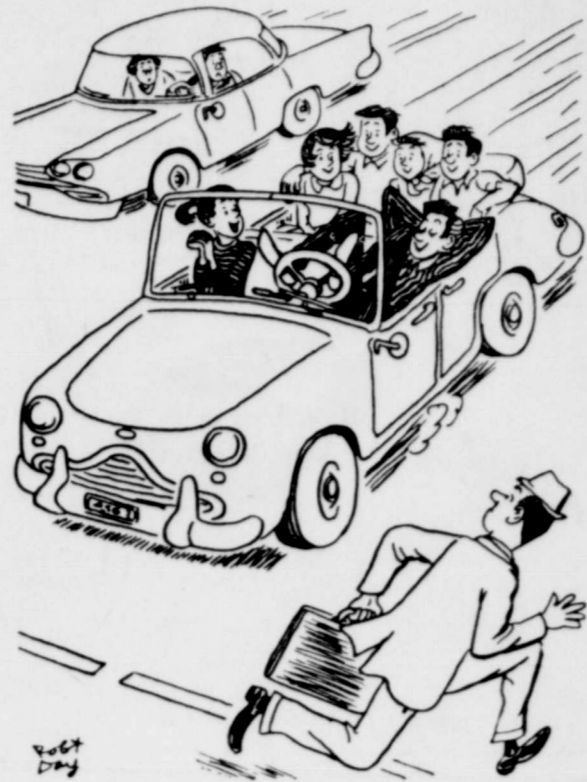

Several thousand 4-H Club boys and girls, adult leaders, and agents, will gather at College Station next week for the annual 4-H Club Round-up. This event held on the campus of A&M College is the big event of the year for many 4-H Club members. They will participate in 25 different contests to determine state winners. Previously, each team participating won first or second place in district contests and earned the right to participate in the state contests.

Four Sterling County 4-H Club boys will participate in the state range judging contest. They won the district 7 contest in April. Team members are Reynolds Lee Foster, David Durham, James Morgan and Tommy Foster. Reynolds Lee is nursing a broken wrist and Tommy an injured knee but both are planning on going.

The team will Sterling City at 6:00 a.m. Tuesday morning and return home Thursday afternoon.

A barbecue will be given by the Texas 4-H Recognition Committee Tuesday night to honor club members. On Wednesday night the Recognition Committee is sponsoring entertainment for the club members. During the day Wednesday, club members will participate in a variety of activities on the campus. The Electrical Engineering department will present a program on Electricity; the Biology department will present the SCIENCE OF LIFE; and the School of Veterinary Medicine will televise a veterinary operation on closed-circuit television.

Cancer Unit Met Monday Night

The Sterling County Cancer Unit met Monday night in the community center. This was a regular meeting of the group.

E. D. "Doug" Robinson, of the Spur Experiment Station, spent Tuesday in the county looking over the mesquite in terms of aerial spraying. Doug has been working at Spur for several years, first with Cecil Meador and now heading the work since Cecil has gone to work for a commercial concern.

Doug, Eddie Braswell, and I looked over mesquite at half a dozen different locations. The places were N.H. and Neal J. Reed, Bill J. Cole, Tommy Foster, Gene Alley, Reynolds Foster and Claude Collins estate.

Doug was of the opinion that spraying would not be

very effective at any of the locations this year. The rain two weeks ago caused the plants to put forth young, tender leaves which would burn when sprayed and drop off. If spraying was held up until the new leaves were ready, the old foliage now on the tree would be hardened and spraying would be ineffective. If disturbed by spraying which was ineffective the trees would be harder to kill in later years. Also, on every one of the locations a variety of bugs and worms were beginning to defoliate the trees. They are working on the tender foliage now but as that plays out, they will move to the older leaves. Here again spraying would not work since the tree must have good foliage since the leaves take up the herbicide and translocate it to the roots where it kills. Also, some of the trees are not leafed out very well and have a sparse amount of foliage. In one or two locations in lowlands, a late freeze burned the early growth and there is freeze line and foliage is sparse.

Had the rain come in late April or the first few days of May, it might have been a different story, according to Robinson. He advised to hold off spraying this year since the root kill prospects were bad. The kill would be very low and too costly and cause dissatisfaction.

When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted, will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If, upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. All devisions concerning the payment of such reward and the conditions of payment will be made by the Board of Directors of the Association.

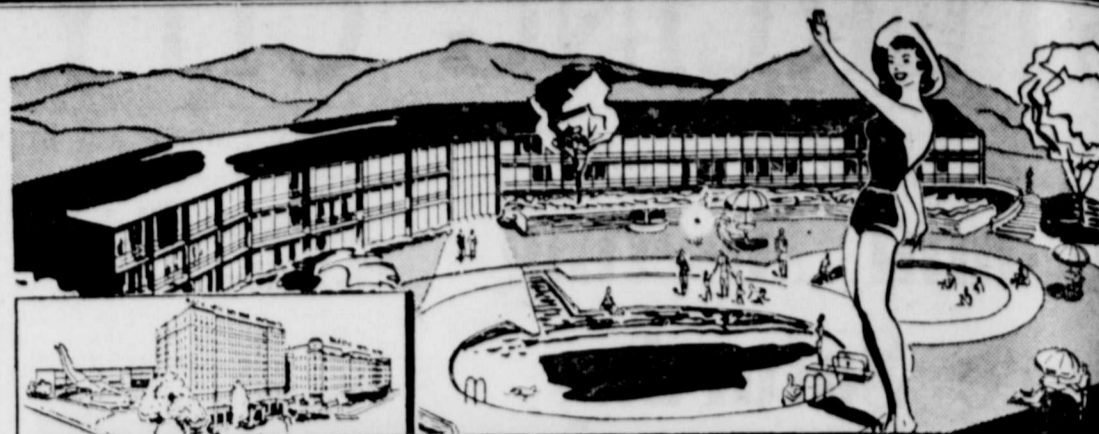

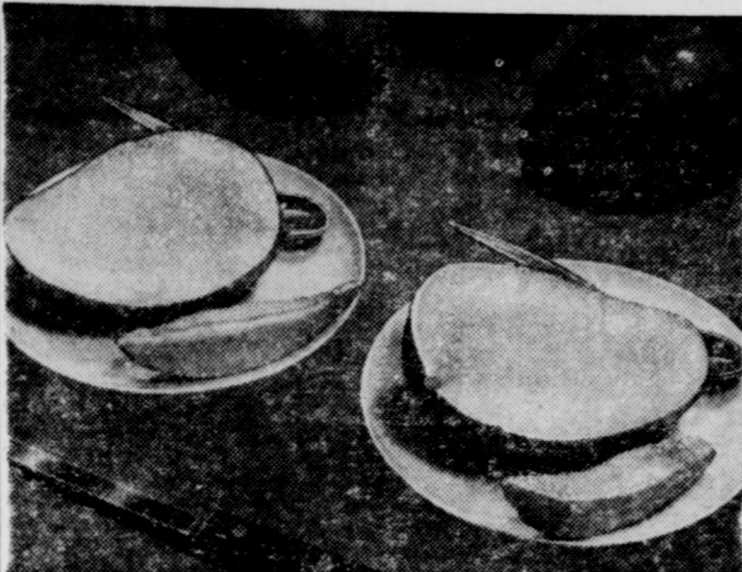

KING OF TROPICAL FRUITS

The mango is known as the King of Tropical Fruits with ex-
 cellent reason. Its rich mellow flavor, its magnificent aroma, its
 juicy lush texture all contribute toward establishing its regal rank.
 Native to the Oriental tropics, the mango is inextricably entwined
 with the folklore, religion and history of its countries and peoples.
 Mangos were introduced to the tropics of the western world in
 mid-17th century and today the mango is a major foodstuff of the
 people wherever it grows. It is in south Florida that the mango
 reaches its ultimate in quality. This is the only area of the con-
 tinental United States where the mango flourishes and is the only
 place in the world where horticultural upgrading has been exten-
 sively pursued.

From late May through September mangos are shipped from
 south Florida to specialty stores and food markets throughout the
 United States. Demand is such that many mango fanciers have
 standing orders for yearly shipments for this is one way of assur-
 ing a summer tropical treat even during light crop years.

The mango truly deserves the enthusiasm its devotees lavish
 upon it. The flavor of the rich yellow-orange flesh is a combination
 of apricots, pineapple, peaches, bananas and even fresh coconut in
 some varieties plus something all its own. It is ambrosia all by
 itself.

Because there are some dozen
 improved varieties shipped from
 Florida, there is variety in color,
 size and shape but the following
 rules will guide the novice:

1. Select fruit with perfectly
 smooth skin as shriveling or
 wrinkling may indicate fruit
 picked too soon.
2. Fruit will ripen when left
 out just as tomatoes so it is not
 necessary to avoid those show-
 ing green.
3. When the fruit is ready to
 eat all the green will have dis-
 appeared on almost all varieties
 and the flesh should yield gently
 to pressure in about the same
 degree as a ripe peach.
4. Ripe fruit will also be highly
 aromatic, giving off a distinct
 fragrance.
5. Some varieties develop
 black freckles toward the stem

end which is often mistaken for
 a sign of ripening as in the
 banana. This is a false idea. The
 freckles indicate a disorder that
 is usually only skin deep and
 ordinarily does not affect the
 flesh unless it is quite extensive.

6. When the mango is deter-
 mined to have reached eating
 ripeness, chill as this improves
 the flavor.

7. Do not cut or peel until just
 before serving as the delicious
 fragrance is best conserved in
 the whole fruit. Do not eat the
 peeling or the single flat seed.

8. Serve cut in half like a
 cantaloupe to be eaten out of the
 shell or in slices or chunks alone
 or in combination with other
 fresh fruits or ice cream.

If you follow all these rules
 there will be many happy mango
 seasons ahead.

Know the Danger Signals

My cancer was detected because I had an irritating pain in the
 chest. I suspected it might be heart trouble.

 the left chest showed up on the x-ray films. It

 would have spread more. So I tell those who ask
 advice, "Always be alert to Cancer's Seven
 Danger Signals."

The American Cancer Society has designated
 seven of these signals for the most common
 forms of cancer. They are: unusual bleeding or
 discharge; a lump or thickening in the breast
 or elsewhere; a sore that does not heal; change
 in bowel or bladder habits; hoarseness or
 cough; indigestion or difficulty in swallowing;
 change in a wart or mole.

If you have one of these signals for more
 than two weeks, go to your doctor at once. I
 am thankful that I went to my doctor in a hurry.
