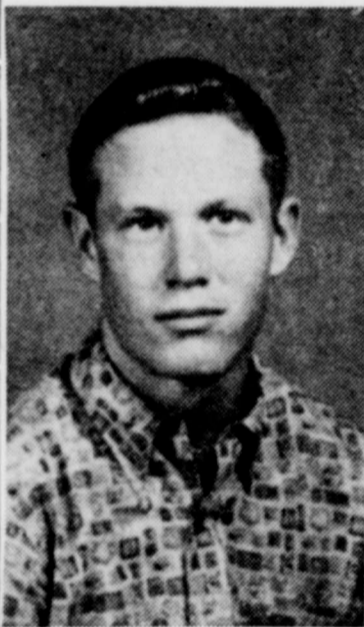

## Named Candidate for State FFA President

Don McDonald, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. McDonald of Sterling City, was elected as the Area II candidate to vie for the State FFA President at the Texas Association, Future Farmers of America at the state convention in Dallas July 19-21.

One state officer candidate is elected from each of the ten vocational agricultural areas in Texas. One of the ten will be elected at the state convention to serve as the 1961-62 State FFA President. The other nine boys will become state vice-presidents.

Don was elected from a field of four candidates at the Area II convention held in San Angelo June 1 and 2. Don has been president of the Sterling City chapter for the past two years. He was Concho district president in 1958-59 and 1959-60; he served as Area II vice-president in 1959-60 and Area II president in 1960-61.

Herbert Mills, a Sterling County native, served as the State FFA president in 1934-35. And everyone would like to see it happen again.

C. L. King, Jr. attended the Area II convention in San Angelo as the official voting delegate from the Sterling Chapter. In business at the convention, Johnny Northcutt of Midlan, was elected to succeed Don McDonald as Area II president for 1961-62. Miss Shari Addison of Lamesa was elected Area II Sweetheart. She will attend the State Convention in Dallas and vie for the State FFA Sweetheart title.

Numerous other awards and recognitions were made at the convention, attended by about 260 boys from the 43 West Texas counties comprising the Area.

## Our WASHINGTON Letter



The Republican victory in Texas has provided a field day for the Monday morning quarterbacks, the crystal gazers and the commentators—both amateur and professional.

Democratic leaders, while blushing a bit, try to discount the partisan significance. They remind that the light vote did it for Tower—the drop from 2.2 million who voted in November to 900 thousand in May. And some say Bill Blakley was a bit too conservative to suit the liberals—liberals who are forever yakking about party loyalty.

AFL-CIO, for example, announced before the election: "There has been no state COPE recommendation in the Senate race—and there will be none."

On the other side, seasoned observers (whose views are shared by many Blakley supporters) view the Tower victory as an upsurge of conservatism, a Texas reaction to the New Frontier's budget-busting spending and welfare program.

"Just packing the Rules Committee in January lost enough Texas Democrats to turn the tide to Tower" on man commented. Another thought the Administration's minimum wage legislation soured enough Democrats to do the trick.

Even though Senator Blakley did not embrace these and other proposals that are believed to be generally unpopular in Texas, yet it was convenient for him to play the role of the scape goat.

In a lighter vein, a telegram received by Attorney General Bobby Kennedy from Texas said: "Tower and Republicans have captured Texas. Imperative you send 500 Marshals at once for rescue, or send 500 tractors for ransom."

Another one: "How to get scalped on the New Frontier" by Bill Blakley.

The self-styled Freedom Riders, sent into the South to stir up trouble on the eve of the Kennedy-Krushchev conference, was led by one James Douglas Peck. It has now been disclosed that Peck has a long

Several pamphlets on the new Peace Corps as set up recently by President Kennedy have been received in the office. Each county agent's office in Texas has copies of the fact book on this organization and information can be received from this office.

Peace Corps volunteers will function as teachers, community development workers, medical assistants, lab technicians, vocational teachers, librarians, social workers, construction foremen, or agricultural extension workers in the countries they are sent to help.

Any American citizen over 18 is eligible. There is no maximum age limit. Married couples as well as single men or women may apply.

In addition to the fact booklet, Peace Corps Volunteer questionnaires have been received. Your county agent will be glad to supply you with these papers also.

The 24th annual Sonora Wool and Mohair show will be held next week, June 14-15 in the wool house at Sonora. The First National 4-H Club wool judging contest will be held on June 15 also in Sonora. ## Survivors May Be Eligible For Social Security Payments

Social security benefits may now be paid to survivors of workers who died between March 31, 1938, and January 1, 1940, if the worker had at least a year and a half of social security work before he died, says Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the San Angelo Social Security Administration District Office.

Before the Social Security Amendments of 1960, no monthly benefits were payable to the survivors of a worker who died before 1940.

Under the new law, if such worker had worked under social security for at least a year and a half, benefits are payable to his widow and dependent mother at age 62, to his dependent father at age 65, and to his disabled children who were disabled before they became age 18. This is true even if the family had collected the "lump sum" at the time he died.

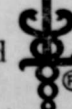

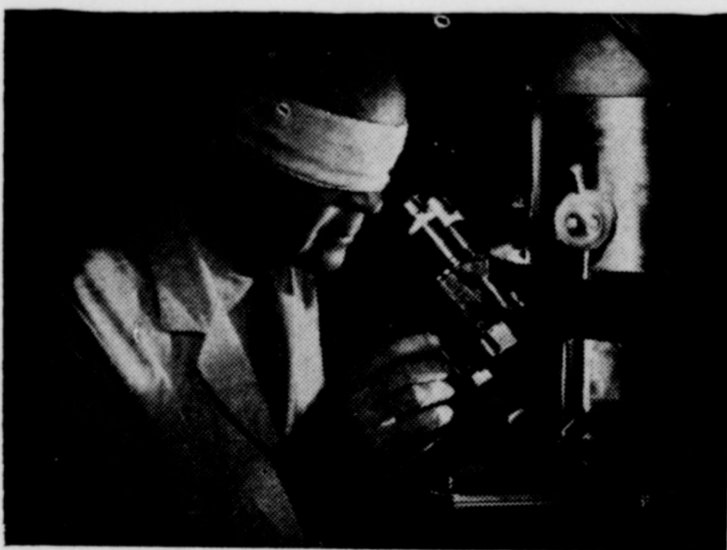

### North Concho River Soil Conservation News Column

Brush control operations are in progress on several ranches in the North Concho River Soil Conservation District at present.

Aerial spraying of 7,000 acres of mesquite is being done on the Wrage-Hendrigson and Bryant Harris ranches in western Glasscock County.

Bob Ballenger, located 5 miles north of Garden City is doing aerial spraying of 3,000 acres of mesquite plus about 1,900 acres of prickly pear grubbing.

Currie Cattle Co., Dr. R.E. Glass and J. W. Cox, located on the Garden City highway, plan brush control by aerial spraying this year. Dr. Glass has just completed some mechanical grubbing of mesquite.

These cooperators are being assisted in carrying out their conservation plans by the Great Plains Conservation Program.

### GOOD NEWS FOR POTATO LOVERS!

Potato lovers rejoice! The winter potato crop is abundant and abundance means good buys.

Ironically, this popular vegetable was discovered by happenstance. The potato is a native of the Americas and kissin' cousin to such other vegetables as tomatoes, sweet peppers, and eggplant. During a Spanish expedition to discover the mythical and gold-laden land of El Dorado, a conquistador found natives of Colombia cultivating and eating potatoes. Even if the conquistador's search for treasures had been successful, the value of his gems and gold would be inconsequential compared with the value of the potato to the peoples of the world down through the centuries.

Americans eat almost 100 pounds of potatoes each year. Many households have potatoes at least once a day, some at every meal. Such extensive use soon runs the gamut of recipes even for the versatile potato. Combined with one of its kissin' cousins, the tomato, Florida's new potatoes take on a different twist.

#### New Potato and Tomato Pan Fry

2 pounds new potatoes, peeled and sliced

1 medium onion, chopped

2 cloves garlic, chopped finely

2 tablespoons olive oil

6 slices bacon, diced

3 tomatoes, cubed

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1 teaspoon chopped fresh basil or 1/4 teaspoon dried

1 teaspoon parsley flakes

Brown onion and garlic in oil in a large, heavy frying pan. Add bacon and sliced potatoes. Continue cooking until potatoes are golden brown. Add chopped tomatoes and seasonings. Cover pan tightly and cook 20 minutes over low heat or until potatoes are tender. Serves 6.
