## **Tooth Taboos**

In the primitive tribes on the island of Samoa, the loss of a tooth was believed to be a punishment inflicted by a household god because that person had violated a certain taboo. Similarly, in our civilized society the breaking of \_

the taboos or rules of good nutrition can result, conceivably, in the loss of one or more teeth.

Scientists are convinced that a significant amount of dental decay is caused by improper nutrition.
