MISS FANNIE COPELAND Oldest Citizen Dead at 97

Miss Fannie Copeland, 97 August 18, was found dead in her bed here Tuesday morning about 7 o'clock. She was Sterling County's oldest citizen. Born near Rome, Georgia, in 1864, Miss Copeland moved with here family to what was then Runnels City in Runnels County in 1882. Two years later they moved to Sterling County and her parents purchased land at \$1 per acre and ranched on the divide. The family's first home was in Tom Green County and they rebuilt in Sterling County when it burned. She was postmaster 27 years at a post office on the Divide between Sterling City and Robert Lee. She had been in the ranching business more than fifty years. She leased the ranch several years ago to her nephews, John Copeland, Jr. and C. J. Copeland. She moved into town and bought several rent houses. Her health had been bad for several years.

Services were held at the First Baptist Church here on Wednesday at 3 p.m. with the Rev. Sherman Conner officiating. Burial was in the Montvale Cemetery with Lowe Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Pallbearers were Harold McCabe, John Brock, Dr. W. J. Swann, Billy Ralph Bynum, Jeff Davis and Hal Knight. Survivors include the two nephews and three nieces, Mrs. Ernie Solat, and Mrs. Charlene Turney, both of San Angelo and Mrs. Lee Newcomb of Edna.

The field day at the Sonora Experiment Station originally set for this week. Wednesday 13th, was postponed. A casualty of Carla's unsettled weather conditions the early part of this week, it has been rescheduled for Wednesday, September 27. The program will remain the same as before according to the announcement and will include discussions on range management, wildlife management, and a tour of the station's facilities.

The West Texas Fair at Abilene this week starts the fall fair schedule. It opened on Monday and will close on Saturday, the 16th.

Two divisions in the sheep show at Abilene have entries from Sterling County. Clinton and L.F. Hodges are showing in the Rambouillet division.

On Thursday, Suffolks were to be judged while the Rambouillet judging is scheduled for Friday.

Twelve 4-H club members have lambs on feed for the spring shows while three have registered Rambouillets. Several more club members will probably put lambs on feed in the next few weeks.

Club members with lambs are: Larry Stewart, James Morgan, Jack Clark, Jerry and Mike Payne, Vernon Asbill, Rosanne Foster, Mitsy Davis, Cecilia and Jeanie McDonald, and Reynolds Lee and David Foster.

Those who have registered Rambouillets are Barbara, Drew, and David Durham, and Betty Jo Barrett.

There has been interest in the 4-H club horse project from several club members and parents. Possibly, two or three will have horses as their project for the coming year since this has been made an official project. At least two area shows, Odessa and San Angelo, have added junior classes in the quarterhorse division. The Quarter Horse Association of West Texas and the American Quarter Horse Association have been instrumental in getting these classes for the youngsters.

The fall application of fertilizer to lawns should be made at least 30 days before frost. Fertilizer can be applied any time from now on since it is hard to predict when the first frost will hit this area. Applications of fertilizer will send the grass into the winter with a strong root system in good healthy condition. The grass will come out next spring in much better condition as a result.

Fertilizer should be applied at the rate of 2 pounds of ac-

tual nitrogen per 1000 square feet. A fertilizer containing both nitrogen and phosphorus should be used at this time. A good one for this area is 16-20-0. Application at the rate of 13 pounds per 1000 square feet will furnish the necessary nutrients. The fertilizer application should be followed with a thorough watering.

To be eligible for price support for barley, a producer must divert from barley production a part of his barley acreage and use that diverted acreage for conservation. In addition to being eligible for price supports the program provides for payments on the diverted acreage.

Even though Sterling County is not considered a major barley production area, the program does apply. Interested producers should contact the local ASC office for details in the next few days, according to Eddie Braswell, office manager.

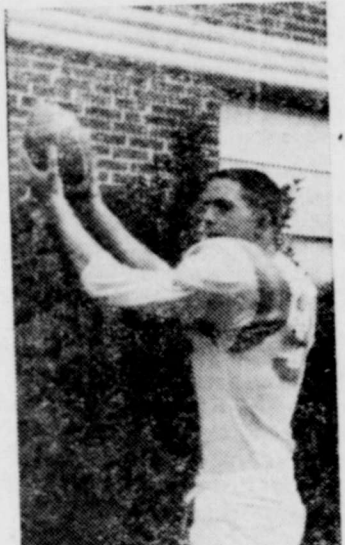

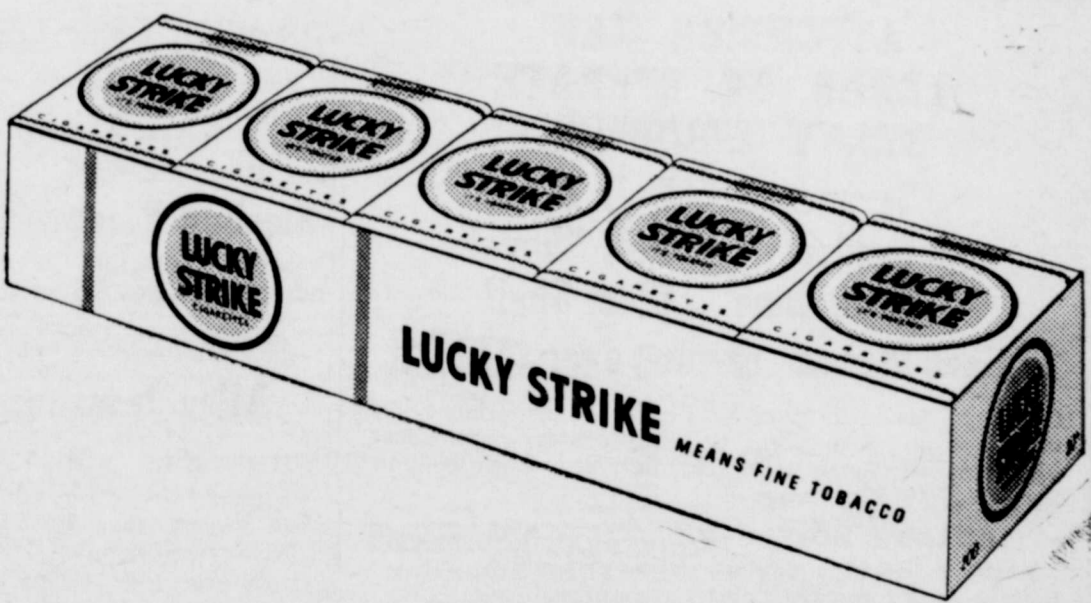

The landowners in the Coke County Zone of the North Concho River Soil Conservation District will elect a supervisor on October 3, 1961.

J. R. (Uncle Bob) Mims is stepping down after serving the district for more than 20 years. Uncle Bob served on the original board of supervisors when the district was organized.

The election will be held in the park at Water Valley with a barbecue and conservation tour following.

Ninety-five acres of cropland is being leveled on the Sander's farm located on the Sterling-Big Spring highway in Glasscock County. The land will be used for alfalfa and ensilage for a cattle feeding program.

The land levelling job is being engineered by the Soil Conservation Service. Earthmoving is being done by conservation contractor J.D. Harmon of Robert Lee.

The levelling involves approximately 30,000 cubic yards of earthmoving.

Elbert Long, manager of Sander's farms, has been busy for two weeks cutting ensilage. It has been estimated that 32 tons per acre is being cut. The Northrop King Forage Sorghum No. 320 was irrigated and fertilized.

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Our WASHINGTON Letter

THE COMMUNIST PARTY, U.S.A. is becoming quite brazen. All members of the Congress are now receiving regular releases from Gus Hall, top dog in the Red conspiracy in this country I have received two of them.

In these releases Hall follows the Kremlin line, taking pokes at Wall Street, Monopolists, Big Business, and the Western alliance. He says the conservatives in the U.S. are war-minded, against the Negro and labor unions, and would enslave the proletariat if they had a chance.

Hall also takes a cut - as would be expected -- at the House UnAmerican Activities Committee, and - as would be expected -- against the film "Operation Abolition".

Sending this propaganda to members of Congress is something new. So far as I know, the Commies have never done that before. It seems to be timed to coincide with the Kremlin directed drive against anti-Communists in this country. Called an anti-anti-Communists drive, the Kremlin's new technique was recently exposed by the Senate Internal Security Committee, and also by FBI's J. Edgar Hoover.

The line is to discredit individuals and groups who become targets of ridicule and all manner of techniques are employed by the Communist experts in the field of psychological warfare to discredit those who would discredit Communism.

The 5 day conference of unaligned Nations, mostly from Africa and Asia, which just met in Belgrade, Yugoslavia, did not wrap itself in glory. The delegates found fault with our retention of Guantanamo Naval Base in Cuba; criticized Portugal's role in Angola; picked on France for her actions in Algeria and Tunisia; rebuked alleged western colonialism, etc.

But not a word of criticism was voiced of the Soviet breach of the voluntary ban on thermonuclear testing; not a word of fault was found with harsh treatment of East Berliners, Hungarians and other Eastern Europeans - all at the hands of the worst imperialists of modern time!

Most of the unaligned nations who participated have emissaries in Washington seeking more foreign aid - and many threatening to go Communist if we don't give them more money.
