AROUND THE COUNTY by

The District 7 Sheep and Goat school will be held on the Texas A&M Adjunct at Junction this year on March 27 and 28. Topics on the program include the sheep and goat, wool and mohair outlook situation, grazing and range management, wool and mohair grades, grazing and range management and grading, wool and mohair appraisal by a warehouseman, results of the sheep selection program in several counties, crossbreeding lambs for lamb production, safety in the use of chemicals, and an afternoon on the Awbrey Kothmann ranch. Awbrey has been participating in the Extension sheep and goat improvement program for seven years and has some interesting results to show as a result.

All interested ranchers are invited to attend the school. There is no charge other than for meals and lodging. If you are interested, contact the county agent for further details and a complete program.

The screws are being tightened more and more on the screwworm in Texas. More flies are being released each week in the valley area of Texas where the screwworm is becoming active. In addition several plane loads of flies have been released in the Hill country area where cases of screwworms have been positively identified.

The latest series of steps to tighten the screws consist of the recommendations of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and the Department of Agriculture personnel working on the program. They ask that each livestock owner inspect his livestock frequently, especially the navels of newborn animals, a favorite place for worms. Collect ten maggots from each infested animal, place them in a bottle of water or alcohol and notify the county agent. Do not move animals from any area unless all wounds have been treated with Korlan screwworm smear. Do not move animals out of counties where screwworms have been reported until the animals have been sprayed with Korlan or Co-Ral and all wounds treated with Korlan smear. Do not accept animals from other states unless the animals have been treated as above.

These steps will aid in the program greatly. It will enable the Foundation to rush loads of sterile male flies into the areas where screwworms are reported. It will act as a guarantee on your investment in the program in that personnel working on the program will be able to stay abreast of the movement of the flies and seek to control them before the worms become prevalent over a wide area.

Texas is once again included in the area where grasshoppers may be bothersome in 1962, reports of the USDA indicate. Federal-state surveys conducted last fall on 13.5 million acres of rangeland in 15 states are the basis of the reports. These surveys were made to determine the number of eggs deposited last fall by the grasshoppers.

Sterling County was in an area where the count of eggs last fall was considered a lightly infested area. The hatch of these eggs this spring will determine the hopper crop this year. It is possible that there will be no trouble from the 'hoppers if the hatch of the eggs is low. Also possible, a good hatch of the eggs might mean trouble from larger than usual numbers of hoppers. Generally, the grasshoppers will make their appearance some time in the next six weeks or two months.

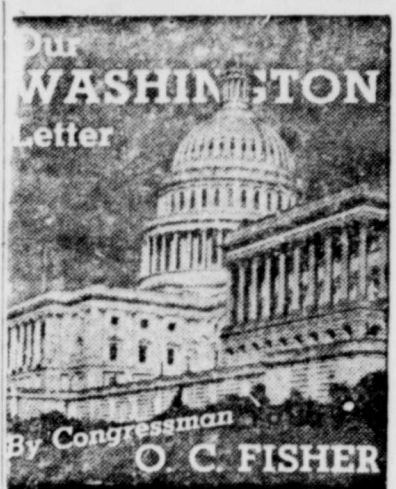
The new business is in the building just east of the post office on the main block of business houses. The building was last occupied by Garrett & Baileys Dry Goods.

The free use of our mail service to transmit communist propaganda in this country will be discontinued in the future, if a House-approved amendment to a postal rate bill is finally adopted.

The practice of allowing free mail service to the Soviets is in keeping with an international agreement entered into many years ago. The U.S.A., the Soviets, and many other countries, were parties to that arrangement. For a while the privilege as applied to the Communists was suspended in the country, then it was allowed to continue.

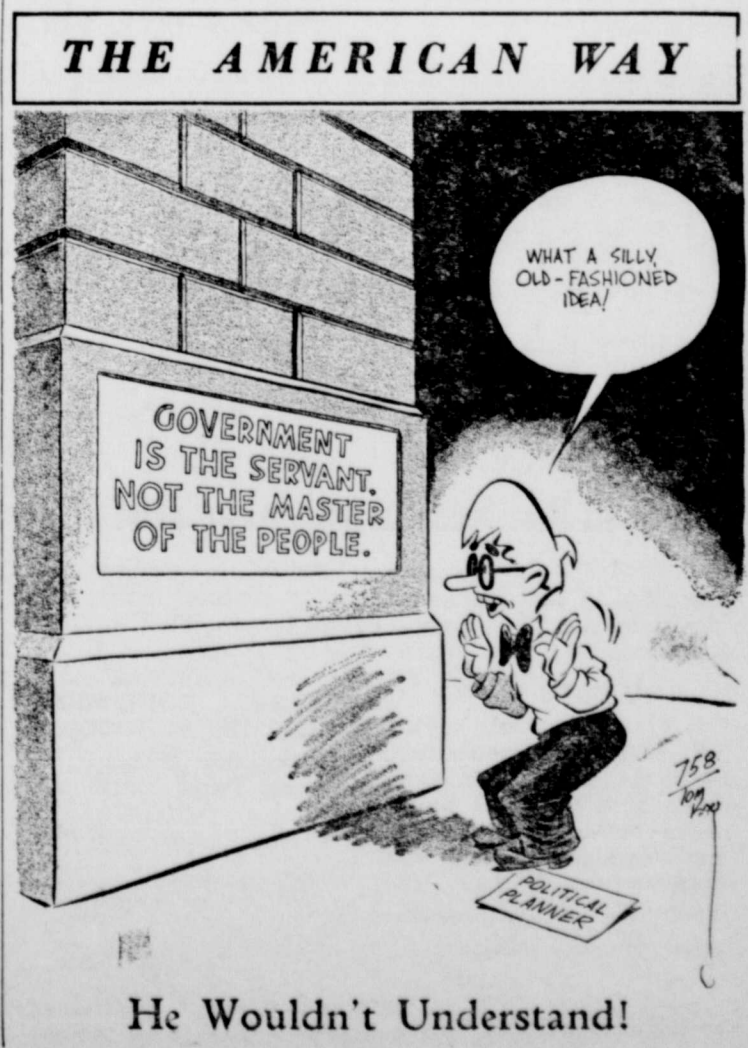
Since then, tons of Red propaganda has flooded our mail, saturated our school campuses and libraries, and overburdened our postal service. Many of us feel that even though the United States has the same right to send printed material through Russian postal service, without cost to us, the Soviets abuse their privilege and it is doubtful that very much of what we send over there actually is allowed to get into the hands of the intended readers.

The matter of restricting and controlling this practice is essentially a responsibility of the Executive branch of the government, since it deals with international affairs. But the Congress would seem to have the authority to determine by legislation, as matter of public policy, what mail may be sent free through our postal service.

In any event, the House has acted, and the measure is now before the Senate.

By a coalition of Republicans and northern Democrats, plus a few southern Democrats, a \$263 million job training bill was rammed through the House last week. The Senate had already approved a similar bill; but the Senate, being a bit more welfare-minded, upped the cost to \$655 million. Now a conference committee will work out a compromise.

Actually, the project (which I voted against) is an unnecessary duplication of vast and varied vocational and apprenticeship training program, costing hundreds of millions of dollars, already in effect. It is another in a series of welfare programs which the Congress will be called upon to approve this session. But this one had its appeal, and it sailed through.

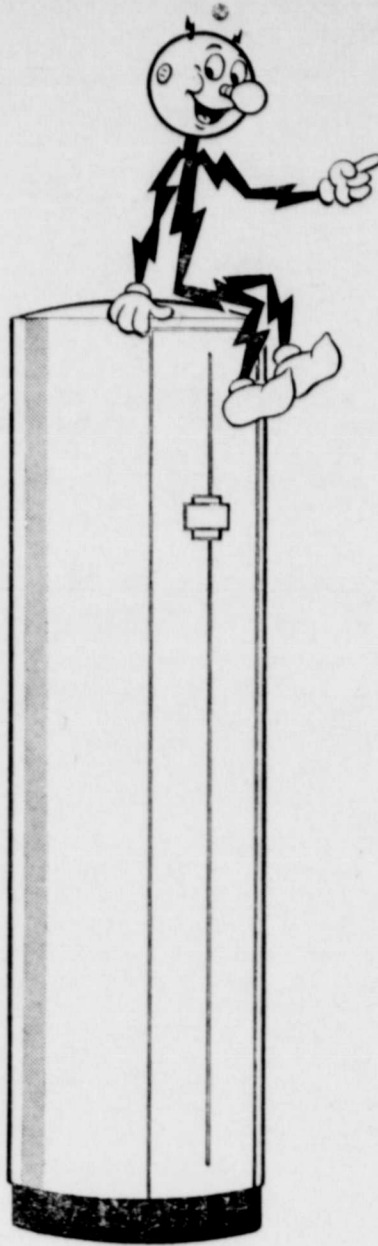
**Social Security  
Changes**

Recent social security amendments change both the requirements for payment of benefits and the rate of social security taxes according to Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office. The new changes include the following:

1. Men may now get reduced payments as early as age 62.
2. Some workers already drawing the minimum monthly payment of \$33 had their checks increased to \$40.
3. People can now earn more and still draw some social security payments.
4. Workers may now qualify for benefits if they have credit for at least one quarter of work under social security for each year since 1950 up to the year they reach 65 (62 for women).
5. Payments to aged widows and widowers have been raised about ten per cent. When only one parent is receiving payments, that parent also got an increase.

In making these changes, Ellington continued, Congress has shown its usual concern for the financial soundness of the Social Security Trust Fund. To maintain the fund with enough income and reserve to make these increases in payments, Congress has adjusted the tax rates upward.

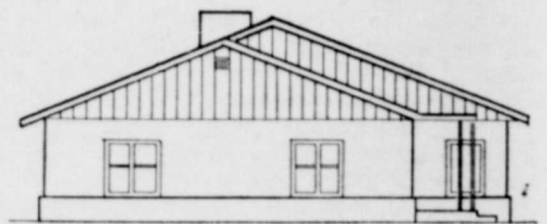

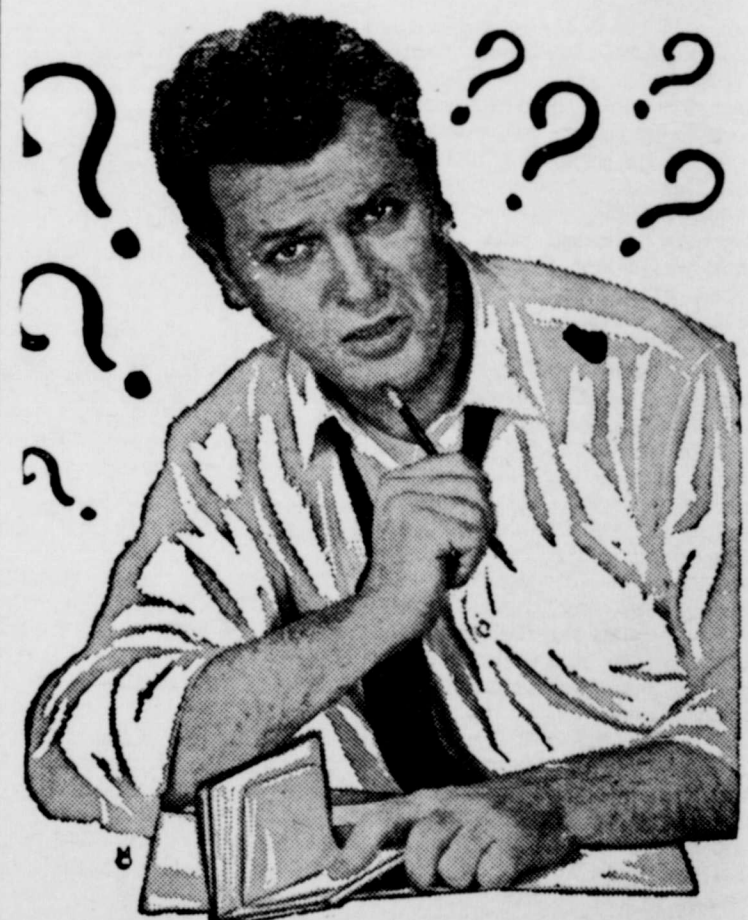

**Navy Now Accepting Three  
Year Enlistments**

The Navy will accept volunteers for the first year term enlistment and will permit certain young men to reenlist for two or three years in an experimental program, Vice Admiral William R. Smedberg, III, Chief of Naval Personnel announced today.

The experimental program has been placed in operation, Admiral Smedberg said, to meet the increased readiness posture of the Navy and the Nation. It will remain in effect until June 30th, 1962. The three year enlistment program is open to men who have had no prior military training. Under the reenlistment program, eligible personnel who have been released from active duty may reenlist with an option of up to 30 days advance leave. Formerly, broken service men reenlisted for four or six years with no advanced leave authorized. Admiral Smedberg said this new experimental program would afford young men of the country an opportunity to train and serve patriotically while learning of Navy life with only a three year commitment.

The experimental program will in no way effect the Navy's current stay in school policy, young men will continue to be encouraged to stay in school.

Many people may be losing social security benefits according to Floyd B Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, because of failure to file an application for payment.

Most of them are aware of the \$1200 yearly earnings restriction for social security beneficiaries, but may not realize that they are eligible for some benefits even if their earnings are more than \$1200 per year.

An employee can receive a check for any month that his earnings are \$100 or less regardless of his total earnings for the year. A self-employed person can receive a check for any month he does not render substantial services in the operation of his business, regardless of his net profit for the year.

Anyone who earns over \$100 in every month, and over \$1200 in the year as well, may still be eligible for some payments. Each two dollars earned between \$1200 and \$1700 a year, costs only one dollar in social security benefits; over \$1700, each additional dollar reduces benefits one dollar.

Ellington said that anyone who has reached retirement age should inquire at his nearest social security office. He may be losing benefits by not applying now.

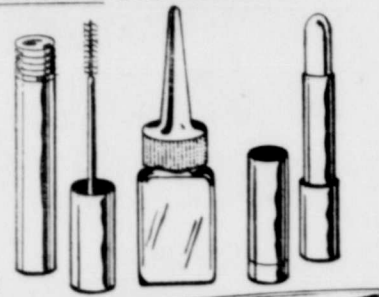

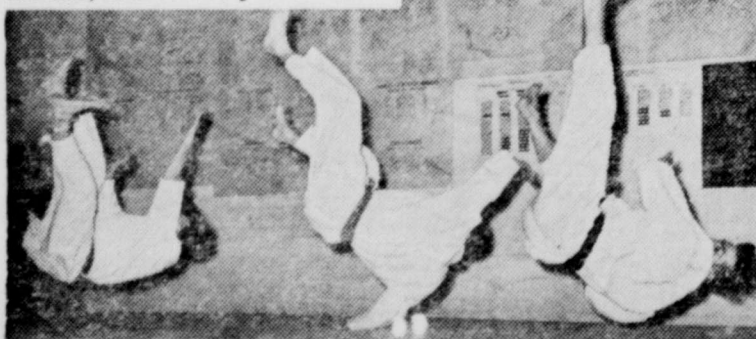

#### OLD AGE BENEFITS ARE CHANGED

One of the recent changes in the Social Security Act is important to all persons who work between the ages of 62 and 72, according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo social security office.

"This change concerns the 'earnings test' the amount one may earn and still receive some payments," he said. "Earned income of \$1200 or less in a year has no effect on the benefits. Now, however, only \$1 in benefits is withheld for each dollar earned in excess of that amount," he continued.

"This means that in some cases where a man and wife are both of retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age insurance. Where there are three or more beneficiaries in one worker's family, it is possible for him to earn as much as \$4,000 and receive some family payments for the same year."

After age 72, there is no retirement test, Mr. Ellington believes that there are many workers in the District between age 62 and 72 who should apply for the benefits to avoid any possible loss. Claims may be filed with the Social Security Administration office at San Angelo, Texas.

#### Some Benefits for Workers Who Continue to Work After Retirement Age

Just the other day, a local man read an article saying all working people 65 or over who have not applied for their social security benefits should check into it. Well, he thought he was making too much money to collect his old-age insurance benefits. He's earning about \$2200.00 a year as a maintenance man.

He is glad he followed the advice in that article because he found that some social security benefits will be payable to him for 1961, even though he continues to work. You see, a worker doesn't have to retire completely in order to get benefits. Under a law passed just last summer, a worker earning over \$1200 a year has only \$1 in benefits withheld for each \$2 he earns between \$1200 and \$1700. Then, for each \$1 he earns over \$1700, an additional \$1 is withheld.
