

from ad valorem taxation. The following is a copy of the proposed amend-

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding Section 19a to read as fol-

"Section 19a. Implements of husbandry that are used in the production of farm or ranch products are exempt from ad valo-

Section 2. This proposed constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the voters at an election to be held November 2, 1982.

The ballot shall provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (Agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation." (S.J.R.

The net result of this amendment, if added to the Constitution, will be to exempt all impliments meeting the tax definition

from ad valorem taxation. Bailey County Chief Appraiser, Dale Jones, told the Journal that out of a large number of Bailey County farm owners and operators, only 262 signed up this year for the farm equipment exemption. "On the ones who did sign up, a total of \$8,254,483, was removed from the 1982 Bailey County Appraisal District Tax base. If the proposed amendment passes in November, a total of \$17,421,605 could be removed from the BCAD tax base in 1983 which affect all entities in Bailey County Appraisal

a total of \$6,129,853, was removed from our appraisal district tax base and a total of \$2,124,630, was removed under the heading of livestock exemption, giving the total of \$8,254,483, in value removed from our district tax base for 1982. "By the passage of this amendment, it is conceivable that a great amount of dollars could be removed from the Bailey County Appraisal District tax roll because of the automatic exemption that the amendment will provide," says Jones.

Livestock exempt i o n s now stand that livestock in the hands of the producer is 100 percent and does not require any sign up at this time. However, Jones says that it is not yet known whether or not the farm tax exemption will be one that does not require a sign up if the constitutional amend-

ment passes. Earlier in the year, the Journal talked with Bailey County Appraisal District Chief Appraiser, Dale Jones in an effort to clarify the ruling at to what is and what is not exempt with regard to farm implements.

There are three main questions to settle regarding the new exemptions on implements or farming or ranching: a) what kinds of property constitute imple-

ments of farming or ranching; b) what types of ownership qualify for the exemption; and c; whether the exemption is total or

In a recap, Jones said that only certain types of personal property can qualify; real property, fixtures and improvements cannot meet the definition. Trucks, etc., would have to be decided on a case by case basis, the appraiser said.

Regarding the ownershup of qualified property, only natural persons are entitled to the exemption. The person can be a citizen of this state, of another state, or of another country. But, neither a corporation nor a partnership may claim the exemption.

"At the present time, taxpayers need not own all types of implements necessary to conduct an agricultural business, nor need he even own farm or ranch land", Jones said. Custom farmers can receive the exemption on their equip-

Under the present state property tax laws, the amount of farm equipment limited to \$15 thousand for each singular adult or \$30 thousand for a family. There are several other criteria that must be met on the exemptions for 1982.

In response to the request from MADD. Mothers Against Drunk Drivers, Governor Clements has declared September 3-12, as Drunk Driving Awareness Week in Texas.

Labor Day Holiday Death Count of 58 during 1981 was a 32% increase over the 44 fatalities recorded in 1980. It is hoped that with a statewide awaren e s s campaign and stricter law enforcement during the holiday period this increase trend will be broken.

'Harris County has shown a 3% decline in traffic fatalities this year -- this is particularily surprising when you realize that traffic tatalities in the past have increased an average of 13% a year! We think the reason for this decrease is the awareness campaign generated by MADD, the HPD DWI Task Force, the County DWI Task Force, more aggressive prosecution of drunk driving offenses by the District Attorney's office, as well as the media attention given to the issue," stated Marinelle Timmons, Texas Director of MADD.

We are talking about a crime that kills more than homicides, injures more than assaults with deadly weapons, does more property damage than the forgers, burglars and robbers all added together. Drunk drivers kill 70 people a day in the United States and cause an estimated economic loss of over \$5 billion annually. In Texas alone, 12 people are killed each day by drunk drivers while hundreds more are permanently

disabled. MADD has shown that people make the difference. During the past year, 22 states have toughened their drunk driving laws, and many are currently considering changes. The MADD organization now has 82 chapters in 29 states, with 6 established chapters in Texas, and 18 more in the forming sta-

Gover n o r Clements Traffic Safety Task Force will present recommendations to the Governor during the next two months. The Task force will be making many recommend a tions including:

* Raising the drinking age to 21. A University of Michigan 9-state survey reflected that when the drinking age was raised from 18 to 21 the states involved showed a 28% reduction in fatalities in the 18-21 year old age group.

* Open container law. You cannot say to the people of Texas that drunk driving is a ser-

ious issue as long as the citizens are allowed to drink while driving.

* Mandatory jail time for repeat offenders. A Republican Primary poll showed that 93% of the voters favored jail time for repeat offenders.

* Eliminate deferred adjudication in DWI - related offenses. Under a ' deferred adjustication ' sentence, the guilty conviction is deferred pending a probationary per-



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
