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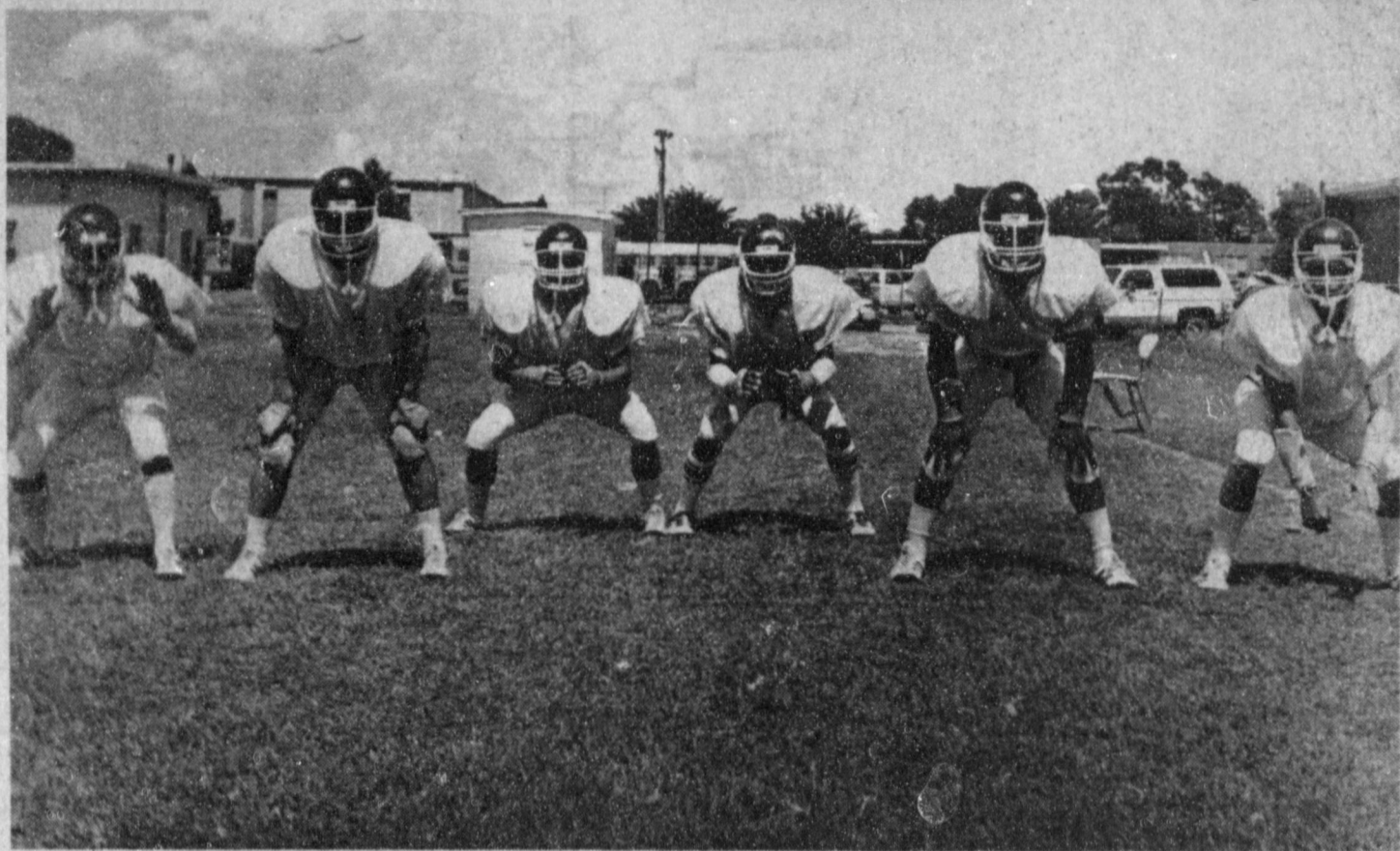

Mules Open Against Rams Friday-8 PM

Okay, Mule fans, the time has come to prove your worth. Get out your black and white, and get ready for Friday night's season opener which will put the Mighty Angry Black Mules against Tom Gruber's Rampaging Portales Ram. Game time is 8 p.m.

The Mules will be looking for retribution for the 6-0 score the Rams stuffed down their throats last year at this time. However, the tables may turn a little this season, since Gruber's Rams are a little slower, and he has lost a number of key players from last year. Gruber has replaced the graduated Poe's at

quarterback with Ed Loehr, a 6'2" - 180 pound junior, who handles himself and the ball well. His size is going to make him a little tougher to pull down, says Gruber. "We lost several men at key positions this year, and will be playing men who are coming up from JV ball, having little or no experience in varsity play," Gruber told the Journal, Tuesday. The Rams also have been hit with some injuries in guard, Randy Johnson, who has just had surgery and also with Mike Worley, a 5'11" - 160 pound guard. "Playing Muleshoe is like looking in a mirror," says Gruber, "since we play the same basic formations that the Mules employ." John Gossett, who was an all-state tackle for the Rams last year, has been moved to tight end, since Gruber feels that his talents are more in need there. Five of the Rams are starters both ways.

Drive Safely School's In Session

Motorists must exercise extreme care in school areas and along school bus routes. Texas law requires motorists to stop for any school bus loading or unloading passengers. To warn drivers, such buses will have alternately flashing RED LIGHTS on the front and rear. Motorists must remain stopped while these red lights are flashing.

The Texas Department of Public Safety's statistics for 1981 showed there were 17 deaths and 925 injuries in 1,698 school bus - related accidents.

Voters Will Decide Issue In November

In the November general elections, voters will decide whether to exclude farm equipment exemptions by 100 per cent. Voters will have the responsibility of approving or disapproving a constitutional amendment (#3) designed to exempt agricultural implements from ad valorem taxation.

The following is a copy of the proposed amendment: Section 1. That Article VIII of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding Section 19a to read as follows:

"Section 19a. Implements of husbandry that are used in the production of farm or ranch products are exempt from ad valorem taxation."

Section 2. This proposed constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the voters at an election to be held November 2, 1982. The ballot shall provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (Agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation." (S.J.R. 8)

The net result of this amendment, if added to the Constitution, will be to exempt all implements meeting the tax definition from ad valorem taxation.

Bailey County Chief Appraiser, Dale Jones, told the Journal that out of a large number of Bailey County farm owners and operators, only 262 signed up this year for the farm equipment exemption. "On the ones who did sign up, a total of \$8,254,483, was removed from the 1982 Bailey County Appraisal District Tax base. If the proposed amendment passes in November, a total of \$17,421,605 could be removed from the BCAD tax base in 1983 which will affect all entities in the Bailey County Appraisal District."

On Saturday night, entertainment will start around 8

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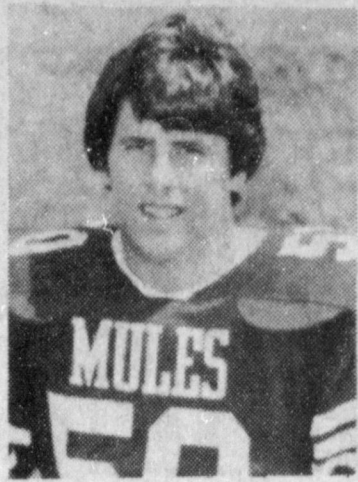

a total of \$6,129,853, was removed from our appraisal district tax base and a total of \$2,124,630, was removed under the heading of livestock exemption, giving the total of \$8,254,483, in value removed from our district tax base for 1982. "By the passage of this amendment, it is conceivable that a great amount of dollars could be removed from the Bailey County Appraisal District tax roll because of the automatic exemption that the amendment will provide," says Jones.

Livestock exemptions now stand that livestock in the hands of the producer is 100 percent and does not require any sign up at this time. However, Jones says that it is not yet known whether or not the farm tax exemption will be one that does not require a sign up if the constitutional amendment passes.

Earlier in the year, the Journal talked with Bailey County Appraisal District Chief Appraiser, Dale Jones in an effort to clarify the ruling at to what is and what is not exempt with regard to farm implements.

There are three main questions to settle regarding the new exemptions on implements or farming or ranching: a) what kinds of property constitute imple-

ments of farming or ranching; b) what types of ownership qualify for the exemption; and c) whether the exemption is total or partial.

In a recap, Jones said that only certain types of personal property can qualify; real property, fixtures and improvements cannot meet the definition. Trucks, etc., would have to be decided on a case by case basis, the appraiser said.

Regarding the ownership of qualified property, only natural persons are entitled to the exemption. The person can be a citizen of this state, of another state, or of another country. But, neither a corporation nor a partnership may claim the exemption.

"At the present time, taxpayers need not own all types of implements necessary to conduct an agricultural business, nor need they own farm or ranch land," Jones said. Custom farmers can receive the exemption on their equipment.

Under the present state property tax laws, the amount of farm equipment limited to \$15 thousand for each singular adult or \$30 thousand for a family. There are several other criteria that must be met on the exemptions for 1982.

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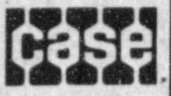

Four years ago, Cleo and Beth Webb purchased a 25-year old business in Muleshoe, and have built the business even more. The popular Spudnut Shop, located at the corner of Main Street and Avenue D, has long been a popular coffee and donut stop in Muleshoe.

But, since purchasing the Spudnut Shop, the Webbs have expanded the short order foods, from the original hamburger offered, and now also do some plate lunches. Included on the menu are various sandwiches, as well as chicken strips, steak fingers, a tuna plate, pattie plate, cottage cheese and fruit, with soft drinks, tea, coffee and milk, and of course, a Spudnut pastry for dessert.

Recently, with their plate lunches, the Webbs have added the ever-popular and asked for -- gravy.

Webb said, "Our Spudnuts are made with potato flour and a special blend of spices to achieve a unique, tasty treat."

"Spudnuts began in 1939, in a small neighborhood shop located in Salt Lake City, Utah. The shop was owned by two brothers, Bob and Al Pelton, who were intent on inventing a recipe for the perfect donut. After months of experimentation, they discovered the ideal combination of choice Idaho potatoes, specially blended flour, pure vegetable shortening and rich, subtle spices. The result was a light, flavorful potato donut which the Peltons called "Spudnuts," after the nickname for potato, Spuds.

"Today, Spudnuts are made from a dry mix that contains all the quality ingredients of the original recipe," he concluded, on the background of Spudnuts.

The Spudnut Shop in Muleshoe is a family operated restaurant, along with three non-family employees.

Webb also reminded that starting around 1 a.m., Spudnuts are made fresh each morning for the local operation, compared to super-market bakery goods that are from 4-5 days old. "Our Spudnuts are always fresh," he explained.

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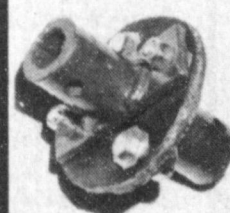
