A large crowd of former Sterling students, both those who live here and some from afar off, are expected to attend the gathering.

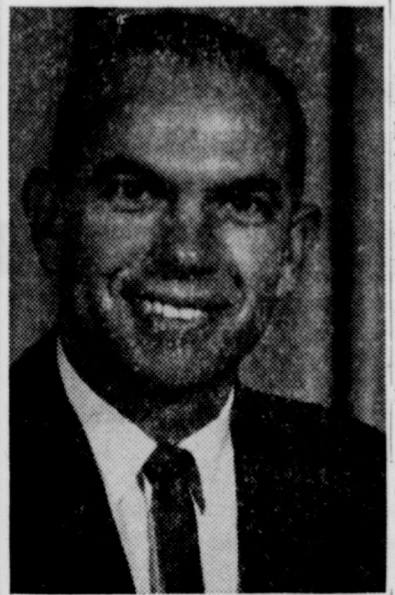
Jill Harris Gets Awards

OUR WASHINGTON LETTER



The legal debt limit is going up to \$308 billion, made necessary by the vast increase in non-military spending. It was raised to \$300 billion early this year, and it is quite likely there will be another increase next year.

This serves to remind us of how meaningless our fiscal plight, and it serves to remind us how meaningless a debt ceiling is unless an effort is made to hold annual expenditures within that limit. I would like a man resolving: "I make only \$500 a month and I hereby resolve that I won't spend more than that this month" and then going out and running up bills totalling \$600.

The permanent debt limit was fixed at \$275 billion in 1957, but there have been six increases since then. Being convinced that with less-essential spending the debt ceiling could be honored, I have been voting against the increases.

As an indicator of the trend that is making the debt ceiling meaningless, since 1947 annual outlays for non-military purposes have jumped from \$17 billion to \$40 billion, much of which has been to finance new and expanded welfare programs and experiments in social planning.

Perhaps the current increase in the debt limit can serve to arouse the American people to the seriousness of spending money we do not have. We have had deficits in 25 out of the last 32 years. This spending spree is inexcusable, particularly during times of prosperity and nearly full employment.

It is time we come to grips with the total of Federal expenditures, if the value of the dollar is to be preserved and more inflation avoided.

Six Sterling County 4-H Club members and one mother attended the 4-H Club Round Up at College Station last week. The Round Up, held on the campus of A&M College, is the meeting place for all 4-H Club teams. During the two days, club girls and boys participate in 27 different contests. Each team competing in the state contests has previously won first or second place at the district level.

Business Phones Up \$1.50 and Residences Up 50c

The General Telephone Co. of the Southwest is going up on the rates of the phones in Sterling City next month, and the increases amount to \$1.50 per month for business phones and 50c per month for residence phones.

This will make one-party business phones \$11.00 instead of the present 9.50. A business extension phone will cost 1.75, up 25c from the present 1.50 per month.

One party residence phones will go to 5.75 and two party residence phones will be 4.75. A home extension phone will go from \$1.00 to 1.25.

Some Benefits for Workers Who Continue to Work After Retirement Age

Just the other day, a local man read an article saying all working people 65 or over who have not applied for their social security benefits should check into it. Well, he thought he was making too much money to collect his old-age insurance benefits. He's earning about \$2200.00 a year as a maintenance man.

He is glad he followed the advice in that article because he found that some social security benefits will be payable to him for 1961, even though he continues to work. You see, a worker doesn't have to retire completely in order to get benefits. Under a law passed just last summer, a worker earning over \$1200 a year has only \$1 in benefits withheld for each \$2 he earns between \$1200 and \$1700. Then, for each \$1 he earns over \$1700, an additional \$1 is withheld.

One of the recent changes in the Social Security Act is important to all persons who work between the ages of 62 and 72, according to Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo social security office.

"This change concerns the 'earnings test' the amount one may earn and still receive some payments," he said. "Earned income of \$1200 or less in a year has no effect on the benefits. Now, however, only \$1 in benefits is withheld for each dollar earned in excess of that amount," he continued.

"This means that in some cases where a man and wife are both of retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 a year and still receive some old age insurance. Where there are three or more beneficiaries in one worker's family, it is possible for him to earn as much as \$4,000 and receive some family payments for the same year."

After age 72, there is no retirement test, Mr. Ellington believes that there are many workers in the District between age 62 and 72 who should apply for the benefits to avoid any possible loss. Claims may be filed with the Social Security Administration office at San Angelo, Texas.

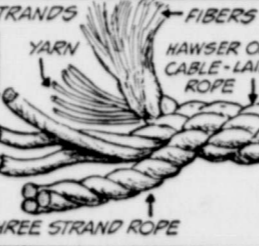

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Navy Now Accepting Three Year Enlistments
 The Navy will accept volunteers for the first year term enlistment and will permit certain young men to reenlist for two or three years in an experimental program, Vice Admiral William R. Smedberg, III, Chief of Naval Personnel announced today. The experimental program has been placed in operation, Admiral Smedberg said, to meet the increased readiness posture of the Navy and the Nation. It will remain in effect until June 30th, 1962. The three year enlistment program is open to men who have had no prior military training. Under the reenlistment program, eligible personnel who have been released from active duty may reenlist with an option of up to 30 days advance leave. Formerly, broken service men reenlisted for four or six years with no advance leave authorized. Admiral Smedberg said this new experimental program would afford young men of the country an opportunity to train and serve patriotically while learning of Navy life with only a three year commitment. The experimental program will in no way effect the Navy's current stay in school policy, young men will continue to be encouraged to stay in school.

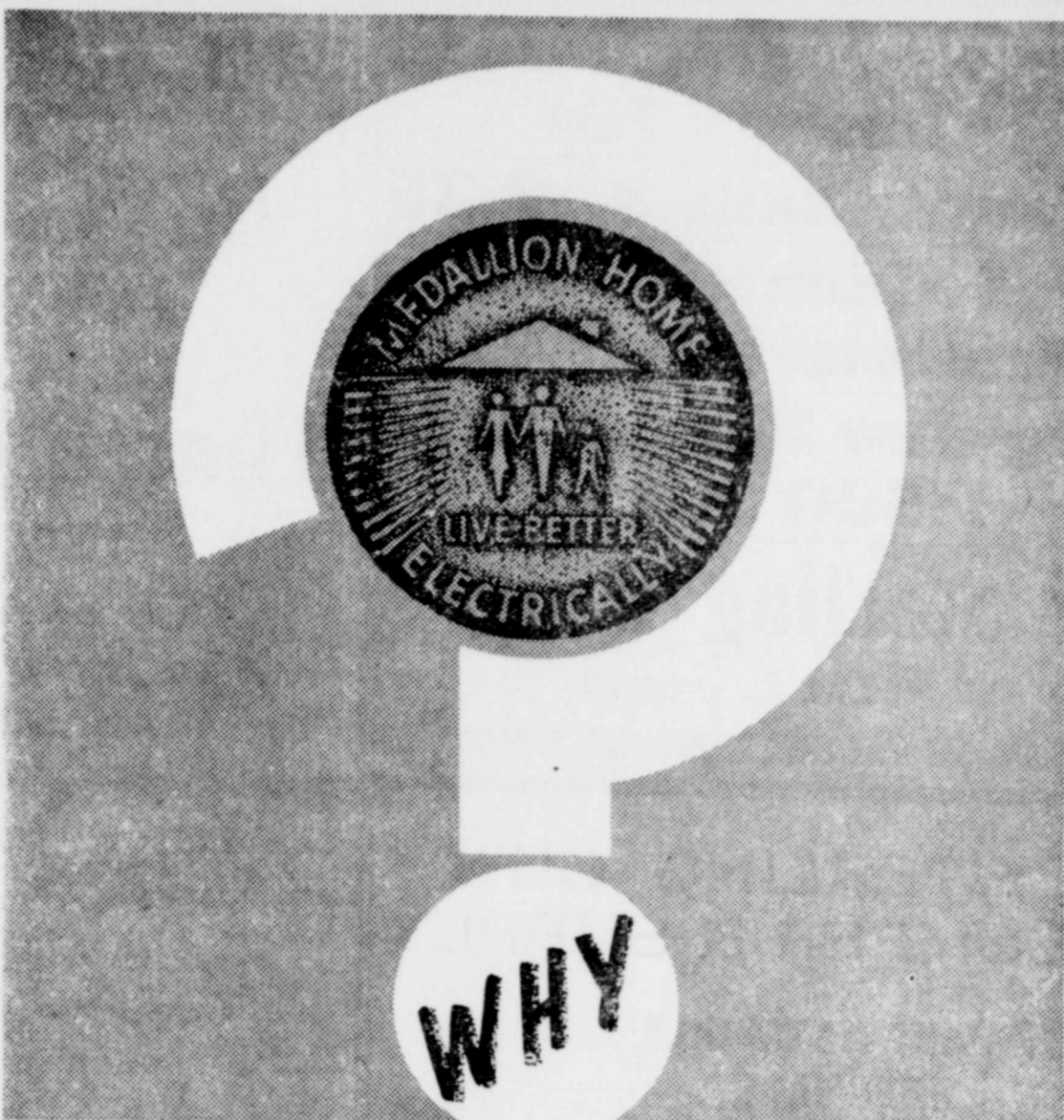

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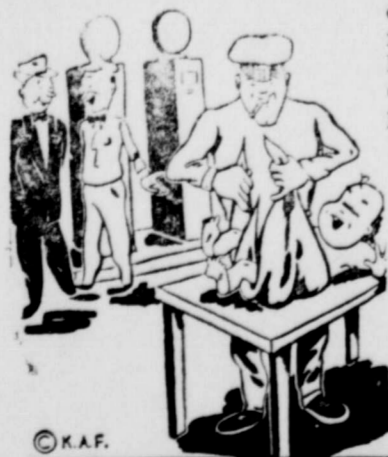
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HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS FROM THE AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

The tragedy of the thousands of persons who drowned last summer is that many lives could have been saved if a rescuer or bystander had known how to apply artificial respiration.

The important things about artificial respiration are: Know how to do it; start applying immediately after the victim has been removed from the water. Don't wait for an ambulance or for help to arrive. It probably will be too late.

The American Red Cross offers courses in life saving that include artificial respiration. But even without formal training, most people could manage to give assistance to the rescued swimmer.

There are two methods of artificial respiration currently being taught: Mouth-to-mouth, and back-pressure, arm-lift. Of the two, first aid experts usually agree that the mouth-to-mouth, or mouth-to-nose method is the most practical, in the absence of special equipment.

In the mouth-to-mouth method, first clear the air passages by drawing the tongue forward with your fingers. Place the victim halfway between a face-up and side position. Tilt the head back to insure a clear air passageway. Take a deep breath. Place your mouth over the victim's nose or mouth, and breathe into his lungs until you see the chest rise and feel the lungs expand. In mouth-to-mouth, pinch victim's nostrils shut while breathing into his lungs. Remove your mouth and let the victim exhale. Place your hand between the ribs and navel and apply slight pressure to expel all air. Repeat the cycle 15 times a minute.

The manual method should be used if for any reason the mouth-to-mouth method cannot be used. Place the victim in a face-up position. Place something under the victim's shoulders to raise them and allow the head to drop backward. Grasp victim's arms at the wrists, crossing and pressing victim's wrists against the lower chest. Immediately pull arms upward, outward and backward as far as possible. Repeat 15 times per minute.

For either method, there are some basic rules. Start immediately. Check mouth for obstructions. Loosen clothing and keep the victim warm, but don't delay artificial respiration to do this. After the victim revives, be ready to resume respiration if necessary. Have someone call a physician. Don't stop and don't give up unless you're positive the victim is dead.

If an accident occurs at a public pool or public beach, there likely will be a trained guard present to take over or called on to help in a rescue, artificial respiration. If you are keep calm and move quickly to try to get the victim breathing again as soon as possible.
