JUNIOR FIRE MARSHALS GIVE CHRISTMAS TIP TO PARENTS

Do you want your children to have a Merry Christmas?

Seems like a silly question. Christmas is a season when parents go all out to make their children happy.

But -- unfortunately -- it's also a season when some parents thoughtlessly expose their children to possible tragedy.

Intentions are the best. But there is Christmas shopping to do, last minute errands to run, perhaps a holiday party in the neighborhood.

The facts are that of the 11,500 people who die in fires every year 20% are children five or under. The high rate of fatalities among children is due in large part to the fact many have been alone in a house when it caught fire and didn't know what to do.

This Christmas, more than four million elementary school pupils are spreading an important reminder to parents: don't leave children home alone, not even for "just a few minutes."

The pupils are junior Fire Marshals who are taking part in a national campaign for a safe Christmas holiday. The Junior Fire Marshal program is a year-round activity sponsored as a public service in 15,000 elementary schools by The Hartford Insurance Group. The program is sponsored locally by Worth Durham of Durham Insurance Agency with the cooperation of school officials.

The second dose of the Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine will be given at the Sterling County Hospital here on Sunday, December 16. The hours will be the same as last time, from 1:00 till 7:00 o'clock.

The vaccine will be type II and is the one recommended for the second dose. The type will be used for this area unless the set-up by the sponsoring group, the Tom Green Eight County Medical Society.

Some of the same workers will help at the hospital as far as is possible.

All persons are urged to avail themselves of the opportunity to get their second dose. It will be given on a sugar cube or orally, as was done here last time.

There is no charge for the vaccine but donations of 25c per dose or more will be welcome to defray the cost of the program.

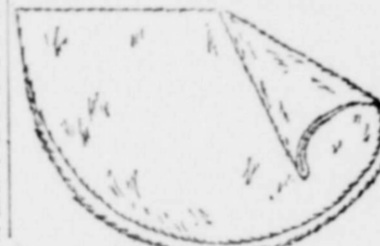

ANDREW JACKSON

From the Eighth Grade American History Class, by Larry Wilson.

Andrew Jackson was born March 15, 1767. is father died a few days before Andrew was born and the widow Jackson and her three children went to live with Andrew's aunt.

During the Revolutionary War, a British officer ordered Andrew to black his boots, but Andrew refused. The officer struck him with his sword that left scars the rest of his life. Andrew was put in jail and during that time his mother died, his brother died in the war, and his sister died with smallpox. After the war he had no one and Andrew's Grandfather died and left him with three pounds. Andrew this money away.

Later Andrew went to college and became a lawyer. When he was 32 years old he became a judge and the war of 1812 had started.

He offered his services and marched his troops to Natches. While at Natches, orders came for him to dismiss his troops. He became furious because they didn't pay his men any money. Finally he did dismiss his men with no salary.

His men said that he was as tough as Hickory and that is where he got the name of "Old Hickory." In 1829 Andrew Jackson became president of The United States.

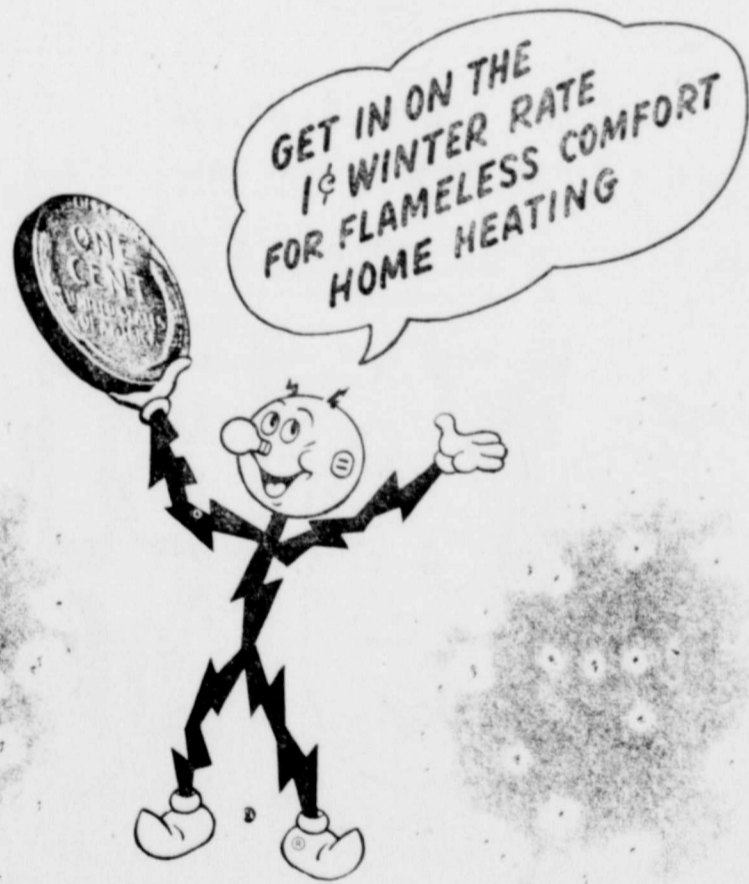

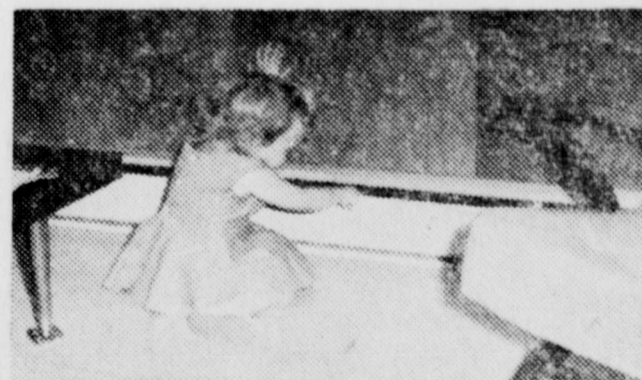

Now by this you see what coach meant. When he said we wouldn't function by accident. We'd use our heads and think things through. I think the future looks rosy—How about you?

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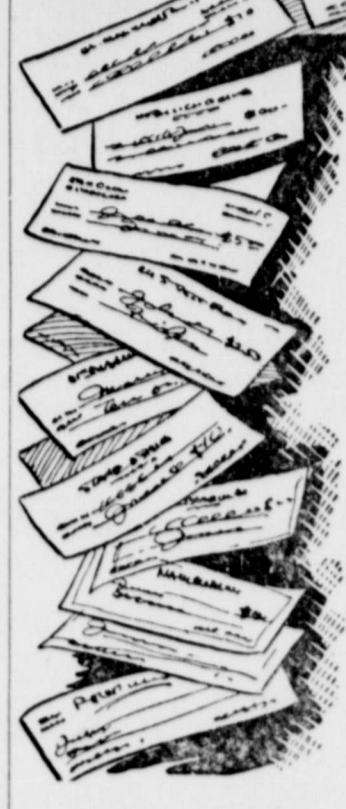
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
