The Sand Hills Hereford & Quarterhorse Show at Odessa ended the old year as the last stock show of 1962 and the first show of 1963. An unusual feature of the Odessa show is the fact that it is limited to Hereford cattle, finewool sheep and quarterhorses.

Diana Cole, a 4-H Club member, exhibited two horses in the junior of club division horse show Monday morning. Her 1961 gelding, Baldy Mac Cole, was reserve champion gelding and second in his class. A 1961 filly, Chita Mac, won fourth place. The gelding won second in the open horse show Monday afternoon for Diana.

Janis Igo, a first year 4-H Club member, showed three finewool lambs and a Rambouillet cwe. She failed to place in the top ten of the classes but she has done a good job of getting her animals ready for the show.

Auction sale of forty lambs and forty calves will be held Saturday morning. There were 250 lambs and 200 calves in the show.

The Sterling County Livestock Show will be held on January 14. Judging will start at 8:00 a.m. and the sale at 1:00 p.m.

Other shows in which club members will participate are the Abilene Show January 20-23, San Antonio February 8-17, and the San Angelo show March 6-10.

Reservations are now being taken for the Livestock Feeding and Grain Market Development Tour sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, the Grain Sorghum Producers' Association, Texas A&M and Texas Tech. Only two hundred reservations will be accepted on a first come first served basis.

The tour this year will visit the Tuscon-Casa Grande area in Arizona and the Los Angeles and San Francisco—Stockton areas in California. They will tour livestock feeding facilities in these areas; these are potential markets for both livestock and grain.

producers. The tour will leave Lubbock by special train on Monday, February 17 at 7:40 a.m. They will return on the 23rd. For more information on the tour, contact the county agent's office.

Now that fruit and nut trees have gone dormant is a good time to spray them for the control of scale. Scale is a tiny insect that attaches itself to the trunk and limbs of trees in a hard shelled case from which it derives the name, scale. About the size of a pinhead, they attack trees of all varieties and are capable of killing a tree.

Recommendations for spraying call for the use of an oil emulsion spray. Use the spray at the rate of 3 1/2 gallons of 97% oil emulsion in 100 gallons of water. If the scale is very bad, a second spraying in about 30 days might be necessary. The base oil emulsion spray can be purchased at most feed and seed stores or nursery supply stores.

Prolific Wolfcamp Strike in Sterling County

Cosden Petroleum Corp. of Big Spring, No. 1 Parramore, Sterling County re-entry operation, 12 miles southeast of Chalk, has been completed as a Wolfcamp gas-distillate discovery, for a calculated absolute open flow of 5.7 million cubic feet of gas per day, plus 156 barrels of 45 gravity distillate.

Production was through perforations between 6,694-6,712 feet, which had been acidified with 2,500 gallons.

Originally drilled by Ray A. Albaugh, Big Spring, as the No. 1 Nellie Parramore, it was abandoned Oct. 5, 1955, at 8,805 feet.

Location is 670 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of 61-17SPRR.

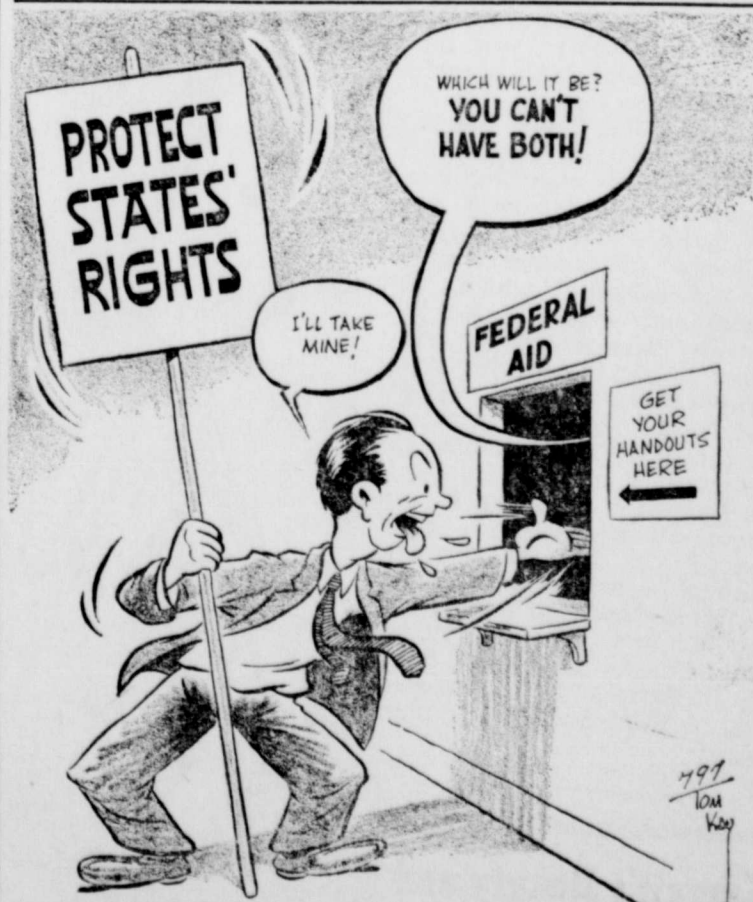

Sterling County Livestock Show Here January 14

The Sterling County Livestock show has been set by the association for Monday, January 14. The school board has confirmed this date.

Officers of the Sterling Livestock Association are Clinton Hodges, president; Ross Foster, vice-president; Billy R. Bynum, treasurer and Arthur Barlemann secretary.

The 1963 show will have classes for light, heavy and pens of three crossbred lambs; light, heavy and pens of three finewool lambs; champion and reserve champion crossbred lambs and champion and reserve champion finewool lambs. As in the past shows, there will be a class for registered Rambouillet rams, lambs, and two tooth, and a class for registered Rambouillet ewes, lambs and two tooth. New classes for the 1963 show will include a class for registered Suffolk rams, lambs and two tooth; a class for registered Suffolk ewes, lambs and two tooth. The pen of three range ewe lambs has been reinstated for the 1963 show. This class has also been reinstated in the San Angelo Fat Stock Show to be held in March.

Ribbons and money prizes will be awarded to the exhibitors of the first eight lambs in each of the crossbred lamb classes and three places will be given in the pens of three crossbred lambs. The top ten lambs in each of the finewool classes will receive ribbons and money prizes, and the top five pens of three finewool lambs will receive ribbons and money prizes. Three money and ribbons will be awarded in each of the Rambouillet Suffolk and range ewe lamb classes.

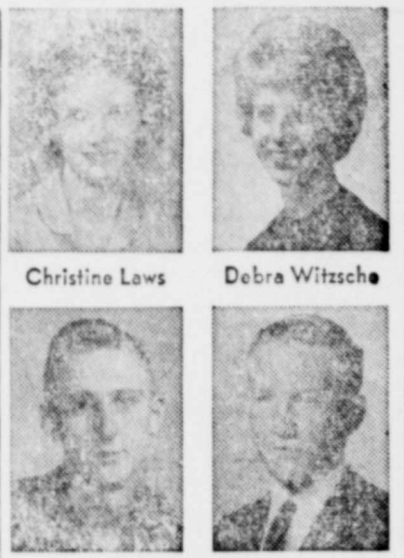

icipated in gardening, poultry, clothing, home improvement, stock breeding, lamb raising, safety and four years' junior leadership.

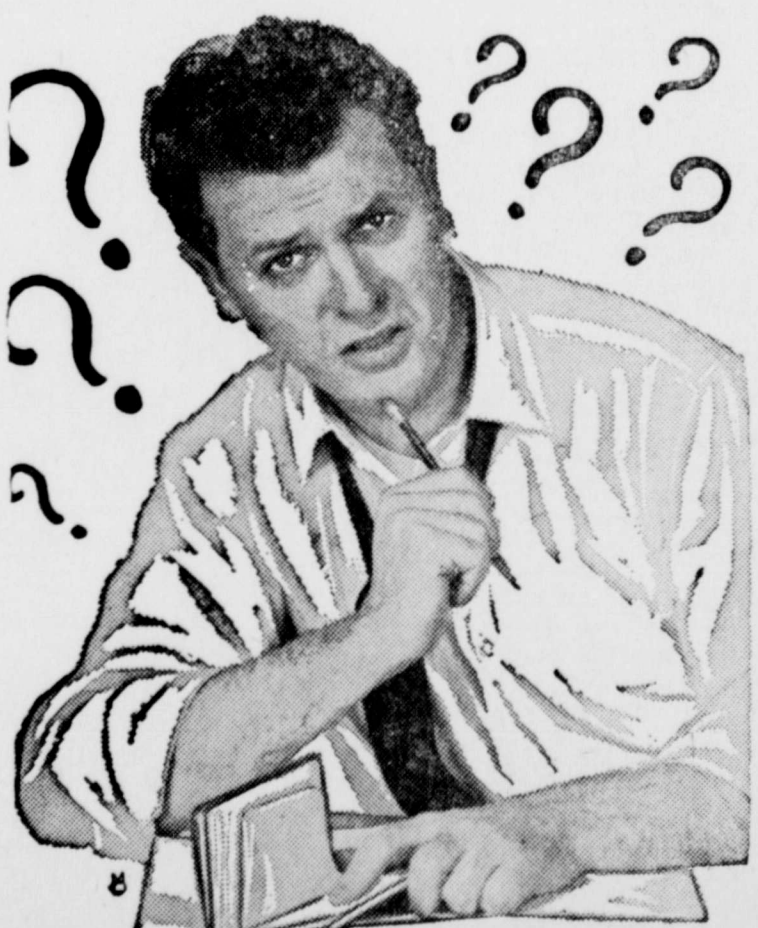

SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES

Social security beneficiaries who are still working should report any increase in their earnings that would change their estimated incomes for 1962, cautioned Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager, San Angelo Social Security Office.

Beneficiaries who work and earn over \$1200 a year make an annual report of their estimated earnings for the coming year, Ellington explained. The amount of benefits withheld by the Social Security Administration is based on this estimate.

To avoid overpayment in social security benefits, any increase in earnings above the estimate should be reported to social security promptly. If a beneficiary receives more in benefits than he should have, his checks may be suspended to make up for the overpayment, Mr. Ellington pointed out.

Revisions in the estimates may be made on post card forms furnished beneficiaries or at any social security office. To delay may cause hardship later, Ellington warned.

Over fifty million people have worked long enough under social security to qualify for cash disability benefits if they become disabled. This means that they have social security credits for five years (20 quarters) out of the past ten years, Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security office said. In the case of a severe disability, the worker and his dependents may be eligible for monthly cash social security disability benefits if he meets this work requirement.

It is not necessary to be completely helpless to qualify for social security disability benefits. These benefits are payable to those who suffer from a crippling disease or a severe impairment which makes them unable to do any substantial work.

Disabled adult sons and daughters of retired, deceased, or disabled workers may also receive childhood disability benefits if they become disabled before they reached age 18.

Anyone suffering a severe disability which prevents him from doing any substantial work should get in touch with the local social security office to determine his eligibility under the Social Security disability program, Ellington stated. He may be losing benefits if he fails to apply for them promptly. The social security district office will explain to disabled workers and their families their rights under the law.

ABOUT READY TO RETIRE?

Are you about to retire? Then ask the social security office for their new booklet, "Now That You Are Retiring." It contains advice and useful information for persons nearing retirement.

Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo, said the publication was prepared because of numerous requests from persons at retirement age. They wanted information that would help them get full satisfaction and enjoyment from their later years. The draft of the booklet got enthusiastic approval at the recent White House Conference on Aging.

The booklet covers such subjects as decisions to make and changes to face, working while getting social security payments, part-time work available to older people, community activities, recreation, adult education, where to live after retirement, health care, stretching retirement income, and counseling and information services. A copy may be obtained free by writing or telephoning the Social Security Administration District Office in San Angelo.

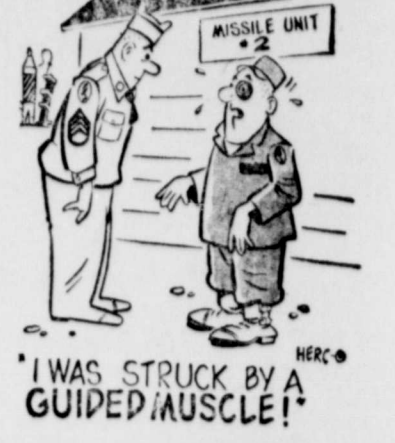
