Officers of the Sterling County 4H Club for the year were elected this week. The officers are, president, Cecilia McDonald; vice-president, Larry Stewart; secretary, Jeanie McDonald; and reporter, Betty Joe Barrett.

A number of club members are showing their livestock in the San Antonio Livestock Exposition during its ten day run for 1963. Club members who are exhibiting are: Diana Cole, quarterhorses and Angora goats; Tommy Foster, market lambs; Rosanne Foster, Charlotte Foster, Janis Igo, market lambs in the open show; Betty Jo Barrett, junior Rambouillets.

Horses will be judged on Saturday and Sunday of this week. Then the big market lamb show for boys is judged on Saturday. On Monday, the open market lamb show goes out in the judging arena. That afternoon the Angora goats are judged. On Tuesday morning, the junior Rambouillets are judged. The rest of the week is full of judging of various breeds of sheep, cattle, hogs, horses and the like.

A meeting to report the progress of the screwworm eradication program is scheduled for the week of February 18-22 in Sterling County. At that time ranchers will receive a report on what has been done in the program and what remains to be done and the future of the program.

Letters will be sent out to all rancher as soon as the exact date is set for the meeting.

If anyone intends to fertilize their yard, garden or anything else, now is the time to get a soil sample in the mail. The run on the testing facilities usually starts in a few weeks and it takes a little longer to get the results back on the samples. Ordinarily, it takes about ten days or two weeks to get a return. The test costs two dollars. This covers the cost of the laboratory materials used in making the test. The two dollars often saves more than that though. With a test, you know exactly what your soil

needs and you don't have to pay for something your soil might not need.

The county agents' office has the instructions and mailing cartons for sending in your samples. See or call him for more details.

### For Social Security

Are you about to retire? Then ask the social security office for their new booklet, "Now That You Are Retiring." It contains advice and useful information for persons nearing retirement. Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo, said the publication was prepared because of numerous requests from persons at retirement age. They wanted information that would help them get full satisfaction and enjoyment from their later years. The draft of the booklet got enthusiastic approval at the recent White House Conference on Aging.

The booklet covers such subjects as decisions to make and changes to face, working while getting social security payments, part-time work available to older people, community activities, recreation, adult education, where to live after retirement, health care, stretching retirement income, and counseling and information services. A copy may be obtained free by writing or telephoning the Social Security Administration District Office in San Angelo.

Social security beneficiaries who are still working should report any increase in their earnings that would change their estimated incomes for 1962, cautioned Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager, San Angelo Social Security Office.

Beneficiaries who work and earn over \$1200 a year make an annual report of their estimated earnings for the coming year, Ellington explained. The amount of benefits withheld by the Social Security Administration is based on this estimate.

To avoid overpayment in social security benefits, any increase in earnings above the estimate should be reported to social security promptly. If a beneficiary receives more in benefits than he should have, his checks may be suspended to make up for the overpayment, Mr. Ellington pointed out.

Revisions in the estimates may be made on post card forms furnished beneficiaries or at any social security office. To delay may cause hardship later, Ellington warned.

### Former 4-H'ers

## Texas Civic Leaders Cited, Singled Out for Citizenship

Four Texans, with 4-H Club work dating back as far as 1913, are winners of state-wide alumni recognition awards for 1962 citing them for providing young people with "living examples of dependable, purposeful citizenship."

The Lone Star State winners are Colbert E. Gregory of Groesbeck, Mrs. Durwayne Irvin of Dike, Mrs. Teddy J. Whitmire of Monahans, and E. R. Wagoner of Lufkin.

The former 4-H'ers, selected by the Cooperative Extension Service, received burnished copper plaques from the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation, Chemicals Division-Agricultural.

Olin Mathieson sponsors the awards program to recognize former 4-H members whose records of service exemplify effective community, state or national leadership, success in their chosen careers and interest in 4-H and similar activities.

Gregory, a rancher in Limestone County and executive vice president of the Farmers State Bank in Groesbeck, is described as a "banker friendly to progressive farming and better livestock." He was a 4-H member for four years in Navarro County before World War I.

The Groesbeck banker is a deacon of his church and a leader of the agriculture committee of the local chamber of commerce. He financed the 1962 trip of the Groesbeck 4-H beef cattle demonstration team to the State 4-H Club Roundup.

Mrs. Irvin has been local leader of the Dike Community 4-H Club for six years, drawing on her experience as a 4-H member in Hopkins County. She is a leader in local school activities and is secretary of the Connor Cemetery Association.

The Irvin family lives on a small farm near Dike. Promoting 4-H activities and livestock shows has been high on the schedule of Mrs. Teddy J. Whitmire of Ward County for more than 10 years. She was secretary of the County Extension Service for nine years and served most of that time as secretary of the Ward County Livestock Show.

Mrs. Whitmire, a housewife, quarter horse breeder and director of the Ward County Livestock Show Association, was county dress revue winner during eight years of 4-H work in Matagorda County.

Wagoner, formerly with the Texas Forest Service and the Kentucky Division of Forestry is executive secretary of the Texas Forestry Association. He has been instrumental in distribution to 4-H'ers and other young people of 8½ million free pine seedlings.

The forestry executive concentrated on sheep raising during four years of 4-H work in Montgomery County, Ohio. He is on the board of his local church and served three years as district commissioner for the East Texas Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

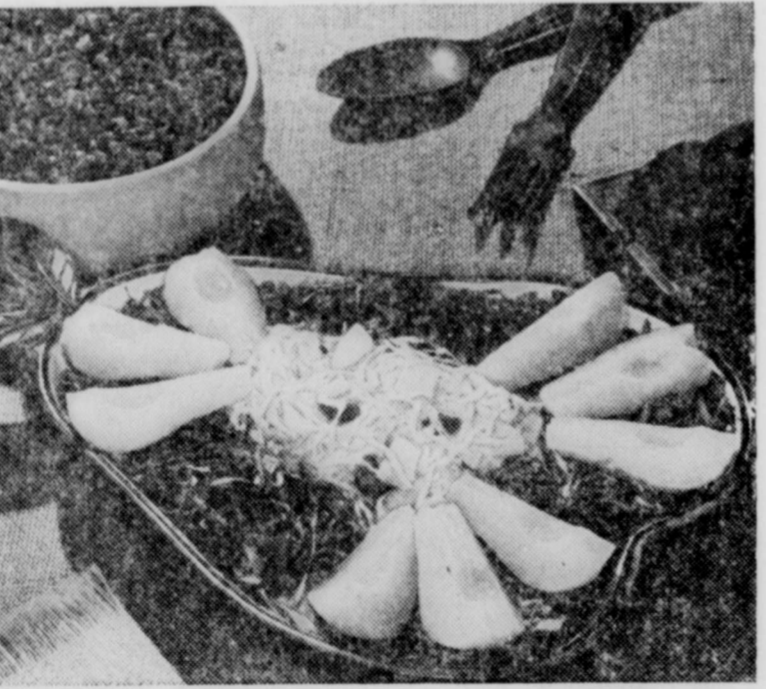

**Social Security**  
Over fifty million people have worked long enough under social security to qualify for cash disability benefits if they become disabled. This means that they have social security credits for five years (20 quarters) out of the past ten years, Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security office said. In the case of a severe disability, the worker and his dependents may be eligible for monthly cash social security disability benefits if he meets this work requirement. It is not necessary to be completely helpless to qualify for social security disability benefits. These benefits are payable to those who suffer from a crippling disease or a severe impairment which makes them unable to do any substantial work. Disabled adult sons and daughters of retired, deceased, or disabled workers may also receive childhood disability benefits if they become disabled before they reached age 18. Anyone suffering a severe disability which prevents him from doing any substantial work should get in touch with the local social security office to determine his eligibility under the Social Security disability program. Ellington stated. He may be losing benefits if he fails to apply for them promptly. The social security district office will explain to disabled workers and their families their rights under the law.

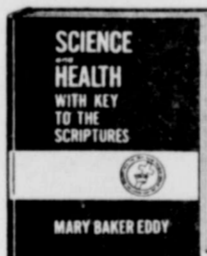
