Cheaper City Water SUMMER WATER RATES IN EFFECT NOW

Water your yard. The bargain rates on water are now in effect, in fact they went into effect the 20th of March, said city secretary Mrs. Johnny Donalson. After a customer uses the first 5,000 gallons for \$5, all over that will be billed out at 25c per thousand gallons, said Mrs. Donalson. The minimum here is \$3.50 (for 3,000 gallons). The next 2,000 gallons are billed out at 75c per thousand. Then the special summer rates will be in effect.

AROUND THE COUNTY by



ARTHUR BARLEMANN, JR. COUNTY AGENT

A range judging team of four Sterling County 4-H Club Members took second place in the range judging contest at San Angelo College farm this past Saturday. The contest was sponsored by the college and the three soil conservation districts around San Angelo. Sponsoring districts were the North Concho Rier District which includes Sterling County, the Concho District which includes the territory from San Angelo to Eden, and the Eldorado-Divide District.

Team members were Larry Stewart, David Foster, Tommy Foster, and Jack Clark. Larry was second high overall individual in the contest scoring 466 points out of a possible 600. David was fifth high overall with a score of 450 while Tommy was seventh with 410 points. Eighth high was Jack with 345 points.

The Sterling team was high team in plant identification with 1037 points out of a possible 1600. They were required to identify 40 plants, give the season of growth, the classification--climax, invading, or introduced-- life span, and grazing value. They were second in the range condition portion and second on plot placings.

Again, Larry was second high on plant identification and David was third with Tommy fourth. David was fifth high individual on range condition. In range placings he was fourth and Larry fifth.

The boys received ribbons for each of the above named placings. In addition, the team received a plaque for their second place team effort. Team score was 1671, a good score for the first contest of the year.

All those who participated were guests of the three districts for a barbecue dinner at Fred Harris'.

The four boys also took part in the wool and mohair judging contest sponsored by the college Saturday afternoon. They failed to place in the top three here though.

The worm samples taken in from the W.N. & L.R. Reed ranch last week were not screwworms. They were taken in by Forrest Smith who is inspector in this area. According to Mr. Reed, he called back the information that they were other than screwworms.

Don't forget to file your papers for payment under the wool incentive program. Dead line for filing is April 30 but the local ASC office says that the sooner you file, the better. They can process the applications at any time now on wool and lambs sold before March 31.

The 1963 marketing year will be only nine months. Effective January 1, 1964, the marketing year will coincide with the calendar year. Hence, the 1963 year will be just nine months. This was voted on in referendum last year and passed by the producers.

News media and county agents will be briefed on the wheat situation next week. The meeting for this area is to be held in Abilene on Monday, April 8. There they will receive information on the referendum to be held later this year on the wheat program.

Agents and growers will attend another meeting on the wheat program in Ballinger on Thursday, April 18. All interested growers who would like to attend are urged to do so. Contact the county agent if you would like to attend the growers meeting on the 18th in Ballinger.

Our WASHINGTON Letter
By Congressman O. C. FISHER

A substantial cut in foreign aid got a boost last week when a committee headed by retired General Lucius D. Clay, after an exhaustive study of the subject, reported that the USA has been attempting too much aid for too many and often in the wrong ways. The report called for an overhaul and a reduction.

From July 1, 1945 to June 30, 1962, our total economic and military aid to foreign countries was \$97.6 billion.

Last year President Kennedy asked for \$4.9 billion, but the House cut this figure to \$3.9 billion, and the Senate went along. This year the President asked for another \$4.9 billion plus an additional half billion in obligational authority.

In the face of this, there is a carry-over of funds appropriated in previous years, of \$21.3 billion -- not yet spent, but in the pipe line or waiting to be committed.

The Clay report calls for a curb on aid to countries which use the money to build up socialist economies, and urged that aid to such countries as left-leaning Indonesia (we have given them \$670 million) be curbed. It said assistance to Latin and South America, unless there are drastic changes in local set-ups, would be wasted. And it called for a halt of our hand-outs to the vast array of mixed-up Negro Nations of Africa. That area, it insisted, should be left to France and Britain -- if any aid is justified.

We have poured nearly \$2 billion into Africa -- including \$156.5 million to Ghana -- another leftist country that has been playing footsie with Krushchev for years.

The report was acclaimed by many in Congress. It enabled some of us to say, "I told you so". For years I have been voting against the mammoth omnibus foreign aid bills because they contained too many items for more than 100 countries that simply could not be justified. Indeed, we have given -- in one form or another -- an average of \$1 billion to practically every country in the world since 1945.

And now, at last, the Clay Report lays it on the line -- the U.S. is attempting too much aid for too many countries -- and often in the wrong ways. There could be a cut of at least \$2 billion in the current foreign aid bill.

SOCIAL SECURITY

Over fifty million people have worked long enough under social security to qualify for cash disability benefits if they become disabled. This means that they have social security credits for five years (20 quarters) out of the past ten years, Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security office said. In the case of a severe disability, the worker and his dependents may be eligible for monthly cash social security disability benefits if he meets this work requirement.

It is not necessary to be completely helpless to qualify for social security disability benefits. These benefits are payable to those who suffer from a crippling disease or a severe impairment which makes them unable to do any substantial work.

Disabled adult sons and daughters of retired, deceased, or disabled workers may also receive childhood disability benefits if they become disabled before they reached age 18.
