District Court Session Here Monday

The 51st District Court was in session here Monday. Two DWI cases were disposed of on plea of guilty; one divorce was granted and the grand jury indicted several persons.

Doris Hayter Moore was fined \$100 and costs by the judge, Joe Mays, on a plea of guilty of DWI, second offense. J. Howard Bolinger was also fined \$100 and costs on a plea of guilty of driving while intoxicated, second offense.

Lavada DeMerritt was granted a divorce from John DeMerritt and her surname of Mitchell restored by the court. The divorce of Alvin Roe vs. Vivian Roe was dismissed for lack of prosecution by the defendant.

Indicted by the grand jury were Robert Stevens Griffing, on a charge of murder with a motor vehicle, without malice. Jerry Fountain was indicted on a charge of receiving and concealing stolen property of over \$50 value. Leroy Butler was indicted for receiving and concealing stolen property of over \$50 in value. Raymond Clyde Mann was indicted for DWI second offense. Severnia Enrico Ramon was indicted for theft of over \$50.

The grand jury was then recessed, subject to further call if necessary.

Ranges in Good Shape

Good soaking rains have covered Sterling County and all of West Texas this week. Up to five inches in areas of this county have been measured by ranchers. Sunday night all of the county got rain and parts of the county got showers Saturday.

Wednesday morning the county was soaked all over with general rains, ranging up to nearly three inches. Here in town 1.20 was recorded and the fall was heavier to the south and east.

Water gaps have washed out twice on some ranches and the rains have put the Concho River to running again. Sterling Creek came down on rises twice.

Counties to the east, Coke and Tom Green have had more total than Sterling, but they were needing rains worse—Sterling had received more moisture in recent weeks than they had.

According to reports, rains were general over the state this week, making the agricultural outlook perk up.

The second case of screw-worms in Sterling County for this year was confirmed by the Mission laboratory last Saturday. This case was in the navel of a calf owned by Reynolds Foster. The sample was taken late Wednesday evening, mailed on Thursday and confirmed by a telephone call to Forrest Smith on Saturday.

It is not known for certain that flies have been dropped in this area under the hot spotting program. Reynolds says that he has seen no plane in the area nor any of the fly boxes. The weather has not been too cooperative for flying or hunting white X's on the ground since the case was found. Also, there has been a buildup of cases above the buffer zone or release line and the planes are about two days behind rather than being able to get on the case the day after it is confirmed.

With the weather we are having, there may be more cases in this area when it warms up. It is doubly important that livestockmen send in all cases of worms. If you don't have vials and mailing tubes, a supply is available in the county agents office. But mail in all cases so the program officials can stay abreast of developments.

G. C. Scruggs, president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, this week reported that they had gone over the goal of three million dollars for the screw-worm eradication program. Funds from livestockmen have reached the point at which the state and federal government will enter in with their funds as soon as they are appropriated.

Contributions from Texas livestockmen and friends total a little more than \$2.9 million. Louisiana has contributed \$38,700, New Mexico has sent in \$33,500, and Oklahoma has reported \$24,000. In addition, a group of producers in California have sent in

\$500. The above funds may be swelled later. Some states and counties are still working at raising money and may send in more before stopping their drives.

White grubs have been found in several lawns lately. The grubs work on the roots of the lawn grasses. First indications are usually dead patches in the lawn. When inspected, it will be found that the roots of the dead grass have been eaten by the grubs or cut.

Two methods of control may be used on the grub; these are the application of insecticides either as a dust or as a spray. Chlordane is the commonest method of control and easiest to find in feed and seed stores. If a dust is used, it should be used at the rate of 10 ounces of 40% chlordane per thousand square feet of lawn. If you prefer a spray, chlordane at the rate of 2 tablespoons per gallon of water should be used. The spray should be applied at the rate of 25 gallons per thousand square feet of lawn.

The dust should be followed by sprinkling to get it into the soil where the insects are working. Children and pets should be kept off the lawn for several days after he application of the insecticides.

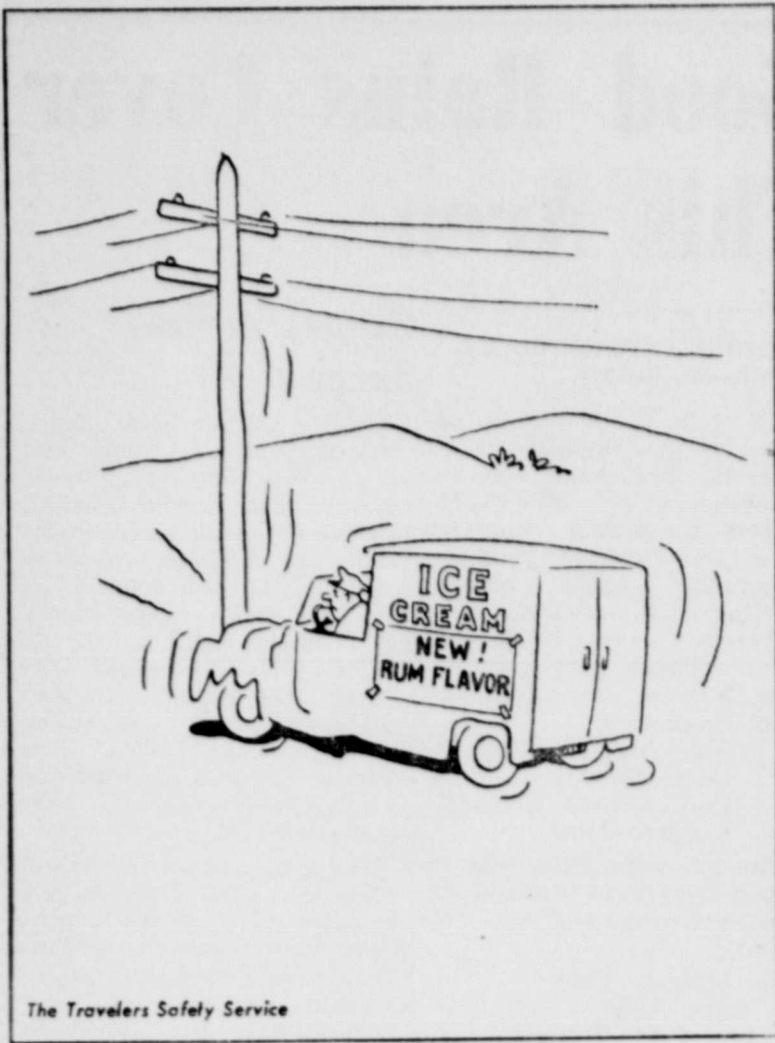
The recent rains should prove helpful to the ranchers who are aerial spraying mesquite; on the other hand rains within a few hours after spraying may result in poor jobs. It is not known how long the chemical should remain on the tree's leaves to get full effect before rain occurs. A number of spray jobs have been done in the county in the last couple of weeks. Some of them have had rain a few minutes after being sprayed while others have had hours or days before rain occurred. This may show up in the amount of rootkill—the next couple years will tell the story.

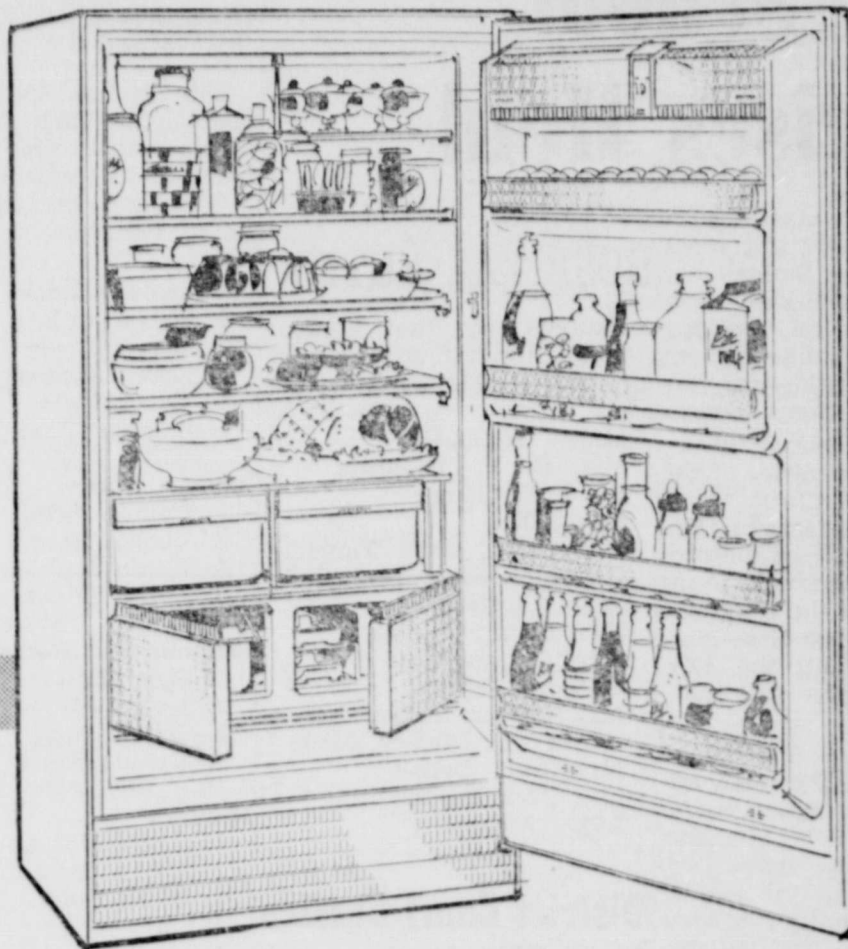

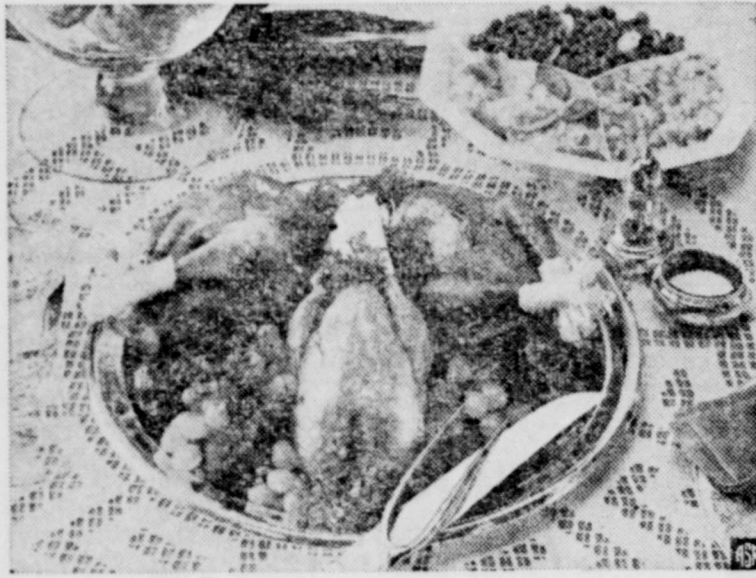

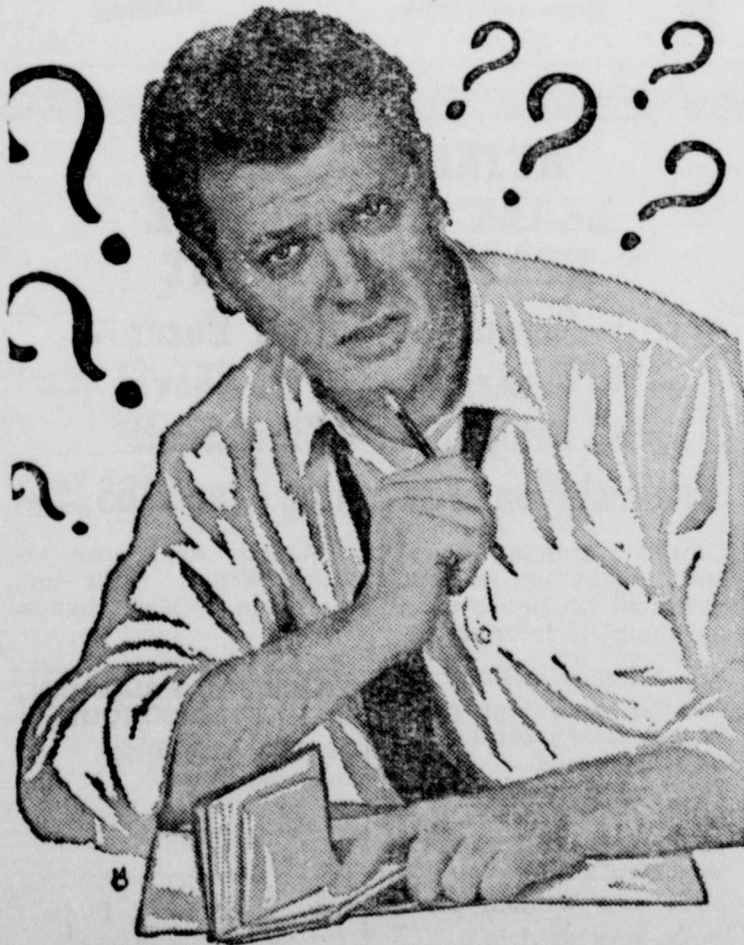
Quick Roast Chicken Stuffing



Dinner parties present a true test of a homemaker's table-setting arrangement as well as her culinary skill. The food served must measure up to the table finery, hopefully without chaining the hostess to the kitchen. Modern convenience foods such as instant whipped potatoes and Brandywine canned sliced white button mushrooms help the modern hostess to short-cut dinner preparation. The Borden Kitchen shows how this can be accomplished in this recipe for a roast chicken stuffing:

- Instant Whipped Potato Stuffing**
(Makes enough stuffing for one bird)

| 1 (4 to 4½-lb.) roasting chicken | 1 teaspoon salt |
| 4 tablespoons butter | ¼ cup milk |
| 2 medium-size onions, chopped | 1½ cups (4 servings) instant whipped potato flakes |
| 3 (4-oz.) cans sliced button mushrooms, drained well | ¼ teaspoon black pepper |
| ¼ cup mushroom liquor | ¼ teaspoon poultry seasoning |

Clean and truss bird; salt the inside. Melt butter in small skillet; saute onions and mushrooms in butter until onions are tender and slightly transparent. Pour mushroom liquor and salt into small saucepan. Cover and bring to a boil. Remove from heat and add milk immediately. Add potato flakes. Stir with a fork until all moisture is absorbed. Whip briskly. Add sauteed vegetables, pepper and poultry seasoning and mix well. Cool slightly. Lightly stuff bird with dressing and close cavity. Cover bird with clean cheese cloth which has been dipped in melted butter. Roast, breast side down, on rack, in an open roaster in slow oven (325° F.) about 1½ hours or until tender. Remove cloth, turn bird breast side up and continue to roast 15 minutes longer. If desired, garnish with small bunches of green Thompson grapes, spiced red peaches, green minted pears . . . and parsley.

Social Security Tips

Many people age 65 or over who are still working don't realize that under the law they are "partially retired" and can receive some social security payments. It is possible to receive social security retirement benefits even if earnings go over \$1200 a year, according to Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo.

Mr Ellington gave an example of a 65-year-old man and his wife eligible for a monthly social security payment. If the man earns \$2,500 in a year, he and his wife could receive \$1,110 in social security payments.

More than a million people over 65 have not yet applied for social security benefits. Many could receive benefits even though they are working. Some of these million people are probably living right here in the San Angelo area.

Mr Ellington suggested that employed persons 65 or over visit, phone, or write the San Angelo Social Security office at 204 Continental Building to find out whether or not they can receive some social security payments.

Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo, offered a few tips today on how to get your first social security check when it is due.

If you are nearing retirement, Ellington suggests that you get in touch with your social security office, and take some proof of your age with you. Have a member of his staff examine whatever proof you may have to see if it will be acceptable when you do retire.

Should you need better evidence of your date of birth, you will be given information to help you get that additional evidence.

If you are within three months of retirement age, the social security office can take your application for benefit now. Go to the social security office and take with you proof of your age and your social security card, of course.

Ellington said that even though you are working and are 65 years old, you can apply at any time. Many people think that you have to retire completely to get any benefits. This is not true, Ellington said.

For the 7th time in 3 years, the House has just approved another increase in the debt ceiling. During the preceding 8 years the limit was raised 5 times -- from \$275 billion to \$285 billion. In view of the frequency of increases, the ceiling is becoming rather meaningless.

Last year the limit was \$308 billion to continue until March 31, this year; \$305 billion from April 1 to June 24; and \$300 billion for the remainder of the year.

Last week's action raises the ceiling to \$307 billion through June 30, and to \$309 billion for July and August.

Debt ceilings were first enacted in 1917, and have been gradually increased since then. In 1941 the limit was set at \$65 billion.

A debt ceiling would serve a useful purpose during peace time if it would be observed. If it were employed as an actual brake and the cloth then cut to fit the pattern, a ceiling could be a useful tool in maintaining fiscal stability. In other words, if when the budget people decide each year how much money they plan to spend, they would hold the line at the debt ceiling, that limit would then carry some significance.

Such a practice has become unfashionable. The planners no longer seem to pay any attention to the debt ceiling. They go ahead with spending plans--with approval of Congress--and then figure the ceiling will be raised to take care of the deficit.

I voted against the raise last week. If Congress would block this spending trend by refusing to raise the ceiling, then we would see some real retrenchment in federal non-defense spending.

Senator Barry Goldwater didn't lose any friends in the House last week when, in a press conference, he took a poke at the Senate and had something nice to say about the House! The Senate, he said, has become "irresponsible--you can get anything through the Senate". He went on to say that the House of Representatives has become "the responsible organ".

Records Necessary for Social Security

Floyd B. Ellington, district manager, San Angelo social security office, today urged farmers to make a special effort to keep good reliable records of their farm income and expenses.

The earnings credited to the social security accounts of farm and ranch operators are taken from their income tax reports. Ellington said, specifically, from Schedule F of Form 1040. The schedule lists the gross income and itemized expenses.

Social security benefits, payable retirement, death, or in case of disability, are based on the earnings credited to each person's social security account, the manager explained.

Accurate records are needed to make sure the farmer or rancher gets proper credit for his earnings and gets his correct benefit amount, Ellington said, also to simplify and speed up processing of applications for benefits.

He advised farmers to keep records of income and expenses as they are incurred throughout the year rather than risk an inaccurate statement when the year is over.
