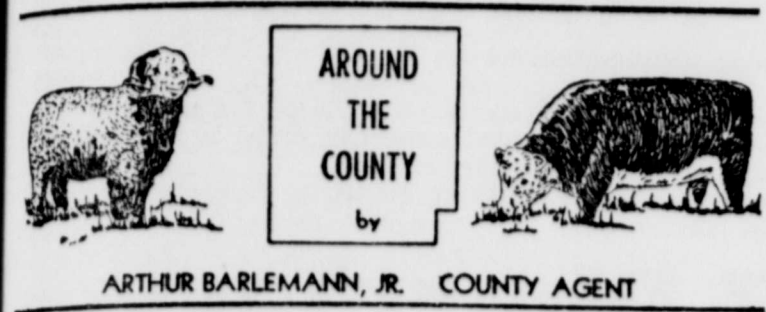

D.P.S. Needs Patrolmen

Major Leo E. Gossett, Commander of the sprawling West Texas Region of the Texas Department of Public Safety announced today the Texas DPS is now accepting applications from young men who are interested in becoming patrolmen with the four field services of the Department. Vacancies now exist in the License and Weight Service, Driver License Service and Highway Patrol Service.

"The last session of the Texas Legislature authorized beginning salaries ranging from \$441.00 - \$453.00 per month, plus other job benefits," Gossett said. Young men between 21 and 35 years of age who can meet the basic qualifications are urged to contact the nearest DPS Office for further information and application forms.

Basic qualifications for applicants are: He must be between 21 and 35 years of age, sound physically, high school education, residents of Texas for at least one year immediately prior to submission of application, of good moral character, and willing to accept assignment anywhere in Texas.

Upon successful completion of the entrance examination process, recruits are given 16 weeks of intensive training at the Department's Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, after which the successful recruit emerges a commissioned officer in top-flight mental and physical condition.

Local Coaches and Players to Coaching School

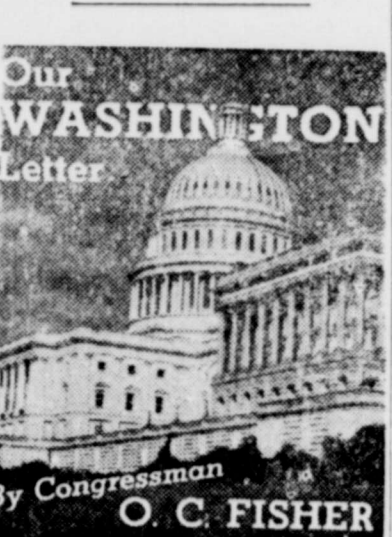

Oil Test Being Completed

HMH Operator, Midland No. I, Ross Foster, in 24-22-H & TC, indicated 3/4-mile north-east extension to Clearfork production in the Parochial Bade multipay field of Sterling County, eight miles west of Sterling City, is continuing to test through casing notch at 2,081 feet.



Another questionnaire has been sent to voters in the 21st district. This one covers some of the more pressing issues of the day. The results should reflect a fairly accurate cross section of public opinion in our area.

This is the best way -- and the only way -- I know of our gauging the composite thinking of my constituents on the subjects covered. The success of the efforts depends, of course, upon the extent of cooperation of the people who are willing to express themselves.

Polls like this are becoming increasingly popular in Congress. There have been about 50 samplings taken by Congressmen this year. This practice has attracted considerable attention, and is being recognized as a fairly accurate barometer or public opinion.

This sampling technique was initiated by me on Capitol Hill some ten years ago, and the idea has caught on. In the areas covered it is admittedly more accurate than the Gallup Poll. The results are known to be analyzed at the White House and by political partisans as a way of learning how the public is reacting to programs that are being advanced.

When returns are complete, they will be tabulated and the results published in the Congressional Record. Because so much interest is being shown these days in what is going on in Washington, this seems to be a particularly good time to invite all the people to express themselves.

The U.S. submarine fleet is steadily growing. Equipped with Polaris missiles that are fired from submerged positions, this technique is becoming a vital factor in our overall defense build-up. It is becoming one of our most powerful deterrents.

In a letter to me, from "At Sea, Gulf of Mexico, 16 July, 1963", Adm. H.G. Rickover informs me the USS BARB, our 18th attack submarine has just completed all tests.

"In addition to the 18 attack nuclear subs", the Admiral added, "we also have 13 Polaris type submarines in operation. When all nuclear submarines... are completed, the U.S. will have 41 Polaris and 47 attack submarines."

HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS FROM THE AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

Whether it's the heat or the humidity or both, it's hot in most of the United States in July. In some places it's hotter than others, but it's still hot.

After a month or so of sweating and steaming, it's not uncommon to find the heat is beginning to wear you down.

There's nothing you can do about the outside temperature. Unless you're fortunate enough to have air conditioning in your office or shop, home and auto, there's nothing much you can do about it inside either.

But there are some things you can do to be more comfortable -- things that can help you beat the heat. Stay out of the sun as much as possible, especially during the middle of the day when rays are hottest. Wear light, loose clothing, the less the better. The ladies have an edge over the men in this respect. Drink more liquids than usual, but take extra salt on your physician's advice, particularly if you have liver or kidney trouble or a heart condition.

Take a shower or a dip in the pool once or twice a day to cool off. Get plenty of rest and sleep. Eat your regular diet and don't go overboard on cold cuts, and salads, unless you like them anyway.

Get up early in the morning to do your heavy work on the lawn or garden. Or work at dusk in the evening, but try to avoid heavy exertion during the hottest hours of the day.

You need exercise in the summer as well as in the winter, but don't overdo it, especially on extra hot days. Don't overdo physical exertion, whether at work or play. The more relaxed outdoor life of the summer months has many advantages to compensate for the heat. Stay relaxed and use common sense, and you can beat the heat -- at least somewhat.

Social Security Tips

Has disability robbed you of your earnings capacity? If so, you should check with your social security office, according to Floyd B. Ellington, district manager in San Angelo. Monthly benefits can be paid at any age to working people who have become unable to work by reason of a severe disability that is expected to last for a long time. Benefits begin with the seventh month of disability, but an application may be made before that time. To be eligible, the disabled worker must have social security for at least 5 years' work in the ten year period before he became disabled.

When you make your application the social security office will assist you in securing the medical evidence necessary. When this evidence has been obtained, along with other facts, a decision will be made as to whether your condition is severe enough to qualify you as "disabled" under the terms of the law.

If you think you meet the requirements or know of anyone who may be eligible, get in touch with the social security office in San Angelo as soon as possible. Delay may result in a loss of benefits.

SOCIAL SECURITY

Many people are not aware they don't have to retire completely to receive social security benefits according to Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager.

Ellington stated that special provisions in the social security law make it possible to receive some social security benefits even though a person may have fairly high earnings. He explained that a person can earn \$1200 during the year and receive all of his benefits. And just \$1 in benefits is withheld for every \$2 earned between \$1200 and \$1700. For earnings over \$1700, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$1 earned.

Ellington pointed out that a full month's benefits is payable for any month in which the beneficiary does not earn over \$100 in wages and does not actively engage in self-employment.

Ellington urged all workers to visit the social security office when they near retirement age to learn more about their benefit rights. The office is located at 204 Continental Bldg., San Angelo, Texas.

If you are a social security beneficiary who earned over \$1200 from employment or self-employment in 1962, and you were under the age of 72 in any part of the year, you must file a report of your earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1963. Failure to report may result in a loss of benefits.

This was announced today by Floyd B. Ellington, Manager of the San Angelo Social Security District Office. Mr. Ellington further explained that an estimate of your 1963 earnings will also be required.

This report will enable the Social Security Administration to determine:

(1) Whether you received all benefits payable for 1962. If not, you will receive the additional benefits due for last year.

(2) If you were paid more benefits in 1962 than were due. If so, you will be required to refund the amount of the overpayment.

(3) Whether any of your benefit checks for 1963 should be withheld. This will be determined on the basis of your estimate earnings for the year.

Mr. Ellington noted that beneficiaries who received no benefits in 1962 are not required to file the report. However, they are encouraged to do so as they may be entitled to receive some benefits for the year even though their total yearly earnings greatly exceeded the \$1200. Benefits can be paid to a beneficiary for any month in which he did not earn over \$100 as an employee and did not render substantial services in self-employment.

The other day some neighbors of ours came home from a camping trip with a tiny fawn their 16-year-old son had discovered "lost" in the woods — and my boy Mike was furious about it! Mike knows full well that baby animals don't often get lost. They're usually left alone only temporarily, while the "grown-ups" are feeding or resting close by. Well, Mike tried to convince the older boy that he'd made a mistake, but it took a conference between my husband Joe and the boy's father to settle

the situation. Joe pointed out that the fawn hadn't really been lost, and also that when a deer begins to mature, it will very often turn on people quite savagely for no apparent reason. Finally they agreed to keep the fawn until it's big enough to stand some chance of survival, and then set it free in the woods again. Remember to caution your youngsters not to even touch infant wild animals — their mothers will abandon them if they carry human scent. Tell them the kindest way is to leave them in the woods!

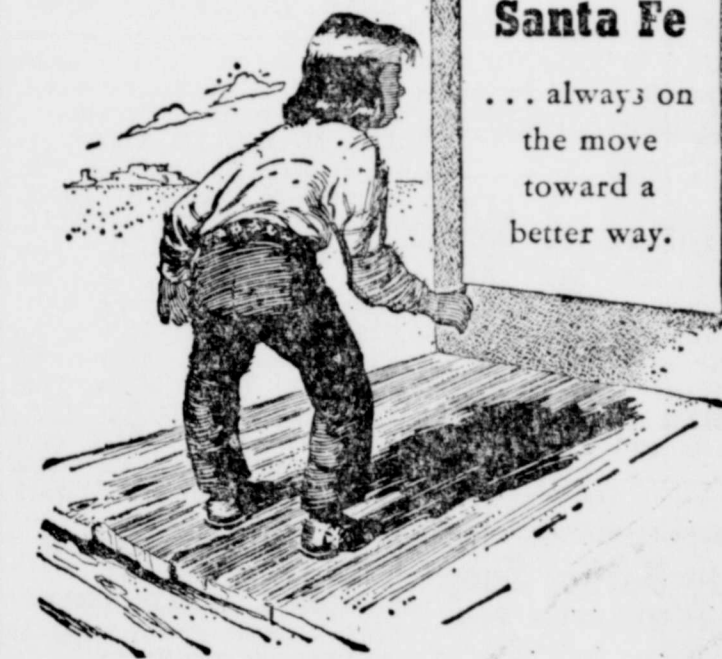

EXECUTIVE PRIVILEGE

The U.S. Constitution sets up three separate branches of our government, each with special powers. Actually each branch works closely together with each other.

But sometimes the executive branch has facts or papers which Congress or the courts would like to have. Suppose the executive refuses this information to the other branch. Can the courts make it give this evidence?

For generations arguments have gone over the extent of "executive privilege." Even President Washington refused the Senate information from his cabinet about negotiations for treaties. President Washington said that disclosure would hurt the public interest. Aaron Burr tried to compel President Jefferson to produce papers and testify about government affairs. Jefferson first refused but later cooperated in part with the court to avoid a conflict.

Since then, the courts have protected the executive from prying into the workings of the executive branch. The president seems to have almost unlimited powers to say what might be inimical to the public if disclosed although some have criticized the overuse of the rule.

In an anti-trust suit, the government refused to give the defendant reports it held, though he needed them to defend himself. In another case the government did not give a landowner copies it had of appraisals though it was his land that was being condemned. In other suits the government has refused to show copies of contracts, instructions to officials, or other government reports, needed in law suits.

More recently, the courts have liberally allowed "discovery" of facts from the government. If the government from proceeding with its case unless it give the facts to the other side.

Government information subpoenaed by a court is difficult to enforce. The court must fine or jail the official for his disobedience. Courts hesitate to do this if the official genuinely believes that the information is privileged which the court cannot determine until the court sees it. This could destroy a legitimate claim of privilege because the judge has to review it and decide.

The executive has said that privilege will not be used to cover up mistakes or to promote political or personal gain. To get a fair trial and promote justice in a lawsuit, full information may be necessary. Yet full disclosure may be against public interest. The courts and the executive have tried to balance the interest of the government and the litigant.
