

Oil Well Plugged

J. C. Williamson and Southern Minerals Corp. No. 1 Atkinson, a wildcat deep test well of Sterling City was plugged and abandoned last Friday before noon. The test well made oil and salt water tests at a depth of 8,500-70 feet, but the operators plugged the hole and pulled out, evidently assuming that there was not enough pay to justify further treatment.

The test was on the Frank Atkinson estate ranch, where Dayton Barrett ranches under lease.

ELMER KELTON EDITOR OF TSGRA MAGAZINE

The Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association has appointed Elmer Kelton as editor of the Sheep and Goat Raisers, The Ranchman's Magazine, published in San Angelo. Announcement came from James L. Powell of Fort McKavett, president of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association.

Kelton has been with the San Angelo Standard-Times 15 years, most of that time as agriculture editor.

The association has bought the magazine from H.M. Phillips, its editor and publisher since 1930. Though under individual ownership, the magazine has been official publication of the Association since its first issue in 1920. Association headquarters are in San Angelo.

Kelton has won numerous Associated Press awards for news articles he did for the Standard-Times, including a first place in spot news last year for an article about the Attorney General's special Pecos hearing on the Billie Sol Estes case.

A novelist, he has published eight western and historical novels. One of these, entitled "Buffalo Wagons," was named best Western novel of the year in 1957 and given the Western Writers of America Spur award. Kelton later became an officer of WWA and is its immediate past president.

His latest novel, "Horsehead Crossing," is still current on paperback book stands. Another, "Shadow of a Star," published in 1959, is due for reissue this fall.

Kelton has written numerous articles for regional and national farm and ranch publications.

Kelton is a native of Crane, Texas, where his father, Buck Kelton, is manager of McElroy Ranch Co. A journalism graduate of the University of Texas, he is an infantry veteran of the European Theater of Operations in World War II.

The auction sale for premium market animals will be held Saturday, October 19 at the fair.

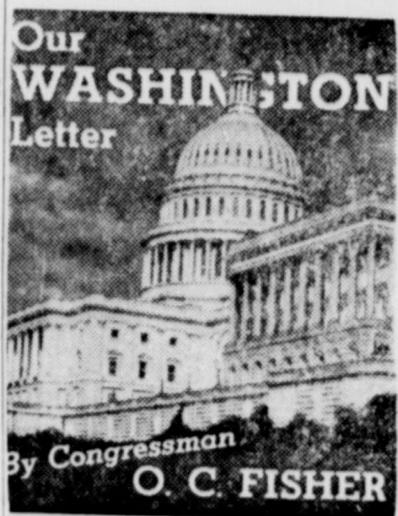

Like the fair maiden who had to choose between two suitors, the Administration last week chose Civil Rights ahead of Tax cuts, in a popularity contest on priorities.

Civil Rights, Senate whip Hubert Humphrey announced, is simply too hot to be acted upon in Congress during an election year just when people are getting ready to vote.

But tax cuts, it was reasoned, would be quite palatable in the Spring, just before tax-paying time.

Humphrey's announcement, following a White House conference, made it apparent the Administration does not consider the tax bill so important after all.

The decision probably didn't matter much, except for appeasement purposes (in response to NAACP's demands), since Senator Harry Byrd, chairman of the Senate committee that will handle the tax bill, has indicated he will take his own time in giving the tax measure a good going over. And that can hardly be completed before the end of the year.

And by January, Byrd's committee will be better able to judge how far the Congress is willing to go in reduced spending. The record for this session will have been finished. The tax cut bill, which some of us opposed because we were not convinced the promised retrenchments in spending would take place, was approved in the House only after glittering promises were made that "unnecessary Government activity" would be cut out, with immense savings. But not a single specific cut-back in nonessential projects was identified.

In September, the House had to be content with promises; in January, the Senate can look at performance.

Everyone agrees that taxes are too high. But sponsors of a tax cut at this time also agree that a chaotic fiscal situation will result unless there is also a genuine program of reduction in spending. There is the matter of an estimated \$10 billion deficit during the current year, not taking into account the loss of revenue if the \$11-billion tax cut passes the Senate.

And, along with that, there is now pending in the Congress measures calling for new and expanded spending programs, amounting to around \$7 billion. There is no question but that all or most of this could be sidetracked, if retrenchment promises are honored. It remains to be seen.

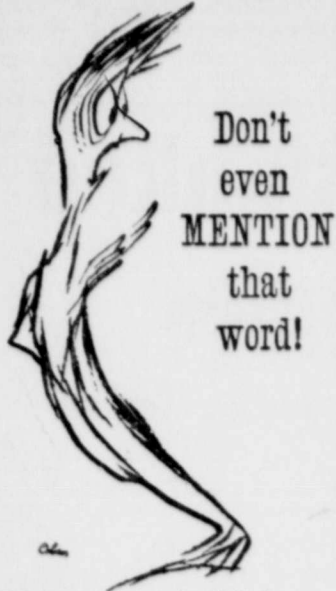

Come for Coffee and Dessert

HERE'S a light and delicate dessert, just right for a candle-light coffee party. You'll find this dreamy Bavarian easy to prepare with fruit flavor gelatin, whipped topping mix, and frozen raspberries. Once you've tried it, you will want to try different flavor and fruit variations.

Raspberry Bavarian Mold
1 package (3 ounces) orange flavor gelatin; 1/4 cup sugar; pinch of salt; 1 cup boiling water; 1/2 cup cold water; 1 package (10 ounces) frozen red raspberries, partially thawed; 1 envelope whipped topping mix; 16 ladyfingers.

Dissolve gelatin, sugar, and salt in boiling water. Stir in cold water and raspberries until berries separate. Chill until slightly thickened.

Prepare whipped topping mix according to package directions, increasing vanilla to 1 teaspoon. Thoroughly blend 1 1/2 cups whipped topping into gelatin. Line a 1 1/2 quart mold with ladyfingers. Pour gelatin mixture into mold. Chill until firm. To serve, unmold and garnish with remaining whipped topping. Makes 6 to 8 servings.



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For Social Security

A new concept in social security was described today as "partial retirement payments" by Floyd B. Ellington, Social Security Administration district manager at San Angelo. Mr. Ellington stated that a large number of persons in the district are getting some retirement benefits even though they are working and earning more than \$1200 per year. He also estimated that 600 more persons in the district could be receiving from one to eleven months' benefits per year by filing an application.

Ellington went on to explain that earnings of \$1200 per year is no longer an absolute level beyond which all social security benefits are cut off. Instead, \$1200 is the point at which all social security benefits begin to be adjusted due to excess earnings. "The actual point of earnings at which all benefits are cut off varies with the total yearly benefits due the family," Ellington said. He urged that all workers past retirement age check with the social security office at San Angelo for an individual analysis of their status.

"Don't delay - check today," Ellington emphasized. Benefits are retroactive for only 12 months before the month of filing an application, and applications filed now will allow us to consider paying back benefits for a whole year."

Many people are not aware they don't have to retire completely to receive social security benefits according to Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager.

Ellington stated that special provisions in the social security law make it possible to receive some social security benefits even though a person may have fairly high earnings. He explained that a person can earn \$1200 during the year and receive all of his benefits. And just \$1 in benefits is withheld for every \$2 earned between \$1200 and \$1700. For earnings over \$1700, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$1 earned.

Ellington pointed out that a

full month's benefits is payable for any month in which the beneficiary does not earn over \$100 in wages and does not actively engage in self-employment.

Ellington urged all workers to visit the social security office when they near retirement age to learn more about their benefit rights. The office is located at 204 Continental Bldg., San Angelo, Texas.

Has disability robbed you of your earnings capacity? If so, you should check with your social security office, according to Floyd B. Ellington, district manager in San Angelo. Monthly benefits can be paid at any age to working people who have become unable to work by reason of a severe disability that is expected to last for a long time. Benefits begin with the seventh month of disability, but an application may be made before that time. To be eligible, the disabled worker must have social security for at least 5 years' work in the ten year period before he became disabled.

When you make your application, the social security office will assist you in securing the medical evidence necessary. When this evidence has been obtained, along with other facts, a decision will be made as to whether your condition is severe enough to qualify you as "disabled" under the terms of the law.

If you think you meet the requirements or know of anyone who may be eligible, get in touch with the social security office in San Angelo as soon as possible. Delay may result in a loss of benefits.

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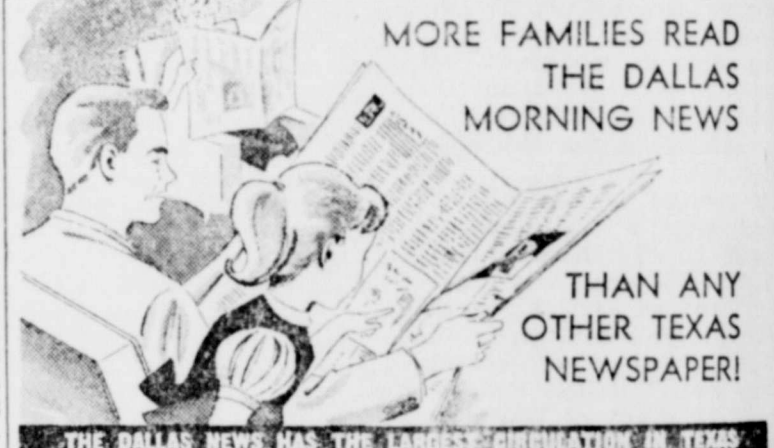

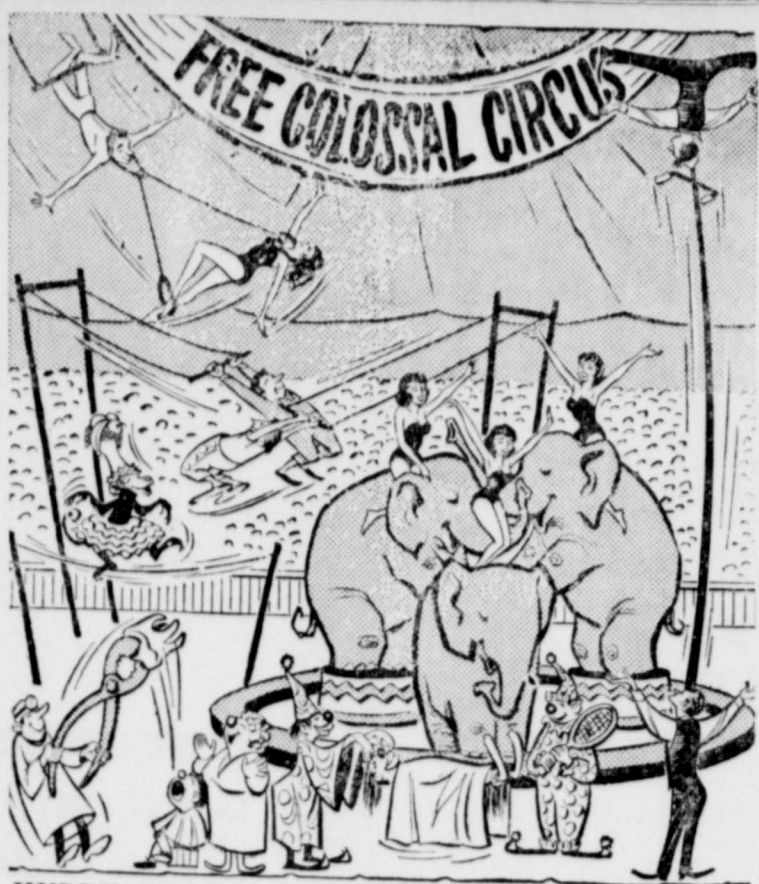
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REWARD NOTICE
