Imperial Tops Eagles in Season's Final

The Imperial Longhorns lucked through to a 34-32 win over the Sterling City Eagles in the final game of the season last Friday night at the Longhorn field.

The game was tied 14-14 at halftime and the score was close all through the game. Injuries plagued the locals and the Longhorns with a large squad just wore down the Eagles to win the finale.

Bill Foster, Eagle back, made the first Sterling touchdown in the first quarter and repeated in the second. In the meantime, U.S. Customs examiners are being instructed to submit samples to the Customs lab whenever they believe the products have been misrepresented. Because of the complexity of the content test only a limited number of tests can be handled with existing customs lab facilities.

In any event, the result of the mislabeling exposure is having a salutatory effect. Importers can be expected to expect to exercise much more care and caution in the future to avoid the penalties that can be applied to mislabeling practices. Mohair growers and manufacturers in this country are determined to protect the reputation of mohair products against the downgrading of the mohair fiber by having its content misrepresented. Laws to protect against this are adequate. The problem is to get those laws applied and enforced.

BOB CLEMMONS BUYS COL TEX TRUCK STOP

Bob Clemmons has bought the Col-Tex Truck Stop here from D. J. Norton and began operating it last Friday, Jan. 15. The cafe part of the truck stop is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Julius Bade.

Norton has operated the Col-Tex Truck Stop for the past few years, and the building is owned by Tommie Gage Oil Co. of Big Spring.

Danny Bailey went out of the game early with a hurt shoulder. Ailments and injuries kept Speedy Sparks, Crisp Williams and other Eagles from performing at their best.

Coach Dillard's boys went through the season with games against larger squads, veteran players and still gave an account of themselves in each one. With the loss of only two seniors, Danny Bailey and Billy Beaur, next season promises well for the Sterling boys.

Good Rains Fall

TWOPAY OIL TEST COMPLETED

A discovery was completed in Sterling this week and a re-entry was slated.

The Triple M (multipay Wolfcamp) field of northwest Sterling County gained a new and higher Wolfcamp pay and a second upper Wolfcamp producer and 5-8-mile southeast extension to that pay with dual completion of F.E. Shaheen & Sons, Abilene, No. 1 65 Sellers, 20 miles northwest of Sterling City.

It was finaled from the higher producing section for a daily flowing potential of 264 barrels of oil, gravity and gas oil ratio unreported, through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations between 6,309-20 feet which had been acidized with 20,000 gallons.

From the upper Wolfcamp, it was finaled for a daily flowing potential of 240 barrels of oil, gravity and gas-oil ratio unreported, through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 6,689-702 feet, which had been acidized with 20,000 gallons.

Location is 660 feet from the north and 2,055 feet from the west lines of 65-17-SPRR.

The dual upper Wolfcamp discovery, and Wolfcamp extender, the same operators No. 1 Nellie P. Sellers, was finaled July 9 from the upper Wolfcamp for 243 barrels of oil, and gas-oil ratio of 430-1, through a 32-64-inch choke and perforations between 6,710-792 feet; and June 21 from the Wolfcamp for 284 barrels of 40 gravity oil, through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 6,868-88 feet.

The field has four Wolfcamp producers.

American Petrofina of Texas, Big Spring, will drill the No. 1 Nellie P. Sellers as a 3-8-mile northeast offset to the dual upper Wolfcamp opener and Wolfcamp extender, 1,980 feet from the south and west lines of 62-17-SPRR. Contract depth is 7,500 feet.

W.A. Moncrief, Fort Worth, will re-enter and clean out to 8,500 feet for completion attempt in the Fusselman at a Sterling County 8,711-foot Ellenburger wildcat failure, 10 miles southwest of Sterling City. It is the No. 1 R.T. Foster.

Originally drilled by Pan American Petroleum Corp., it was abandoned Dec. 20, 1952. Location is 2,22 feet from the west and 467 feet from the south lines of 17-13-SPRR.

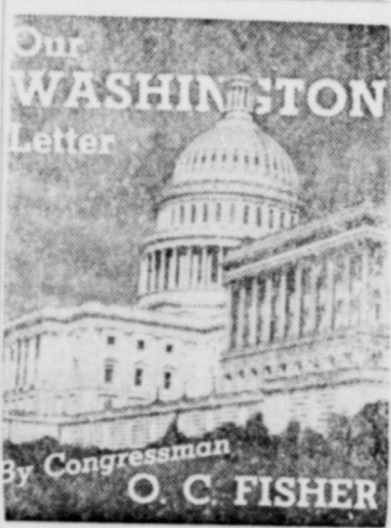

The U. S. Customs Bureau has confirmed "a substantial overstatement of the mohair content" of imported Italian sweaters, and is coordinating its action in this area with the Federal Trade Commission to deal with the sweater mislabeling problem effectively and quickly.

This development last week followed tests conducted by Customs in its own test laboratory. FTC has about completed its tests, and is expected to make an announcement of its findings.

I recently cited ten retail stores that were selling imported Italian sweaters where private tests indicated the mohair content of the garments were mislabeled. The tests showed substantially less mohair than the labels stated.

The one million sweaters brought in from Italy whose mohair content have been questioned have long since moved into retail channels. But the exposure has caused the importing retailers to re-examine their practices and seek to avoid a repetition of mislabeled garments.

For example, a report from Florence, Italy, states that Macy's Italian office said all labels will be changed for next deliveries.

The rains on Monday night of this week were general over

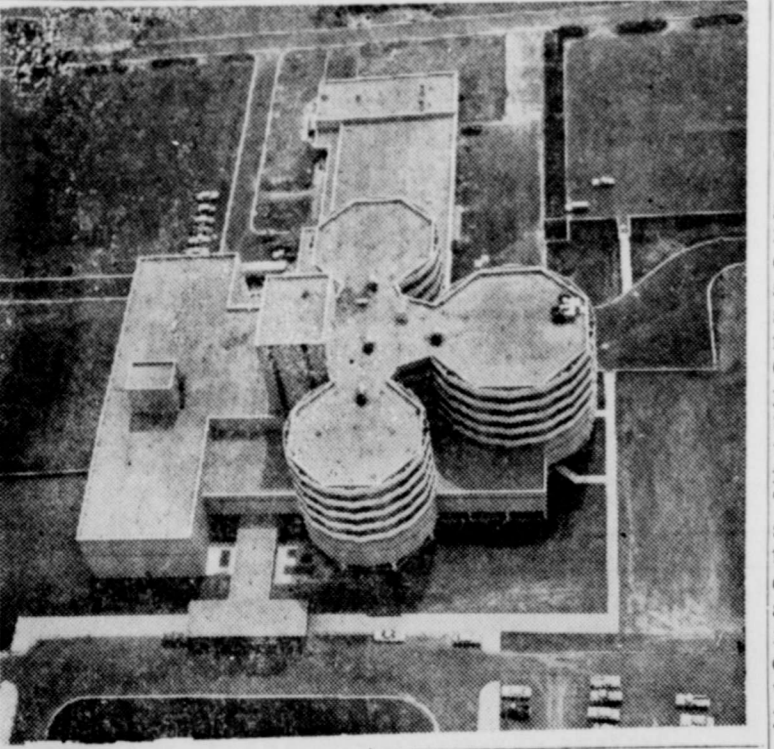
the county. Amounts varied from one inch to two inches with the majority in the inch and a quarter and inch and a half bracket.

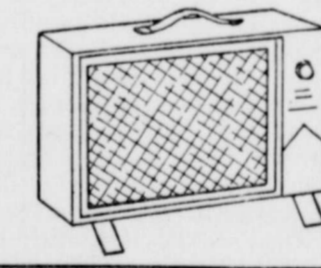



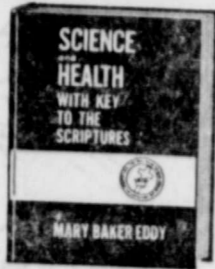

Social Security

"Area residents should file their social security claims before they retire in order to insure prompt payment of benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo, said today. Many people of retirement age do not get their first social security checks as early as they might, simply because they waited too long to apply for their benefits, Ellington pointed out.

Applications may be filed any time within three months of when a person wants benefits to start. Since the average processing time of a claim is 4 weeks, Ellington advised people to take advantage of this early filing and submit their applications as soon as possible.

Many claims are delayed because the applicants do not have the necessary information or papers to establish their eligibility for benefits, he said. These delays could be avoided if people would get in touch with social security office ahead of time to find out what they should bring with them when they apply for benefits.

Ellington stated that a short visit or phone call to the social security office before the time of filing can significantly speed up the processing time of the application.

SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES

Floyd B. Ellington of the San Angelo social security district office said today that applying for your social security benefits two or three months before you retire is a good step to take. Retirement from many years of working involves a great many details to be attended to at the last minute. It's best not to leave social security till then. Mr. Ellington said that his office can help speed your first check if you apply a little ahead of time.

Applying early means you will get your social security benefit check soon after you retire. Your benefit will arrive when you need income most—after the familiar pay check has stopped.

Several months before you retire, you should call the social security office at 653-6861 to see what proofs to bring with you when you go in to

apply for your benefits. You may be asked to bring proof of your age, proof of marriage or your last tax return or a W-2 form showing your wages. The social security office can tell you what you will need. Details peculiar to your particular case can be discussed and decided.

Even if you are not retiring Mr. Ellington said that his office would like to send you a pamphlet explaining the highlights of social security. If you are at least 62, it is extremely important to know about reduced benefits payable at that age. There is a good deal to know about social security options that might apply to your own situation. At age 65, benefits can be paid in full if you earn less than \$1200 a year. And even if you earn considerably more than \$1200 a year, some benefits may be payable.

Don't delay. Phone or go into the social security office at 204 Continental Building, San Angelo, Texas before you retire. They'll be able to answer a lot of questions for you. "Am I entitled to benefits? How Much? What about My Wife and Children?" These are only a few of the matters they can clear up for you. They'll make sure you don't lose any benefits to which you are entitled.

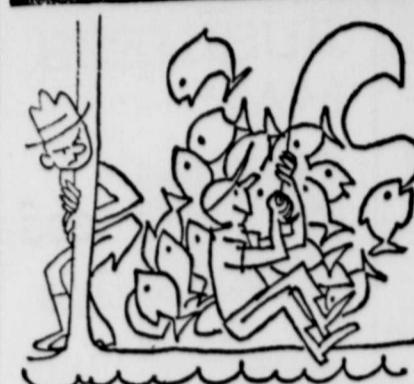
