The referendum on Cotton Marketng Quotas for the 1964 Upland Crop will be conducted Tuesday, December 10, 1963, between hours of 8:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M. at the AS CS office located in the Sterling County courthouse.

This will mark the eleventh consecutive year in which growers have voted on marketing quotas for their upland cotton crop.

### March of Dimes Aid Frees Joan To Devote Selt to Helping Others

For 13 years, Joan Keeler has been jousting with a formidable antagonist.

Sometimes this attractive young woman, who lives and follows her profession of occupational therapy in Summit, N. J., makes some headway and seems to be winning. Then in a counteroffensive, her old foe will deliver a succession of

The old foe, the formidable antagonist, is rheumatoid arthritis. Arthritis tortures, cripples and deforms more people in the United States than any other disorder.

Emphasizing that she neither wants nor needs anyone's sympathy, Joan agreed to tell something about her encounters with this excruciating disease since her teens. She spoke during one of her monthly visits to the March of Dimes-financed Arthritis Center at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center, New York City.

At the age of 17, Joan could look forward to what should be a reasonably happy life. She

be a reasonably happy life. She was attractive, athletic and a good student.

Then without warning, Joan says, "the roof of my little dream house caved in."

First, there were unaccountcause pain wracked her body. Next, fever and loss of weight. Diagnosis of rheumatoid arthritis, never simple to make, was even more difficult 13 years ago. Specialists shook their heads in puzzlement over which disease had robbed this young woman of perfect health.

Floyd B. Ellington of the San Angelo social security district office said today that applying for your social security benefits two or three months before you retire is a good step to take. Retirement from many years of working involves a grat many details to be attended to at the last minute. It's best not to leave social security till then. Mr. Ellington said that his office can help speed your first check if you apply a little ahead of stout

etire. Your benefit will arrive when you need income most-after the familiar pay check has stopped.

Several months before you retire, you should call the social security office at 653-6861 see what proofs to bring with you when you go in to apply for your benefits. You may be asked to bring proof of your age, proof of marriage or your last tax return or a W-2 form showing your wages. The social security office can tell you what you will need. Details peculiar to your particular case can be discussed and decided.

Even if you are not retiring Mr. Ellington said that his office would like to send you a pamphlet explaining the highlights of social security. If you are at least 62, it is extremely important to know about reduced benefits payable at that age. There is a good deal to know about social scurity options that might apply to your own situation. At age 65, benefits can be paid in full if you earn less than \$1200 a year. And even if you earn considerably more Main to Houston at 4th St. than \$1200 a year, some benefits may be payable.

Don't delay. Phone or go into the social security office at 204 Continental Building, San Angelo, Texas before you retire. They'll be able to answer a lot of questions for you. "Am I entitled to benefits? How Much? What about My Wife and Children?"These are only a few of the matters they can clear up for you. They'll make sure you don't lose any benefits to which you are entitled.



When two or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted, will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If, upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. All devisions concerning the payment of such reward and the conditions of payment will be made by the Board of Directors of the Association.
