AROUND THE COUNTY

The two 4-H Club members exhibiting in the Houston Livestock Show junior division last week did very well as representatives of Sterling County. Competing at Houston were Janis Igo and Gary Foster.

Janis showed the tenth place fine-crossbred lamb. Her lamb was bred by William and J. Q. Foster. It sold in the auction ring sale on Thursday afternoon for sixty cents per pound.

Gary Foster showed a seventeenth place Southdown lamb. Breeders of his lamb were Mike, Gary and Pat Foster. It sold for forty-five cents per pound in the auction.

Janis also showed her Rambouillet in Houston. Her yearling ram placed third; one of her yearling ewes placed fourth.

Sterling County 4-H Club members are busy exhibiting and competing in the San Angelo Fat Stock Show this week. A total of twenty different club members are showing twenty head of market lambs, four groups of range ewe lambs, eight Rambouillets and three quarterhorses in the junior show.

In addition to the club members, a number of FFA boys and several adults are exhibiting in the San Angelo show. The show will end on Sunday when the livestock will be released at 3 p.m. Sale of fat lambs and steers will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday morning.

Several persons have asked if the rain of ten days ago might have destroyed the effectiveness of the oil emulsion spray applied to their pecan trees for the control of scale. Generally, it is felt that if the spray has been on the trees as long as 72 hours, the maximum benefit has been derived from it. If on the trees for as long as 48 hours, the effect will not be as good, of course. Less than 36 hours will show little benefit.

It is still not too late to spray with an oil emulsion for the control of scale. If your trees are affected with this pest, I would say spray them yet this year. From what I have seen of the majority of the trees around town, the buds are not sufficiently developed for the oil to injure them. But I would spray them as soon as possible as warm weather will cause the buds to swell and then injury could

occur from the use of the oil. The oil burns the tender young buds and will result in a short leaf crop and nut crop also.

As far as is known, Sterling County has completed testing for reaccreditation under the brucellosis program. Our certificate expires on March 14 of this year. The required number of herds have been tested in the county; all the herds which had the reactors or suspects in 1961 have also been tested and passed this time.

We have received no notice that there are herds to be tested. In view of this, we feel that testing is completed since only one herd has been checked so we should receive our certificate for another 3 years.

Gun Club To Be Organized Here

Fourteen gun enthusiasts met March 3 in the community center and discussed starting a gun club here. Due to the San Angelo stock show and the American Legion post meeting, it was decided to hold a second meeting here on March 17 at 7:30 p.m. in the center to form the club; elect the officers and set the dues, etc.

Trap and skeet shooting (for shot guns) was talked at the Tuesday night meeting. Next meeting bench rest rifle shoot will be discussed. Ladies and teen agers are invited to attend and to join the club.

Any and all shooting will be supervised. Gun safety will be the number one interest.

Two possible sites have been picked and it will be in order to choose a site at the March 17 meeting.

M. E. Churchill Buried Saturday

Funeral services for Marvin E. Churchill, 70, were held here last Saturday afternoon in the Methodist church. Burial followed in the Foster Cemetery with Lowe Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Churchill died about 11 p.m. Thursday night following a heart attack in his home.

He was born in Voca April 3, 1893 and had lived here since 1906. He had been the Gulf Oil consignee here since 1934. A veteran of World War I, Mr. Churchill had always been active in the local Legion Post; he was a member of the Lions Club; had been a steward of the First Methodist Church for 30 years and was fervent sports fan of all sports.

The services were conducted by Stan Horwood, due to the illness of the Methodist pastor, the Rev. Leo Ross.

New Oil Discovery for Sterling

Completion as a Clear Fork oil discovery was effected at L.E. Foster, Midland, No. 1 Glass, section 1, block 32, T-5-S, T&P Survey, 16 miles west of Sterling City, one location southeast of the Fool's Creek, 1,500 foot Queen sand pool and one mile west of the nearest Clear Fork production in the Herrell multipay pool of Sterling County.

It pumped 36 barrels of 32.4 gravity oil and no water thru perforations at 2,531 to 2,533 feet, after treatment with 500 gallons of acid. The well is separated from the Herrell pool by a 2,502 dry hole.

LIONS CLUB

The Sterling City Lions Club met Wednesday noon in the community center for the regular weekly luncheon. Six guests were present being Don Killone, George Skeete, Chas. WTU To Reduce Rates

Passing on the Tax Reduction

Savings resulting from the reduction in Federal income taxes will be passed on to West Texas Utilities customers according to plans for systematic rate reductions announced today. These reductions in rates will save customers about \$1 million annually, approximately 2.8% at this time. Savings will be even greater as electric sales grow.

Wayne Loury, WTU local manager, announced that the company plans to pass on the full benefits of the tax reduction which it will receive under the new tax law. Under the new tax law the income tax on corporations will be reduced in two steps of 2% each. The corporate income tax will go from 52% to 50% in 1964 and from 50% to 48% in 1965.

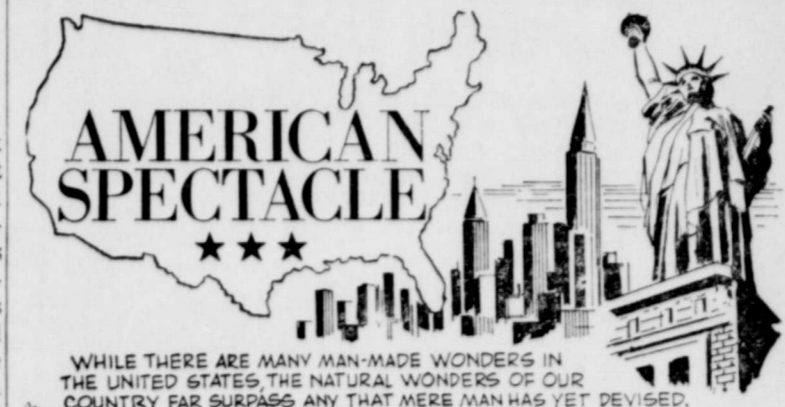
"We are giving customers the benefit of both the tax reduction already established for 1964 and the tax reduction scheduled for 1965," Cal Young, WTU president said. "Passing this tax saving on to customers in the form of rate reductions will simply leave the company with the same rate of return it has been earning."

"Such system- rate reductions require extensive study. In addition, after the new rates are designed, considerable work will have to be done to adjust our IBM computer billing procedures to these new rates, Young added. We expect to have the new rates in effect by mid-summer, probably July or August. Prior to the time the rates are placed in effect, they must be approved by each incorporated city."

WTU has a unique record for any industry, one of which we are very proud, Young pointed out. WTU has never raised a rate. Through the years we have consistently reduced the cost of service as plant efficiency and improved operations, together, with increased customer usage permitted. This planned rate reduction is a continuation of that long-established policy."

Taxpayers got a break last week when the House voted down a bill, which had previously passed the Senate, to authorize \$312 million for what is known as the International Development Association. This vote was taken the very next day after the \$11.6 billion tax reduction bill was cleared.

This Association is composed of 17 nations, and has been in business for three years. Each member nation contributes money to it, and an international board then dishes out the money in the form of loans or gifts. Repayments would go into a revolving fund.

The current target is to raise \$750 million in contributions, with Uncle Sam putting up \$312 million—or 41% of the total. Loans can be made, practically interest-free, with up to 50 years for payment. Since we would have to borrow the \$312 million and start paying interest at 4%, it was estimated by the House that it is over the \$312 million.

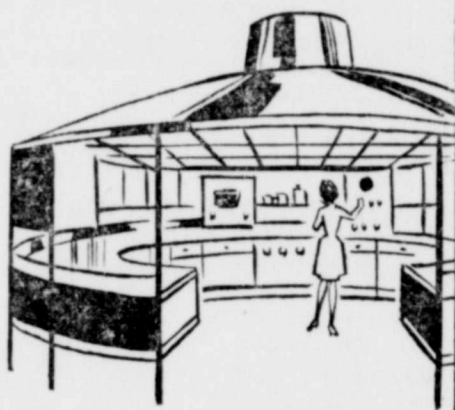

Pudding Treats

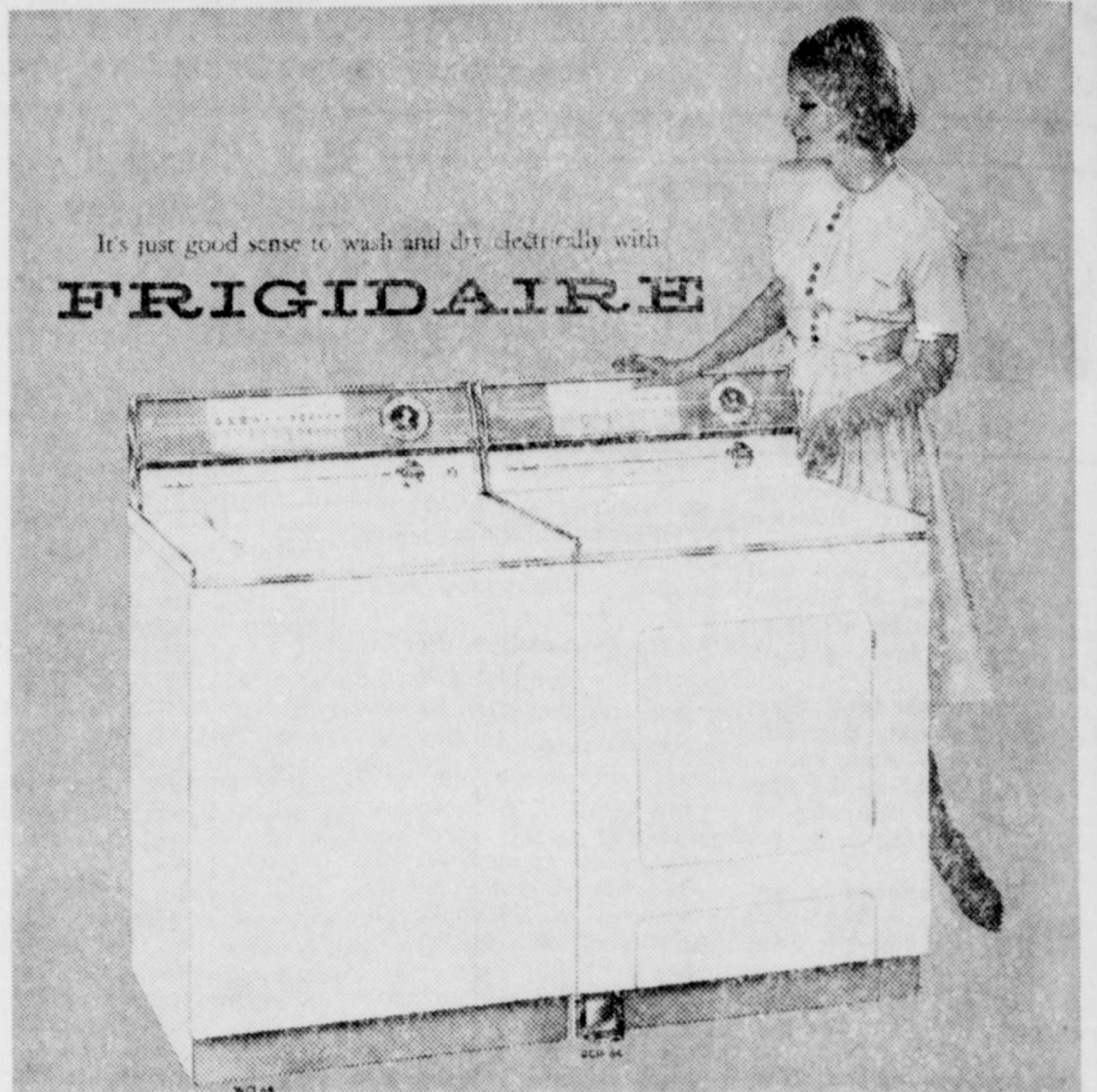

Puddin' Squares
1 package (5 ounces) vanilla pudding and pie filling; 2½ cups milk; 1 package (6 ounces) chocolate chips; 3 tablespoons butter or margarine; 1 tablespoon water; 1 cup graham cracker crumbs; ½ cup whipping cream or 1 envelope whipped topping mix.

Combine pudding mix and milk in a saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Pour into a bowl; cover surface with wax paper. Chill thoroughly, at least 2 hours.

Melt chocolate chips and butter over hot water. Add water and blend well. Stir in graham cracker crumbs; then spread mixture over the bottom of a 9-inch square pan. Beat chilled pudding until smooth. Whip cream, or prepare whipped topping mix according to package directions. Fold whipped cream or 1 cup prepared whipped topping into pudding. Pour over chocolate mixture. Chill thoroughly. Makes 12 servings.

Social Security

"Area residents should file their social security claims before they retire in order to insure prompt payment of benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo, said today. Many people of retirement age do not get their first social security checks as early as they might, simply because they waited too long to apply for their benefits, Ellington pointed out.

Applications may be filed any time within three months of when a person wants benefits to start. Since the average processing time of a claim is 4 weeks, Ellington advised people to take advantage of this early filing and submit their applications as soon as possible.

Many claims are delayed because the applicants do not have the necessary information or papers to establish their eligibility for benefits, he said. These delays could be avoided if people would get in touch with social security office ahead of time to find out what they should bring with them when they apply for benefits.

Homemaker Named**

Cecilia Ann McDonald
Cecilia Ann McDonald has been named 1964 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Sterling High School. She achieved the highest score in a written homemaking examination taken by senior girls throughout the country of Dec., and now becomes eligible for one of 102 scholarships totaling \$110,000.

Her paper has been entered with those of other school winners in the state competition for the title, State Homemaker of Tomorrow. The winner of this honor will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the annual program. The second ranking girl in the state will receive a \$500 educational grant. The school of the state winner will be awarded a complete set of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

Late in April, the first place winners from each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia, together with school advisors, will gather in Colonial Williamsburg, Va. to start an expense-paid educational tour of the East. The week-long tour, also including Washington D. C. and New York City, will culminate with the naming of the 1964 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Chosen on the basis of original test score, plus personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will have her scholarship increased to \$5,000. Grants of second, third and fourth place winners will become \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

All judging is done by Science Research Associates, Chicago, which also constructs and grades the written examination.

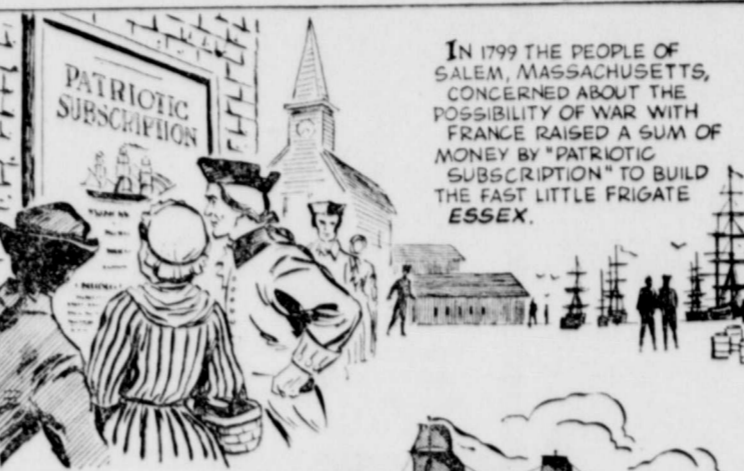

It marked its tenth anniversary this year with a record enrollment of 484,879 senior girls in 14,059 high schools. Total enrollment since the program's start stands at 3 1/2 million girls, and with this year's grants, scholarships will exceed \$1 million.

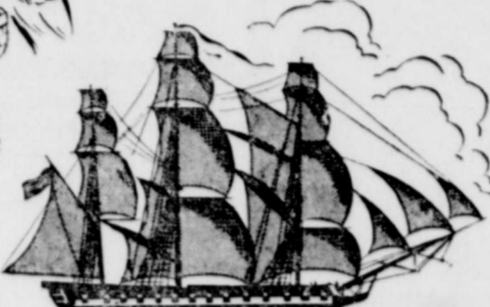
