AROUND THE COUNTY

Sterling County 4-H Club members exhibiting in the San Angelo stock show last week did very well in the breeding sheep division and the range ewe lamb show. Five club members competing in these divisions of the show brought home \$305 in prize money.

Club members in the fat lamb show were not so lucky however. The highest placing fat lamb was the 18th place lightweight finewool 1 lamb shown by Janis Igo. This lamb did not make the auction sale on Saturday as seventeen lambs were sold in the lightweight division.

Opening the judging for the club members was the junior Quarter Horse show. Diana Cole was the only Sterling County club member competing in this show. She showed the second place aged gelding, Hawkshaw Mac. Her 1963 stud colt, Hundred Grand, was fourth in his class.

In the Rambouillet ram show on Thursday afternoon, Betty Jo Barrett showed the 12th and 14th place two-tooth rams and Janis Igo had the 31st place ram in the same class. In the Rambouillet ewe show, Betty Jo had the first place ewe lamb and the 7th and 13th place place two tooth ewes while Janis Igo had the 14th place ewe in this class. Janis also had another yearling ewe that placed in the top 35 of this class but did not receive prize money although she did get a ribbon. In the pen of three, Betty Jo had the second place in the breeder owned class and the open class as well.

Betty Jo was second high premier exhibitor in the junior Rambouillet show and received the Leonard Richardson Trophy, a large silver bowl. It will remain in her possession for one year. This trophy is donated by the Richardson family.

Our club members had four groups of range ewe lambs entered in this division of the show. All four groups of three placed in the top fifteen groups of this show; twenty-nine groups were entered and shown. Janis Igo won first in this division for the second consecutive year with a group of ewes bred by L.F. & Clinton Hodges. Frank Price placed sixth with a group bred by Foster S. Price while Allen Price placed twelfth with a group also bred by his father. Barbara and Drew Durham placed 13th with a group of their own breeding.

The commercial sale of the fat lambs on Saturday morning was very good. A total of 73 lambs were sold to Armour & Co. for \$21.80 per hundred. The sifted lambs sold on Wednesday afternoon were bought by Concho Livestock Company for \$19.85 per hundred.

The fourteen club members exhibiting fat lambs were Pat Foster, Gary Foster, Rosanne Foster, Jay Clark, Charlotte Foster, Skeete Foster, Pam McEntire, Mackey McEntire, Terry Seago, Janis Igo, Susan Mixon, Sally Mixon, Randy Mixon, and Bobby Bynum. Club members and their parents are to be congratulated on having their lambs so well fitted for this show and others as well. An adult who deserves a lot of credit for helping fit the lambs this year is Ralph Davis. Ralph helped all of the boys and girls at one time or another this year in trimming their lambs before the shows and spent a number of nights in the barn doing this. His help was greatly appreciated.

Screwworm eradication program officials are happy that there have been no confirmed cases of screwworms since December 20 when a case was

sent from Hidalgo County. A case sent in from Wilson County in January has been dropped as a true case; officials determined that all was not as represented when the case was sent to the laboratory and it has been declared in untrue case of worms for 1964. So, 1964 has been screw worm free, at least through March 5.

Oklahoma stockmen have contributed an additional \$11,000 to the program, bringing their total to \$62,000.

Officials continue to work with the Mexican Government for continued cooperation in the program. A group visited the National Cattlemen's Confederation in Mexico City in February. This visit replaced the visit scheduled for November 25 but canceled after the assassination of President Kennedy. Purpose of the visit was to pledge future cooperation in fighting animal health problems common to both countries. Among those making the visit were Mr. and Mrs. Alvie Cole.

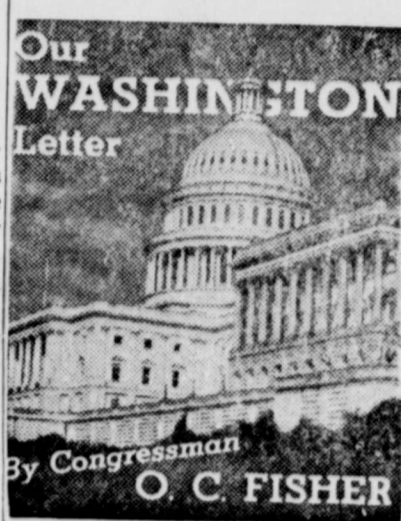
To Austin to See Basketball Finals

Our WASHINGTON Letter

A report by a task force, appointed by Secretary of Interior Udall, on Golden Eagle deprivations upon livestock in the southwest, made public last week, confirms the basis for complaint that has been lodged by a number of us during the past year. The Secretary last January announced he would not approve any application for permission for the use of aircraft in protecting livestock against this predator.

The task force, composed of five experts in the Fish and Wild Life branch of Interior, was appointed by the Secretary to study the facts in the field after Congressman Poage and I protested the Secretary's policy in a conference with him.

The Report was dated last April, but was not made public until last week, and then only after our repeated demands. The Report completely agrees with our contention—that the only effective means of fighting the eagle menace is by the use of aircraft. The Task Force spent some 10 weeks in the field, holding public hearings, observing and investigating the problem. It confirms the seriousness of the eagle deprivations on livestock, was factual and impartial.

After Secretary Udall received the report he proceeded to appoint another Task Force, composed of College Professors, which he labeled an "Advisory Commission, to make another similar investigation of predators. A report of the professors is expected momentarily, and can be expected to disagree with the findings of the first Task Force. To us it has the earmarks of a loaded committee, since some of the members of it are known by their prior statements to be opposed to the findings of the First Task Force.

The second Task Force includes no one from the livestock industry; no public hearings have been held by it and its findings must be based largely upon hearsay and theory.

As a result of a committee hearing last week, during which Dan Auld of Kerrville appeared and gave very convincing evidence concerning evidence concerning the seriousness of the problem, it is hoped the Secretary will change his attitude regarding the use of aircraft. We are continuing to urge that be done.

FFA Boys Show at San Angelo Show

Jimmy Smith of Winters Student Teacher Here

Jimmy Smith, a senior agricultural Education major from Texas Technological College, Lubbock, is doing his student teaching in the vocational agriculture department of the Sterling City school system. He will be in Sterling City seven weeks, from March 9 to April 24.

Mr. Smith is a native of Winters, Texas. He fed and showed lambs while a vocational agriculture student at Winters, and participated on judging teams. He was a member of the San Angelo College livestock judging team and a member of the junior livestock judging team at Tech.

Mr. Smith will observe teaching techniques the first week at Sterling, begin teaching one class the second week and another class the third week. He will assist in the instructional program conducted for all of the vocational agriculture students for one hour per day for 36 hours of additional instruction as required under the plan D instructional program.

Professors from the agricultural education department at Texas Tech will visit Sterling vocational agriculture department frequently to counsel with Smith in his practice teaching program. He will work with some of the FFA judging teams and will go on some of the judging trips with the judging teams and the local V.A. teacher, Fred Igo. He will graduate from Tech in August, 1964, with a B. S. degree in agricultural education.

Sterling Oil Strike Completed

Dual completion as a Mississippi discovery and local southwest extension and second Ellenburger producer in the Spade pool of north-central Sterling County has been reported at Southland Royalty Company, Ft. Worth, No. 2 Ellwood, 2,310 feet from north and 990 feet from west lines of section 56, block 18, SP survey, 15 miles north of Sterling City.

It pumped 156 barrels of 48.6 gravity oil, plus 26 per cent water, daily from the Mississippi through perforations at 7,994 to 8,010 feet, after treatment with 10,000 gallons of acid.

Completion in the Ellenburger last January 19 was for a daily potential of 175 barrels of 50.8 gravity oil, plus 6 per cent water, through 3-64-inch choke and open hole at 8,076 to 8,078 feet, after treatment with 1,000 gallons of acid. Gas-oil ratio was 600-1.

Five-eighths of a mile east, southeast of his recent Clear Fork discovery in the El Kay pool, five miles west of Sterling City, L. E. Foster, Midland, staked a 9,000-foot Seven Rivers lime wildcat as No. 5 O. O. Meyer, 1,700 feet from south and 467 feet from east lines of section 4, block T, T&P survey.

County Judge Bill Brooks said that anyone interested in the job could make application to him or to any county commissioner. Applications will be considered by the court.

In the past the hostess has had living quarters, utilities, phone and water bills paid.

In the lightweight crossbred class James Morgan had the 21st place lamb and Johnny Copeland had the 25th and 36th places. James Morgan had a 28th place crossbred heavy, and Bobby Westbrook had the 36th place lamb in that class.

Mike, Bill and Wayland Foster exhibited the champion Suffolk ewe and the champion Suffolk ram in the junior Suffolk sheep show. They also had first in the pen of three, both sexes represented.

Bill Allen, David Foster and Drew Durham exhibited range ewe lambs in the range ewe portion of the show. Drew, in partnership with sister, Bitsy, placed 13th in that event. David Foster and Bill Allen failed to place their ewe lambs.

James Latham exhibited 3 Rambouillet rams and three Rambouillet ewes in the junior Rambouillet show. James had an 11th place ram lamb, and 37th and 39th in yearling ram class. In the yearling ewe class James had the 20th and 27th places.

In the livestock judging contest Saturday, Bill Foster, Larry Stewart, David Foster and Wayland Foster competed. Bill was third high individual in judging sheep, and the third overall high individual in the contest. There were approximately 50 teams competing in the contest, with 4 boys on each team.

Judging Team Workouts
The Sterling City V. A. students are having workouts for the judging events which will be taking place during the next few weeks. The livestock judging team will compete Saturday at the San Angelo College contests. A number of the boys are working for a place on the team. There will be a judging contest March 21 at Sweetwater, in which the team will participate.

The livestock, grass, and wool teams will go to Sul Ross State College for the contests there on April 4. The San Angelo Range Judging and wool and mohair contests will be held April 11. The Area II judging contests will be conducted April 25 at Texas Tech, followed by the State judging contests May 2 at A&M University for the qualifying teams.

Want Some Fish? FOR YOUR POND

Uvalde, Texas, Pond owners who desire to secure fish for stocking farm and ranch tanks should make application now for fish to be delivered this spring, according to J.H. Pratt, manager of the National Fish Hatchery, Uvalde, Texas. Fish can be allotted only to persons whose applications have been approved.

The fish are furnished free of charge and spring distribution will start at the Uvalde hatchery about April 15. Application forms may be obtained from your local county agent, Soil Conservation Service office or from the Uvalde hatchery.

Anyone having a tank one-fourth acre or more in size, which has not been previously stocked is eligible to receive the fish. Consideration is also given to restocking tanks and lakes that have refilled following drouth periods, and for restocking where the undesirable fish population has been eliminated.

Large-mouth black bass, redear sunfish and channel catfish are available at the Uvalde National Fish Hatchery. Applicants are given a choice of four different stocking methods: 1. 150 bass and 100 redear per acre; 2. 100 bass, 100 redear and 50 catfish per acre; 3. 75 catfish per acre when stocked alone; 4. 150 bass when stocked alone. Ponds of less than one acre are not stocked in combination with catfish.

The fish are delivered to central meeting points, usually the county seat, by the hatchery's distribution trucks. Applicants will be notified by the hatchery of the time and place to pick up their fish.

Over one and one-half million fish are normally produced each year by the National Fish Hatchery at Uvalde and most of these are distributed throughout the hatchery's distribution area of 67 counties in Southwest Texas. Federal and state agencies are encouraging the construction of fish ponds and lakes as an aid to conservation of water and wildlife resources.

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WTU To Reduce Rates

Passing on the Tax Reduction

Savings resulting from the reduction in Federal income taxes will be passed on to West Texas Utilities customers according to plans for system-wide rate reductions announced today. These reductions in rates will save customers about \$1 million annually, approximately 2.8% at this time. Savings will be even greater as electric sales grow.

Wayne Loury, WTU local Manager, announced that the Company plans to pass on the full benefits of the tax reduction which it will receive under the new tax law. Under the new tax law the income tax on corporations will be reduced in two steps of 2% each. The corporate income tax will go from 52% to 50% in 1964 and from 50% to 48% in 1965.

"We are giving customers the benefit of both the tax reduction already established for 1964 and the tax reduction scheduled for 1965," Cal Young, WTU president said. "Passing this tax saving on to customers in the form of rate reductions will simply leave the company with the same rate of return it has been earning."

"Such system-rate reductions require extensive study. In addition, after the new rates are designed, considerable work will have to be done to adjust our IBM computer billing procedures to these new rates, Young added. We expect to have the new rates in effect by mid-summer, probably July or August. Prior to the time the rates are placed in effect, they must be approved by each incorporated city."

WTU has a unique record for any industry, one of which we are very proud, Young pointed out. WTU has never raised a rate. Through the years we have consistently reduced the cost of service as an efficiency and improved operations, together, with increased customer usage permitted. This planned rate reduction is a continuation of that long-established policy."

WTU supplies electric service for Sterling City and Water Valley and 165 other West Texas towns and communities in 50 counties extending from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

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REWARD NOTICE

A reward of \$500.00 will be paid by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to any person (other than law enforcement officers) giving information causing the arrest and final conviction of any person or persons found butchering or stealing any sheep or lambs or goats belonging to any Association member in good standing.

When two or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted, will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If, upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. All deviations concerning the payment of such reward and the conditions of payment will be made by the Board of Directors of the Association.
