

We want to take this method of thanking our friends for the many kindnesses of flowers, gifts, visits, cards and food The most common micronutrient deficiency is a lack of iron, called iron chlorosis or "anemia".

Iron chlorosis can be found in plants all over the country, but there are some areas where most untreated plants suffer this condition. For example, in the West plants find it difficult to get all the iron they need from the soil, and in the East iron chlorosis often results from worn out soils.

Pale green or yellow young leaves is one of the major symptoms of iron chlorosis. Another sign to look for is fewer and smaller blossoms.

Iron deficiency can best be corrected with a type of chemical called a "chelate" (pronounced key-late). One of the most widely used iron chelates is Sequestrene, a development of Geigy Agricul-tural Chemicals. Available as a powder, it can be dissolved for application with a sprayer or used undiluted directly on the soil. Either way, it will bring an iron-starved plant back to its original glow of health.
