EIGHT THOUSAND FLATWORMS---each of them called George---are going to school at the University of Michigan. They're enrolled in a research program that is teaching them to react to certain stimuli. In 1787, when the framers they set to work to create a system of checks and balances 5 in government which was to perpetuate the fundamental theory mentioned in the preamble of the earlier document:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident; That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

"That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; . .

Some five years later, the first ten amendments to our Constitution were adopted at one time, specifcally detailing various basic civil rights steming from the underlying theory of the Declaration of Independence.

Our courts day by day guard these rights for us.




