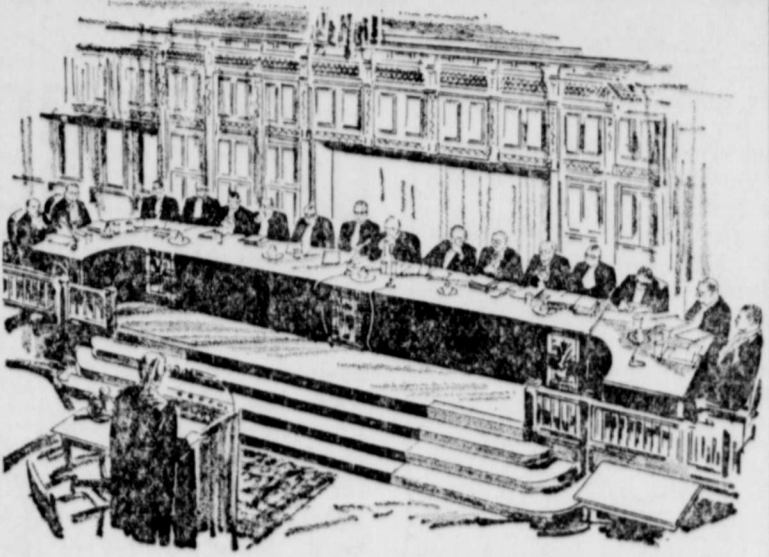
REWARD NOTICE

International Tribunal

In the turreted Peace Palace at The Hague, Netherlands, 15 judges sit hearing periwigged advocates supporting their arguments with citations as new as jet planes or as old as the Norman Conquest. This historical spread in testimony dramatizes the range of business of the International Court of Justice (ICJ), the juridical arm of the United Nations. The ICJ is the tribunal for settling legal disputes between nations. The 15 judges, no two from the same country, are elected for nine-year terms. They serve as individuals, not as representatives of their countries. Nations apply to the court to interpret treaties, settle boundary and territorial-waters disputes, seek damages for loss of life or property and a broad range of other subjects. Except for advisory opinions, the court's judgments are binding. Of some 35 cases dealt with since 1946, when the ICJ was founded, nine have involved aerial incidents—the action of one country against the aircraft and crews of another. In an Anglo-French dispute over two English Channel islands, the court heard supporting arguments based on agreements going back to the Norman Conquest of 1066. The ICJ awarded the islands to Britain.

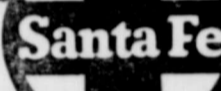

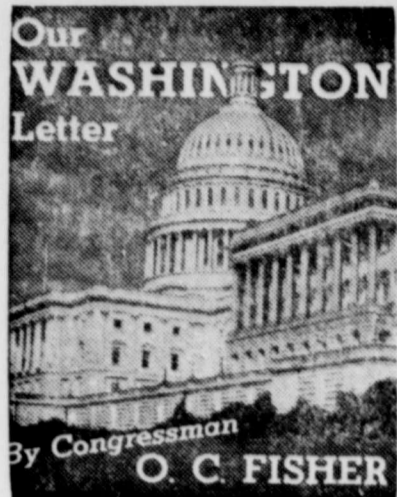

Our WASHINGTON Letter

With emphasis on social welfare, the President sent his budget message to Congress last week. Welfare funds, which have increased every year since 1960, takes off breathtakingly in the next fiscal year for a two-year increase of about 65%—a major feature of the Great Society.

The President estimated that the government will spend \$5.3 billion more than it takes in during the next year, which begins July 1. The last balanced budget was in 1960—during Eisenhower's last year. Spending for next year was estimated at \$99.7 billion, which is about \$2 billion more than the last fiscal year. At the rate of spending now projected, this will probably be the last budget we will see that is under \$100 billion.

Indeed, in another 8 years spending is due to reach \$150 billion annually. It was \$70 billion only 8 years ago. Most of this increase is the result of non-military spending.

This constant rise is easy to understand. It stems from so many new programs the federal government begins. Once begun, they have a way of expanding and getting bigger and bigger each year.

A few examples will illustrate that: The cost of the so-called Poverty program will exceed \$1 billion, four times what was spent on it this year. Federal aid for education, under the President's program, will increase by 75% during the next year.

Outlays for welfare have more than doubled in 8 years. Other programs have doubled, tripled and quadrupled during the same period.

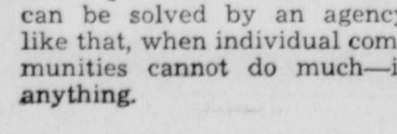
A brand new program, now before Congress, will pump more than a billion dollars a year into 11 Appalachian states.

When the government runs out of money, it borrows, add that much more to the public debt, and passes it on to our children and grandchildren to worry about.

It has become quite old-fashioned in some quarters to object to this system of deficit financing. Those of us who oppose this, and vote against these new programs, are accused of being out of step with progress!

In any event, it seems kind of sad that this nation, at the height of full employment and prosperity, should go merrily along with its 6th straight budget deficit, thus inviting still more balance-of-payments and inflation troubles.

Civil Service Opportunities

The U. S. Civil Service Commission today announced a new examination for filling research and non-research positions in all branches of engineering in the Washington, D. C. area. In addition, positions in certain branches of engineering will be filled throughout the United States. The salaries for these positions range from \$5,650 to \$15,665.

This new examination incorporates revised qualifications standards and replaces previous examinations. Persons who have not yet been appointed from earlier examinations must pass this new one if they are still interested in being considered for these positions.

To qualify for non-research positions, applicants must have an engineering degree or an equivalent combination of appropriate college work and professional experience. For positions involving highly technical research, development, or similar functions a bachelor's degree in engineering is a requirement. Additional professional experience and/or education are required for the higher grade levels.

Full details concerning the requirements to be met as well as instructions on how to apply are given in Announcement No. 332-B. Announcements and appropriate application forms may be obtained from many post offices throughout the country or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415.
