## Make-Ahead Gala Dessert By Betty Barclay

THIS cool dessert will get a warm reception from din-ner guests. Frozen mixed fruit

and whipped topping mix are combined in a most unusual shortcake. Fruit Shortcake

1 package (12 oz.) frozen mixed fruit; 1

envelope whipped topping mix; 4 teaspoon almond extract; flaked coconut; 6 packaged in-dividual spongecake shells.

Thaw mixed fruit as directed on package.

Meanwhile, prepare whipped topping mix as directed on package, substituting ¼ teaspoon almond extract for the 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Shape into balls, using about 1/3 cup prepared whipped topping for each. Roll balls in coconut. Place on wax paper-covered tray or baking sheet and freeze until firm -about 1½ hours.

Then place coconut-covered balls in spongecake shells and spoon fruit over top. Or, spoon fruit into spongecake shells and top with coconut-covered balls. Makes 6 servings.


