### GOOD RAINS OVER STERLING COUNTY

Good rains fell over the county Sunday and Monday of this week. Rain began after daylight Sunday morning and again on Monday morning.

From a half to more than an inch fell Sunday morning and even more was recorded on Monday. Better than an inch fell here in town Monday and the two-day total was better than two inches in some parts of the county.

Bitterweed is coming into full flower and "beauty" now in pastures and along the right-of-way over this area. The seeds can be washed into pastures later by rains and spread back over the grazing lands.

On Wednesday evening, the rains resumed and dropped .70 inch here in town and greater amounts fell in more favored areas over this section.

### Local Girls Place in District Track


Two local high school girls placed in the district track meet last week in Bronte and will go into regional track at Snyder this Saturday.

Cindy Lowery placed first in high jump, first in broad jump, first in hop, step and jump, third in the 220 yard dash and tied for first in the 80 meter hurdles.

Elaine Price placed first in the 60 yard dash, second in the 100 yard dash, second in the broad jump, second in the hop, step and jump and third in the 80 meter hurdles.

Robert Lee won the meet, with Sterling City second and Rankin third.

Recently in the Bluebonnet Belles meet in San Angelo, Cindy was first in high jump and Elaine was fourth in the javelin throw.



Time for the casebearer on pecans is getting closer. Last year, the first eggs were found on the fifteenth of May. According to the last newsletter of the State Pecan Growers Association, the casebearer is just about on time in the areas further south.

Thus far no eggs have been found on trees here. Usually the first eggs are found soon after the tips of the blooms and the tiny nuts have turned brown. The egg is a tiny one, the size of a small pinhead, and varies in color with age. When first laid, it is white but soon turns and is usually brownish in color in a few days.

Recommendations for the control of the pest are the same as last year. Malathion, toxaphene, sevin, nicotine sulphate, and DDT are still recommended as control agents. A combination of malathion and sevin has given some good results. The malathion gives a quick kill while the sevin gives a longer kill due to a greater residual effect. Last year's recommendations on the mixture was two pounds of sevin and one quarter pint of malathion emulsion per hundred gallons of water. If DDT is used for the control of the casebearer it is wise to use six pounds of wettable sulfur with it to control the mite.

If rosette is a problem, two pounds of zinc sulphate may be added to the spray. Rosette is a nutritional disease common here. The tip ends of the branches or tops of the trees have a yellowish appearance. Leaves crinkle and are misshapen.

Congress last week paved the way for screwworm eradication officials to move the barrier zone to the Pacific coast. In one day, the Senate and the House of Representatives approved the bill for the uninterrupted operation of the program an the President signed the bill. The original bill requested \$550,000 to operate the program until July 1. The approved bill appropriated an additional \$100,000 extend the eradication program and barrier zone in Arizona and California. The bill stipulates that the expansion will be based on matching funds from producers and states involved.

A sample of worms was sent to the laboratory on Tuesday of this week from Sterling County, the fourth of the year. No report on the identification was available at this writing. J. E. Watson who has a place about 25 miles southwest of Sterling City on the Big Lake Road brought it in for mailing.

Marketing specialists predict that meat consumption in the United States will reach a new high this year. They say that the per capita consumption of red meat will reach 173 lbs. in 1965, four pounds more than last year.

Most of the increase will be in beef and veal. These two are in good supply and at reasonable prices researchers indicate.

### Wildcat Set on Wilkinson-McEntire

Southland Royalty Co. will drill a 9,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Sterling County, 10 miles northwest of Sterling City, six miles east of the Crede (multi-pay Wolfcamp) field and eight miles south of the Triple M (multi-pay Wolfcamp) field. It is the No. 1 Wilkinson-McEntire.

Location is 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of 12-23-H&TC.

It is 1/2 mile east of Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 McEntire, an 8,995-foot failure abandoned Oct. 10, 1951. The following tops were picked on elevation of 2,555 feet: Strawn, 6,520 feet; Mississippian, 8,795 feet; and Ellenburger, 8,905 feet.



Capitol Hill was aglow with suspense last week as reports from Viet Nam and the Dominican Republic were stepped up. On Thursday, President Johnson invited a number of us to the White House to explain developments and lay out an emergency request for \$700 million to help finance the accelerated costs.

Within hours after the White House conference, our Committee on Armed Services unanimously approved a procedure to provide the requested funds, and the following day the House approved it, with but 7 dissenting votes — most of them extreme liberals from the West Coast.

Whether one happens to agree with our role in Viet Nam and the Dominican Republic or not, we are in those places for the purpose of containing and resisting Communist aggression, which over the long pull would undoubtedly seriously affect our own security if their nibbling plans are not blocked.

The effect of solid approval of funds to finance our missions is to let the Communists know that the President has the support of the Congress and of the people in general. Communist propaganda has been to the effect that we are divided in this country in our resistance to their aggression. They would like for the world to believe that we do not have the will to make use of our enormous military power if when the occasion arises in meeting our commitments and our role in the free world.

In the Dominican Republic, a Castro-triggered coup was nipped in the bud with the landing of Marines there. Hundreds of American lives were saved, U. S. property protected, and the Communist time-table was thrown out of gear. The President's forthright action revived the Monroe Doctrine which has been battered around as a result of our bungling in Cuba. The Communies want a beachhead on the mainland of Latin America, and they chose the Dominican Republic for their mischief. No wonder Castro blew his top as a result of our intervention.

**Civil Service Announcements**

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced a new examination to fill the position of Service Representative in the Social Security Administration's District Offices throughout the country. Service Representatives furnish information to the general public concerning the benefits payable under the Social Security Act. These positions are at the grade GS-4 level paying \$4,480 a year. It is necessary to pass a written test and to have either two years of appropriate work experience or 2 years of study about the high school level.

The final date for applying is June 30, 1964 but those who file by May 25 will be tested on the first test date which is June 19. Applicants should consult Announcement No. PH-138-3(65) for detailed information and instructions. Applications should be sent to the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Social Security Administration, Baltimore, Maryland.

Another new examination for Agricultural Commodity Grader (Meat) has also been announced. These jobs, paying \$5,00 a year, provide for training on the job in various phases of the livestock and meat programs. Related experience and/or appropriate education are required. Applications must be filed before June 15, 1965 with Central Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Consumer and Marketing Service Unit, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

Announcements and appropriate application forms may be obtained from many post offices located throughout the country or from the Boards of Examiners above.

The U. S. Civil Service Commission today announced a new examination for filling research and non-research positions in all branches of engineering in the Washington, D. C. area. In addition, positions in certain branches of engineering will be filled throughout the United States. The salaries for these positions range from \$5,650 to \$15,665.

This new examination incorporates revised qualifications standards and replaces previous examinations. Persons who have not yet been appointed from earlier examinations must pass this new one if they are still interested in being considered for these positions.

To qualify for non-research positions, applicants must have an engineering degree or an equivalent combination of appropriate college work and professional experience. For positions involving highly technical research, development, or similar functions a bachelor's degree in engineering is a requirement. Additional professional experience and/or education are required for the higher grade levels.

Full details concerning the requirements to be met as well as instructions on how to apply are given in Announcement No. 332-B.



**For Social Security**

Maids and Cooks Must Have Social Security Paid

Wages paid a household worker—whether employed as a maid, cook, laundress, cleaning woman, baby sitter or similar job—are covered for social security purposes if the employee is paid \$50 or more in cash in a calendar quarter.

A calendar quarter is a 3-month period beginning with January, April, July or October. Room and board are not counted, but carfare is, if paid in cash.

If you have a domestic employee who meets this requirement, you are required to report these wages to the Internal Revenue Service and pay the social security taxes. A report for the quarter just past is due not later than April 30. Failure to file timely tax returns may result in additional penalty and interest charges.

But most important, you might be depriving your household worker of her social security protection and benefits for herself and possibly her family—benefits to which she is legally entitled.

Additional information concerning this subject can be obtained from your local social security office. Ask for leaflet OASI-21.

**High-Flying Prospectors**

Bird's-eye photography is performing miracles of prospecting undreamed of by the "desert rat" who, with only a burro for company, once searched the West for gold.

From cameras borne aloft by planes, rockets and satellites, today's "prospector" is discovering unsuspected deposits of gold, copper, iron and other minerals. Such cameras can cover up to 40,000 square miles with a single exposure.

Aerial photography developed in World War II, now has become a peacetime tool, says the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO). This was the consensus of 190 scientists from 45 countries who attended a UNESCO-sponsored meeting on the subject in Toulouse, France.

But mineral searches are only one target of high-flying cameras. They also give fast and accurate information about soil, vegetation, river systems, coast lines and animal populations. UNESCO points out that such inventories are the first step toward putting the vast, emerging portion of the world on the road to self-support.

"Aerial photography is indispensable to developing countries," UNESCO says. "They need to catalog their natural resources before they can exploit them properly. They cannot afford the time for slower, less efficient cataloging methods."

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

#### What's the Limit?

The most sensible way to handle a heavy burden is to carry it on your head. This conclusion emerged from a United Nations International Labor Organization (ILO) panel which drafted human-load recommendations based on scientific studies dating back to 1951. The panel noted that millions of laborers in all countries spend their working days carrying boxes, bales, sacks and other containers filled with an endless variety of items.

The studies showed that head-carrying is best, as it spreads the load evenly over the body and helps reduce postural effort. One panelist listed sprains, circulatory damage, hernia, skeletal deformities, back pains and feet and joint injuries among the hazards of improper carrying or overloading.

The experts recommended that a load for an adult man be limited to 88 pounds. For boys from 16 to 18 years old and for women, the recommended maximum is 33 to 44 pounds; and for girls from 16 to 18 years, 26½ to 33 pounds. Below that age, regular load-carrying should normally be prohibited, the panel said.

Load size as well as weight is a factor. One expert cited the fatigue experienced by French carriers who, under a 110-pound bale of bottle corks, "look like an 18-month-old baby playing with a large balloon."
