



AROUND THE COUNTY by

Within the last few weeks, two samples of worms sent in to the screwworm eradication plant have been identified as non-screwworms. The samples were sent in by David Drennan on the place in the north-west corner of Sterling County and by Jeff Davis from the old Fred Allen place.

Recent announcement by the eradication program concerning the federal appropriation for the program have been good news to the livestock producers. Funds spent by the federal government on the eradication program no longer have to be matched with producer, or non-federal money, thanks to Congress in the closing days of the last session.

The cost of treating outbreaks in areas where the worm has been eradicated must continue to be matched by state and private funds. However, the expense of maintaining the barrier along the Mexican border will be borne by the federal government. Congress voted \$2.8 million for this purpose.

The maintenance of the barrier along the U.S.-Mexico border was the point that held up the final appropriation. In the end, the backers who held that the Texas livestock producers should not be accountable for the maintenance of the barrier just because they lived so near it prevailed and the present appropriation passed. It is still possible that producers will sometime in the future have to raise money for the treatment or areas in the state when, and if, the money on hand is exhausted. But they will not have to pay for the program in Mexico.

John Brock is planning on entering the pecan show in San Angelo to be held on December 9. The show has invited pecan growers, and anyone who has pecans, in any of the counties adjoining Tom Green County, to enter the show. It takes a pound and a half of pecans for each entry. Classes will be set up for the many varieties of pecans grown in this section of the state.

This week we worked with John in selecting pecans for entry in the Burkett, John Garner, Desirable and some other classes. Others will be selected as they are harvested; those already selected are some of the earlier varieties.

Anyone who is interested in entering pecans in the show is urged to do so. We will be glad to work with you in selecting pecans to be entered. This is the first time we have done this type thing; we are relying on information from others in the Extension Service who have participated in some of the pecan shows. This is John's first venture in one of the shows also. As he says, "We will get educated pretty fast on December 9th—and we have a lot to learn."

Garlyn Hoffman, Extension range specialist and former county agent of Sterling County, visited in the county last Thursday. Garlyn was here inspecting the brush control plots on the Tommy Foster ranches as well as looking at some work done by other ranchers.

The plots on the Foster ranch are part of a series of research plots stretching from Refugio in South Texas to Oldham County in the northern part of the Panhandle. It is hoped that the plots will enable all the services interested in brush control to give better recommendations for aerial spraying following chaining of mesquite. The plots are seeking information on the best time to spray following chaining. Thus far, two

Social Security

"A tremendous boost for many youngsters" is the way Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security District Office, described one of the changes which was made in the Social Security Law last month. He explained that children between the ages of 18 and 22 can continue to receive their monthly social security checks if they attend a public or accredited school as full-time students. Children of deceased, retired, and disabled workers are included.

Under the old law, checks for children stopped at age 18 even if they continued to go to school. Mr. Ellington stated that, "If there are any of these young people under age 22 who are going to school now or in September, they or their parents should get in touch with their social security office right away; and since this provision provides for payments back to January 1965, some benefits may be payable to former child beneficiaries who went on to school and who reached age 22 earlier this year."

"These youngsters are eligible for these payments and we are anxious to get their checks to them as quickly as possible," Mr. Ellington stated. He added that anyone with any question about this change should get in touch with their San Angelo Social Security Office immediately. The office is located at 3000 W. Harris and the phone number is 949-4608, or see your representative when he is in your community.
