Anyone who is interested in entering the pecan show in San Angelo is reminded that entries are due before noon on Wednesday, December 8. The nuts should be in the office of the county agent in San Angelo by that time. They may be left in his office any time prior to that time.

The nuts should be in a paper sack with your name, address, and variety, if known, and if you don't know the variety, the show committee will place them in the class they feel most logical. Each entry should consist of a pound and a half of nuts in the shells. During the judging, the judge will pick up ten pecans at random. These ten will be weighed in the shell; they will then be shelled and the kernels weighed to determine the shelling percentage or yield. All entries become the property of the show to be sold to defray the cost of the show.

Thus far, two persons have indicated they intend to enter the show. They are John Brock and Webb Hudson. If there are others who are interested, we'd be glad to help them select their entries. They should call for help by Tuesday morning.

The ladies might be interested in the food show. Foods classes include cakes, cookies, and candies. There is also a junior division in the foods show.

Sheep producers are reminded that the marketing year for the wool incentive program now ends December 31. This includes all wool and lambs sold after January 1 and December 31. If you have sales slips on either lambs or wool file them now if you haven't already done so.

December 4 is to be a work day at the County Livestock Barn. The Sterling County Livestock Association set the work day for the purpose of cleaning the show barn, oiling the chat now in the barn to keep down the dust and then adding sand to the judging arena and pen areas to aid in preventing the dust problem.

CLINTON HODGES Honored by San Angelo Jaycees

Clinton Hodges, young Sterling County rancher, who got an early start in breeding top quality Rambouillet sheep was named the outstanding ranchman in the San Angelo trade area by the San Angelo Jaycees Wednesday.

Hodges has been active in sheep breeding ranching and conservation practices and associations, as well as operating a ranching enterprise jointly with his father, L.F. Hodges. Rambouillet sheep raised by Hodges have been winning trophies for him since 1948 in sheep and wool shows all over Texas.

Crowning honor in Rambouillet breeding came to him and his registered flock when a ram raised by him was the first ram to become eligible for the coveted register of merit award of the American Rambouillet Sheep Breeders Association.

Hodges has served two terms as director of the Rambouillet breed group, as well as two terms as director of the Texas Purebred Sheep Breeders Association.

Other ranching posts Hodges has held include all the offices in the Sterling County Livestock Association and chairman of Sterling County Agricultural Conservation and Stabilization Committee.

Having won the area title, the Texas nominee will be a candidate for the national honor bestowed as a national Jaycee project.

RANCHERS TO HEAR ABOUT WINTER NUTRITION PROBLEMS

A number of Sterling County young ranchmen will meet in the vocational agriculture department of the Sterling City School December 9 at 7 p.m. to hear Billy Taylor discuss winter nutrition problems confronting the ranchman. Mr. Taylor, an animal nutritionist is with Southwest Mineral of San Angelo.

The group will hold an organizational meeting to determine the feasibility of organizing a Young Ranchman's Organization which will be affiliated with the Texas Young Farmer Organization. The primary purpose of the organization is to continue the educational opportunities of the young ranchman or farmer who is not currently enrolled in school. Agricultural specialists are available through the Texas Education Agency, Agricultural Extension Service, and other resource personnel are available to bring educational programs to the group at the monthly meetings. The local program is coordinated through the local vocational agriculture teacher.

All young ranchmen are dially invited to attend the meeting.

Well Completed by Skelly Oil Company

The WAM, South (Fusselman) field of Sterling County gained its fourth producer and a location east extension with completion of Skelly Oil Co. No. 1 E. R. Foster, 15 miles southwest of Sterling City.

Completion was for a daily flowing potential of 171 barrels of 44.8 gravity oil, and gas-oil ratio of 800-1, through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 8,652-65 feet, which had been acidized with 10,000 gallons.

No reports had been released previously. Location is 660 feet from the north and west lines of 5-7-H&TC.

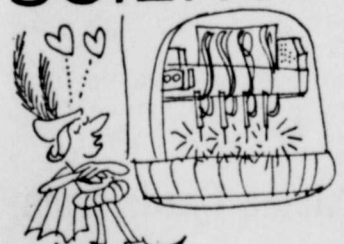

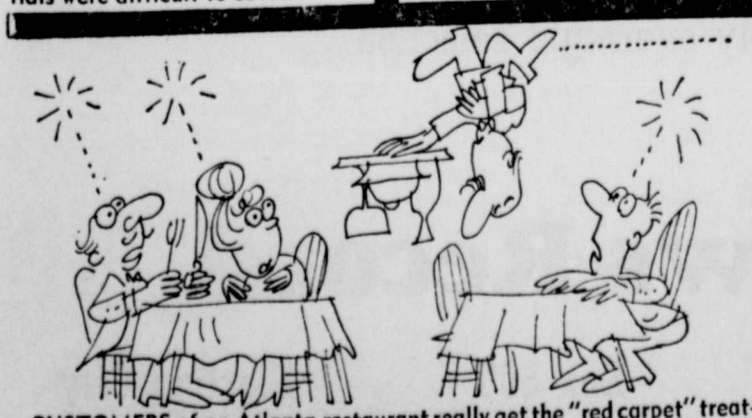
SCIENCE SKETCHES

A Coleman County lad who had a peek behind the Iron Curtain and a poised young woman from Edcouch in Hidalgo County have won state 4-H public speaking honors.

Joe Pat Hemphill, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Zeno Hemphill of Coleman, won the boy's award with a talk on "A World Without 4-H," which recounted his 1964 summer trip to East Berlin, Hungary and Czechoslovakia. Hemphill will receive a wrist watch from The Pure Oil Company.

Lynda Bowers, 18, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Terry Bowers, spoke on "Citizenship—Our Heritage and Our Responsibility" to win the state contest for girls. She will receive a chest of silverware from Pure Oil, the program sponsor.

The 4-H'er with the best project in dairy foods was 16-year-old Joanna Lewis of Murchison. Carnation Company will give her a wrist watch.

Hemphill, born and raised on a ranch of more than 9,000 acres, had ample material for his many speeches on conservation and cattle. However, he also has spoken on "Democracy in Action" and read a dress revue script while Coleman County 4-H lovelies paraded their home-stitched fashions. Hemphill has been before TV cameras and on many radio shows.

In his "World Without 4-H" speech Hemphill characterized life in Czechoslovakia as dull and uninspiring.

"Our trip was very short," said Hemphill, "but it was

enough to convince us that Communism is not progress." Miss Bowers has given 24 speeches and appeared on radio and television. As president of her senior high school class she delivered the welcome address at graduation.

Public speaking, she says, has helped her gain poise and self-confidence. Miss Bowers attends Pan American College.

A profit of more than \$1,000 over six years tells how seriously Andy Scott has taken the Chihuahua-raising business.

Scott, the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Scott, chose dog care as his main 4-H project, he says, because "it is one suited to a city boy." (Actually, 22 per cent of the 2.5 million 4-H'ers come from urban homes.) In all, Scott has sold 97 Chihuahua pups and has given away 10.

Scott gave four pups to a deaf mute woman because he felt dog raising would make life more enjoyable for her and help her financially. He says, he himself, would never have started his dog project without financial aid from his parents.

Dairy foods expert, Joanna Lewis, says she is "thoroughly familiar with milk" because she has lived all her life on a dairy farm.

Miss Lewis has been an asset to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joyce Lewis, by helping out with every dairy operation. She feeds calves, flushes lines, washes out the 700-gallon tank, gets cows from the pastures, and milks them.

In addition, she churns her own butter and makes cottage cheese and sour milk.

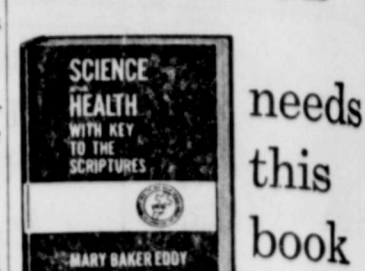

SOCIAL SECURITY

"You don't have to retire completely to get social security benefits," Floyd B. Ellington, social security district manager in San Angelo said today.

"If you earn \$1200 or less in a year, you are considered to be completely retired and would be entitled to all your benefits," he added.

If you earn over \$1200 in a year, you may be considered partly retired and entitled to part of your social security benefits. For example, a worker would have only one dollar in benefits withheld for every two dollars earned between \$1200 and \$1700. For earnings over \$1700 annually, one dollar in benefits is withheld for each dollar of earnings.

Ellington emphasized the fact that, no matter how much you earn in a year, you can be paid your social security benefits for any month in which you neither earn over \$100 as an employee, nor render substantial services as a self-employed person.

Avoid any misunderstanding you may have about the social security retirement test, especially if you are over 65 earning anywhere between \$1201 and \$3600. Get all the facts from your social security office at 3000 West Harris, San Angelo, Texas.

Social Security

"A tremendous boost for many youngsters" is the way Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security District Office, described one of the changes which was made in the Social Security Law last month. He explained that children between the ages of 18 and 22 can continue to receive their monthly social security checks if they attend a public or accredited school as full-time students. Children of deceased, retired, and disabled workers are included.

Under the old law, checks for children stopped at age 18 even if they continued to go to school. Mr. Ellington stated that, "If there are any of these young people under age 22 who are going to school now or in September, they or their parents should get in touch with their social security office right away; and since this provision provides for payments back to January 1965, some benefits may be payable to former child beneficiaries who went on to school and who reached age 22 earlier this year."

"These youngsters are eligible for these payments and we are anxious to get their checks to them as quickly as possible," Mr. Ellington stated. He added that anyone with any question about this change should get in touch with their San Angelo Social Security Office immediately. The office is located at 3000 W. Harris and the phone number is 949-4608, or see your representative when he is in your community.

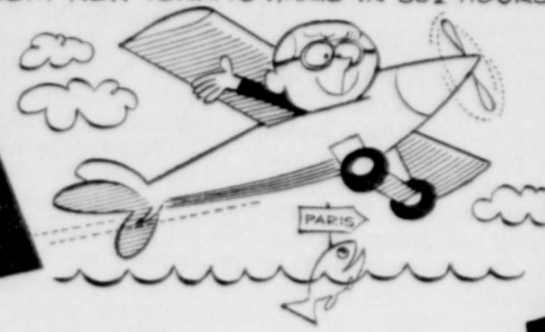
