Noratadata Club Met Monday

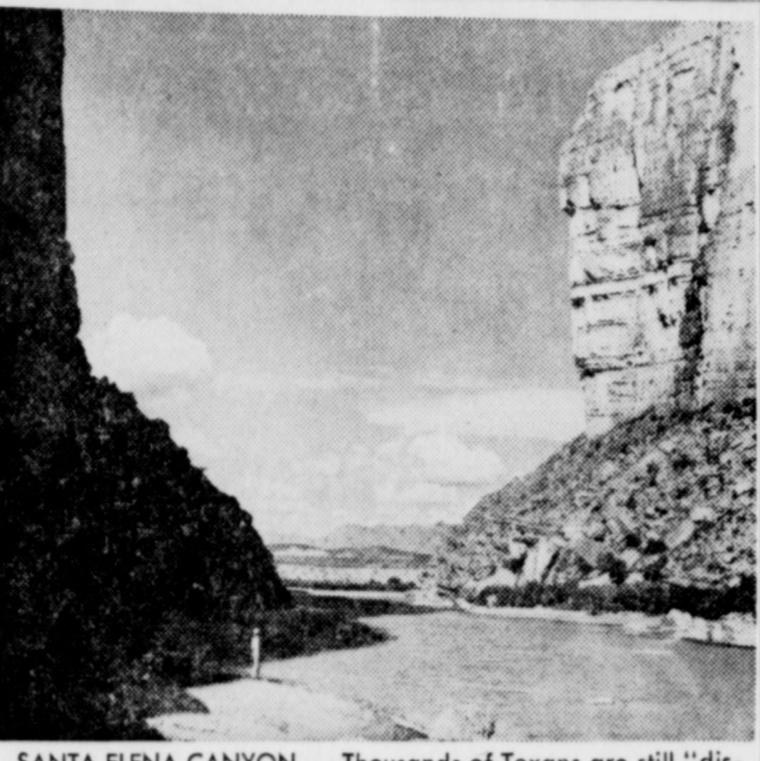

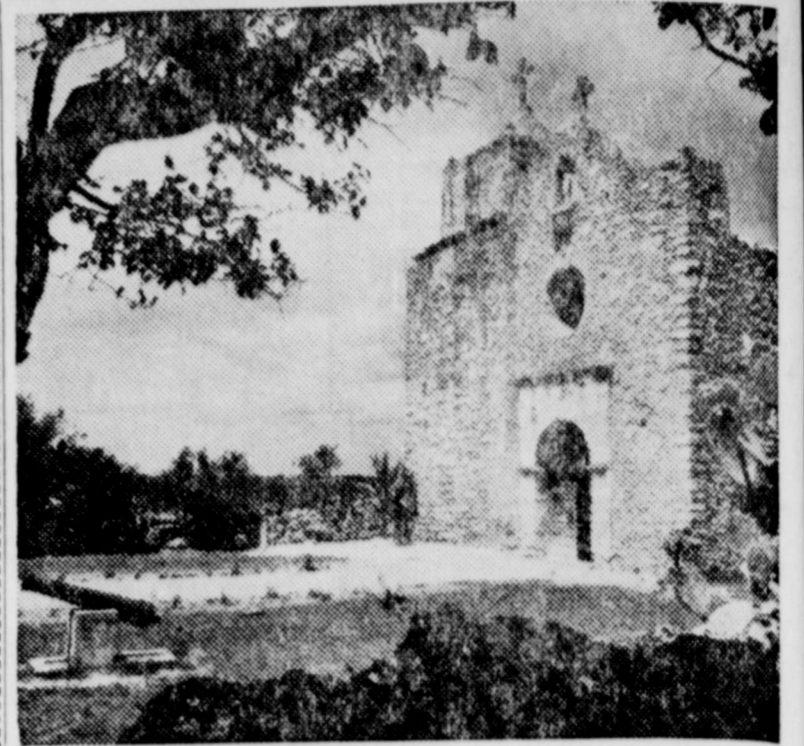

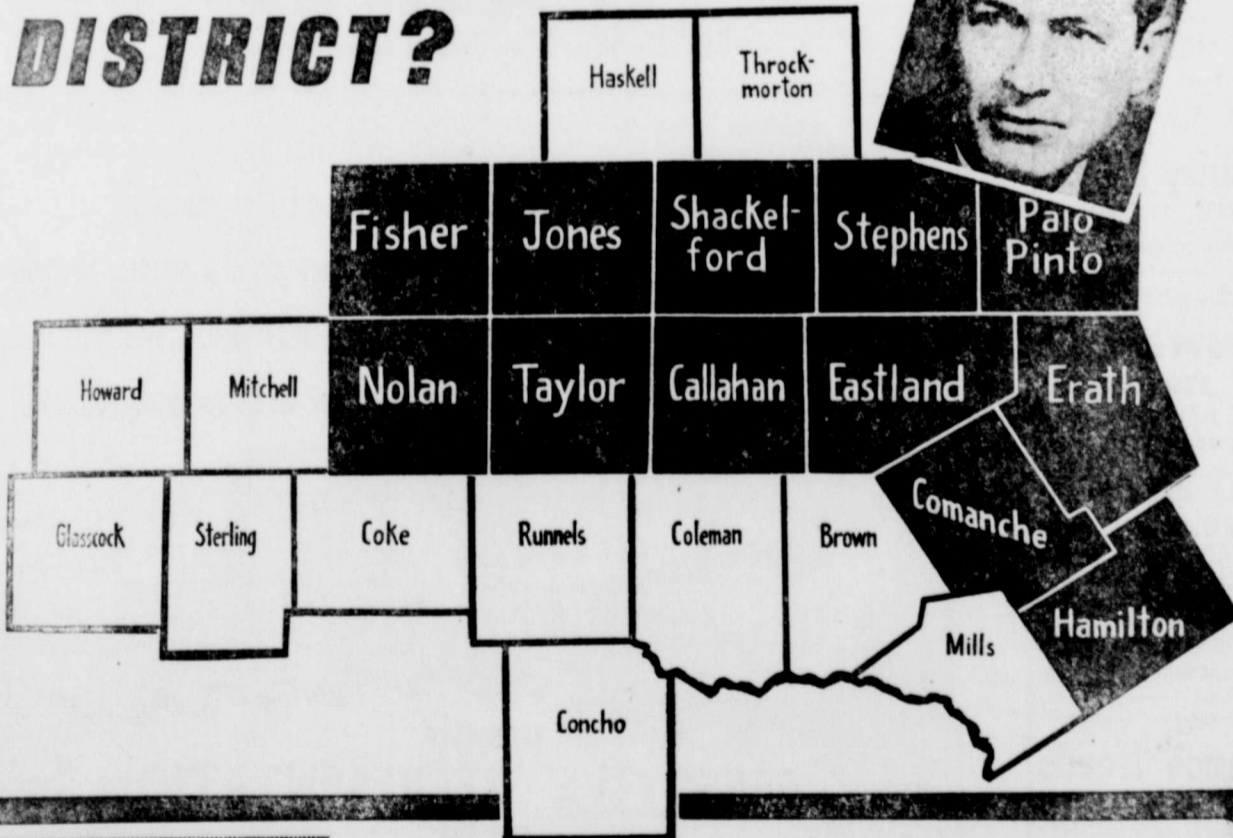

Health Spending Increases, Physicians' Share Declines

CHICAGO—Americans are increasing spending for health care. But they still spend more for tobacco than for hospital care, and more for cosmetics and haircuts than for doctor bills, reports The AMA News, published by the American Medical Association.

Spending for health care totaled \$25.2 billion in 1964, according to figures of the U.S. Department of Commerce. That's an increase of 7.8 per cent from the \$23.4 billion spent in 1963.

Hospitals receive the largest share of health-care spending—about 30 cents of every dollar. The total spent for hospital care in 1964 was \$7.6 billion. This compares with \$7.8 bil-

lion spent on tobacco products. Other portions of the health-care dollar are divided among drugs, 17 cents; dentists, 10 cents; health insurance, 7 cents; appliances, 4 cents, and miscellaneous expenses, 5 cents.

The remaining 27 cents goes to physicians. This percentage has declined slightly over the years. Twenty years ago, physicians received about 28 cents of every dollar spent on health care.

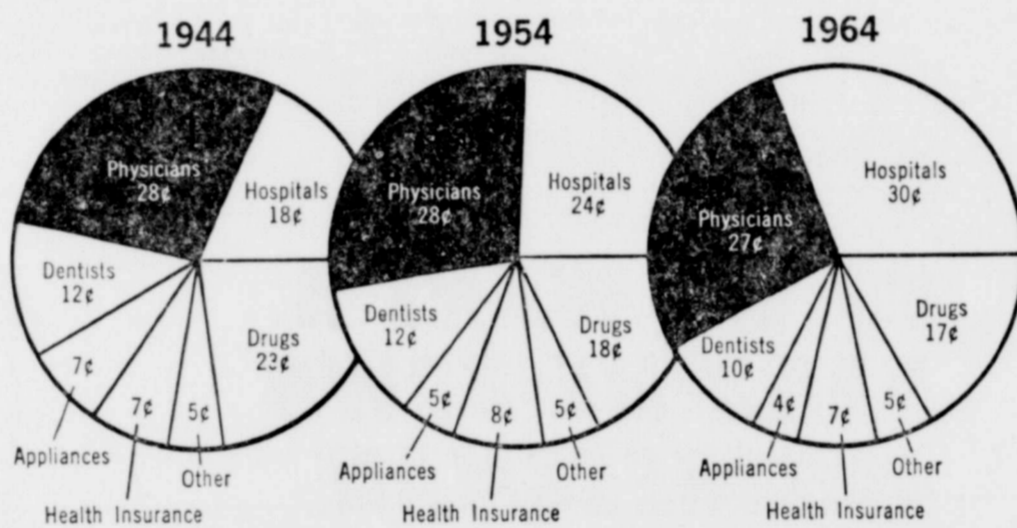
Expenditures for physicians' services totaled \$6.8 billion in 1964, compared to \$7 billion spent on personal items such as cosmetics, haircuts, and toiletries.

This was the distribution of the

health-care dollar 10 years earlier: hospitals, 24 cents; physicians, 28 cents; drugs, 18 cents; dentists, 12 cents; health insurance, 8 cents; appliances, 5 cents, and the other services, 5 cents.

The Department of Commerce reported these expenditures for health care in 1964:

Hospitals, \$7.6 billion, up 12.5 per cent over 1963; physicians, \$6.8 billion, up 5.5 per cent over 1963; drugs, \$4.4 billion, up 5.2 per cent; dentists, \$2.4 billion, up 5.8 per cent; health insurance, \$1.8 billion, up 6.3 per cent; appliances, \$1.1 billion, up 9.7 per cent, and other services, \$1.2 billion, up 6.0 per cent over 1963.

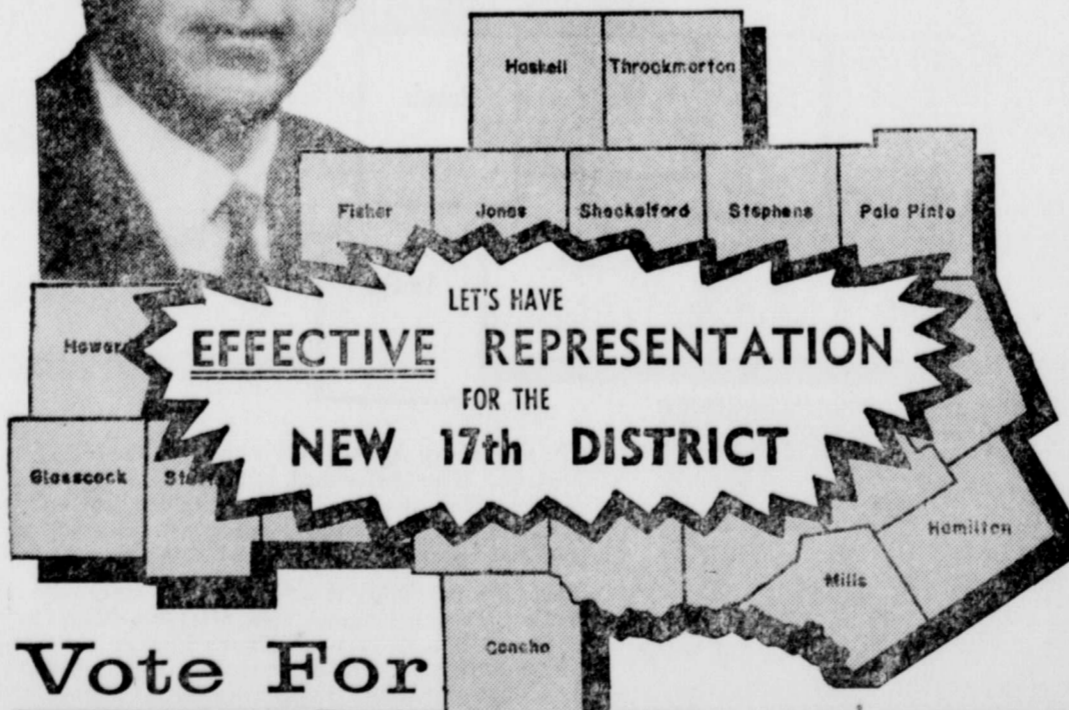


DISTRIBUTION OF THE HEALTH CARE DOLLAR

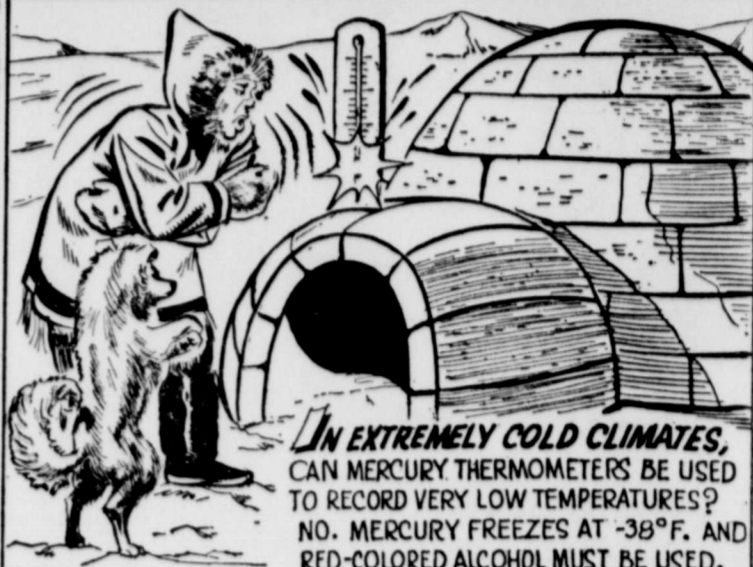

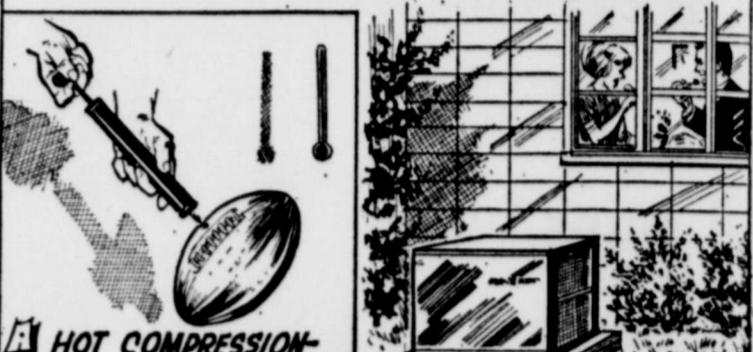

MEDICARE APPLICATION BLANKS AT POST OFFICE

Postmaster Virgie Garrett of Sterling City announced today that application blanks for supplemental Medicare benefits are available at the post office window here.

The application blanks are being made available as the Social Security Administration seeks to contact 3.1 million senior citizens before a March 31 deadline imposed by the Medicare law.

President Johnson has proclaimed March as "National Medicare Enrollment Month." He urged all federal agencies and all citizens to cooperate in enrolling senior citizens in the program.

Initially, some two and one half million application blanks were distributed to nearly 34,000 main post offices throughout the 50 states. Additional forms are available as needed.

Through direct mailings and other means, the Social Security Administration has had contact with 16 of the 19.1 million citizens who will be 65 or over on July 1. Of the 16 million who replied, less than one million aid they did not want to sign up for the supplemental program.

The supplemental program costs \$3 a month and provides doctor bills and other benefits. Everyone 65 and over is eligible for the basic hospital benefits under Medicare.

A copy of the application blank is displayed on the lobby bulletin board of the local post office.

Senior citizens who reached 65 before 1966 face a two year

DISABLED MAY BENEFIT FROM SOCIAL SECURITY

Some 3000 Texans who may be eligible for disability benefits under the new Social Security provisions, have not yet applied for them according to Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of the San Angelo Social Security office.

Under recent liberalizations of the law, persons with nonpermanent disability may now qualify for benefits. Ellington said that under the previous law a person was eligible only if he had a severe disability that was expected to last a long and indefinite time. Now benefits can be paid if the severe disability has lasted or is expected to last as long as 12 months by his doctors. There are also more liberal requirements for certain persons who are blind.

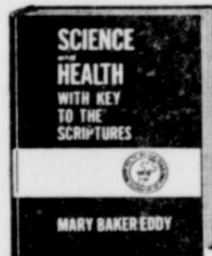

STILL TIME FOR MEDICARE SIGNING

Older people in the Sterling City area who did not sign up for the voluntary doctor bill insurance under medicare before the close of the first enrollment period on March 31 have been given a little more time, Floyd B. Ellington, so in San Angelo, announced today.

In legislation signed by President Johnson last week, Congress had extended until May 31 the deadline for enrollment by persons 65 or over.

Nearly 90 percent of the nation's elderly were enrolled for the doctor bill insurance when social security offices closed at midnight on March 31, Ellington said. Only 5 percent had turned down the protection which supplements the basic hospital insurance provided persons 65 or over.

Another 5 percent had not made up their minds either way, or else were not aware of the deadline and the need to sign up for the supplementary protection.

Older people who have not yet applied for their medicare benefits should get in touch with the nearest social security office now, Ellington said.

Book Given to Davis Museum Room by Mrs. Brown

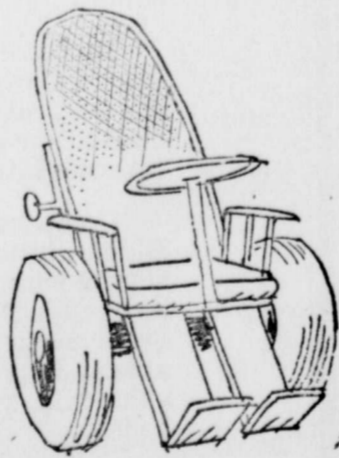
Mrs. R. P. Brown has given one of her scrap books of history and interest about this county to be kept in the Jeff Davis museum room at the Davis ranch.
