



AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D.C.—It is a common saying around the halls of Congress that the Country would be better off if the last two weeks of any long Session were eliminated. The reason is because there are all the things that "must" be done before shop can be closed and members go home. Invariably there is confusion in all the haste, and only cursory study can be given to complicated legislation. Congress is to adjourn in the next few days, but if it were not election year, the curtain would probably not come down before Christmas. In fact, it was Christmas Eve when adjournment came in 1964. In recent years adjournment has not come until late in the fall.

The Congress last studied its own operation and procedures in 1945-46, and as a result, passed what is known as the Reorganization Act. One provision of that Law determined that adjournment should not be later than the last day of July, except in time of war or national emergency.

The catch in this arrangement is that from World War II, the Korean War and other continuing crises, an emergency has been considered to be in effect. It is apparent that unless Congress improves its operation, which only it can do, Sessions will last the year round and its work still not completed.

The longer each Congressional session lasts, the greater is the potential for doing mischief. This is especially true when the Congress is so subservient to the Executive Branch and largely controlled by it.

More important than the length of any session is the thoroughness and effectiveness with which the Legislative Branch conducts its business.

The growth of the country and the increasing complexity of the issues lengthen the time required for consideration of legislative business. The issues and proposals of the future promise to be even more complex and time-consuming. The Congress must gear itself to meet its responsibility.

The bookkeeping procedure of the government is set up on a fiscal year basis, beginning July 1 and running to June 30 of the following year. The Congress meets on a calendar basis. Broadly, the Congress has two essential functions. One is to pass laws and the other is to appropriate money for financing Government activities.

On the matter of appropriations, money bills which must originate in the House of Representatives are supposed to be enacted before the end of the fiscal year. In most cases, as is the situation this year, they run beyond June 30, and as a result "a supplemental" bill is presented which is a "catch-all." Only the Appropriations Committee itself can give a reasonable explanation of what is included in these measures when they are presented. The solution to such inefficiency lies in better budgeting of time

Have you sent in your list of addresses frequently used and yet you don't know the ZIP Code number? If not, it's still not too late. Fill out the addresses and mail the card back to the local post office. They'll fill in the correct ZIP Code number and in a short time mail it back to you. Then you can file it away for future use.

Don't sell the ZIP Code short folks. It might be a tiny bit of trouble to use the ZIP number, but after the first of the year, if you mail anything second, third or even fourth class mail, you have to have the ZIP number on the address label. The postal rules require it—or will then. And nearly everybody mails some things besides first class letters once in a while. Better learn 'em.

Now I can remember when (and so can you) it only cost 1c to mail a local letter and two cents to mail an out-of-town letter. Now it takes four cents for a local and five for an out-of-town one. And it takes ten cents worth of time to write all the ZIP code and stuff on it. But, with our increasing population, etc, the postal service needs ways to speed up mail delivery. And ZIP coding will help.

The penny post card has gone the way of the nickel cigar, the 5c cup of coffee or drink, or the way of the good old 100 cents dollar. Pretty soon it will be just a little cheaper to deliver your letter yourself, if it's not over a thousand or so miles. And you can fly.

and a reorganization to meet the ever increasing demands. A joint committee on reorganization of the Legislative Branch of the Government has been considering, for the past year, proposals for reform and has now produced a measure which will likely be acted on in the next session of Congress.

Many ideas were presented to the Joint Committee by Members of both the House and Senate and outside students of government.

One proposal would divide two-year session of Congress into categories of work to be performed during each. The first year would be devoted to substantive or authorizing legislation. The second would be devoted entirely to the appropriations process. To conform with such a change, the Government's accounting procedure would have to be changed from a fiscal year to a calendar year basis.

This provision is calculated to allow each member to concentrate his time, attention and efforts on specific fiscal matters. Supposedly, it would make it possible to compute the exact amount of funds required in advance so that proposed expenditures may be balanced against anticipated revenues. It should shorten the Session of Congress.

More importantly, it should help the Legislative Branch of Government to reestablish its independence over the Executive Branch and once again become the servant of the people, as the Constitution intended. Presently there is too much appropriating by the Congress and not enough authority as to how the taxpayers money is spent.

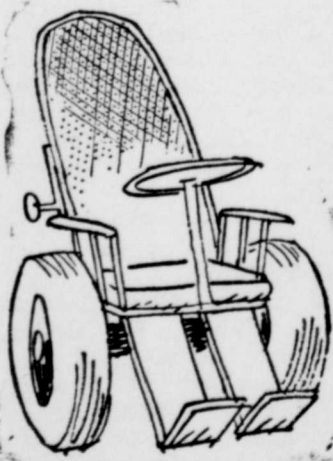

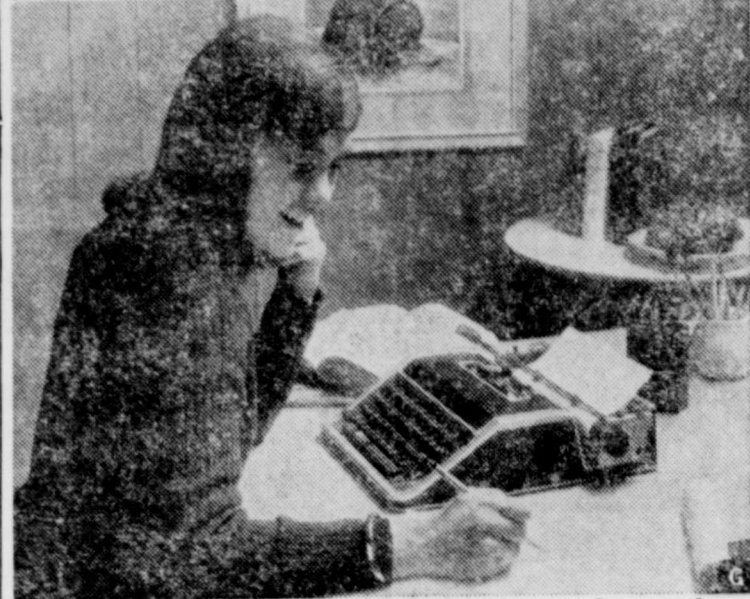

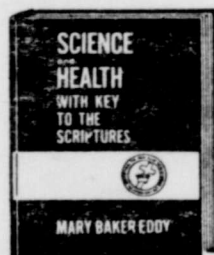

Social Security

Some 3000 Texans who may be eligible for disability benefits under the new Social Security provisions, have not yet applied for them.

Under recent liberalizations of the law, persons with nonpermanent disability may now qualify for benefits. Ellington said that under the previous law a person was eligible only if he had a severe disability that was expected to last a long and indefinite time. Now benefits can be paid if the severe disability has lasted or is expected to last as long as 12 months by his doctors. There are also more liberal requirements for certain persons who are blind.

Know the Proposed Amendments

Editor's Note: A brief explanation of the 16 constitutional amendments to be voted on in November follows. These 16 amendments appeared in the paper through August.

Amendment No. 1
Provides that all land owned by natural persons and designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

Amendment No. 2
Would authorize creation of airport authorities composed of one or more counties.

Amendment No. 3
Increases the permissible term of office for directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years and validating present statutory terms of office for such officials.

Amendment No. 5
Would authorize the legislature to provide for a system of retirement, disability and death benefits for county officials and employees and others.

Amendment No. 6
Provides for payment of assistance to survivors of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections and full paid firemen.

Amendment No. 7
Would repeal the Constitutional provision requiring a poll tax as a prerequisite to voting and requiring the Legislature to provide for annual registration of all voters.

Amendment No. 8
Would authorize the Legislature to enact laws permitting persons to vote for state officers and for president and vice-president of the United States without having fulfilled residence requirements to vote for other officers, as well as laws permitting former residents of the state, for a certain period, to vote absentee for president and vice-president.

Amendment No. 9
Increases to five the number of judges on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals and lengthens the term of that court.

Amendment No. 10
Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy after such change without further election.

Amendment No. 11
Would authorize the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon two-thirds vote of the Legislature and expanding the uses to which money in the Texas Water Development Fund may be put.

Amendment No. 12
Provides the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts.

Amendment No. 13
Would authorize the Legislature to provide for consolidating the functions of government within a county having 1,200,000 or more inhabitants and to provide for inter-governmental contracts between political subdivisions of the county.

Amendment No. 14
Would allow members of the armed forces to vote in Texas upon satisfying the residence requirements applicable to

Establishes the date on which newly-elected members of the Legislature qualify and take office.
