Six Sterling County 4-H club members took part in the Sand Hills Hereford and Quarter Horse Show at Odessa this week. Four of them, Susan, Sally, and Randy Mixon along with Amy Hodges took part in the fat lamb show. Two of the club members, Janis and Lee Igo competed in the Rambouillet sheep show. The Odessa show does not have a junior division, so the club members have to compete with the adult breeders.

In the fat lamb show, Randy Mixon had the fourth place lightweight lamb. Amy Hodges had the eighth place medium weight lamb. At Odessa, only finewool lambs are shown but the sheep have never been made a part of the name, and Hereford cattle and quarterhorses are shown. Actually the Hereford cattle show was dropped some time ago but this year a junior Hereford show was added for the 4-H club and FFA members.

In the Rambouillet sheep show, Janis and Lee Igo brought home eight ribbons and forty dollars in prize money. This, along with the seven dollars Randy won in the lamb show, brought the club's total to \$47 in prize money in the first show of the year. Amy did not receive any prize money as Odessa pays only seven places in their lamb show.

Janis and Lee's ribbons included fifth and tenth places in the ewe lamb show, sixth place in the two tooth ewe class, sixth and seventh in the ram lamb class, and ninth in the two tooth ram class. In the group classes, they placed fifth in the exhibitors flock and fourth in the get-of-sire class. This year's Rambouillet show was stronger than it has been in several years. More flocks were entered and many of the classes had as many as fifteen or more entries.

The Odessa show will end Saturday night with the final performance of the rodeo. Sale of prize winning fat steers and lambs will start at 9:30 a.m. Saturday morning.

Letters have been mailed advising all Sterling County ranchers of the income tax management shortcourse to be held here on Tuesday night, January 10 in the community center at 7:30 p.m. If for some reason, you do not receive a letter, you are invited. Occasionally, someone's name gets omitted in addressing envelopes but this does not mean they are not invited to such a meeting.

The tax management course will be conducted by Robert Mensing, area farm management specialist for Extension District 7 with headquarters in San Angelo. It is sponsored by the County Program Building Committee.

Kensing will cover all phases of agricultural tax matters on the income tax form. Some of the items include depreciation, investment credits, records necessary to prove claims, capital purchases and gains, unusual deductions, wages and other items. There will be ample time to ask questions on matters not covered in the one night course as well as those covered but not clear.

Two other items of interest to many are on the calendar for the near future. The first is the Sterling County Livestock Show on Monday, January 16. All lambs must be in the barn not later than 1:30 Sunday afternoon, January 15. Classification of lambs into the proper breed classes will be done Sunday afternoon as will the weighing. Following the weighing, the lambs will be divided into equal classes.

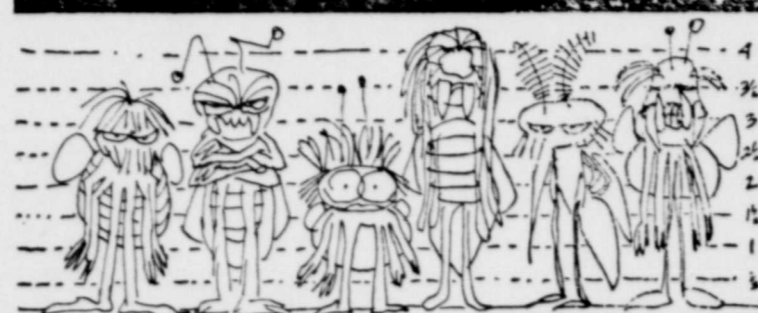
SCIENCE SKETCHES

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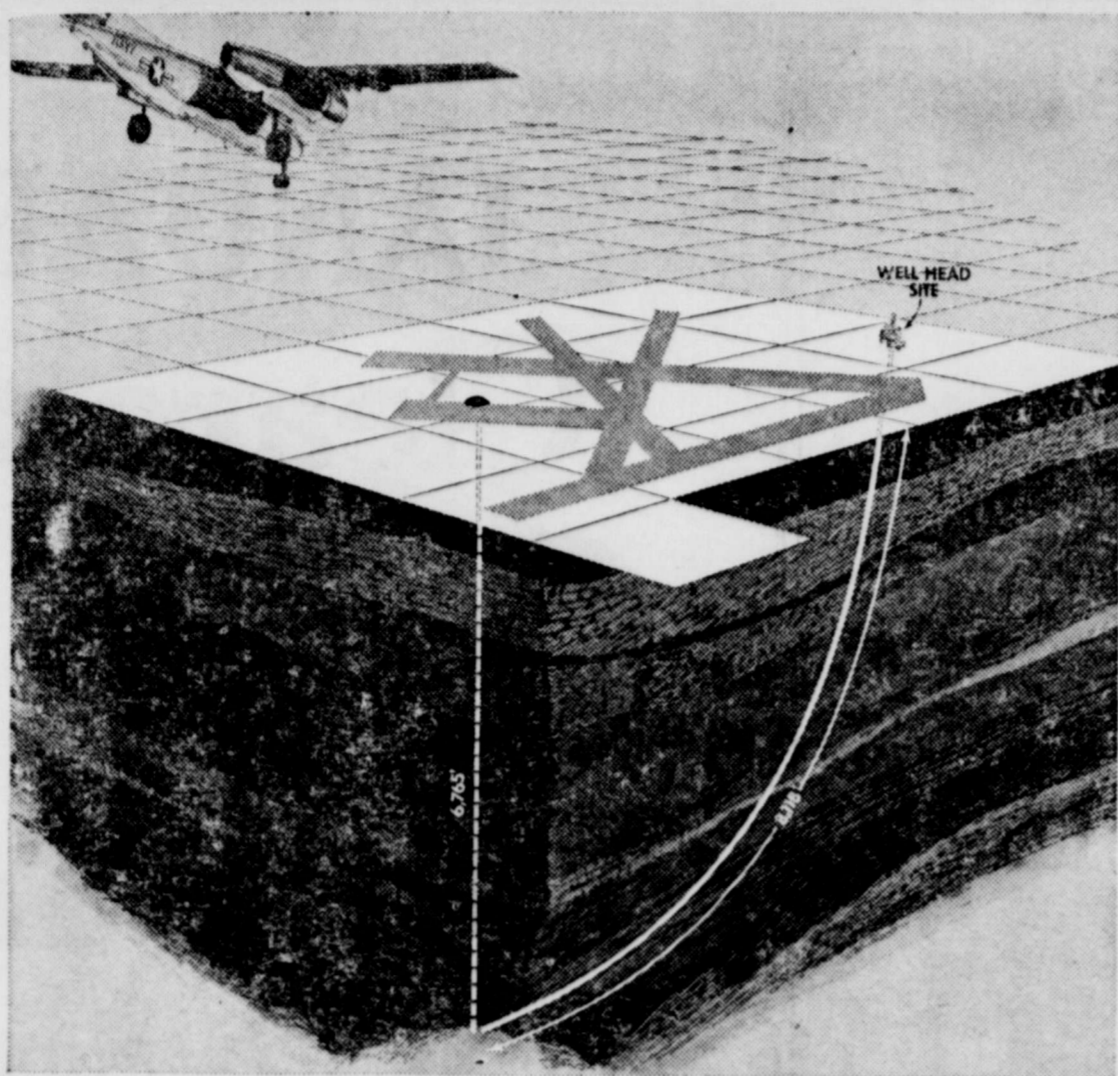

OIL UNDER THE RUNWAYS—An oil-bearing formation below the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station presented an unusual drilling problem for Humble Oil & Refining Company. Wells had to be completed without interfering with any flights or other base operations. Humble, which obtained federal leases to drill for the oil, completed approxi-

mately 30 wells by directional drilling. This illustration shows how a typical well was angled away from the well head site to a completion point three-fourths of a mile away. The black dot on one of the runways indicates where the well would have been drilled in the normal vertical fashion if the surface had not been restricted.

A reward of \$500.00 will be paid by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to any person (other than law enforcement officers) giving information causing the arrest and final conviction of any person or persons found butchering or stealing any sheep or lambs or goats belonging to any Association member in good standing. When two or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted, will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If, upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. Social Security

Some 3000 Texans who may be eligible for disability benefits under the new Social Security provisions, have not yet applied for them.

Under recent liberalizations of the law, persons with nonpermanent disability may now qualify for benefits. El-

ington said that under the previous law a person was eligible only if he had a severe disability that was expected to last a long and indefinite time. Now benefits can be paid if the severe disability has lasted or is expected to last as long as 12 months by his doctors. There are also more liberal requirements for certain persons who are blind.

LONG DISTANCE RATES TO BE REDUCED

Reduced long distance rates for most station-to-station calls within Texas will become effective January 1, 1967 for customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, Southwestern States Telephone and Four States Telephone Companies, according to E. H. Danner, president of the three companies.

State-wide reductions on calls vary from five to fifteen cents on most station-to-station calls over 50 miles in distance within Texas. Reduction for calls over three minutes are even greater, according to Danner. The reductions apply to calls made during the time when "day rates" are in effect as well as to all intrastate (within Texas) station-to-station calls made during the "night rate" hours after 8 p.m. and all day Sunday.

The new tariffs reflecting the reduced rates will be distributed to all offices handling long distance calls at the earliest possible date, Danner stated.

LONGER BENEFITS UNDER SOCIAL SECURITY FOR STUDENTS (Up to 22 Years)

The social security law now provides monthly benefits to unmarried students under age 22. These benefits are payable only on the record of an insured parent who is drawing disability or retirement payments, or who is deceased. The amount of the benefit depends on the earnings of the parent and the number of dependents entitled to payments on the parent's account. Student payments can be as high as \$102 per month and more in future years.

Students whose benefits were stopped under the old law when they reached age 18 may be eligible to receive payments now.

Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, believes here are many students in this area who could qualify for monthly payments.

These payments are not automatic. Any student who has a parent who is retired, disabled, or deceased should contact the people at the social security office for additional information and application forms. If you wait too long, you risk losing benefits.

The district social security office is located at 3000 West Harris in San Angelo. The telephone number is 949-4608. The office remains open each Monday evening until 8:30 for the convenience of those who are unable to come in during regular office hours.
