AROUND THE COUNTY

Twelve Sterling County 4-H Club members will be taking part in the San Antonio Livestock Exposition opening Friday in San Antonio's Joe Freeman Coliseum. They will be exhibiting twenty head of market lambs, thirteen head of registered Rambouillets in the Junior Rambouillet breeding sheep show, and five head of Hampshires in that division of the open sheep show.

Lamb exhibitors and the number of lambs they are exhibiting are as follows: Bobby Lyum, two lambs; Tommy Lyum, two lambs; Kenny Blank, one lamb; Payton Wilson, two lambs; Randy Mixon, one lamb; Sally Mixon, one lamb; Susan Mixon, one lamb; Janis Igo, one lamb; Wayne Igo, one lamb; Pam Entire, two lambs; and Jim Terry, two lambs.

Rambouillet exhibitors in the Junior show are Amy Judges with four rams and four ewes; and Janis and Lee Payne Igo with three rams and five ewes.

Amy Hodges also has two Hampshire rams and three ewes entered in the open Hampshire show.

Fleece exhibitors in the wool show are Foster S. Price with two ram fleeces and two ewe fleeces; Frank Price with one ram fleece and one ewe fleece; Allen Price with one ewe fleece. These are entered in the range division of the wool show.

Clinton Hodges has one fleece entered. It is in the registered Rambouillet show.

The market lambs will be judged on Saturday, beginning at 8:30 a.m. Judge is Myron Luman of Kansas.

The wool show will be judged on Friday, the opening of the show. Wool judge Billy Kidd, county agent of Saba County.

Junior Rambouillets will be judged on Tuesday, February 14. Judge is W.M. Day, county agent of Upton County. Hampshires will be judged on Wednesday by Bob Nichols of Oklahoma State University.

Three visiting county agents from India will be visiting in Sterling County on February 15. The county agent idea is in India and the three are visiting in the United States to get ideas on sheep and goat production. They will spend one day each in Irion, Schleicher, Concho, Sterling and Tom Green Counties.

The three men have spent several months in various parts of the United States before coming here. Their visit is a part of the government's plan to help these countries develop their agricultural economies.

Plans for the day in Sterling County have not been completed but they will probably have time to visit only ranches as they are staying in San Angelo. They are back in San Angelo by 7 p.m. on Thursday, February 16.

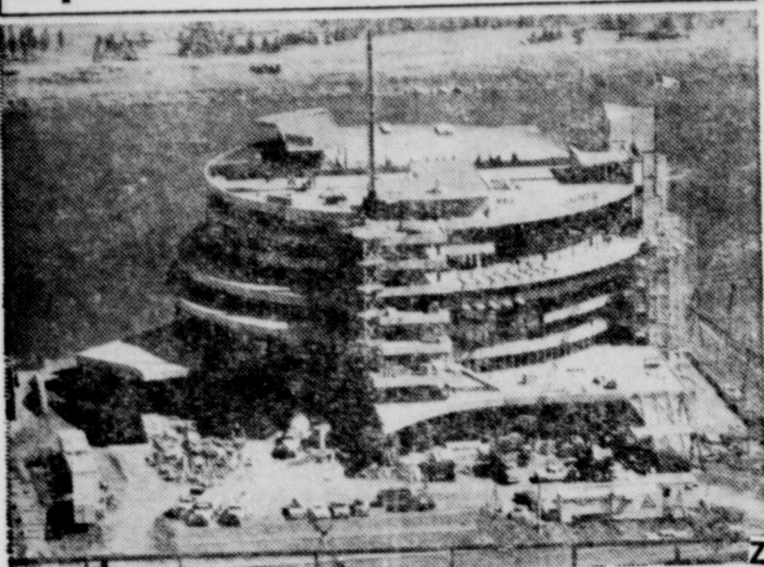

Expo Theme Expressed by France



France is going to the second largest French-speaking city in the world with a challenge to 20th Century man's conscience... via an impressive pavilion on Ile Notre Dame at Montreal's Expo 67. Based on the storyline, "Tradition and Invention," the French exhibits are designed to stimulate both intellect and emotion.

As at all world's fairs, architecture at Expo 67 will be excitingly modernistic, and the French Pavilion, which is built in the shape of a Venetian lamp, will be no exception. The seven story structure, set on a square grid, boldly reflects the island nature of the Expo site, as it is built partly on the ground, and partly in the water.

Inside, visitors will see exhibits showing French progress in all the technical fields. Even the methods of presenting exhibits will be inventive and futuristic. It is planned, for example, to show spectacles by "Son et Lumiere" - impressive sound and light effects.

Striking as it is, the \$4 million Pavilion is not France's first or only contribution to the fair, for the Exposition's very theme, "Man and His World," is drawn from the works of French writer and aviator, Antoine de Saint-Exupery. He wrote, in "Wind, Sand and Stars" ("Terre des Hommes"), "To be a man is to feel that through one's own contribution, one helps to build the world." Expo 67 will express this philosophy through five sub-themes depicting man as Creator, Explorer, Producer, Provider, and Member of the Community.

Expo 67 will begin April 28th and run through October 27th. Over 70 countries in addition to France will participate with their own pavilions.

Social Security

Some 3000 Texans who may be eligible for disability benefits under the new Social Security provisions, have not yet applied for them.

Under recent liberalizations of the law, persons with nonpermanent disability may now qualify for benefits. Ellington said that under the previous law a person was eligible only if he had a severe disability that was expected to last a long and indefinite time. Now benefits can be paid if the severe disability has lasted or is expected to last as long as 12 months by his doctors. There are also more liberal requirements for certain persons who are blind.

**LONGER BENEFITS UNDER
 SOCIAL SECURITY FOR
 STUDENTS (Up to 22 Years)**

The social security law now
 provides monthly benefits to
 unmarried students under age
 22. These benefits are pay-
 able only on the record of an
 insured parent who is draw-
 ing disability or retirement
 payments, or who is deceased.
 The amount of the benefit de-
 pends on the earnings of the
 parent and the number of de-
 pendents entitled to pay-
 ments on the parent's ac-
 count. Student payments can
 be as high as \$102 per month
 and more in future years.

Students whose benefits
 were stopped under the old
 law when they reached age 18
 may be eligible to receive
 payments now.

Ted F. Moellering, District
 Manager of the San Angelo
 Social Security Office, believes
 here are many students in this
 area who could qualify for
 monthly payments.

These payments are not au-
 tomatic. Any student who has
 a parent who is retired, dis-
 abled, or deceased should con-
 tact the people at the social
 security office for additional
 information and application
 forms. If you wait too long,
 you risk losing benefits.

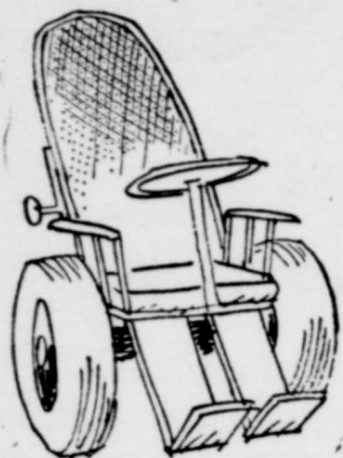

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—While most thoughts are on such momentous questions as the war in Viet Nam, higher taxes, inflationary pressures, and other problems to be solved, there is news in mundane things.

The Navy has a project called "Operation Green Turtle". Maybe it is not so mundane after all that the Navy is involved with the subject of turtles. As a matter of fact, they become pretty important in a lot of places and have to be frankly admired. There seems to be something more noble about their actions in a way than anything a battleship can do.

At any rate, the Navy is taking a considerable interest in turtles. The particular species to which the Navy is giving some special attention is the giant sea turtles weighing several hundred pounds seen mostly in zoos, unless one spends a lot of time around the sea. This fascinating operation in which the Navy is engaged may make a great deal more sense than some other things. It is trying to save something. It is the great green sea turtle that finds the Coast of Costa Rica as a favorite place to lay its eggs before, once again, moving out to sea. The surprising thing is that the Navy, since the early 1960's, has been flying baby turtles to various locations throughout the Caribbean and the Gulf of Mexico with the idea of establishing more turtle colonies at various spots in South America. (This includes Bimini in the southernmost part of the Bahamas.)

The chief purpose of this whole operation is to fly thousands of infant turtles to these spots, where they will be released and where, by nature, they are expected to return, after maturity, to raise their families.

This is a source of food for many people of Latin America and around the Caribbean. Not many of us would like turtle soup with our chili, but in times past, it has been a mainstay with some of our neighbors and the supply has

run out in quite a few places.

For the past two years, the University of Florida has been carrying on a research program and finding, as is the habit of much of marine life, the adult turtle returns to the very spot where it grew up. The researchers prevailed on the Navy to help them with a conservation problem to which few had given any thought in the past. Like much other wildlife, there is concern that if something is not done, the marine turtle may disappear and not maintain its ancient role as a source of food. It seems that the early voyages of Columbus and others who followed him depended a great deal on the number of turtles they could catch and store aboard, while kegs of beef spoiled.

At the beginning, we were officially interested in an adequate source of native food for people around the Caribbean area, such as the Virgin Island, over which we have jurisdiction. Evidently, the idea has caught on, and an organization called the Caribbean Conservation Corporation has been formed, which is expanding the operation to those places suitable for turtle habitats.

As yet unknown is the way giant turtles will appear to cruise about the seas without so much as a radar set. They are supposed to swim and float thousands of miles, and always return to the beach where they were born. Speculation is that they navigate by the sun and the stars, a feat deserving of admiration, if true.

Some very interesting things turn up in publications around Washington, and this is one of them. It is doubtful that very many people have any real respect for turtles, but from a publication by the United States Naval Institute, called "Proceedings", is the story about the Navy's interest in turtles.

Aside from the usefulness of turtles as a source of food, it seems they are pretty intelligent, which is enough to end this essay with: Turtles seem to know what they are doing—and it make one wonder if we do.
