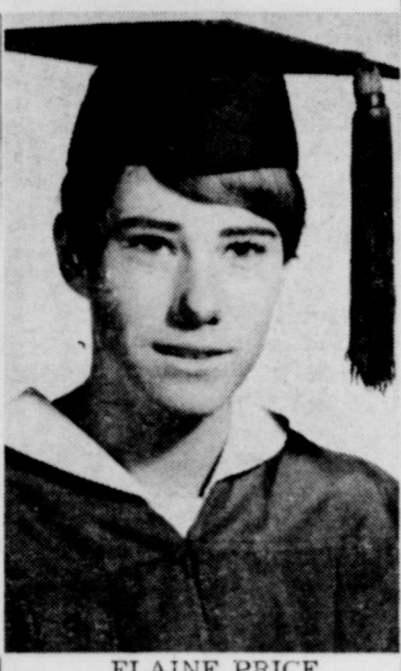
HONOR STUDENTS NAMED

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington D. C. - In his State of the Union message delivered to Congress in January, the President promised he would submit proposed legislation for amending laws to prevent long tie-ups of vital industries because of strikes.

Recommendations on this subject have not yet been received. It is reported that the Presidential experts are still at odds among themselves on an approach.

Numerous union contracts expire in the next few months. Some of our largest industries are involved.

A few days ago it required only a few hours to rush through Congress a Resolution to forestall the threatened nationwide railroad strike. If not settled within 20 days, the Congress will have to again act, by passing emergency legislation or tolerating a national railroad tie-up. It is short-sighted to leave the national interest exposed to such a hazard.

Everyone is aware of the fact that the problem of settling strikes is both sensitive and complex. The Congress itself should not be in the business of mediation, but there comes a time when additional powers ought to be voted to cope with emergencies, even if no perfect solution has been devised. No one has come up with any single satisfactory formula in national emergencies or lockouts. It may be necessary to grant the President a wider choice of remedies which could be applied to different situations as may be necessary in the national interest. It is entirely possible that Congress may have to broaden the powers which may be exercised under the National Railway Labor Act and the Taft-Hartley Act that to try to cope with every emergency situation after it has arisen.

Legislation has been introduced which provides that the Mediation Board would notify the President if, in its judgement, a dispute between a railroad or an airline and its employees should threaten to deprive any section of the country essential transportation service. The President's then would have a choice of procedures. He could appoint an emergency board or a special board to investigate the dispute. If an emergency board is appointed, it would be directed to outline the facts behind the dispute and make recommendations within a 60-day period, with a right to extend the period for another 60 days. Work would continue during that time and 30 days afterwards.

If no settlement is reached at the end of this period, the President could send a report to Congress and ask for legislation or he could put the working conditions recommended by the Board into effect up to 120 days to allow

more time for a settlement. As an alternative, he could notify the parties of his intention to name a special board. This method is a last resort towards arbitration.

If no settlement was reached in this period the President could name an arbitration board of three, with one representative from each side and a public member. Its decision would be final and binding up to two years, subject only to an appeal to the Courts.

The proponents of this measure point out that it would afford a variety of routes to a solution allowing flexibility in meeting different situations and intensifying pressure for agreement.

A great many people shy away from forced arbitration. In this instance, however, compulsory arbitration comes only after all else has failed to protect the public interest and limits such final action to two years.

Eventually, if not now, there must be better answers to prevent paralysis of vital industries.



Three samples of worms from livestock have been sent to the Mission Laboratory of the screwworm eradication plant by Sterling County livestock producers in the past week. All three samples were identified as non-screwworm by the laboratory.

The first sample reported by the lab was sent in by Curly Wilson from the Collins-Wilson ranch south of Sterling City. The second sample was sent in by William and J.Q. Foster from the ranch north of Sterling City on the Colorado City road. Sample number three was sent in from the David Glass ranch 16 miles west of town by Lynn Glass. The Glass sample was taken from cattle; the others were taken from sheep.

This is the time of the year to begin screwworm watch. Even though it is dry, there is still a possibility of worm cases developing from some means. The time to stop them is before they get started. Watch your livestock, doctor all cases, and send in samples from anything you suspect might be screwworms.

Social Security

Older people in the Sterling City area who have paid doctor bills but have not yet claimed their medicare doctor bill insurance payments are invited to have their claims checked by the San Angelo social security office before mailing them to the medicare carrier, according to Ted F. Moellering, district manager.

"In the first six months of the medicare program some benefit payments were delayed because the applicants did not include all the necessary information with their claims," he said.

Moellering believes that most people will need this help only the first time they make a medical insurance claim. "The Medicare Handbook, which is given to all beneficiaries, explains how to make the claims," he said, "and the form is relatively simple, but most people can use some advice the first time they apply. We're glad to offer assistance, and we believe we can help many people to avoid some delay in their payment."

Moellering noted that the medicare claim may be made either by the patient or by the doctor if he accepts assignment of the insurance. If the doctor applies for the medicare payment, he bills the patient only for any part of the \$50 deductible.

Under the other method of payment the doctor bills the patient, the patient pays the bill, and then the patient sends the completed request for payment form to the medicare carrier. A statement from the doctor showing the treatment given and the charges already paid by the patient must be furnished either on the request for payment form or in a separate receipted bill.

In the Sterling City area, medicare doctor bill insurance is handled by Blue Cross-Blue Shield in Dallas.

The same simple one-page request for payment form is mailed to the carrier no matter whether the payment is to go to the patient or to the doctor. Doctor's offices, accustomed to filling out insurance forms, should have no difficulty providing the few items of information requested, Moellering noted. But handling of forms received directly from medicare beneficiaries is sometimes delayed because some essential item of information has been omitted.

If the beneficiary leaves out his medicare identification number, for example, it is impossible to verify that he is signed up for the doctor bill insurance, or how much of his deductible amount has been paid. Some elderly people with failing eyesight are unable to make legible entries. And some do not get adequately itemized receipts from their physicians, or forget to enclose the receipts with their claims. If the request for payment form is incomplete or improperly filled out the medicare carrier has to write back to the beneficiary, thus delaying the payment.

"The social security office does not make the decision or pay the claim," Moellering said. "The law requires that the payments be handled through the selected medicare carriers. But we can answer general question about medicare and help people in the Sterling City area get their applications ready for review by the carrier."

"If an older person cannot visit the social security office in person, he can send the forms by mail or by someone else," he said, "but in this case, he should be sure to give his telephone number."

The San Angelo social security office is located at 3000 West Harris. The phone number is 949-4608. Office hours are from 8:30 a.m. — 7:30 p.m. on Monday, and 8:30 a.m. — 4:30 p.m. Tuesday through Friday.

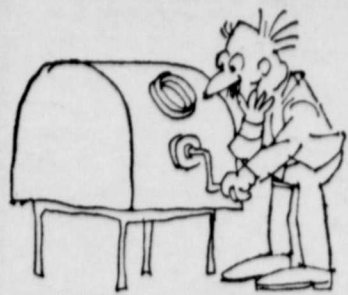

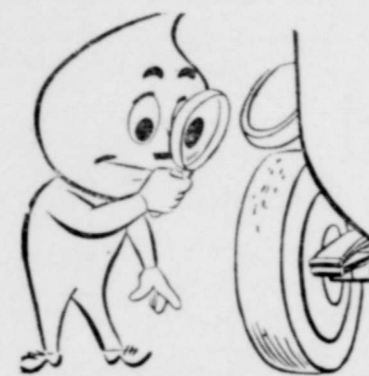

Education Service Centers Established

Education Service Centers—a new development in Texas education—will move a step closer to establishment this month with a series of organizational meetings in 20 regions across the State.

When established these Education Service Centers will (1) provide for the establishment of the Regional Media Centers authorized by the Fifty-ninth Legislature (2) coordinate and encourage development of supplemental educational services and centers under Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 in accordance with State law and policies of the United States Office of Education and (3) provide a locally-oriented base for statewide educational planning.

Through the media services, the regional centers will provide participating school districts with such visual aid as motion pictures and slides, a magnetic tape duplicating service for audio and video tapes, and a visual duplication service to reproduce transparencies and filmstrips.

In addition to providing schools in a region with instructional media services, a center will provide an opportunity for resources of the region—metropolitan and rural—to contribute to educational planning.

Still additional services will be developed by each center in answer to regional needs. And as needs vary from region to region, so will services. Through participating on the Joint Committee, local schools will help to determine what those services should be.

The Fifty-ninth Legislature, with its enactment of Senate Bill 408, paved the way for these media services of the Education Service Centers. This bill provided for a State program for educational media for Texas schools and authorized the State Board of Education to establish needed plans and procedures to facilitate media services.

Under provisions of this law, the State should be ready to implement such centers by September 1, 1967.

HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS FROM THE AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION
Rheumatic Fever

Rheumatic fever accounts for much of the heart disease found in children and young adults, says Today's Health Guide, the American Medical Association's book of health information for the American family.

Rheumatic fever usually occurs between the ages of 5 and 15, although adults can have it. It may affect any part of the body temporarily, but damage to the heart, which can be long lasting, is the greatest danger.

Rheumatic heart disease results from the scarring of the heart muscle and valves by rheumatic fever. This may interfere with the vital work of the heart. Many patients recover without permanent injury to the heart valves, but the disease has a way of repeating itself and each attack renews the chances of heart damage.

Rheumatic fever is preceded by a streptococcal infection such as strep sore throat, scarlet fever or a strep ear infection. It can be prevented by treating the strep infection promptly and thoroughly with antibiotics. Because persons who have had rheumatic fever are susceptible rather than immune to repeat attacks, long-term preventive treatment is often prescribed for them. Regular doses of penicillin, under the direction of a physician, can prevent further strep infections and thus ward off subsequent attacks of rheumatic fever.

You can protect your child against rheumatic fever by consulting your doctor if the child develops a sudden, severe sore throat, or if he has been exposed to someone with scarlet fever or another strep infection.
