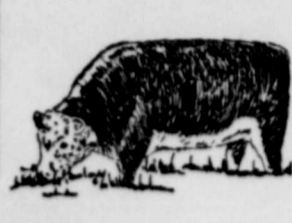

Sixty pets received the rabies shots Monday afternoon.

The annual clinic is held each year to protect pets from rabies.

Iron chlorosis is beginning to show up on lawns and ornamental plants.

Iron can be supplied to flowers, shrubs, and lawn grasses in the form of iron sulfate or iron chelate.

Foliar sprays generally in this area will give a faster "kick" because of the chemical lock.

The iron chelates should be used as a spray or fertilizer at the rates recommended on the containers.

A new hormone-type herbicide, picloram, is being combined with 2,4,5-T to control mesquite at thirteen different locations on seventy blocks in Texas.

Picloram, sold under the trade name of Tordon, is new. It hasn't been cleared for a label yet by the Food and Drug Administration.

Picloram has not been released by the Food and Drug Administration pending further research.

Thus far, the new herbicide is showing good results when combined with the old standard, 2,4, 5-T.

In some of the research blocks started in 1964, the kill has increased from 11.7 with 2,4, 5-T alone to 50.2 with the combination.

The blocks on the Foster ranch were put out in 1966. Thus, there are not any concrete results in regard to rootkill at this time.

As stated previously, picloram has not been released by the Food and Drug Administration pending further research.

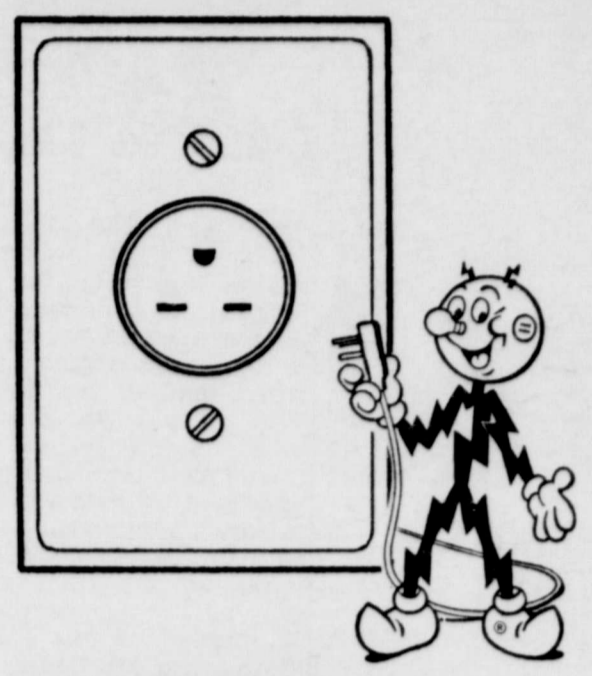

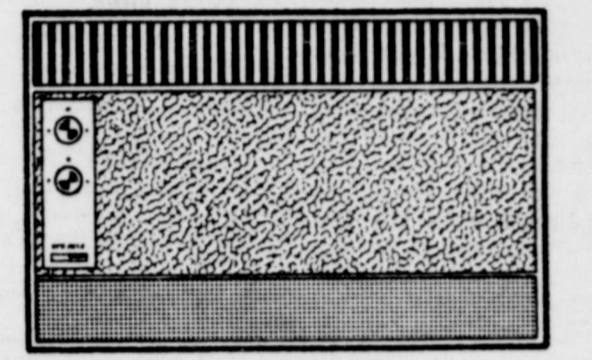


LAND GIFT TO UNIVERSITY

WASHINGTON, D. C. The threatened conflict between the Arab States and Israel should have a sobering effect on our Government's official policy of "building bridges" with the Soviet Union and its Communist satellites in Eastern Europe. It should put a damper on the support by some of the largest American businesses for the Administration policy of increasing trade with the Russians.

On more than one occasion Ambassador to the United Nations Arthur Goldberg has made it clear that peace in Viet Nam rests with the Soviet Union. According to the statements of Nasser of Egypt, the official line of the Russians is complete support for attacks against the State of Israel.

Not only are the Russians blocking any action in the United Nations, but they are checkmating any possible moves by the Geneva Conference machinery provided in the 1954 Agreements for settlement of the Viet Nam war.

All the talk about a policy for the United States to make concessions in East-West Trade Agreements has a hollow sound unless the Moscow Government declares its efforts for peace in the Middle East and Viet Nam.

It is strange indeed that our Government and American businessmen have started a campaign to break a log-jam in trade with the Soviet Union. Washington is supporting the participation of American companies in a Trade Fair in Moscow at this very time. The exhibition, concentrating particularly on food processing and food packaging equipment opened May 16.

It should be clear to policy makers that we can not satisfactorily end the war in Viet Nam in a reasonable time or bring about a satisfactory peace by making unilateral concessions to Russia or by blinding ourselves to the realities of world power politics. The world politics in this instance wears the same brand which it has always worn—world Communist domination.

Now, after feeding Hanoi the supplies to kill our men in South Viet Nam, their long range strategy in the Middle East is showing itself at a frightening speed.

A glance at the map is enough to show that Russian ambitions in that part of the world include the control of the Red Sea and beyond it. They include the Persian Gulf, source of Western Europe's oil supply, and to control that supply is an invaluable advantage. The complete control would mean a dominant influence on the economic life of Western Europe.

For more than 40 years the secret intent of the Communists has been known. The center of their strategy is to find conditions where strife of any sort or kind can be fomented. It then becomes a vehicle for their use. Although it is presently played down by our officials, the numerous trouble spots around the world do not appear to be accidents.

Their efforts for crisis in Berlin, in Indonesia, in Hong Kong, were unsuccessful. Earlier, they were unsuccessful in Greece and Turkey, in Iran and in Ghana. At the present time however, the situation in Greece, Cyprus, the Middle East and, of course, Viet Nam, supported by Soviet intrigue,

Sweet Potato Casserole

Drain and mash potatoes. Blend in pineapple, 2 tablespoons butter, egg, sugar, and salt. Gently stir in ½ cup cereal. Bake in a 1-quart casserole at 350° about 20 minutes. Mix remaining butter and cereal; sprinkle over top of casserole. Makes 4 servings.

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STRENGTH IN RESERVE

The Army Reserve by word is training. Constant readiness is its goal. One of every 200 Americans belongs to the Army Reserve and each of them, whether in units or in the Ready Reserve Mobilization Reinforcement Pool, lives by this word.

Performing double duty, members of the Army Reserve may wear a homburg, or a sombrero, or a steelworker's hard hat, or a bus driver's cap, or any one of a dozen other types of civilian headgear as they go about their daily tasks in civilian life. But, during 48 to 72 training assemblies, many of which take up whole weekends, and two weeks each summer, they doff civilian headgear for Army hats.

More than 700,000 members of the Ready Reserve may change hats this way. The other two categories of the Army Reserve—Standby and Retired—are not so directly affected, although their ranks swell the total number of Army Reservists to more than one million.

The Ready Reserve, first to be called, could be augmented by the Standby and Retired members of the Army Reserve in time of war or other national emergency declared by the Congress.

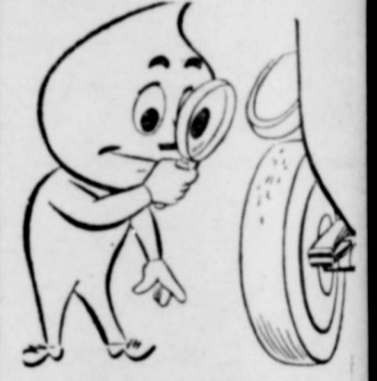
Army Reserve units are diversified. They total 3,575 and run the gamut from 4-man Judge Advocate General detachments to 5,000-man infantry brigades. In between can be found all types of combat, support and service units. Some highly specialized units are found only in the Army Reserve. Others are identical to active Army units. All of them undergo training constantly to achieve and maintain the levels of military proficiency which make a military unit ready for combat.

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
