



Sterling was in the lead at halftime 14-12 but Wall picked up 2 TD's in the third and fourth quarters to pull ahead of the Eagles at the last.

The Eagles took the kick and very quickly had the ball on Walls 3-yard line, where quarterback Phil Cole pushed it over for six points. The Hawks took the ball after the TD kick and pushed it to the Eagle's 6-yard line and a pass from Diershke to Block made the score even for the first quarter.

In the second quarter the Eagles managed to get the oval down to the 1-yard line where quarterback Cole again gained paydirt on a keeper. Esau Vargas garnered the two extra points. Not to be outdone, the Hawks' Eddie Holik lumbered eleven yards for a TD, making the halftime score, Eagles 14, Wall 12.




